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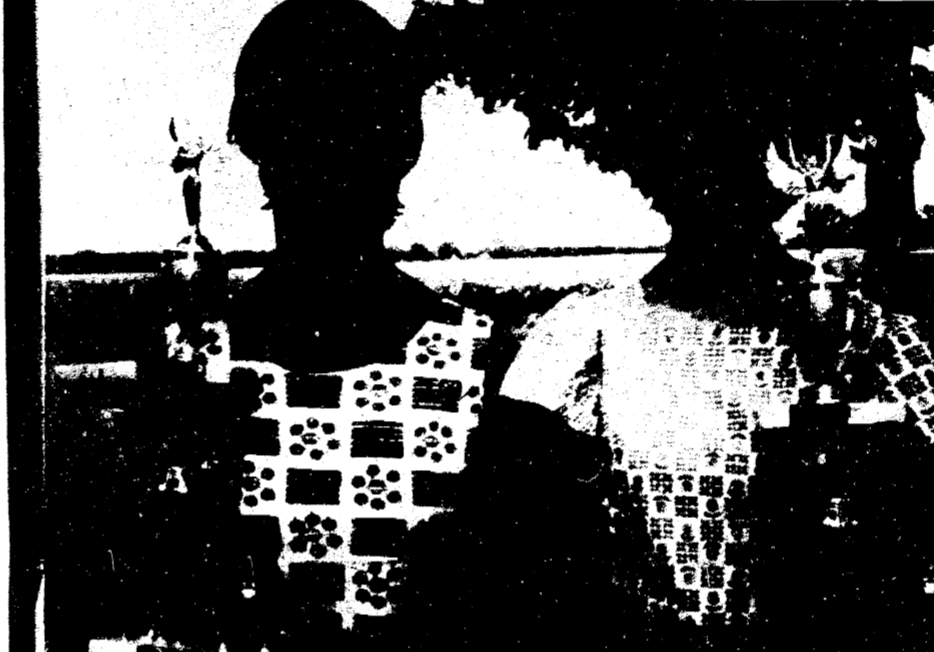

Voters Approve Millage

On Monday, August 23, Manchester School District Voters approved 4 millage propositions, Proposition I for 12.78 mills providing additional fund for operating purposes by 1123 yes votes to 180 no votes. Proposition II - 2 mills for additional operating purposes. 877 yes votes to 439 no votes. Proposition III - 1 mill for the purpose of providing additional funds for maintenance and repair of school building, ground and equipment. 758 yes votes to 548 no votes. Proposition IV - 2 mills for the purpose of providing additional funds for restoration of extra curricular activities to include music and athletics. 678 yes votes to 628 no votes.

Manchester Board of Education Faces Possible Injunction

William J. Green, Superintendent of Schools, announced last evening at a Special Board of Education meeting that he had been informed by Mr. Richard Gray, local representative of the Michigan Education Association, that the local Manchester Education Association was considering a grievance and/or injunction against the school district as a result of reduction of staff made necessary by a cut in revenues and an alleged violation of the Master Agreement in labeling increased operational millage. In light of the possibility of such action by the teachers association, Mr. Green has withheld all new appointments and cancelled all school calendar activities. In further action, Mr. Green commented that a school calendar submitted to him by the Manchester Education Association was equitable and he would have recommended that calendar for approval last evening were it not possible to encounter difficulties with an injunction and/or grievance. He stated that the Board of Education and the community must maintain the rights to establish the school calendar and the rights to operate the schools in concert with the desires of the taxpayer. Mr. Green further stated that he hoped teachers would reconsider any possible action because of the possible danger to the development of a climate of learning beneficial to children and stated to the Board that he would rather not see the schools open at all this year if the educational program were to be counter-productive to the learning process because of the absence of totally committed team effort in working together for the benefit of children. Mr. Green in checking with the Board attorneys stated that their attorneys have informed him that there are no violations of the Master Agreement and that, in fact, that grantmanship procured by the district has in fact saved several positions that otherwise would have had to be cut. The Superintendent stated he would keep the community completely informed through the Board of Education and that every attempt would be made by both he and the Board to resolve any possible conflicts in order to assure the opening of school. In reply to a question as to who was responsible for this action locally, Mr. Green refused to give the names of any professional staff members involved because he felt it would be unethical and unprofessional on his part to involve personalities in an association matter.

CARR-TAYLOR DEBATE

Sixth District Republican Congressional candidate Clifford Taylor announced today that he would accept WJIM TV's offer to sponsor two televised debates between Taylor and Democrat Congressional nominee Bob Carr.
In accepting WJIM's offer, Taylor pointed out that both he and Carr had pledged in 1974 that they would return to the district for televised debates if elected. That pledge Taylor noted, occurred in a similar debate on WJIM in October 1974.
In addition to agreeing to appear on the TV-6 broadcasts, Taylor called upon Carr to accept a challenge offered by

Taylor in May, to mutually appear throughout the district and debate the issues before live audiences at townships and city halls. "I sent a letter to Mr. Carr asking him to appear in debate throughout the district during the campaign", Taylor said. "It was my feeling that in this bicentennial year a return to the old traditional styles of campaigning would be appropriate, and in addition, help both Mr. Carr and me avoid spending huge sums of money on advertising by taking our campaigns directly to the people in this manner. Mr. Carr however, has never responded to my suggestions. I hope, therefore, that he will at least accept WJIM's offer and provide all the district's voters with at least this opportunity to see the candidates side by side."

Taylor further noted that Carr's public response to his debate challenge has been to call it a political ploy. In commenting on this, Taylor said, "It was indeed interesting to hear Mr. Carr accuse me of using debates as a political ploy in as much as it was Mr. Carr in 1972 who criticized then Congressman Charles Chamberlain for refusing to debate with him in that campaign. I think the rapid transformation seen in Mr. Carr from 1972 to today is not surprising, however, and is the kind of change seen frequently once candidates gain election to office. It seems, in short, that incumbency causes many people to lose touch with their constituents by becoming unwilling to publicly defend their records."

THE FOLLOWING NOTICE OF HEARING IS GIVEN
PURSUANT TO THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION'S
ORDER IN CASES NO. U-4840 AND U-4621 DATED APRIL 12, 1976.

Monthly hearings will be held before the Michigan Public Service Commission for the purpose of considering authorization to permit Consumers Power Company to reflect in monthly billings to its customers charges or credits for changes in appropriate items of expense associated with purchased and net interchange power from a cost included in previously approved rates.

A hearing will be held on September 10, 1976 at 9:30 AM in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan to consider inclusion of a proposed purchased and net interchange power adjustment charge of minus .36 mills per kilowatt-hour to be applied to bills rendered to Consumers Power Company customers in the October 1976 billing period.

The hearing shall be for the purpose of determining the amount of purchased and interchange power expense incurred during the calendar month of July 1976 and the reasons therefor. Details of the calculation of the proposed adjustment will be presented along with a summary of net system kilowatt-hour requirements including details of the various types of purchased and interchange power transactions and circumstances necessitating any outages of installed capacity for a period exceeding ninety (90) days. This information will be available on and after August 31, 1976 for examination and inspection at the offices of the Commission Secretary, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 and at the offices of the Executive Director of Rates, Research and Data Control of Consumers Power Company, 212 W. Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201.

The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested adjustment, in whole or in part, and may grant a lesser or greater adjustment than that requested. Interested parties may intervene by placing an appearance on the record at the hearing.

SETBACK FOR SAFETY

Farmers are getting prepared to "storm the citadel" of the Michigan Department of Labor on September 13 to voice their opposition to what they call an "unjustifiable" proposal. MI-OSHA has decided that farmers in this state should be required to retro-fit (build guards for all the old equipment they have on the farm) even though this same proposal was turned down at the federal level because the resulting economic impact, nationwide, could not be justified.

Right now, farmers are checking the machinery on their farms that have moving parts which would have to be covered under the standard and figuring the costs involved—if, that is, it could be done at all. On some equipment, there's no place to attach a guard; dealers are refusing to fabricate the needed parts because of product liability; and—should the farmer decide to build a guard or shield himself—he could be liable for improper manufacturing of a part if someone gets hurt as the result of his "do-it-yourself" project. Consequently, if the standard goes through, a lot of older equipment will

simply have to be junked. What concerns Michigan farmers even more than the economics involved (costs of retro-fit are estimated to be about \$1,300 for the average farm) is their conviction that it would be a setback for safety. Any law that would allow a government bureau more police powers, more punitive powers, and more control over private businesses, creates a resentment between farmers and OSHA. The result is resistance—and destruction of a climate in which farmers and OSHA could work together toward a common goal. In this kind of situation, safety—which should be the primary concern—loses top priority, sort of like the girl who is forgotten while two rivals fight it out.

Farmers' fight against retro-fit is not a fight against safety. Basically, it's a fight against an ever-growing government bureaucracy which has bred a vast army of bureaucrats with the power—one way or another—to reach into every home in America. Farmers would like to be able to look to OSHA for safety education, for assistance in making their farms safe places to work. But when a bureau has the power to regulate every activity on their farms, fine them, or even put them in jail, it becomes an enemy rather than a helpful friend....And a setback for safety.

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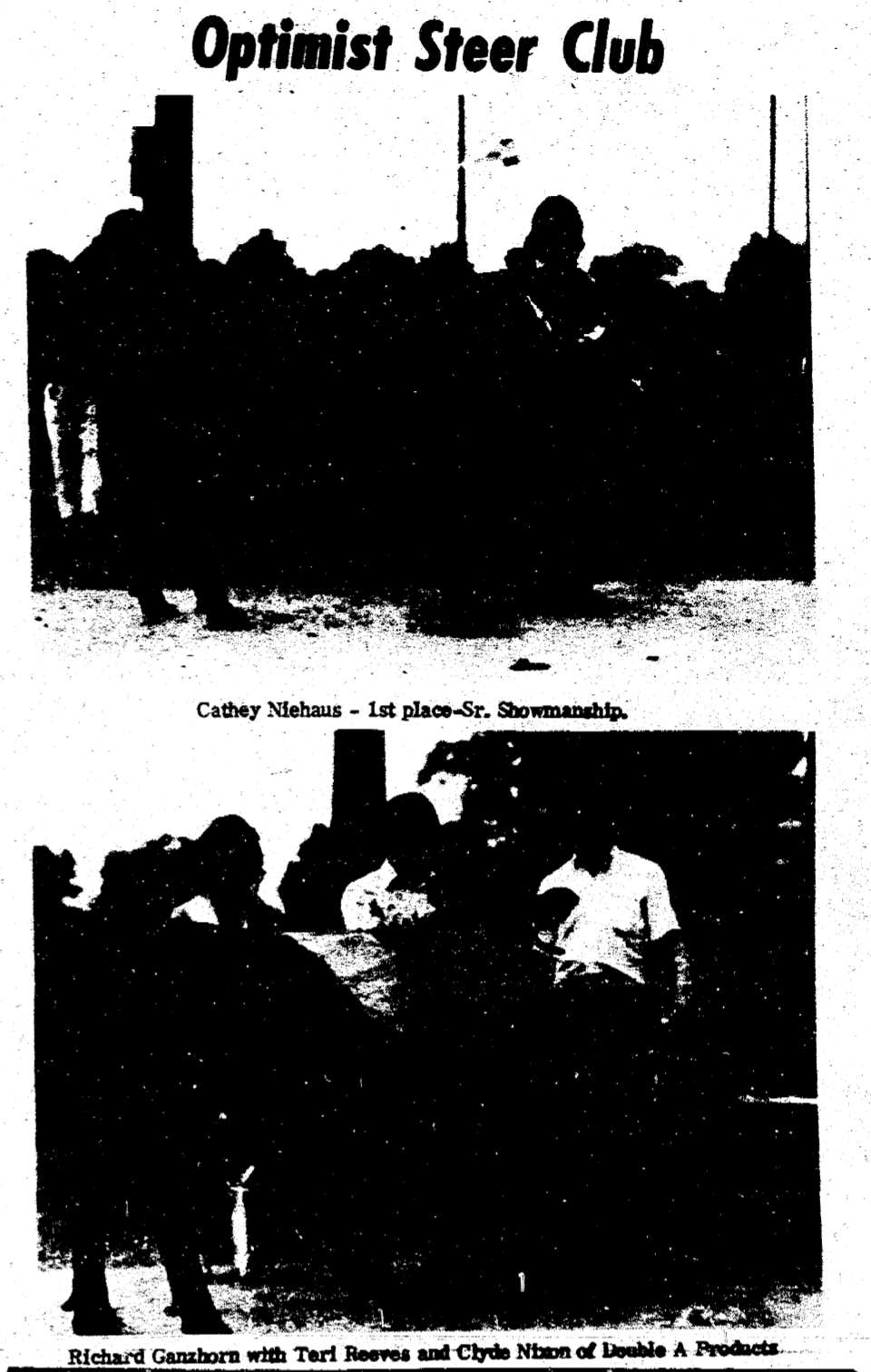


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
