This summer was the most successful in the history of the Manchester Track Club, as members won numerous awards and set several records.

Probably the most successful runner was senior to be Dan Heslip. Dan won trophies at two meets sponsored by the Lipke Track Club of Detroit. In one 4 mile race Dan took first in the 17 and under age division with a strong 22:05 clocking. Dan also took first in a 3 mile race with a swift 15:56 time.

Dan and Sophomore Kurt Norgaard, both completed a hard 13 mile mini-marathon put on by the Sauk Valley Sporting Goods Store in the Irish Hills, and both placed well up with the leaders in their age divisions.

Thirteen year old freshman to be, Doug Padley also found success in an event sponsored by Sauk Valley, as he won a first place trophy for the 13 and under age division in a 5 mile hill climb race.

#### UNITED WAY PICKS 1976 POSTER CHILD

The 1976 United Way of Michigan poster child is a lively four year old youngster who lives because of a kidney transplant. His name is Ray Carl, Jr., and he lives with his parents on a farm outside Alma.

As poster child for the United Way of Michigan, Ray will symbolize the thousands of people who benefit from the work of the health agencies supported by the United Way of Michigan. Health agencies like the Kidney Foundation of Michigan, the UWM agency specifically working in the area of kidney problems.

Ray is pictured on the 1976 poster along with three members of organized labor's family. Each of the four has been a transplant recipient. The others are: Raymond Tacker of Saginaw, a retired UAW member; John Johnson of Romulus, a retired steelworker; and Mrs. James J. Schraaben of Grand Ledge, whose husband is a mem-

ber of Laborers Local 998 of Lansing. Ray was introduced to the press at a luncheon in Lansing at which the State AFL-CIO was host. Walter Campbell, Secretary-Treasurer of the Michigan State AFL-CIO and Chairman of the Board of the United Way of Michigan, presided at the luncheon and introduced Donald J. Plazinski, President of the United Way of Michigan, who extended greetings and appreciation to everyone involved.

William C. Marshall, President of the Michigan State AFL-CIO, briefly reviewed labor's involvement in United Way activities, and expressed his appreciation for all agency services available in Michigan.

The Carl family recognized a problem with Ray when he was about 18 months of age. He was treated at the hospital in Gratiot County and later was transferred to the Mott Children's unit of the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor. He became a dialysis patient and then in March of 1975 received a kidney transplant from a cadaver. He can lead a near normal life, but receives medication to fight the possible rejection of the transplant.

The United way of Michigan is the state-

wide federation of 23 health and community service organizations. It provides financing, budgeting and communications services for its members. UWM receives its funds from more than 100 local United Way campaigns held throughout Michigan each year.

Besides the Kidney Foundation, UWM members include the Heart Association, Cerebral Palsy Association, Leader Dogs for the Blind, Children's Leukemia Foundation and 18 others.

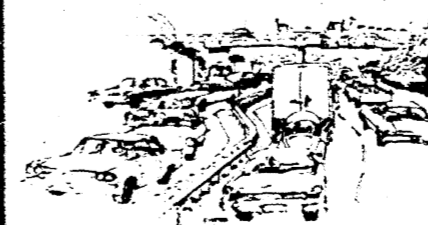

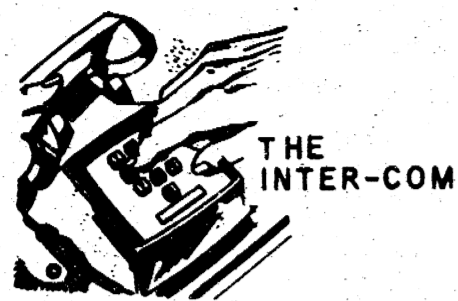

**Slimming Down the Irish Potato**

Although almost every country has developed a potato dish which has become a specialty, to Americans Ireland always seems the home of hearty potato cookery.

The Irish enjoy potatoes as much as Limerick ham or a drop of fine Irish whiskey. They have created from the basic tuber (which originated in Peru) both plain and fancy dishes, such as Champ and Colcannon.

If you have a few pounds of potatoes you want to incorporate into a meal you might start with a highball of Paddy Irish Whiskey, one of the finest quality spirits from the Emerald Isle. Much lighter than years ago, fine Irish like Paddy has a lively, non-smokey flavor that suits a pre-dinner drink, especially if it's a hearty menu. Then offer a platter of grilled shoulder chops with green salad, and a heap of Irish potato cakes.

It's important to note that it's not the potato that is fattening, only the rich fixings that go with it. For sour cream substitute plain yogurt, only 8 calories per tablespoon. For butter, a tablespoon of diet margarine gives you only half the calories. Butter-flavored salt has almost no calories, as well as imitation bacon bits. Diet salad dressing, especially blue cheese, tastes great mixed into a baked potato and so does canned beef broth thickened with a little flour to make imitation gravy.



Potatoes ClanWilliam, with cheddar cheese melted over the top, or potato cakes too, can be reduced in calories by using certain ingredients. But the flavor of these Irish favorites remains, a good follow-up to a Paddy Irish Whiskey relaxer.

**Potatoes ClanWilliam**  
Scoop flesh from baked potatoes, mash with a little milk. Stir in grated sharp cheddar to taste, fresh minced onion and imitation bacon bits. Put mixture back into empty shells, dot with diet margarine, rebake in preheated, very hot oven for 10 minutes until tops are golden brown.

**Irish Potato Cakes**  
Mix 2 cups flour with 2 1/2 tbsps diet margarine and pinch of salt. Mix in 1 1/2 cups mashed potato and 1/2 cup milk to make a soft dough. Roll out on floured board, cut into rounds, sprinkle each with a few caraway seeds. Bake in hot oven for 20-30 minutes. Serve hot, each cake split across middle and spread with margarine. Makes about 9 cakes.

**Fattie Oaten**  
Mix 2 cups warm mashed potatoes with 1 cup fine oatmeal to form a soft dough with 1/2 cup diet margarine to bind the mixture. Roll out on oatmeal-scattered board, cut into shapes, saute in a little corn oil and serve hot. Makes about 15.

**STATUS OF WOMEN**

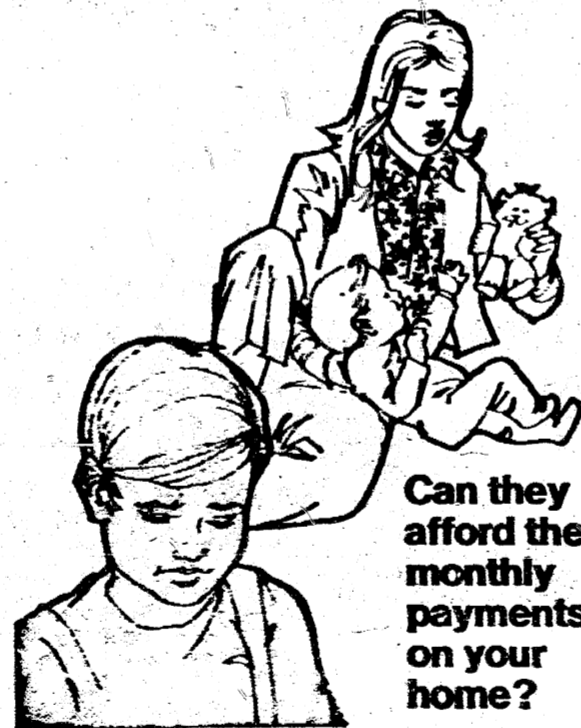

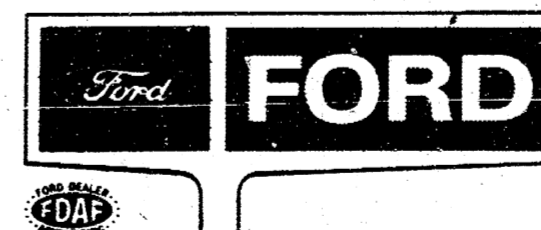

**Schnitzel is Veal by Another Name**



A tasty Wisnenschitzel is enhanced by a squeeze of lemon and a bit of anchovy, with the pleasant white Rhine wine Wedding Veil to accompany this favorite European specialty.

If you treat your guests to veal now and then try substituting schnitzel for scallopini. Schnitzel is the German name for a tasty veal cutlet, and there are as many kinds of Schnitzels as there are middle-European cooks.

The famous Wisnenschitzel (from Vienna) is veal, egged and breadcrumbed and fried crisp, sometimes served with a poached egg on top and called "a la Hohenstein." Sardelschnitzel is German, cooked in a sauce of sour cream and anchovies. Paprika-schnitzel is Hungarian, a lively and highly-flavored dish.

The secret to a delicious Schnitzel is very quick frying in deep oil to produce a crispy-browned cutlet with all the flavor sealed inside. Serve your Schnitzel with Austrian Cheesnoodles and a salad of 1988 lettuce, tomatoes, radishes and cooked baby carrots.

To accompany a luscious Schnitzel, no matter which variation you choose, a white Rhine wine such as Wedding Veil is both appreciated and appropriate. Wedding Veil, a pleasantly dry, fruity wine carries a mesa with great verve right through from appetizer to dessert. White Rhine wine, or Liebfraumilch, is correct with just about any food, so you can serve it confidently and proudly.

**Wisnenschitzel**

Make cuts around the edges of 4 quarter-inch thick veal cutlets so they will not curl. Divide them in 4 things. Flour, dip in three beaten and salted eggs, dredge again in 3 things, bread three crumbs. Fry quickly in hot, deep oil until golden brown and drain on paper a few seconds. A poached egg may be added atop each cutlet. Serve hot, with lemon wedges.

**Anchovy Schnitzel**

Fry 3 pounds of veal cutlets according to above directions. When meat is cooked, remove from skillet. Pour off all but one cup of oil, stir in 2 things. Flour to the drippings, add gradually 1 1/2 cups, position and cook stirring until thickened. Return meat to sauce, cover, simmer 20 minutes. Add chopped anchovy fillets (3), 1 cup sour cream, salt and pepper. Stir, cook several minutes more. Serves 6.



When barbecuing, cook meat and poultry thoroughly, but slowly. Longer cooking over a low fire means less shrinkage and more thorough cooking. Let your fire burn down to glowing coals.

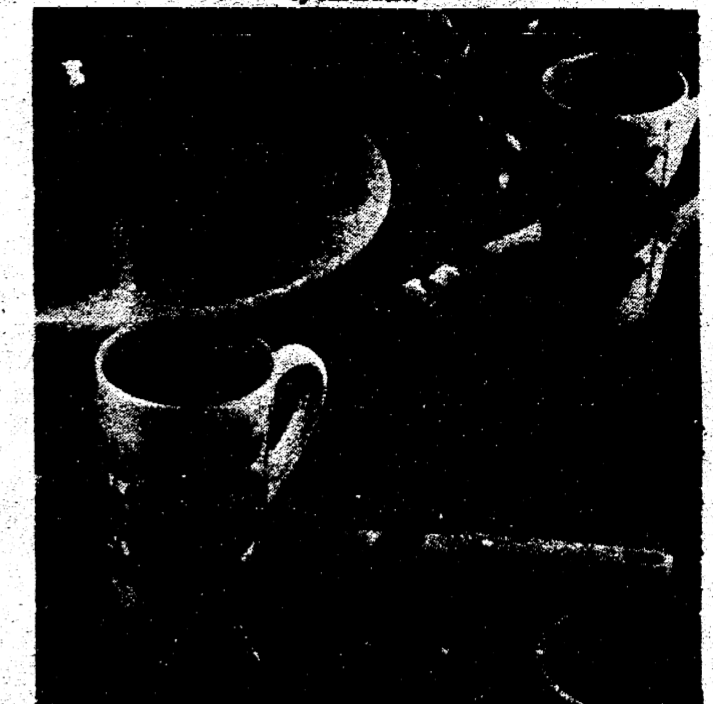

MANCHESTER TOWNSHIP LIBRARY

The Manchester Community Schools Board of Education at its Special Public Board Meeting held on Monday, August 30th, in the study session adopted a school calendar for the 1976-77 school year and approved the following appointments upon the recommendation of William Green, Superintendent:

Mr. James Fielder was immediately to the position of Varsity Football Coach. He had been functioning as Acting Varsity Coach for several weeks prior to final approval of the Board.

Mr. John Korkinn was named full-time Assistant High School Principal with primary duties consisting of student services, discipline, attendance, and will report directly to the Superintendent of Schools with regard to these services.

Mr. Steve Halchak was appointed full-time driver education instructor for high school students and adult education students as well as Director of Safety for the entire district.

Mr. Philip Males was appointed to the administrative staff of the school district and named Director of Adult and Continuing Education. His responsibilities will encompass all areas of community education and services, adult education, high school completion, community guidance services, college placement, and coordination of all college courses in the school district.

Mr. Arlin Schick was appointed to a 52 week contract as Middle School Principal for the 1976-77 school year to replace Mr. Ted Tagging who requested to return to the classroom for reasons of health. Mr. Schick has been a teacher in the Manchester District for the last five years.

Mr. John McGuire was appointed Principal of Pleasant Lake School, Title I Coordinator, and Director of Auxiliary Services on a full-time basis for the 1976-77 school year.

Salaries for McGuire, Males, and Halchak will come primarily from funding sources outside the district as a result of grantsmanship accomplished by the Board of Education.

The calendar calls for 182 student contact days and 8 teacher work days without students.

In other action by the Board of Education, a proposed budget was presented by Green for study by the Finance Committee of the Board. The committee will report back to the whole Board at its September 28th regular Board meeting. Mr. Hans Feldkamp is Chairman of the Board's Finance Committee. In studying the budget, Mr. Feldkamp stated the necessity of knowing the definite number of students on our 4th Friday state aid count, property tax levies, and the final amount of categorical aid that the district will receive prior to final approval by the Board. He noted that as of the date

of the meeting our Kindergarten enrollment was down from last year and one section of kindergarten would be eliminated.
