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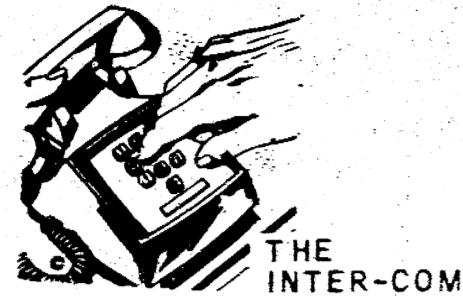

Once again, I am delighted to report a fine second week of school. As I visited each classroom in the district last week, although momentarily, I was extremely pleased at what I saw happening between teachers and children. All children were meaningfully occupied in educational activity and relating to their teachers in such a way as to give substance to my belief that very good things are happening to your children in school. We are still short of some teaching materials, which we will have to obtain in some way. However, teachers are making every effort to improvise until those materials arrive and can be utilized.

I have had the opportunity to visit with

members of the Student Council in the high school and am impressed with the enthusiasm and acceptance of challenges which we threw in their direction for the provision of new programs, activities and leadership for the student body which has elected them. I have great faith in the power of students to get things done in a positive way...and they will as long as they know and accept the levels of expectation set down for them by adults and then become assured that we stand behind them for support and encouragement. We are expecting great things from this group and others as they continue to grow in their understanding of role and abilities.

We are beginning to gather the names of interested parents and adults who will be interested in serving on a district-wide parent and advisory council. If you have such an interest, make your interests known to the central office, your Board of Education members, or the building principals. The tentative goals of this committee will encompass goal-setting for the district in terms of home-school relations, special workshops for parents,

activities for children, volunteer programs, and rejuvenation of the PTO, or a similar organization, for each building and a more generally active role for all parents. Please give us your ideas by calling us at 428-7300.

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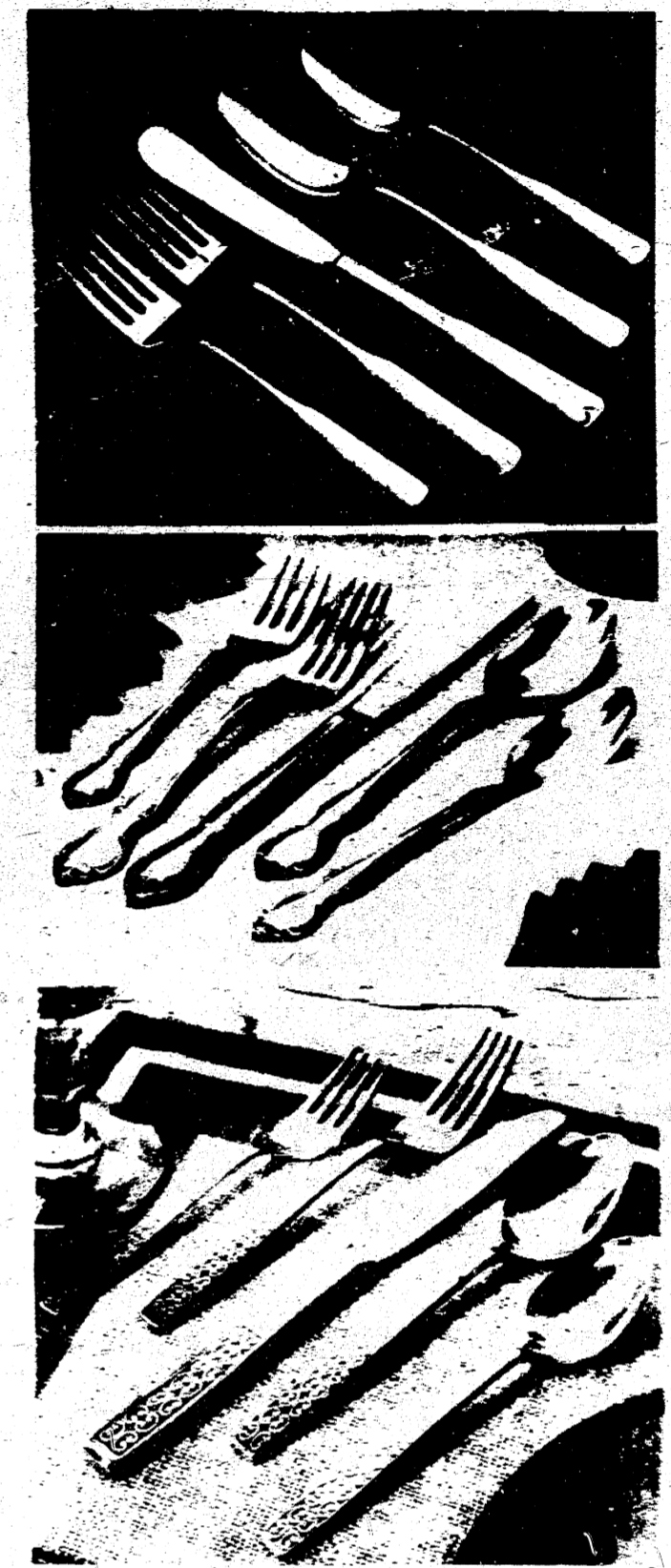

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MANCHESTER FARM BUREAU

"RIGHT TO THE PAST"

Farmers throughout the nation will be watching, with much interest and concern, what happens to a referendum that will appear on the November ballot in California. Should the referendum (known as Proposition 13) pass, union organizers would have the right to trespass on private farm property to try to sign up farm workers. It would also allow farm labor union organizers to continue secondary boycotts and other tactics they've been using for years under the direction of Cesar Chavez.

Naturally, such a proposition that allows trespassing does not sit well with farmers. Providing them access to farm property by non-unionized union organizers is viewed as an invasion of their privacy. It is viewed in California as the proposition. And, if trespassing on farms by union organizers gets on O.K. in California, it's likely to spread across the country.

In two different occasions, presidential candidate Jimmy Carter has endorsed the proposition. After his first endorsement, he called Allan Grant, president of the two-and-a-half million member American Farm Bureau Federation, and said he did not understand the question. However,

he later told a Los Angeles reporter that he would "vote no" to the proposition. This proposition, a California Farmer Union, to Most Carter. Grant says he accepted Carter's explanation the first time he endorsed the proposition but the second time, he said, "can only be viewed as an endorsement of Proposition 13, and he certainly can't claim that he understood the question this time."

"It should be no wonder to anyone," he said, "that when Jimmy Carter has finally taken a firm stand on this issue, it is to stand with Cesar Chavez." Farmers are rather independent when it comes to their property. They don't want government officials, union organizers or presidential candidates—coming on it without an invitation.

It would seem that, as a former legislator, Carter could understand these matters. Could he be the best interests of his fellow farmers are "proposed" compared to the support of labor unions.

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ANOTHER L.C.A.A. STREAK BROKEN

Hudson's long football winning streak was broken in last Falls State Championship and now another long winning streak has ended in the L.C.A.A. Addison High's fine Cross-Country Team that never before had lost a dual meet in the league (the string spans 8 years and over 40 plus meets), lost to our Flying Dutchmen this past Tuesday by a 23-38 score (in cross-country, as in golf the low score wins).

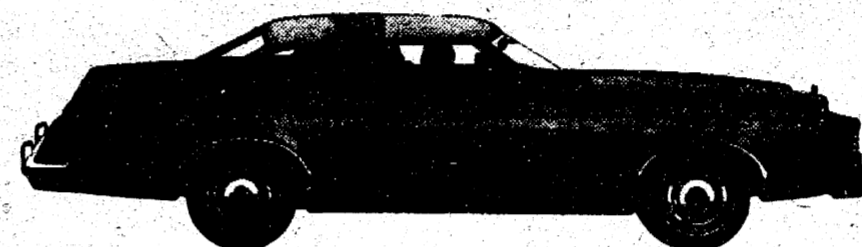
OCTOBER SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS TO BE DELIVERED TWO DAYS EARLY

Social Security checks, which are normally delivered on the third of the month, will be delivered Friday, October 1 since the third is a Sunday, Robert A. Kahoe, Social Security district manager in Ann

Arbor, has announced. The Friday check delivery is a new policy, Kahoe said. Social Security checks will be delivered on a Friday whenever the third falls on a Saturday or Sunday. The same schedule will apply to beneficiaries who have their Social Security checks deposited directly in a bank or other financial institution. Formerly, checks were delivered on Saturday when the normal delivery date

fell on Sunday, but many people had to wait until Monday to cash the checks. The new policy will eliminate that inconvenience. The delivery of SSI checks will not be affected by the new policy. Social Security pays monthly retirement, disability, and survivors benefits to eligible workers and their families.

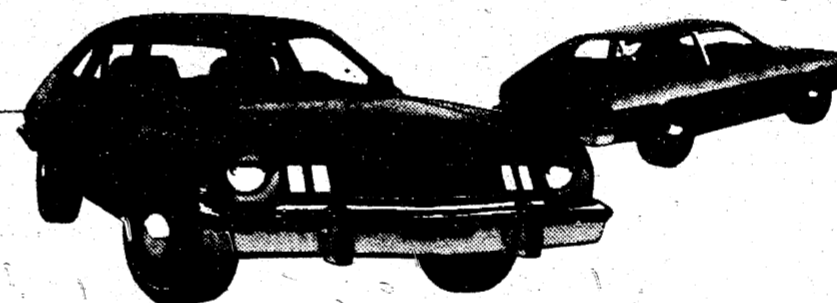

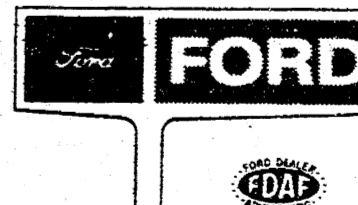

A Special thanks must go to Pastor Joseph Wise of the Emanuel United Church of Christ, for the use of his facilities. The classes were well attended by Manchester Fire and Police Department personnel. Everyone certified received nine hours of intensive training, including individualized instruction using both adult and infant models of the life-like mannequins, affectionately dubbed "Resuscitation Annie."
