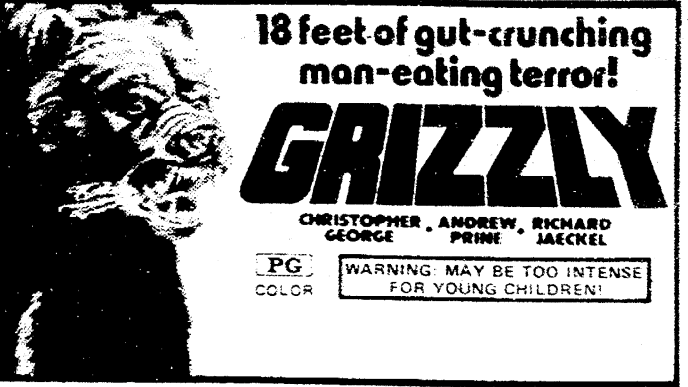

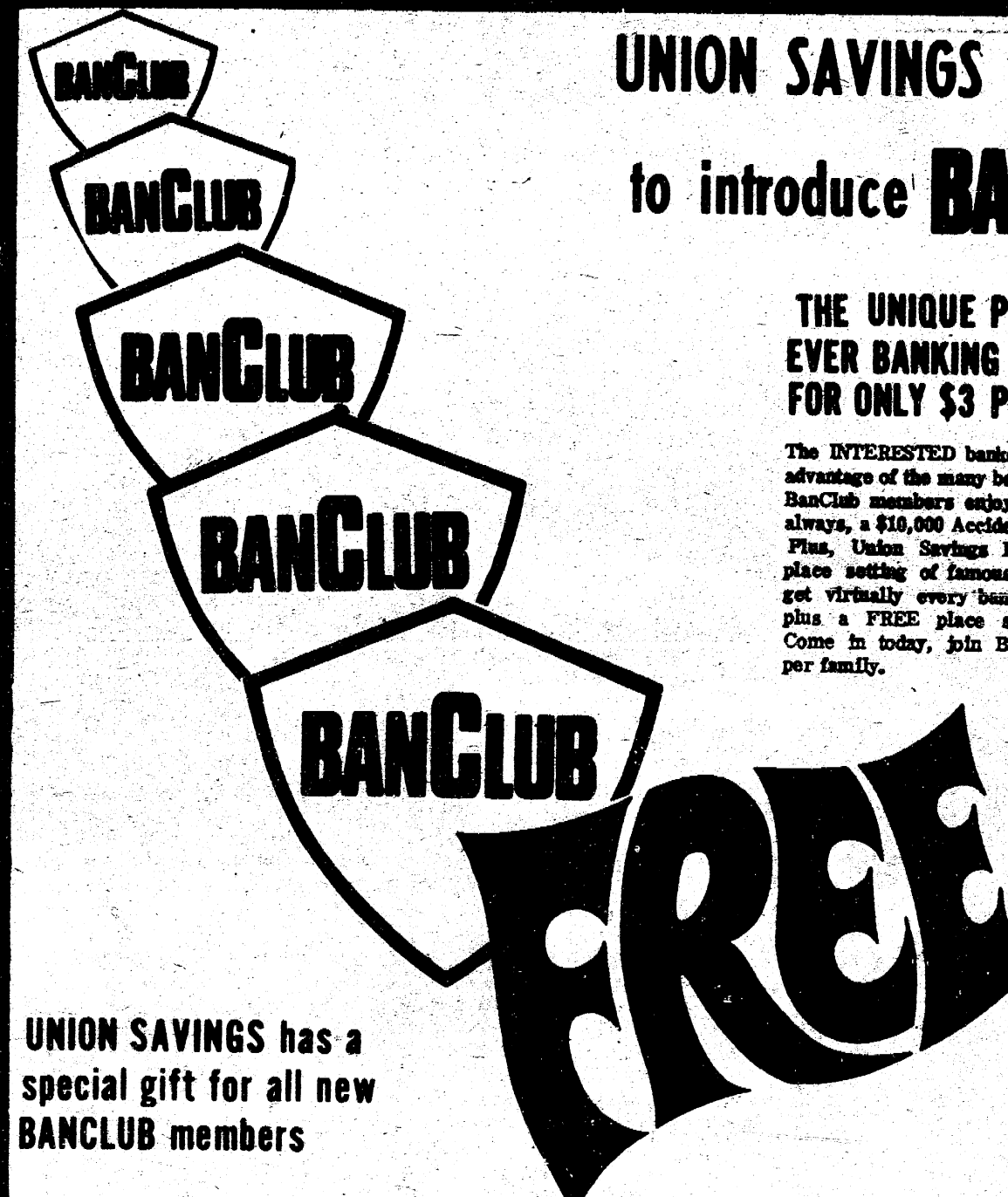

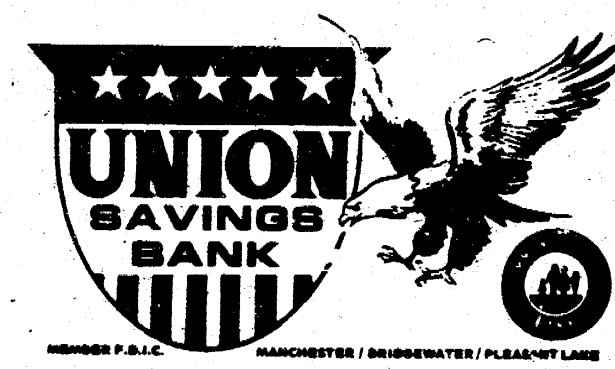

## VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 97

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE MAKING OF OPENINGS AND EXCAVATIONS IN STREETS, ALLEYS, SIDEWALKS AND PUBLIC PLACES OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER, MICHIGAN, THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS THEREFOR AND THE RESTORATION OF THE SURFACE AND PAVEMENT WHEN SUCH OPENINGS AND EXCAVATIONS ARE MADE.

The Village of Manchester Ordains:

**SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.** This ordinance shall be known and may be designated as the "Street Excavation Ordinance of the Village of Manchester, Michigan."

**SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS.** For the purposes of this ordinance, the following terms shall have the following meanings, respectively designated for each:

- (a) The term "person" shall mean any legal entity, including a public utility, individual person, partnership, corporation or association.
- (b) The term "utility" shall mean any person which operates and maintains any main, pipe, line or other equipment in or under any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place in the Village of Manchester, Michigan.
- (c) The term "street" or "alley" shall mean the entire area between the boundary lines of every public right of way, whether open to vehicular traffic or not.
- (d) The term "Superintendent of Public Works" and "Police Chief" shall mean the Superintendent of Public Works and Police Chief respectively of the Village of Manchester, Michigan or their respective duly authorized representatives.

**SECTION 3. APPLICATION FOR PERMIT.** Any person, except as hereinafter provided, desiring to procure a specific permit as herein provided shall file with the Superintendent of Public Works, at least 48 hours before the time proposed to begin such work, a written application upon a blank form prepared and provided by the Village. The application shall state the name and address of the applicant, the name of the street, alley, sidewalk or public place in or under which it is desired to make the excavation or opening, the kind of pavement or sidewalk thereon, the purpose, size and location, as near as can be determined, of the proposed excavation or opening, the name, address, lot and subdivision of the person for whose benefit the work is to be done, and the time during which it is desired such opening is to be permitted. When required by the Superintendent of Public Works, the application shall be accompanied by a plan or pencil tracing or sketch showing the location, character and dimensions of the proposed excavation or opening for the installation of new work, or the location and character of the alterations involving the location of pipes, poles, conduits, wires or other conductors. Any public utility operating in the State of Michigan under the jurisdiction and control of the Michigan Public Service Commission may upon written application on a form provided by the Village, obtain an annual permit which is good for a period of one year from the date of issuance.

Every such public utility performing any construction work thereunder, at the end of each week, or more often when required by the Superintendent of Public Works, shall on a form provided by the Village, file a written report showing all construction work performed by it within the Village during such week under the provisions of such permit. Such annual permit shall not authorize any opening in any concrete, asphalt, brick or other pavement without the written permission of the Superintendent of Public Works in each case.

**SECTION 4. EXCAVATION AND OTHER WORK REGULATED.** No person, other than a duly authorized village official or village employee, shall make, cause or permit to be made any excavation or opening in or under the pavement or other surface of any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place within the Village of Manchester, or construct, alter or repair any street surface, drainage ditch, culvert, driveway extension, curb, gutter or other structure within such street, alley or other public place, except as hereinafter provided. Nothing herein shall be intended or construed to authorize any work of any kind, in any State Highway right of way by any procedure other than that established by the Michigan State Highway Department.

**SECTION 5. PERMIT REQUIRED.** Unless acting under a contract with the Village, it shall be unlawful for any person, other than a duly authorized village official or employee in the course of his employment, to make or cause or permit to be made any excavation or opening in or under the surface or pavement of any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place within the limits of the Village of Manchester, without first having obtained and having in force a permit as hereinafter provided. In case of an emergency arising outside of office hours, at night, on Sundays or legal holidays, when an immediate excavation may be necessary for the protection of public health, safety or public or private property, the same shall be reported to the Police Department, which shall grant permission in writing to make the necessary excavation upon the express condition that an application be made in the manner herein provided on or before noon of the following business day.

**SECTION 6. BOND OR DEPOSIT.** The Village of Manchester may require a bond or deposit sufficient to cover the estimated cost of repairing the surface of a proposed excavation or opening of any street, alley, sidewalk or other public places prior to issuing a permit therefor, when in his opinion the dependability of the applicant is not sufficiently established to reasonably assure compliance with all of the provisions of this ordinance. In any case, the Village of Manchester shall require said bond or deposit prior to issuing said permit when the cost of repairing said surface is estimated to exceed Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, or when the applicant has failed to comply with any provisions of this ordinance in connection with any permit issued hereunder within the previous two (2) years. Any public utility which fails to comply with any provision of this ordinance shall thereafter be required, for a period of at least ninety (90) days, to obtain a permit as herein provided prior to starting any excavation or opening of any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place, and shall be subject to a bond or deposit as herein provided. The furnishing of a bond or deposit shall not be construed to exempt any public utility or person from prosecution or civil action for any violation of this ordinance which may have caused such bond or deposit to be required.

**SECTION 7. GRANTING OF PERMIT.** Upon the filing of the application, and the payment of a permit fee of Fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars, bond or deposit herein described, the Superintendent of Public Works shall grant the permit if in accordance with terms of their ordinance. Said permit shall state the name and address of the applicant, the location, nature, purpose and extent of the excavation or opening, the kind or kinds of pavement to be disturbed, the amount of deposit or bond paid by the applicant, the dates of issuance and expiration date of the permit. All permits shall be consecutively numbered and shall be made in triplicate, one copy shall be given to the applicant, one copy shall be delivered to the Superintendent of Public Works and one copy shall remain on file in his office. Such permit shall at all times be in the possession of a competent person actually at the work site and shall be shown upon demand to a police officer or properly authorized officer or employee of the Village.

This section shall not apply where inconsistent with the permit fee provisions of the ordinances regulating sewers and drains, plumbing and sidewalks, nor to a public utility to which an annual permit shall have been issued under the provisions hereof. The annual fee for an annual permit issued hereunder shall be One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars per annual payable in advance.

**SECTION 8. RECORD OF PERMITS.** The Superintendent of Public Works shall prepare and keep a record of permits issued, numbered in the order in which they were issued, name and address of person to whom issued, location, which they were issued, nature and extent of excavation or opening, time in which street is nature, purpose and extent of deposit or bond paid and such other to be restored, permit fee and amount of deposit or bond paid and such other and further items as will enable anyone to obtain a complete history of each and further items as will enable anyone to obtain a complete history of each permit from its issuance to its termination. The copies of the permit kept by the Superintendent of Public Works, properly bound, may be used as a basis for such record.

**SECTION 9. OPENINGS IN PAVED STREETS.** It shall be unlawful for any person to make or permit or cause to be made any excavation or opening in or under the pavement or other surface of any street after this ordinance becomes effective, for any purpose whatsoever, within a period of two (2) years from and after the time of construction of any such paving or resurfacing; provided, that the Superintendent of Public Works may, on account of an emergency affecting public health or public safety and public welfare, and which agency affecting public health or public safety and public welfare, and which could not have been foreseen, suspend the operation of this two (2) year rule, and in such cases, upon the granting of the permit, such work may be performed within the two (2) year period. The failure or neglect of the applicant or other persons to do or have the work done before such two (2) year period, or, the inconvenience, by reason of such failure or neglect, to property along the particular street or in the particular public place described in the application shall not be considered to be an emergency. The two (2) year period shall be deemed to begin at the time of the completion and final acceptance by the Village of any such construction, paving, resurfacing or repaving.

**SECTION 10. OPENINGS IN STREETS OR OTHER PUBLIC PLACE PRIOR TO SCHEDULED DEVELOPMENT.** Before any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place shall be paved, resurfaced, repaved, widened or otherwise improved, notice thereof shall be furnished to all public utilities and similar persons concerned. Prior to any excavation or treatment of existing surfaces by the Village, State or their contractors such public utilities or other persons shall install therein all wires, pipes, poles, cables, conduits and the like which may be deemed necessary or contemplated by the public utility during the life of the improvement. On the recommendation of the Superintendent of Public Works, the Village Council may, by resolution, set a reasonable time limit prior to which all work on such wires, pipes, poles, cables, conduits, and the like in the street, alley, sidewalk, or other public places to be improved, must be completed. Any person who, without the written consent of the Superintendent of Public Works continues to do such work after the expiration of the time set shall be subject to the penalties provided in this ordinance. Failure of the Village to give or receive notice to or from specific persons shall not affect the other provisions of this ordinance or the penalties hereby imposed, and shall not be deemed to create an emergency within the meaning of Section 9.

**SECTION 11. GUARDING EXCAVATIONS AND OBSTRUCTIONS.** Any person making or causing to be made an excavation or opening in any street, alley, sidewalk or other public place, or within five (5) feet of the boundary of any street, or public place, shall, between sunset and sunrise on every night that the same remains open or danger exists therefrom, keep such excavation or opening fenced or barricaded and properly lighted so as to warn all persons of such excavation or opening and all obstructions. No unauthorized person shall remove or interfere in any way with any such lantern or other danger signal or any such barriers.

**SECTION 12. REQUIREMENTS FOR WORK UNDER PERMIT.** All work under a permit shall be under supervision of the Superintendent of Public Works and in conformity with the following requirement:

(1) All work shall be started within 48 hours after the receipt of the permit and shall be pursued diligently and continuously until the same is completed. When in consequence of the weather or any process of the law, or any other unexpected obstacle, the work shall be stopped for so long a time that public travel shall be unreasonably obstructed, the excavating or opening shall be refilled and repaved as if the work contemplated in a permit were actually completed.

(2) In no case shall a person open or remove a greater area of surface and at no other location than that specified in the original or supplementary application; provided, however, that at the time of actually doing the work, if it shall be necessary to open or remove a greater area of surface than originally applied for, the applicant shall first notify and procure the written consent of the Superintendent of Public Works to do so upon the express condition that he shall and will before noon of the following business day file a supplementary application for the additional excavation.

(3) All work shall be performed in such a way as to cause a minimum of inconvenience and restriction to both pedestrian and vehicular traffic. No dirt or other materials shall be placed on sidewalks. Not more than one-half of the width of the street shall be opened at one time; the other half shall remain untouched for the accommodation of traffic until the first half is restored for safe use. All work shall be prosecuted so as not to interfere with any access to fire houses, fire hydrants and United States Mail Boxes. The permittee must remove within 24 hours all snow and ice that may fall or form upon the street within 5 feet upon either side of the opening and keep such area free from snow and ice until the opening is properly refilled.

(4) The person to whom a permit is granted shall give notice in writing thereof to any public utility or municipality whose pipes, poles, mains or conduits are laid in the street about to be disturbed by such excavation, at least 24 hours before commencing the same, and at his expense sustain, secure and protect such pipes, poles, mains or conduits from injury and replace and pack the earth wherever the same shall have been removed, loosened or disturbed, under or around them, so that they shall be well and substantially supported. If any person shall fail to sustain, secure or protect such pipes, poles, mains or conduits from injury or to replace and pack the earth under or around them, as the provisions of this section require, then the same may be done by the corporation to whom the same may belong and the cost thereof and all damages sustained by such corporation thereby, shall be paid by such person, and in default thereof, such corporation may maintain an action against him therefor.

(5) Paving materials and earth or gravel removed must be kept separate and such materials capable of being reused shall be preserved. The width of the excavation or opening shall be no greater than is necessary for doing the work. Shoring and bracing shall be used when the excavation or opening is 5 feet or more in depth. At the discretion of the Superintendent of Public Works, shoring and bracing may be cut off 1 foot below the surface pavement and left in place when the opening is refilled. The street, alley, sidewalk or other public place must be opened in a manner which will cause the least inconvenience to the public and admit of the uninterrupted passage of water along the gutter. Excavations shall be made by open cut method. No tunneling shall be done except as authorized by the Superintendent of Public Works.

and then only under such conditions as he may impose. No excavation shall be undercut or have a greater width at the bottom than at the top. In case of slips or slides of the sides of the excavation the same shall be trimmed to solid earth and the top surface cut back to the limit of the same before any back filling is commenced.

(6) All openings shall be refilled and temporarily resurfaced by the person to whom the permit is issued on or before the time fixed in the permit, and written notice shall be given to the Superintendent of Public Works when the work is completed. Such temporary resurfacing shall be maintained by the person to whom the permit is issued until the village or person designated shall permanently resurface such opening. Refilling shall be done in thin layers not exceeding 6" in height, firmly rammed until the excavation is filled or to a proper line of placing the paving thereon. All refilling shall be done with sand, gravel, or, if approved by the Superintendent of Public Works, other materials of equivalent compaction qualities. Puddling or water tamping shall be done only by permission of the Superintendent of Public Works. Whenever rock is excavated not more than one-third of the total excavation shall be refilled with the broken stone, which must be in pieces not exceeding 6" in their largest dimensions, and mingled with clean earth and sand, and restored in such manner as to insure the thorough and compact filling of all spaces. All void space in a tunnel excavation shall be backfilled with thoroughly rammed concrete as specified by the Superintendent of Public Works.

(7) In all unimproved streets the surface of the refilled excavation or opening shall be finished in a workmanlike manner and shall in every respect be equal in quality, character and materials to the street surface existing previous to making the excavation. In all improved streets the crown of the surface must conform to the adjacent street surface until sufficient time has elapsed to warrant the restoration permanently of the paved surface. All such restoration of paving surfaces shall be made in accordance with Village specifications and may be done by the Village under contract or by its own forces and the cost thereof charged to the person to whom the permit is issued.

(8) In the replacement or restoration of the permanent pavement, the Village shall have the right and authority to require removal of the old concrete for an area extending at least 1 foot in all directions beyond the edge of the original cut, and replace it with new reinforced concrete, not less than 6" thick, but equal in thickness to that of the adjacent pavement, made in accordance with the current Village specifications for a permanent foundation. The new wearing surface shall extend at least 6" beyond the joint in the foundation of the pavement and be laid with the same care and in the same manner as the original pavement.

(9) If any part of a slab of sidewalk is cracked or damaged in any way, the entire slab shall be replaced.

**SECTION 13. FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH REGULATIONS.** In case any person to whom a permit has been granted shall fail to comply with the terms thereof, such permit shall become null and void, and all its expense which may be incurred by the Village in refilling the excavation or restoring the street or sidewalk to its proper condition shall be borne by the person to whom the permit is issued. In case the person to whom a permit is granted shall fail to leave the street or sidewalk in as good condition as it was previous to any work being done under the permit, any and all expense which may be incurred by the Village in restoring the street to its proper condition shall be borne by the permittee.

**SECTION 14. VIOLATION. PENALTIES.** Any person who shall violate any provision of this Ordinance or shall fail to comply with any of the requirements herein, or who shall excavate or open dig, any street or alley for which a permit is required without obtaining a permit issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or by imprisonment not to exceed ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment. Each day that a violation continues shall be deemed a separate offense.

**SECTION 15. VALIDITY.** Should any section, clause or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

**SECTION 16. WHEN EFFECTIVE.** This Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after publication.

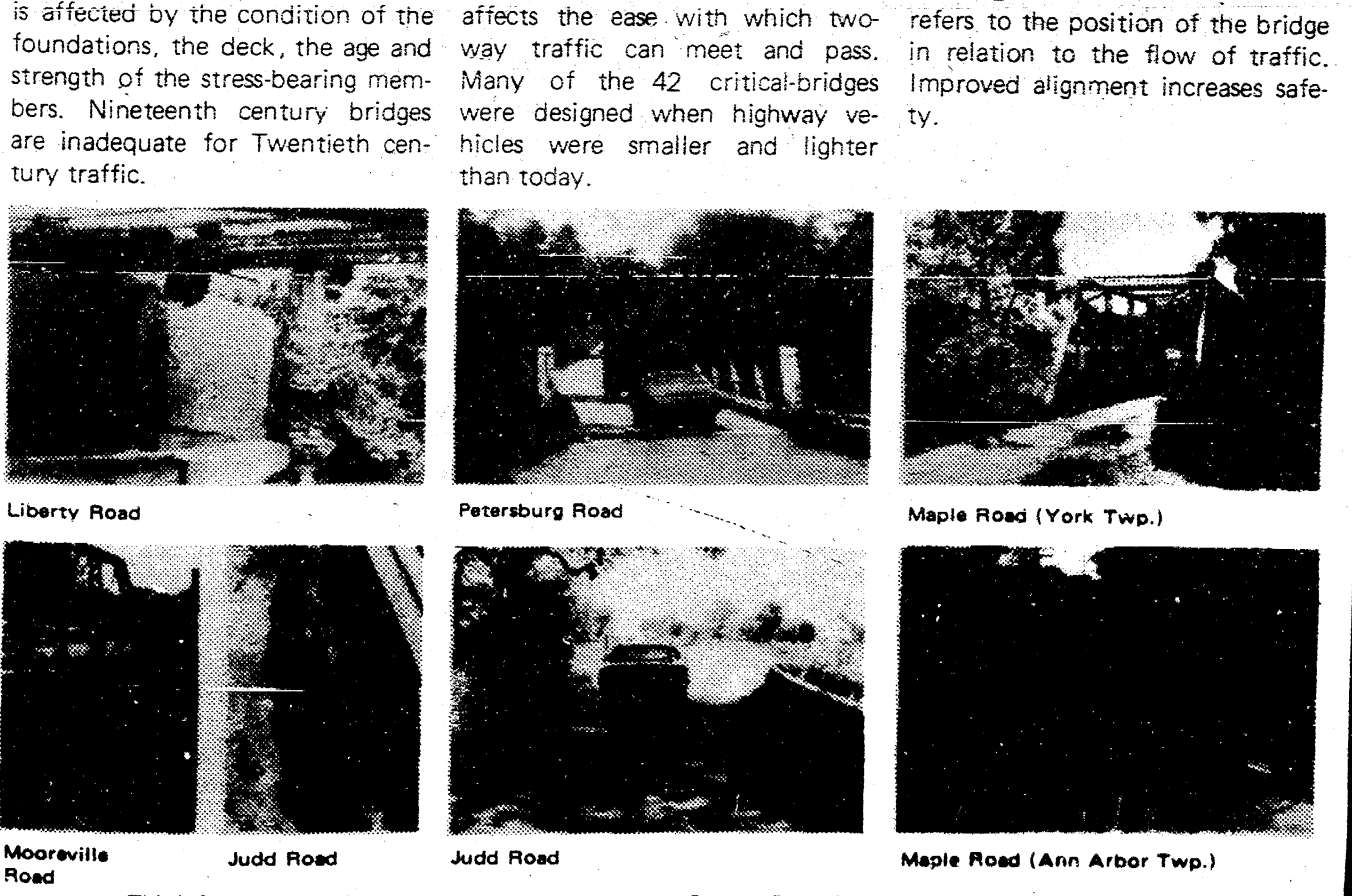
### CRITICAL-BRIDGE

A bridge having a span of 20 feet or more which because of its loading capacity, deck width, or alignment is unable to accommodate today's level of traffic.

**Load Bearing Capacity** is affected by the condition of the foundations, the deck, the age and strength of the stress-bearing members. Nineteenth century bridges are inadequate for Twentieth century traffic.

**Deck Width** affects the ease with which two-way traffic can meet and pass. Many of the 42 critical-bridges were designed when highway vehicles were smaller and lighter than today.

**Alignment** refers to the position of the bridge in relation to the flow of traffic. Improved alignment increases safety.

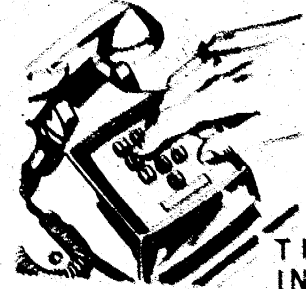

Of the many words in the English language, the one most endearing to the human spirit and heart is the four letter word called LOVE. We embrace it, use it commonly, say it is one of the few four letter words we will permit our children to use, but I wonder, as I'm sure you often do, why we don't apply its meaning more commonly in our everyday lives. Could it be that we are afraid of the word, or that its application might imply weakness on our part. When was the last time we told our children that we loved them, our spouses? When was the last time we took time to show our children's teacher that their efforts in behalf of our children was appreciated? When was the last time we attempted to turn negative malicious gossip around toward the good in people?

I had the occasion this week to read a very beautiful treatise on the subject of Love compiled by Hugh J. O'Connell.

He said, "The word 'Love' has many aspects. In the Bible alone, it is mentioned over 460 times. However, of all the descriptions of love that have been given, perhaps the most beautiful and practical is: 'Love is patient; love is kind. Love is not jealous; love does not put on airs. It is not snobbish. Love is never rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not prone to anger; neither does it brood over injuries. Love does not rejoice in what is wrong; but rejoices with the truth. There is no limit to love's forbearance, to its trust, its hope, its power to endure.'"

We can take some very practical applications from the above and apply them totally for improvement of the quality of life in our own community. We can look for the good points in other people, find excuses for their faults as we find them for our own; don't magnify the defects we find in others, disagree, if necessary, without being disagreeable, and don't just gripe about things; try to make them better. We can avoid causing unnecessary pain by helping those who are in trouble of body or soul, by comforting those who are in sorrow, doing little favors for others when we have the chance, being kind and helpful not only to strangers, but also in our own home, and by helping our churches, schools and community.

We can be glad when others succeed, praise others for their sincere efforts, be ready to lend to others in need, and be willing to lose as well as to win. We can avoid scorn, ridicule, or belittling others and avoid sarcasm like

the plague. All of this can be summed up in basic philosophy of all organized religions, "Do to others what you would have them do to you".

We think these are good thoughts for troubled times. The challenge lies in accepting and applying these principles of love in our own lives, and from this base having it carry over to our children through the educational principles that ought to be applied both in the home and the school.

Dutch Record Remains Spotless

When Manchester met Bronson here Friday, and in the first 3 minutes 15 seconds of the contest both squads had points on the board, I thought to myself "this may be a high scoring game". But the two teams settled down and played a solid, hardhitting football game. When the clock had ticked its last, Manchester was crowned winner, 20-14.

The Dutch kicked to the Vikings from Bronson to open the game and 4 plays later a Viking took the pitch from the quarterback to ramble 60 yards for the touchdown. 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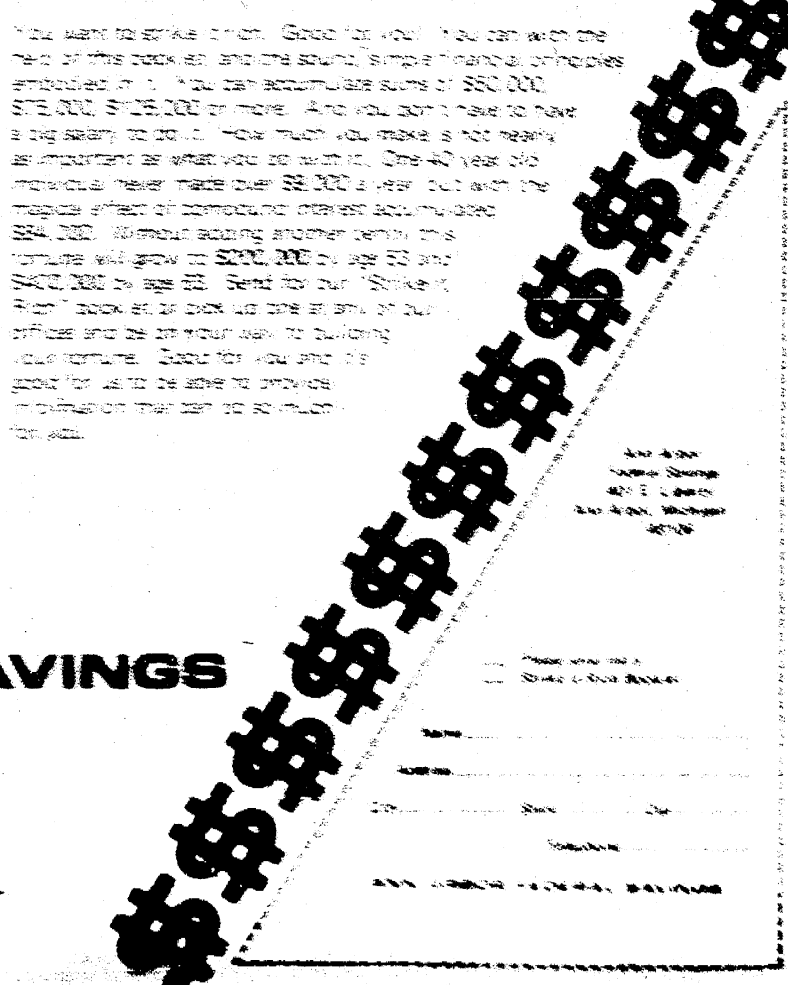

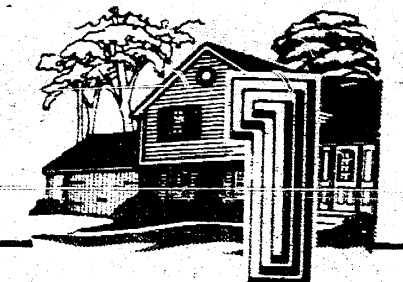

## St. Mary's Alter Society House Tour Sunday, October 24

St. Mary's Alter Society's Annual House Tour is scheduled for Sunday, October 24th from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. The variety of homes on tour are new and old with some in-between such as the Ica Schaffer home at 505 W. Main St. A 4-bedroom, two-story house built in 1946, soft shades of greens and yellows blend throughout the house in a warm color scheme. Newly decorated, this modern picturesque house is one that anyone with an "eye for color" will appreciate.

For those who prefer ultra-modern, the Emory Garlick home at 644 W. Main is a must. Only one word can describe this gracious home-unique. Designed by Mr. Garlick, octagon is the architectural theme throughout the V-shaped house. The living room was designed to "throw you out into the daylight and bring you back into the warm earth-tone colors at night." There are only three conventional windows in the house; the rest were made to fit the architecture specifications. Keeping with the octagon theme, the front door and entrance hall were also designed to "fit" this lovely home. A walk-out family room and patio porch from each room gives the Garlicks a constant view from their hill-side home of Manchester's tree-tops and church steeples.

For a young family, the John Sahakian home at 17000 Bethel Church Road is perfect. A new ranch house with three bedrooms, it's a good example of what do-it-yourselfers are capable of doing to give their home a warm, comfortable feeling of color and design. Mrs. Sahakian uses her own needlepoint work for the all-important personal touch of a home and Mr. Sahakian's talents as an upholsterer gives their home special meaning. A large spacious yard for children and pets, the brick-faced house is geared for a growing family.

But for a "house with history", the Aaron Nathan home at 15490 Buss Road will be a treat for your imagination. It undoubtedly holds many secrets of the weary and perhaps famous travelers who stopped here long ago. Built in 1830 and since restored, it was originally a stage-coach stop. But progress intervened, the main road was diverted and the bustling community of Manchester with several trains chugging through weekly, brought an end to the half-way house. It became the Charles Merriman farm and eventually the last Merriman to live there, Mrs. Mabel Knorpp. The house was sold to Mrs. Albina Augustie and then five years ago to the Nathans, who describe it as an "interesting house." Called a New England salt-box house because of the sharp sloped back roof, the partial two-story house features a "keeping room."

Another very old house with much to say if the walls could talk, is the Ann Scott home at 627 W. Main. A house which goes back to early Manchester days, the parents of Mrs. Alma Tirb, the John Wiedmans moved there in approximately 1918. The Cresswells restored the very large square brick house, keeping the original floor plan intact as much as possible. The addition of a kitchen wing only enhanced the beauty of this Manchester landmark. House tour guests are most welcome to stop and meet Manchester's new residents and also enjoy a stroll around the grounds. This house will be open from 2 to 5 p.m. so plan to stop early.

And it seems that beautiful homes with beautiful views is the general theme of the house tour this year. The James Healy home at 16430 Herman Road features rolling countryside from a screened deck porch. A new home with three bedrooms, 2 1/2 baths and a walk-out kitchen and family room at the back basement level, this comfortable house is a special home to the Healys. Using some boards and beams from their original farm buildings, the family has combined a little old and a little new in the exposed beamed ceiling in the kitchen and dining area. The partial two-story house has a brick fireplace and lots of ideas for those who might be interested in building a home of their own.

Tickets for the House Tour will be available at each of the six homes as well as at St. Mary's church hall. Coffee and cookies will be served throughout the afternoon at the church hall and a baby-sitting service will be available.
