In a previous article, the Manchester Education Association reported to you the action of filing grievances, checking alleged violations of the master contract. The grievances were stated in their entirety at that time but there still seems to be some misunderstanding as to the necessity of grievances. The point was made before that the school as a big business needs to protect itself by contracts. Contracts are necessary tools serving as guidelines for all parties involved, minimizing problems or questions which can occur involving procedures. Two grievances filed were about class loads. The issue of class load was grieved not because some teachers received 1 or 2 more students in their classes than the master contract called for, but because correct procedure was not followed. Procedure states that teachers are first consulted by the building principal and re-

sons given for the overload. The teacher and the Association may then offer their consent. Students remained in their assigned classrooms. It also should be noted that this issue was resolved to the satisfaction of the Board and the Association and that fact was made public at the board meeting. Grievances 3 and 4 concerning class loads have been resolved. Grievances 1 and 2, have gone to level three which means that the Board is currently studying the grievances and meetings are taking place between the Board and the Association. The Board will present a written decision but at this time no written response has been made. We hope that this article and any future articles will keep you informed as to the activities of the Manchester Education Association.

Recorded in the church's history is that the brick work was to be let out to the lowest bidder; the masons were to haul the brick. The mason was to furnish his own-tender and brick carriers. The masons were to furnish nails and lath for 25¢ per yard. Carpenter work was given to the lowest bidder. Members were to furnish and put everything on the building site and the carpenter do all the work. Joe Kramer got the job for \$290. Doors, windows, and glass were put in at a cost of \$137. The Young People of the church, 24 of them, gave \$156.50 to buy the bell. A team of horses owned by J. T. Feldkamp pulled the bell into the tower.

The church was known as Evangelical Association and was called the Salem Church. The first pastor of the church was Rev. Edward Weiss who also served Freedom and Lima Center Churches. In 1946 the United Brethren Church united with the Evangelical Church and so it became the Evangelical United Brethren Church. In 1968 The Evangelical United Brethren Church merged with the Methodist Church and became the United Methodist Church and so now the church is called the Sharon United Methodist Church. The Rev. Wayne C. Ferrigan is the present pastor.







MANCHESTER BLASTS CLINTON

It appeared the Dutch might run the Redskins over as going into the second quarter of Friday's contest Manchester was ahead 13-0. But the Redskins fought back to trail only 6 points by the intermission. Unfortunately for Clinton, Manchester played a superb second half in which the offense put 13 points on the board and the defense shut the Redskins out. 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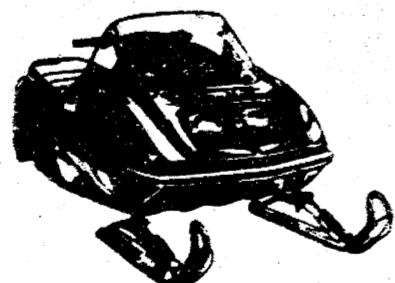
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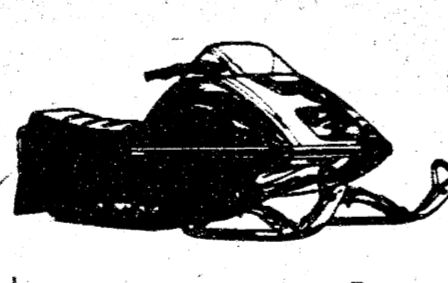
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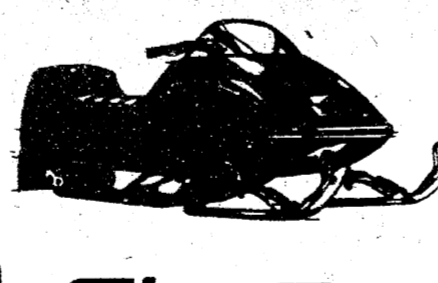

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room into resource areas which enhance the educational experiences beneficial to coping and life skill development in children as they reach toward maturity. They can, and should be based on sound educational principles and should reflect an attitude of the total educational climate. There are very few, if any, members of the Board, or of the total professional staff, that do not support the concept of educational field trips.

In planning field trips, as you know, parents' permission is always sought and if not given, a student may not attend, or participate for whatever reason a parent may have. A permission slip is often taken as a release of the school, or the school board and parents as a dismissal or acceptance of responsibility. It is important to note that at no time can parents abdicate their role as parents, with responsibility being given over to another agency such as the school. Only through judicial channels can this be accomplished. Permission slips only alert the courts in the event of tragedy and resultant claims that the school has taken prudent caution and secured the parents' permission for a student to participate in an activity off the school campus. Conversely, it does not release the school board, or any of its staff from responsibility governing the ultimate safety of the student or responsibility in the event of an accident, negligence, or tragedy. As professional people, we must always answer for our actions on the basis of school, local, state and constitutional laws established in our democratic society.

At the base of much of our discussion will be the ultimate perimeters in which a field trip will be permitted, and what type of activities will be permitted. Even at the age of majority, a student still remains under the governing state laws as they relate to the school activity. This is really the basic question that confronts your Board of Education, determining rules and regulations for field trips. More specifically, can professional staff accept the "looking the other way" when drinking occurs on these trips, the use of illicit drugs occurs, or when behavior is not consistent with that expected of our children when they are in their homes and community. Even when parents say they would never hold the school responsible for anything that happened to their youngster as a result of breaking the law, the community can, and should. Great risks are involved here for the constituents who have elected the Board of Education and more important even to that, is the professional reputations and lives of the faculty members who are forced to "look the other way" rather than face the indignation of a few parents who support the liberal breaking of the law.

Manchester has indeed been fortunate in not having faced any real tragedy emanating from school planned activities. We want to keep it that way. If you have a concern in this area, or share our concerns, plan to attend this very important meeting. Your open and candid discussion will be welcomed by the Board of Education and the administration. Thank you. Have a good week.

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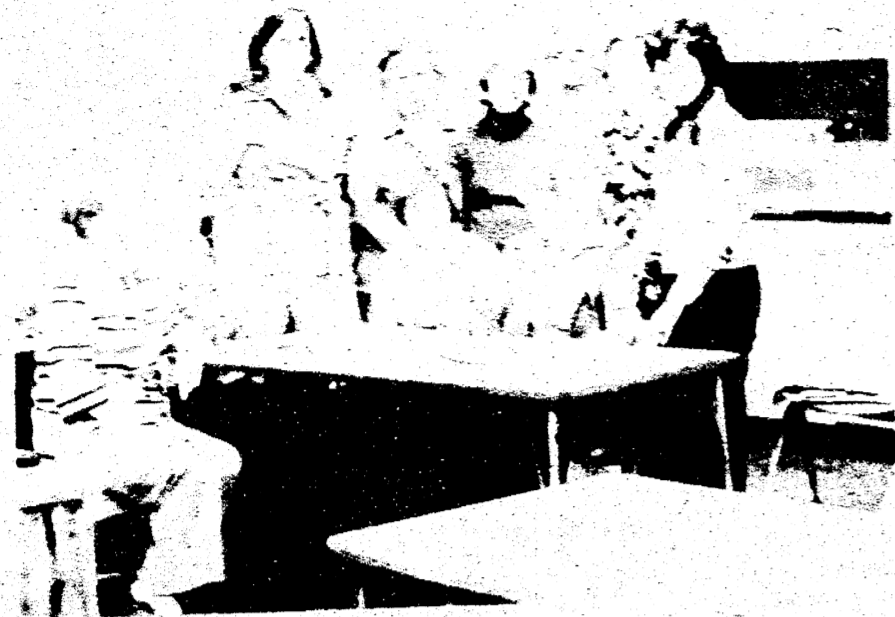

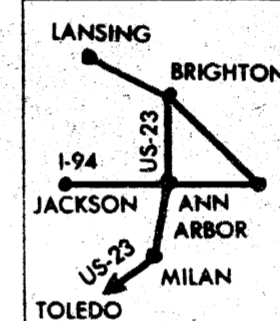

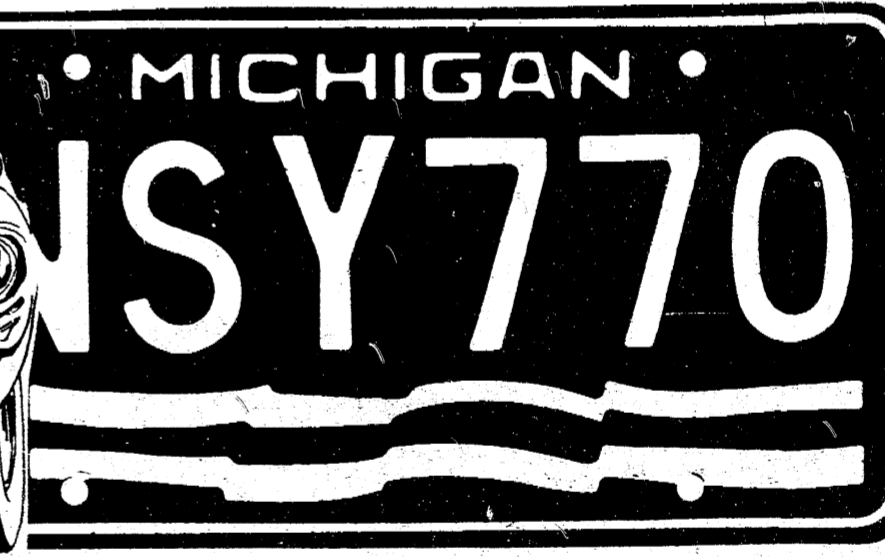
