Under the new converted accounting system adopted state-wide, the presentation of a budget becomes extremely difficult since each area must be broken down much more precisely and with individuals and buildings accounted for in each line item of the budget. In preparing this budget for your study, I have removed all the numbers (16 of which appear before each expense item) and the General Fund number in order to avoid as much confusion as possible. Most of the budget you will be able to identify by school and when you see expenditures repeated, you will know that the figure represents one of the four schools, special education, etc.

It is extremely important for you to know just how, why, and where your tax

dollars are being spent in your schools. If you have any questions about the expenditures or some item for which you wish more information, do not hesitate to call me at any time. You might also wish to stop in for a visit to review the budget

with me or raise any questions you may have or concerns about expenditures.

It is also important to point out here that I am presenting here only the General Fund Budget. At a later date, I will be presenting you an accounting of the Internal Account which holds all monies generated by athletic events, fund-raising activities, clubs, class accounts, etc. The Internal Account is totally separate from the General Fund operating budget and while under the control of the Board of Education must be separated and not used in the general operation of the schools.






