

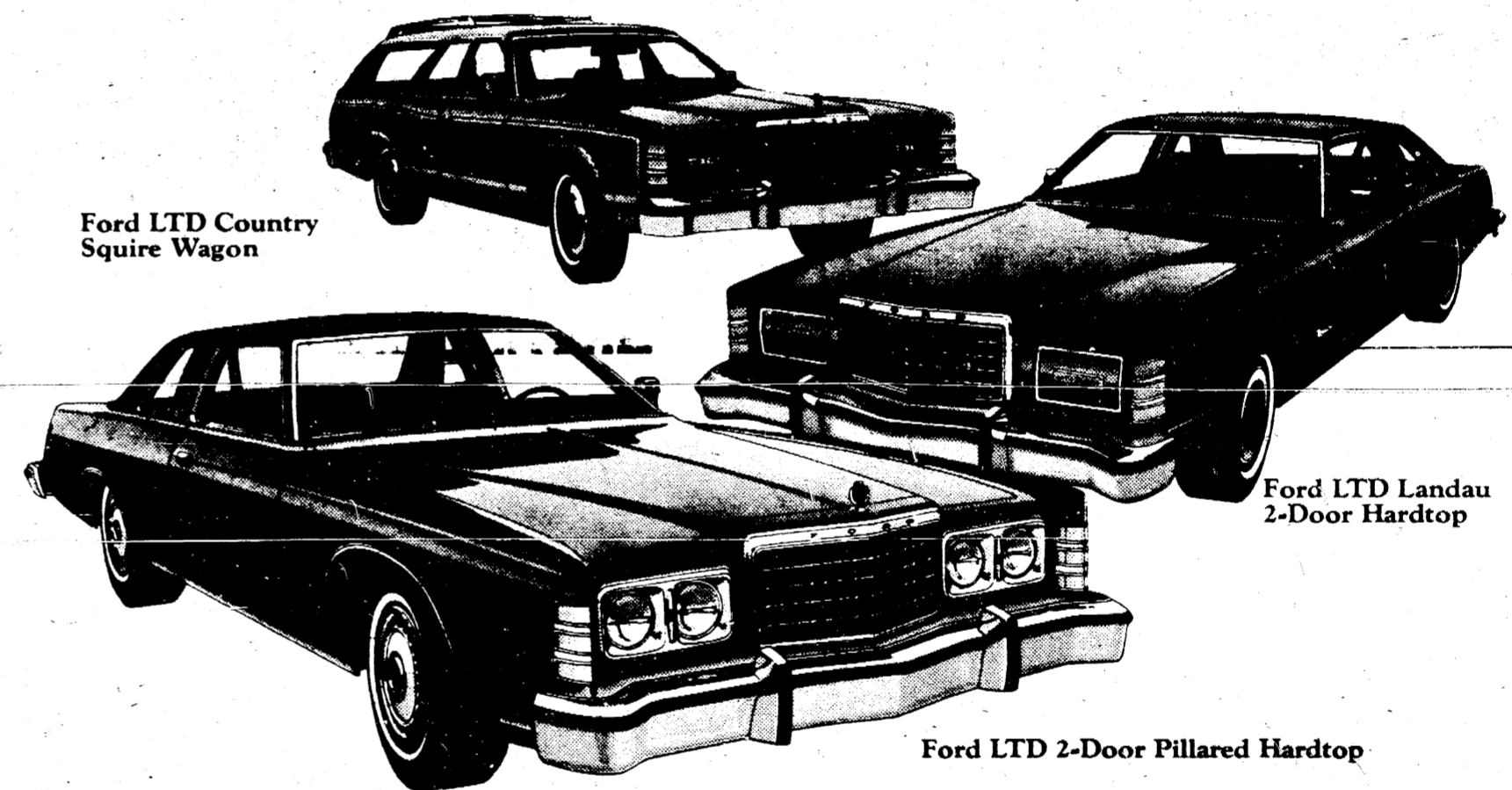

A Report From The Manchester Education Assoc

LEARNING-SCHOOL LEARNING
Parents sometimes wonder about classroom situations that their children describe to them, and ask "How could that have happened?" Parents and teachers have the same goals—to help each child develop a good self-image, to motivate each child to help each child develop the skills and social skills needed to do well in school and at home, and to help each child what they need.
ADULT AUTHORITY. Parents, by being parents, and being the most important source of powerful natural authority over their children. Teachers don't have this kind of authority, which by itself limits many kinds of misbehavior. And as mentioned earlier, student group behavior is often directed towards acting independently from adults. Fourth-SPACE. At home, when a child isn't handling himself well, he can go off by himself until feelings cool and the situation changes. There isn't this flexibility at school. By law, the teacher or another qualified adult is supposed to be with the students at all times. If there is another adult a student can be with for a "breather" there is seldom another place for him to go. Some classrooms have as many as 31 students. This school is intensely social with fewer outlets for privacy, and loneliness, than the home. Finally-CHEMISTRY. Dr. Halm G. Ginott author of Teacher and Child, A Book for Parents and Teachers, states, "A teacher can expect unpredictable group behavior in the classroom." What may be predictable at home may not be at school. Each teacher, with all his/her skills in subject area and in working with people can find each class like a chemistry experiment. The ingredients change in kind, quantity and

intensity, and a hidden catalyst may suddenly lead to an unexpected result. These 5 elements make the school learning situation different from the home learning situation. Working with these elements, the teachers' goal is to guide and stimulate individual students and groups of students in gaining educational skills, and in developing social skills needed for effective group work and interaction.

Question: I am really worried about my eighteen month old daughter. She was born six weeks premature, so we couldn't take her home from the hospital for a month or so. She had breathing problems soon after her birth, also. Her development is really slow; for example, she couldn't sit by herself until she was a year old and was about fourteen months old before she could grasp objects by herself. She doesn't walk and she uses no words yet. She may have trouble seeing, too. Several doctors have run tests on her, but we haven't been told much, yet. No one has mentioned where I could get help for her - either the location of programs or someone who can tell me what to do at home. Is there anything I can do? I am afraid that something is really wrong and would feel better if I could just do something.

Answer: When a child seems to have a serious problem, parents may quite naturally feel scared, confused, concerned, and angry. Sometimes they keep a child at home and don't seek help, because they are afraid to hear the diagnosis of the problem. As long as they don't have the "final" answer, they can pretend a little longer that NO problem exists or that it is just a little one which will clear up soon. When parents begin to reach out for help, as you are doing, they will find that most professionals with whom they come in contact recognize their feelings and will try to provide emotional support, education, and practical help for them as well as services for the child.

There are many programs and services in Washtenaw County for pre-school children and many skilled people who are waiting to help you and your child. Both diagnosis and treatment of problems is available. No child is too young to be referred. You will be part of the team: helping your child and, of course, the medical information shared by your doctors will become part of the treatment program also.

Since the public schools must legally help pre-schoolers who qualify for special services, this is a good place to start. The special education staff at the Washtenaw Intermediate School District can

direct you to the right place or you can directly contact your local director of special education. For Chelsea, Manchester, and Whitmore Lake residents, this person is Dr. Henry DeYoung at 475-9131, extension 48.

When treatment begins early, some problems can be corrected entirely while others can be minimized or prevented from becoming worse.

(Project COPE is a federally funded program which is being operated during the current school year by Special Education Region V for Chelsea, Manchester, and Whitmore Lake School Districts. Its aim is to inform the community about the special problems and needs of pre-school children.
