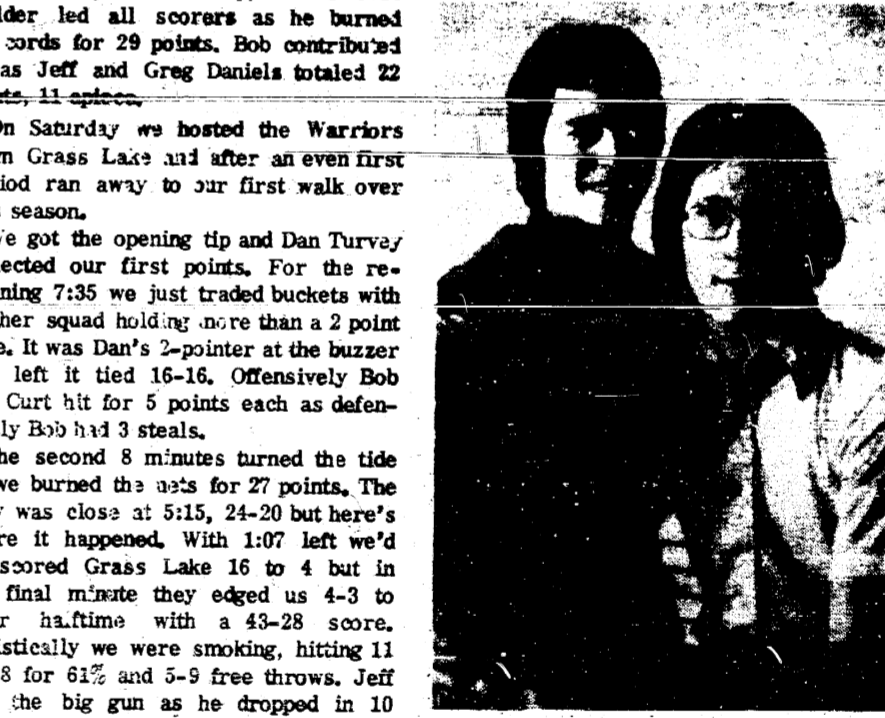
## COMMUNITY EDUCATION

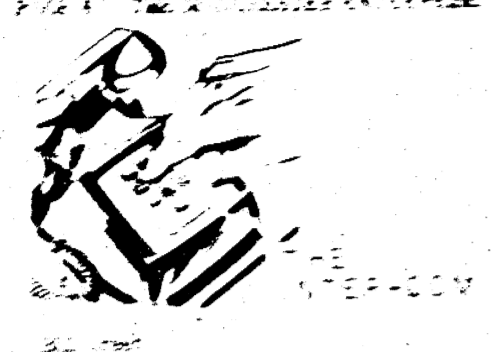

To the qualified electors of the Village of Manchester County of Washtenaw, State of Michigan

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT I WILL BE AT THE VILLAGE OFFICE AT 120 SO. CLINTON ST.

### Monday, February 14, 1977

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. The 30th day preceding said Election

For the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING each of the qualified electors to said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SMALL PROPERTY OWNERS.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 904. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration by any elector or person authorized by the Clerk of the Township, City or Village to receive and forward registration cards and receiving and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election.

UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE

SEC. 901. The possession of election or any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not require the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1924.)

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 906. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date of his last registration, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall make a transfer of registration upon receipt of such request and shall forward the registration card to the new address.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 907. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not returned such removal with the local Clerk shall receive a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address, from the local Clerk, with the election book in the precinct in which he is registered at the next ensuing primary or election. The transfer of election request of the registration records shall compare the signature therein with the signature upon this applicant's registration request and, if the signatures correspond, then the applicant shall carry with him by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 913 of this act, shall show his registration to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The applicant shall not be allowed to vote in the Township, City or Village in which he has been changed, if it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to that precinct on or after the date of the registration, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

## ask COPE

**Question:** I am very upset with my five year old son, because he is not yet toilet trained. He will be going to kindergarten in the fall, and I don't know how he will get along. I am beginning to feel resentful toward him and feel that perhaps he is wetting himself just to spite me. The situation is so bad that he and I never go anywhere except to the grocery store; I don't feel that I can ever leave him with a sitter. Who would want to change the diapers of a five year old child? I am too embarrassed to have anyone know that the child is still wetting himself. I feel like a failure.

**Answer:** The age at which children gain bowel and bladder control varies greatly, but, in general, toilet training is usually not accomplished until a child is past eighteen months of age and - more often - between the ages of two and three. Although a child may have occasional nighttime accidents, we would expect most children to be dry and unsoiled - at least during the daytime - by no later than four.

You are, understandably, feeling a great deal of resentment and hostility toward your child. You feel embarrassed by his lack of success in this area and resent the limitations imposed upon your daily schedule by a child who needs frequent changing. However, your child is certainly not enjoying the situation either. He certainly feels your anger and disappointment. Also, by having to always remain at home, he is missing out on important experiences which would stimulate him and prepare him for school.

First, you need to consult his pediatrician or your family physician to see whether or not there is any physical condition which might be preventing bowel or bladder control. Some problems can be helped medically.

If the physician finds no physical basis for the problem, you must consider that emotional factors may be involved. If you will call COPE (475-9131, extension 50) or the Special Education office at Extension 48, the pre-school psychologist can talk with you and make some appropriate suggestions. If you are interested in making a referral for services, your son can then be tested and a diagnosis of his problems can be made. You will then be directed to services which can help both

HOT AIR—BUT NO HEAT!

American Farm Bureau Federation Congressmen dedicated to the philosophy of government pricing and allocation of resources are trying desperately to find a scapegoat for the current critical shortage of natural gas. Some are throwing rocks at the gas industry with the charge that the shortage is somehow contrived with the objective of raising prices. This is sheer flim-flam. A million of so workers are unemployed due to the fuel shortage and many homeowners are faced with the prospect of no heat because Congress has stubbornly refused to decontrol interstate natural gas prices. The tragedy of the current crisis is that it could have been avoided if Congress had heeded the warnings of impending shortages by the industry and other qualified observers several years ago. The problem really goes back more than 22 years ago when the Supreme Court gave the Federal Power Commission authority to regulate not only the transmission and distribution companies, but also producers of natural gas moving in

interstate commerce.

The price curb on interstate sales encouraged intrastate sales and discouraged exploration and the development of new sources. Secondly, the unrealistic price curbs and low prices encouraged the uneconomic use of natural gas because it was cheaper than other fuels such as oil and coal.

As the result of cheap prices, the consumption of natural gas in the United States has soared. Proved reserves a year ago were said to equal about 11 years worth of demand, with consumption running at about 2 1/2 times the rate of discovery.

President Carter has proposed a band-aid for the current national crisis with his "Emergency Natural Gas Act of 1977."

This would allow the President to order gas transferred from one pipeline company to another and allow a higher price on some natural gas until July 31.

It will take more than symbolic gestures such as donning long underwear and turning down the White House thermostat to achieve a viable national energy policy.

If the President and the Congress vote in favor of price controls as a major part of its new energy policy, next winter will be colder than 1977. Hot air generated by the Administration and Congress won't help.

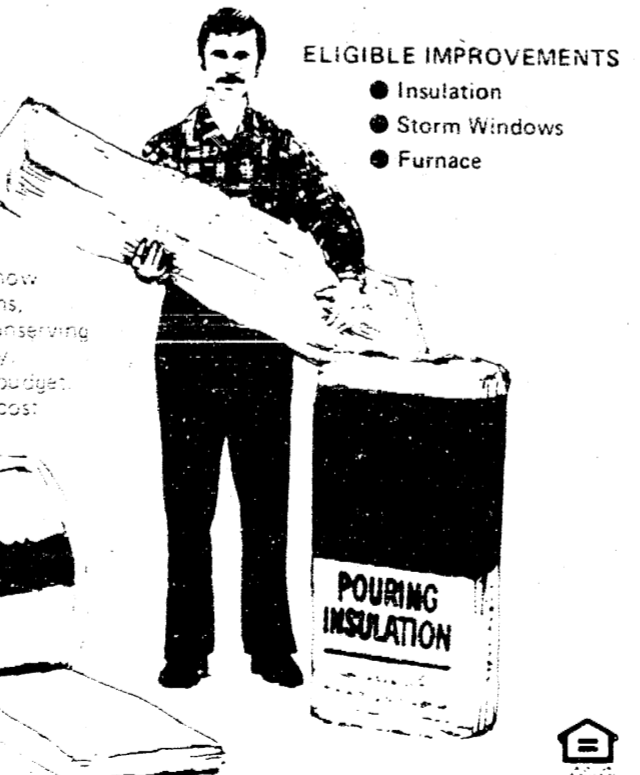

## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

January 17, 1977

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:12 p.m. Present were Daniels, Duncan, Padley, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Denhoff and Fitzgerald. Minutes of the January 3, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Padley, supported by Duncan. All yeas, carried.

Zsenyuk reported on a letter received from Superintendent Green regarding the police services bill for the 1975-76 school year. Zsenyuk suggested that we consider working out a trade-off on services. Moved by Scully that the Manchester Police Dept. participate by providing police services at school activities, but the cost of such services will be deducted from any invoice submitted by the school board to the Village. Padley supported the motion. All yeas, carried. All past bills will be left in the past and will not be considered outstanding bills. The mayor was directed to write a letter stating the above decisions.

Daniels reviewed Public Works activities. It was suggested that the rate of labor charged on reimbursed services should be increased to more adequately cover the Village cost. Moved by Duncan, supported by Schaffer that the rate be increased from \$6.00 to \$8.00 per hour and that the rates be reviewed annually. All yeas, carried. Daniels requested permission and monetary authorization to purchase hand tools for the DPW at the auction to be held January 28, 1977 at the Sportsman's Club. Moved by Scully, supported by Padley to authorize up to \$1000.00 for such purchases. All yeas, carried.

Little reported that he had contacted Lansing regarding the CHI-BRO Park application. There has been no further action on it.

Duncan reported on the Planning Commission meeting. A six month variance was given the Calico Cat so that the Planning Commission can formulate a sign ordinance which is more specific and keeping with the theme of the downtown area. Also any pre-dated signs would be given a specific time limit to change if they were not in accord with the new ordinance. Moved by Scully, supported by Padley to concur with the Planning Commission's recommendations to review the sign ordinance and to grant a temporary reprieve for six months to the Calico Cat until the sign ordinance has been reworked. Yeas: Padley, Schaffer, Scully; abstain Duncan. Motion carried.

John Seeley and John Adams of McNamee's, Porter and Seeley were present at Council request to try to find a more cost feasible plan. They were asked if it were possible to solve the initial problem, being cited for dumping phosphates in the River Raisin, for a lesser cost than quoted for the whole program. The Village is aware that a great deal of work is needed, but feels that it can not afford such a program. Adams stated that the design for the plant includes specifications for BOD and suspended solids as well as the DNR final permit limitations. The old permit expires July 1, 1977. Scully questioned whether specification were necessary to do the job or to get federal grant money. According to Adams the specifications must still be met on the State and Federal level. Seeley suggested that on the area of Financial Requirements of the Grant application the engineers could add a revised statement indicating that it would be quite a financial burden and would necessitate further federal funding, as well as being done in phases. Fielder, Widmayer, Burch, Leniz, Macomber were present from the Manchester Township. The Township would be required to develop their own system on-site, run own pipes and connect to the Village, or install a township system. Present customers on the system (sewer) cannot be on the system and not help pay for it. There are five customers concerned on Austin Road. If the five were cut off, then they would be forced to put in a septic system or such. Fielder will meet with the Township Board and the five owners. Seeley stated that the Township can revise their resolution to not include a part, Re: 400' west Austin

### STANTON ROESCH ELECTED PRESIDENT OF SALINE HOSPITAL

The 24 Directors of the Saline Community Hospital Board elected Stanton G. Roesch president for a one-year term beginning January 25, 1977. He succeeds Gerald O. Bshmitter in this position.

Attorney Roesch maintains a law practice in Saline and Manchester. He is a graduate of the University of Michigan Law School. A long term supporter of the hospital and a board member, he has served as secretary the past 10 years. Robert Betzig was re-elected vice-president, Wesley Exelby was re-elected treasurer and William Howard was elected secretary.

The voting followed the annual meeting of the members of the hospital. Members are those citizens and companies that have contributed to the hospital, making construction of the original 1958 S.C.H. and new hospital possible. Members learned that the fiscal year ending September 30, 1976, yielded a gain of \$51,039 from services. Monies are returned to normal operation of the hospital. Outgoing President Bahamiller said, "The year marks one of growth and success. Services have expanded in several needed areas, including orthopedic and eye, nose and throat medical coverage." New services provided through the hospital include speech therapy and electromyography, a nerve response test performed by a physiatrist. It was noted that a total of 172 cardiac stress tests were done for residents of the area.

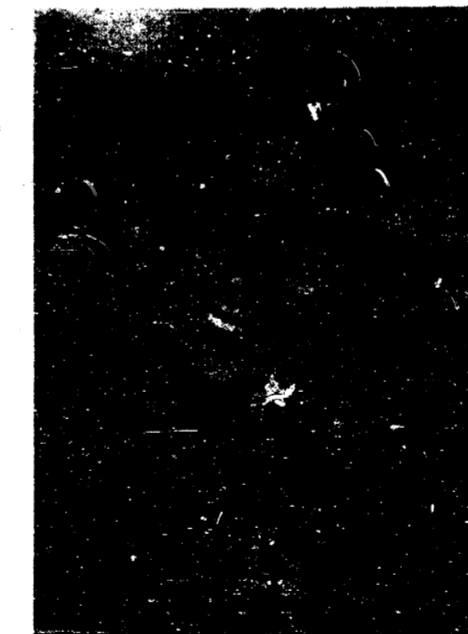
