Manchester Red Cross Blood Club's first Bloodmobile clinic in 1977 will be Monday, March 21, at a new location--The Knights of Columbus Hall--from 12 to 6 p.m. The demand for blood has been particularly heavy this past year with an unusual amount of heart surgery, for which the Red Cross has supplied the blood, all of which has been given by volunteer donors.

## UNITED WAY VOLUNTEER AGENCY

A comparison of Social Service in Chelsea and Saline with Manchester Family Service was the high light of the annual meeting of the local United Way volunteer agency. Mrs. Linda Ormsby, director of Social Services in both neighboring towns was the guest speaker.

Mr. LeRoy Marx, who has been treasurer of Manchester Family Service for eleven years retired, much to the regret of the board. He was given a Certificate of Appreciation for his significant service to the community.

Two board members were re-elected for three year terms, Mrs. Hobart John and Mrs. William Schwab. Mr. Donald Tassie was the third member to be elected to the board this year. Officers for the coming year will be Chairwoman, Mrs. Franklin M. Reck, Vice-chairwoman Mrs. Schwab, Treasurer, Mr. Merrill Marx and Secretary, Mrs. Merle Armstrong.

Reports were given for the past year as well as that of the Christmas Project which was published in The Enterprise, January 13, 1977. In 1976, 85 families were served, consisting of 208 individuals. Of this number, 110 were children and 43 were Senior Citizens. Approximately 690 calls or contacts were made during the year, and 8189 miles were driven (198 trips) by 14 men and women volunteer drivers.

There were two burn-outs in 1976--one in April and one in July. The community's response was most gratifying with clothing, furniture, bedding and household items which Manchester Family Service scheduled and relayed to the families. Referrals were also made for both families to the American Red Cross in Ann Arbor.

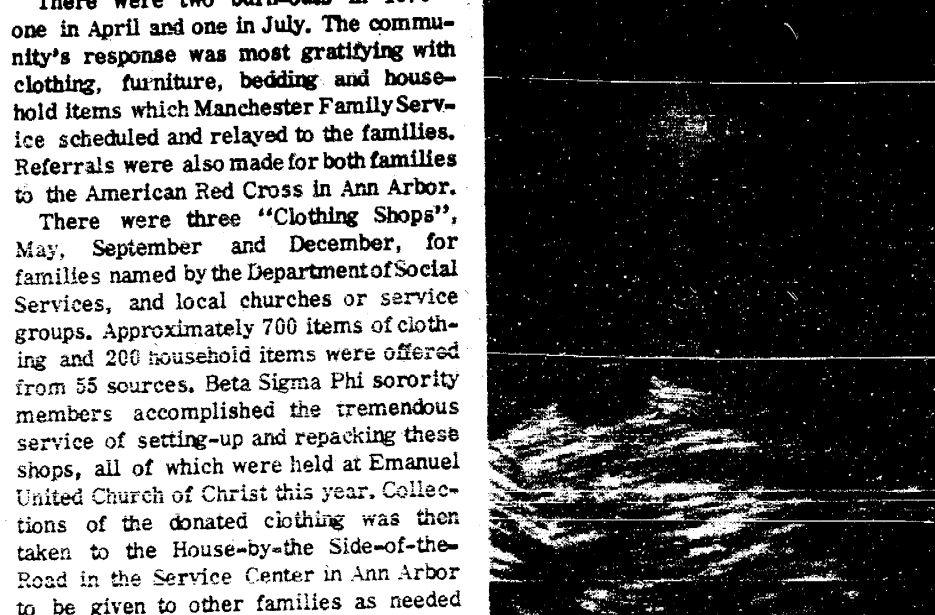
There were three "Clothing Shops", May, September and December, for families named by the Department of Social Services, and local churches or service groups. Approximately 700 items of clothing and 200 household items were offered from 55 sources. Beta Sigma Phi sorority members accomplished the tremendous service of setting-up and repacking these shops, all of which were held at Emanuel United Church of Christ this year. Collections of the donated clothing was then taken to the House-by-the-Side-of-the-Road in the Service Center in Ann Arbor to be given to other families as needed throughout the County. When the County facility could not use things, the Salvation Army picked up the boxes of clothing.

At Easter-time, D'Agostino's Florists gave 8 Easter lilies, for distribution to shut-ins. Beta Sigma Phi collected a layette and gave a food basket to a family designated by the County Nurse.

Thanksgiving turkeys were donated to 16 families from Double A Products employees. Boxes of groceries were included in this project from the 213 cans of food collected by school children as pay for movie attendance, in November.

AFTER ALL...

The United States Department of Agriculture's 1976 Young Executives Committee, made up of 20 middle-level bureaucrats appointed annually to study department operations while continuing with their regular jobs, says USDA should bring consumers into a policy-making partnership.

Although farmers and agribusiness firms have been the department's primary concern in the past, such programs as food stamps have come to dominate its budget and deserve more consideration, the committee said.

News reports credit the new Secretary of Agriculture, Bob Bergland, with saying he intends to bring "consumer voices into the highest policymaking circles" to help shape a joint food-farm policy.

The committee even suggested a change in name to reflect this consumer concern—something like "department of food and agriculture" or "department of food, agriculture and resources." It further suggested that failure to expand its approach to consumer interests could result in "a reduction in the department's role and influence in broad policy formulation, and perhaps its eventual demise."

Maybe, so. But a good many experienced and concerned farmers and ranchers will view the committee's recommendations with suspicion. They will resent any downgrading of the importance and consideration of farm, ranch and agribusiness interests in the department's activities. Many will feel, also, and feel strongly,

that in a world where technology has led to larger acreages and fewer farmers, the recommendations are another blatant effort at "empire building." And in many areas, they've had about all the "big government" they need.

After all, if you want to take a good look at the "after alls," the farmer and rancher need the consumer for a market—but the consumer needs the farmer and rancher just to eat and stay alive.

Technology has helped the farmer and rancher produce more food and fiber efficiently—but it hasn't replaced him.

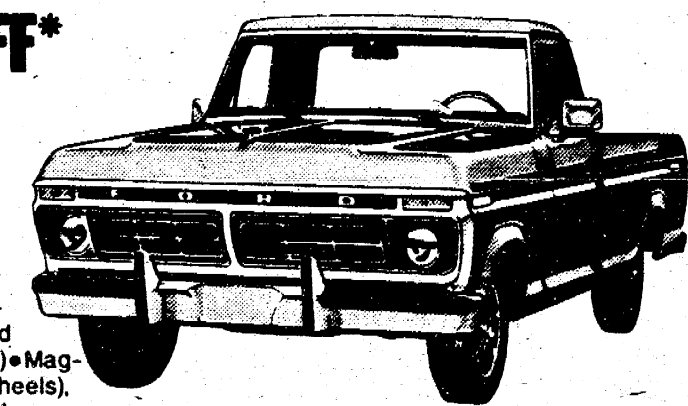

scored 14 to our 4 to enter the locker room up, 30-26. In this period we'd turned the ball over 10 times. Mark and Jeff Clark supplied most of our offense with points each.

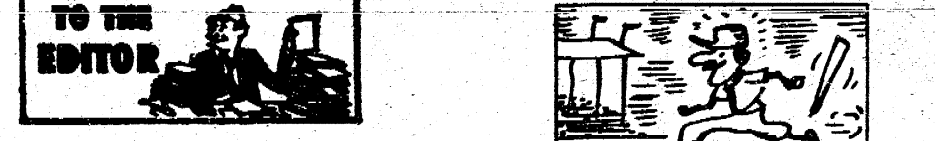
Tom pinned Jonesville, 55 seconds, lost to Dundee 7-2.

under the category of "Other Income," the IRS said.

If a taxpayer loses money while gambling, the taxpayer may deduct his or her gambling losses on Schedule A of Form 1040, to the extent of winnings. For example, a taxpayer who loses \$200 and wins \$150 during the tax year may deduct \$150 on his or her itemized deduction schedule in addition to reporting the \$150 as income. A taxpayer must have records to substantiate gambling losses, such as racing stubs or lottery tickets, the IRS said.

If a prize or award is payable at some future time, at the option of whomever is giving the prize, the amount is not taxable as income until the taxpayer either receives it, or the prize is made available to him or her.

NEW COUNTY COMMITTEE TO HOLD FIRST MEETING MARCH 3

The newly elected members of the Democratic County Committee for the 1977-78 term will hold their first meeting Thursday, March 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Ypsilanti Township Civic Center at the intersection of Whittaker Road and Huron River Drive.

In announcing the meeting, County Democratic Chairperson Suzanne Frount stated that, "The meetings of our County Committee are open, and we invite and welcome any interested person living in Washtenaw County to attend."

The agenda includes a preliminary report from a special committee on "Goals and Means," headed by Vice-chairperson Steve Manchester. The principal business will be the organization of working committees, which will meet in workshop sessions. These include Committees on Budget, Issues, Fund Raising, Voter Registration, Organization, Campaigns, and County Government.

The County Democratic Committee consists of the members of the Executive Committee and two additional members elected from each voting precinct in the County. Democratic County Conventions since 1972 have adopted rules requiring all County Party business to be carried out by the County Committee, and not delegated to the Executive Committee, so as to broaden grass-roots control over party affairs.

Taxpayers must report all winnings from gambling as income on their tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service said.

For tax purposes, gambling activities cover raffles, lotteries, horse racing and bingo games. The IRS considers cash won as prizes in contests and as awards from employers to be taxable income.

Non-cash prizes such as household appliances, all-expense paid vacations, and cars won as prizes or donated by employers, must be included in income at fair market value. Taxpayers should report all winnings on the Form 1040
