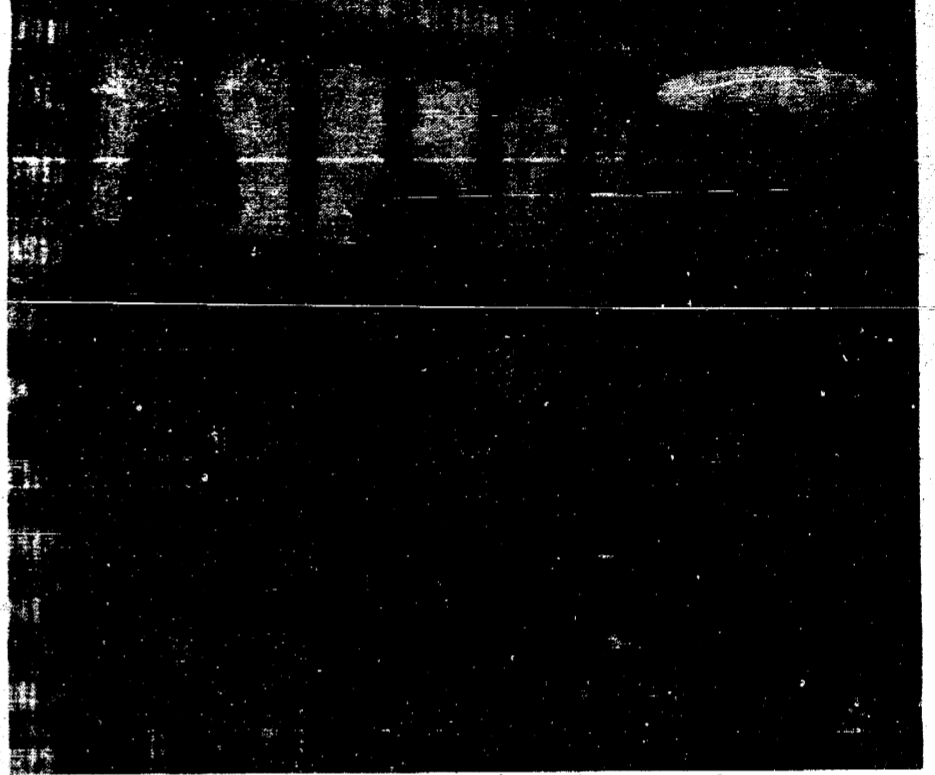
Paul Brehob and Christina Opal won first places in the Manchester Optimist Club's Oratorical Contest conducted Monday evening.

Village Planning Commission Meeting

February 2, 1977

The regular meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Broucek, Leeson, Tracy, Daniels, Krauss, and Duncan.

The meeting was called to order at 7:35 p.m. by Ch. Broucek. Minutes of the December regular meeting (Acting Secretary Tracy) were read, and on the motion by Daniels, seconded by Krauss, were unanimously approved. Several items of current interest were discussed.

It was moved by Broucek that Daniels be the appropriate member to review with officials of the American Legion concerning the development of the properties

located south-east of the intersection of Duncan and Adrian Streets, (Blocks 17 and 18), that such development is in violation of the Village of Manchester Zoning Ordinance, the changing of the (State) Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Regulations. The motion was seconded by Tracy, and unanimously approved. (Note: reference M.V.P.C. Minutes of Feb. 6, 1975)

Possible revisions to the existing "Sign Ordinance", (as part of the Zoning Ordinance), were discussed, and it was decided that Ch. Broucek will draft a letter for distribution to commercial establishments and others, especially in the Central Business District, to request their attitudes and wishes. Also to invite interested parties to attend a subsequent meeting of the M.V.P.C. to assist in a more definitive recommendation for a revised Ordinance.

The meeting was declared adjourned, at 8:50 p.m.

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COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

February 21, 1977

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:05 pm. Present were Denhoff, Duncan, Daniels, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Fitzgerald and Padley. Minutes from the February 7, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Schaffer, supported by Denhoff. All yeas, carried. Enter Padley at 7:10 pm.

Public Works activities were discussed by Daniels. The frozen water main on Ann Arbor Hill has been opened. Repair work has been done at the sewage treatment plant. Patching asphalt has been placed on streets. The park skating rink has been resurfaced. Cleanup work has been undertaken at Kirk Park on the hill placed at the south end of the park. The new 12" water main has been tested by the Village and must now be tested by the Health Department.

Mike Alexander was present to inquire about the procedure Council has taken in regard to the sign ordinance. He felt

that all that was required at this time was an application for a variance if the sign would not conform. It could then exist legally in this capacity. If the ordinance were changed then the sign, along with others, could be handled again at that later time. He felt that Council had taken it upon themselves to act as the voice of the people without a Public Hearing, and he asked how Council had gotten to the present point where a permit has not been issued, in a legal fashion. He was advised that a permit had been applied for and denied with the question of whether or not the portion of the Zoning Ordinance which deals with signs had fulfilled the needs of the community being directed to Planning Commission for further study. Alexander still questioned Council's right of action requesting that he be given a law or ordinance which allows Council to act in the manner in which it has. Little assured him that he would be given a reply prior to the next council meeting.

Moved by Denhoff, supported by Scully to postpone the Public Hearing on budget until the next meeting, due to a lack of information on incoming funds for the next fiscal year. All yeas, carried.

Duncan reported on the Planning Commission activities. A meeting is scheduled for March 2. The sign ordinance will be discussed and the Commission would like input from anyone interested on what type of signs should be representative of the community. Whatever policy is established, all signs would be expected to conform within a set period of time. At the previous meeting Daniels was designated without proper permits and in violation of the flood plane area.

The annual request for designation of one individual as Street Administrator for the village was brought up. Resolved by Bruce T. Daniels be designated as the single street administrator for the Village of Manchester in all transactions with the State Highway Commission as provided in Section 13 of Act 51. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Denhoff, supported by Scully to comply with the statement of assurances as required by the General Revenue Sharing. All yeas, carried.

A Public Hearing was set for 8:00 pm to consider Unloy's request for Hoover Industrial Development District. Limpert asked to hear what improvements are planned for the future. Mr. Fred Barhoff of Unloy replied that nothing further was planned at this point. Further questions were raised regarding the zoning of the

property under Village zoning, future policy in regard to further development districts, capacity problems which might arise for sewers and the projection of how Federal Funding might affect the sewerage. Limpert felt that the district should not be granted until the impact of total development possible under present zoning is designated. Duncan requested further information on the economic situation--what it will cost the Village. Alexander asked what would happen if the property would be sold during the time it is classified as an Industrial Development District. Moved by Duncan, supported by Padley to adjourn the Public Hearing. All yeas, carried. Moved by Schaffer, supported by Duncan that on the grounds of lack of information the request be tabled. Denhoff abstain, all others yeas. Motion carried. Prior to a decision being made on the Hoover Industrial Development District further information is necessary on the future development, tax impact, property size-total acreage, what happens in the event of a change of ownership, and why is the request for the total property area.

Moved by Schaffer, supported by Denhoff to endorse McNamee, Porter and Seely's request to the EPA for payment on the infiltration/inflow portion of the facilities plan. All yeas, carried.

COMMON SITUS NOT A VIRUS

"Common Situs" is a word being batted around now, and at first glance you might get the idea that it was some kind of virus. There are some who are opposed to the idea that might say that Common Situs is a sickness all right. They might argue that those who propose such a plan are sick in the head.

We won't go that far, but the idea of Common Situs picketing is an off-beat idea to many people. Under current law, if there is a labor dispute involving one of the unions at a construction site, other unions at the site can continue to work. Organized labor wants to change all that.

Should Congress approve a bill to allow common situs picketing, one union in dispute at a construction site can close down the entire construction project, regardless of how the members of the other unions feel that might be working there. The passage of this law has been one of the goals of organized labor for 25 years.

There are a number of individuals and organizations opposed to giving organized labor this much more power. Not the least of these is the nation's largest general farm organization, Spokesmen for the American Farm Bureau give two reasons why the organization is mounting a campaign against common situs picketing. First, it will have the effect of increasing the cost of products that farmers have to buy, and farm costs are one of the biggest culprits in the farm price squeeze. Secondly, the Farm Bureau says such legislation will increase the monopoly power of organized labor.

It's reported that labor hopes to push the bill through the House before the Easter recess, and through the Senate

equally fast before the opposition can organize to defeat it. This means that those who are opposed to giving this power to unions better get their pencil and paper in hand now and get letters to their Congressman and Senators as soon as possible. Such correspondence to Congress is the only way to stop this bill from becoming law.

Council Proceedings

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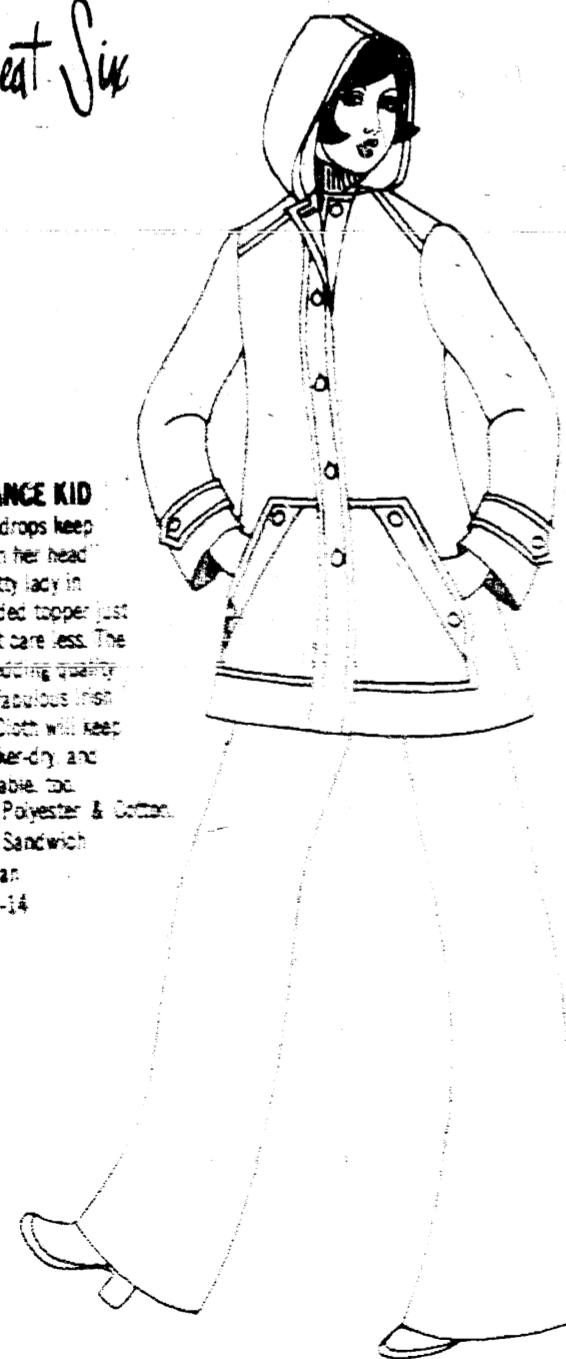

Ask COPE

Question: I just found out that my first grade boy needs speech therapy. I feel sorry about this, because I tried to get help for him three years ago. He didn't begin to talk until he was two, and people had a terrible time understanding him. My doctor, family, and friends all told me that he was a "late bloomer", that I shouldn't worry, and that he would outgrow the problem. Where can parents of young children get help? When should parents worry about speech problems in pre-schoolers?

Answer: Whenever a parent has a concern about his child's growth and development, he can call the Director of Special Education, Dr. Henry DeLong, at 475-9131, Ext. 48. He will help answer questions and can direct you to an appropriate staff person for further help. Public schools legally must serve pre-schoolers who have special needs and must provide both diagnostic and treatment programs for those who are eligible.

In the area of speech and language problems, a speech therapist should be consulted when any one of the following conditions exist in a child:

1. A child is not talking at all by 2.
2. Most of the speech cannot be understood by 3.
3. He is vomiting the first sounds of many words after 18 for example, "d" for "dad".
4. He is not using two- or three- word sentences by 2.
5. He uses overly vocal sounds such as "a" or "o" words by 18.
6. The endings of words are usually missing after 1.
7. He has trouble speaking in sentences.

8. He is embarrassed or distressed by his speech at any age.
9. He is noticeably non-fluent (repeating or stretching out sounds, syllables, words, or phrases, or using a lot of "um's" and "ah's") after 4.
10. He is making many errors with sounds after 7.
11. His voice is monotone, too loud, too soft, or of a poor quality that may indicate a hearing loss.
12. His voice sounds too high or low for his age and sex.
13. He sounds as if he were talking through his nose or as if he had a cold.

Project COPE is a federally funded program which is being operated during the current school year by Special Education Region I for Chelsea, Manchester, and Whitmore Lake School Districts. Its aim is to inform the community about the special problems and needs of pre-school children. Those who have questions, concerns, or who wish to refer a child for diagnostic services can contact Elmer Eagan, Project COPE Co-ordinator at 475-9131, ext. 36 or Dr. DeLong at ext. 48.

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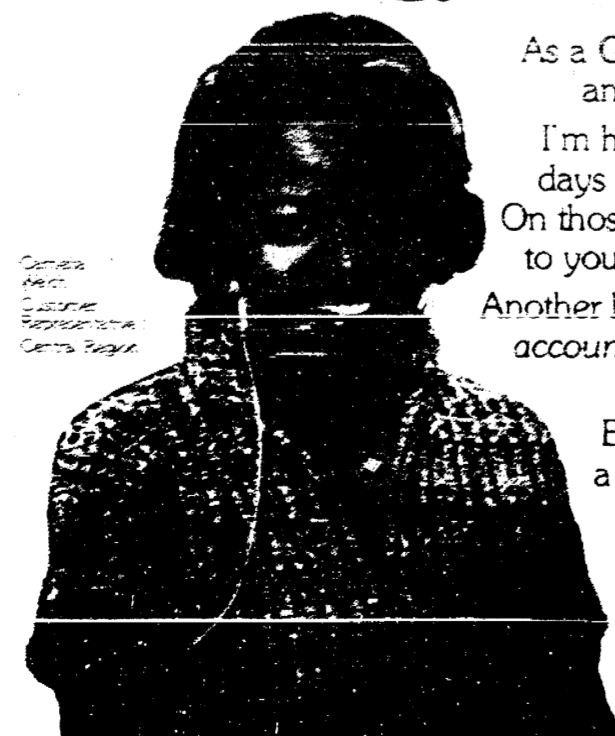



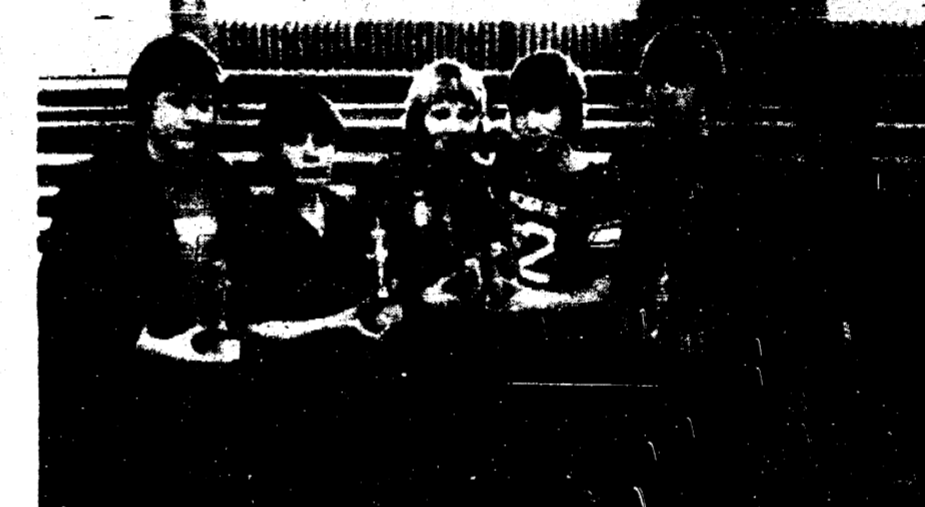
