**BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING**

February 15, 1977

The regular Board of Education meeting was held in the Study Auditorium on Tuesday, February 15, 1977, with President Wm. Bunney calling the meeting to order at 8:05 P.M.

Maxine Frey took roll call with all members being present.

Helen Kensler read the minutes of the previous meeting. President Bunney asked for corrections or additions to the minutes. George Macomber moved to accept the minutes as read. Supported by Susan Westfall, all yeas. Motion carried.

President Bunney asked Helen Kensler to read the minutes of the Special Meeting of February 2, 1977. He asked for corrections or additions before approval of the minutes. Superintendent Green stated that he made an error in accepting the bid on the 1970 pickup because the deadline for bids was February 4, 1977. It was so noted. Louis Vogel moved the minutes be approved. Supported by Susan Westfall, all yeas. Motion carried.

Maxine Frey was asked to give the Financial Report. There is a balance of \$1,788.13 in checking and \$277,000.00 in Savings Deposit Receipts, with a total of \$278,788.13. A tax check from Manchester Township has also been received.

President Bunney asked for a report from the Budget Committee. Chairman Reno Feldkamp stated they met February 5, 1977 and reviewed the current budget.

Many things are up in the air due to fuel expenses, cold weather and breakdown of equipment. He would be able to give a more detailed report after the bills for the breakdowns were in.

President Bunney asked if there were any questions. Louis Vogel asked for the status on our State Aid. Superintendent Green stated we had received 1/2 of our February payment. He was hopeful that the 2nd 1/2 would be paid in April, if the State of Michigan could borrow \$250,000,000. Nothing has been said about the payment for April or June.

President Bunney asked for a motion that all previous bids on the 1970 pickup be rejected. Moved by Reno Feldkamp, supported by George Macomber, all yeas. Motion carried.

Reno Feldkamp read the 2 new bids for the pickup. Ralph Janofski bid \$236.50 and Steve Halchick bid \$235.00. Moved by Jim Walkowe, supported by Helen Kensler to support Mr. Janofski's bid. All yeas. Motion carried.

Superintendent Green gave his recommendation to the Board based on his evaluation and Board concerns in regard to the non-renewal of Chester Kocesi's contract as High School Principal for the 1977-78 school year.

Moved by Reno Feldkamp, supported by Jim Walkowe to accept the recommendation of Superintendent Green.

President Bunney asked if there was any discussion. Mr. Richard Rogers asked to be recognized at this time. He stated he had with him a list of signatures which included 30 adults and 60 students who wanted Mr. Kocesi's contract to be re-

newed. After presenting this list to the Board of Education, President Bunney stated the Board would briefly adjourn to executive session.

President Bunney called the meeting back to order at 8:50 P.M. stating the Board felt they were ready to act on Superintendent Green's recommendation. Further discussion followed regarding the assembling of more names in Mr. Kocesi's behalf.

President Bunney restated that a motion had been made and supported to accept Superintendent Green's recommendation. A roll call vote was taken, all yeas. Motion carried.

Superintendent Green recommended to the Board the following administrative contract renewals for 1977-78.

Brian Schlick-1 year contract with salary negotiated after the approval of the 1977-78 budget.

Moved by Louis Vogel, supported by Helen Kensler, all yeas. Motion carried.

John McGuire-1 year contract with salary negotiated after the approval of the 1977-78 budget.

Philip Malins-1 year contract with salary negotiated after the approval of the 1977-78 budget.

Moved by Jim Walkowe, supported by Louis Vogel, all yeas. Motion carried.

Superintendent Green said that the contracts of John Korican and Don Tassie were not acted upon at this time due to Mr. Korican's request and Don Tassie's illness.

President Bunney read the proposed contract renewal of Supt. Green. (copy of contract on file in Central Office) Reno Feldkamp moved to approve Mr. Green's contract, supported by Helen Kensler, there was no discussion. A roll call vote was taken, all yeas. Motion carried.

Superintendent Green presented the itinerary for the 1977 Senior Trip to the Board for their approval. (copy of itinerary in the supplemental file) Miss Astrida Kalvans is official representative of the Board and has been working closely with the Dely Travel Agency who planned the trip. Mr. and Mrs. Paul Heinrich along with Miss Kalvans and her husband will be the official chaperones in addition to 4 people from the Dely Travel Agency. Moved by Helen Kensler, supported by Macomber. All yeas. Motion carried.

President Bunney asked if there were any other items for discussion. Helen Kensler asked if Typing II would be offered. Mr. Kocesi said after conferring with Mrs. Wise that there were not enough students to offer Typing II.

Mr. Korican suggested a letter of appreciation be sent to Michael Torres for his fine job as Wrestling Coach. Moved by Macomber supported by Feldkamp. All yeas. Motion carried.

There was some further discussion from the audience regarding the agriculture class and the 9th grade math class.

Mrs. Platt asked to be recognized at this time to read a letter which she had received from Miss McMullen the Phys. Ed. teacher regarding the 5th and 6th grade Phys. Ed. program. (copy of letter in supplemental file) The questions she had with regard to the letter and the school system on the whole were; are we meeting only basic minimal needs of our students and are we lacking in equipment and materials in all areas. # AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

WHAT ABOUT "THE OTHER SIDE"?

Farmers have been feeling betrayed lately—betrayed by those they had looked upon as friends. The PBB tragedy, it seemed to them, has been too tough a test for some of those friendships. There was the Governor, long held in high esteem by the farming community for his support and awareness that agriculture was vitally important to the state's economy. Then PBB became more of a political issue (as one farmer described it—a handy tool for the Governor's race) than an agricultural problem, and the long-standing friendship wavered.

Farmers felt that the Governor passed by a real opportunity to restore consumer confidence in Michigan agricultural products when the Federal Food and Drug Administration reiterated its position that .3 ppm PBB tolerance level was safe.

But he chose, instead, to ignore the scientific evidence presented at a recent hearing and use his political influence and power to pressure for lowering of the levels. This action farmers felt would be interpreted by consumers that their current food supply is not safe, a point they strongly dispute.

Then there was the press which in recent years especially farmers had come to look upon as trusted friends in an urban-oriented society, helping them to tell the story of agriculture to the non-farm public. Then PBB became an emotional, sensational issue and that friendship, too, wavered. Farmers couldn't figure out why the few farmers who were having problems got all the news coverage and the many who had experienced the PBB tragedy but had positive stories to tell were ignored.

They had much better luck communicating with members of the press than they did with the Governor, and their valued friendship with the media, they believe, will be strengthened by the PBB "test." Concerned farmers have been meeting with the press in recent weeks

and it's been a listening-learning experience on both sides. The press is learning about farmers' real concerns—what the loss of consumer-confidence will do to them economically, that these economic concerns are for their industry rather than a corporation, that they fear consumer-political pressures for "pure" food will result in shortages and higher prices.

Farmers are learning, too. They've learned that healthy people and healthy animals aren't news, that if they took their healthy herds to the state capitol lawn, they'd get some news coverage, but not as much perhaps as if they were sick. (One farmer responded to this tongue-in-cheek suggestion by a sympathetic newsman: "We have too much respect for our state capitol to do that.") Most important, they've learned that news people are human, that they have strong feelings about reporting any issue fairly and from both sides—and that this is not possible if farmers only sit and grumble about "bad publicity."

Hopefully, this "team" of farmers and news people, both of whom supply a vital commodity to the consuming public, will bring some rationale to this issue before too many decisions are made, based on emotion and political pressure rather than facts. They're the only ones, it seems, who can.

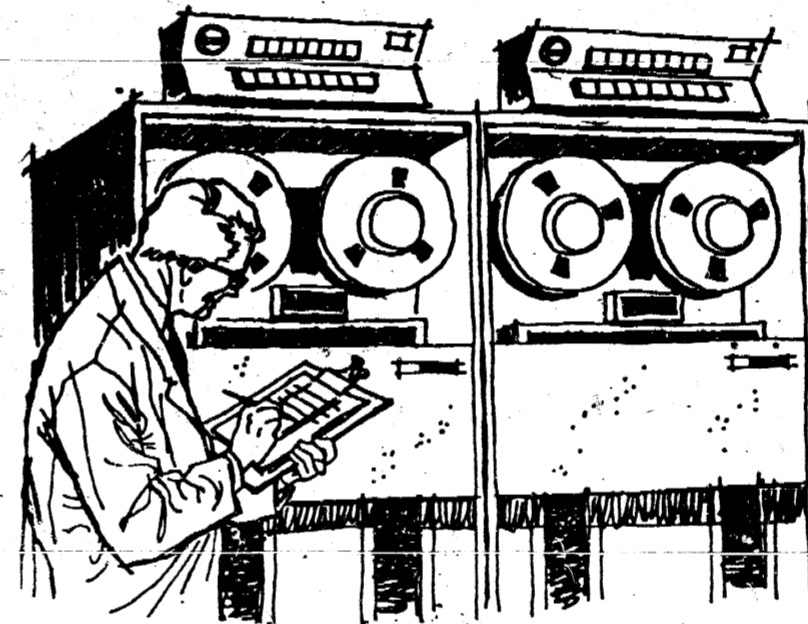

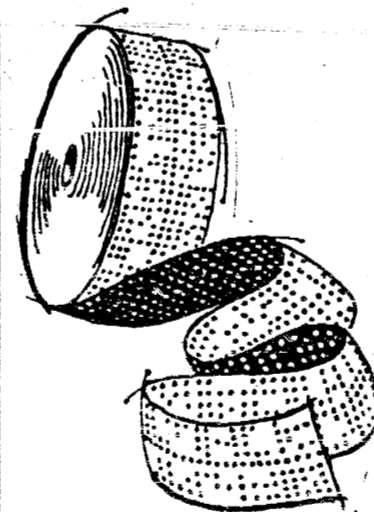

One of his recommendations is a total increase in Educational Appropriations to \$1,269,749,646.00 for the year 1977-1978. Included in the area of this total appropriation is a section labelled Reading Support. These monies have been cut over the years and are now allocated in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 statewide for 1976-1977. Governor Milliken's recommendation in the area of Reading Support for 1977-1978 is to cut this figure to \$1,000,000.00, a cut of 50%.

The band and orchestra enjoyed preparing for this special concert and the Senior Citizens appreciated being invited.

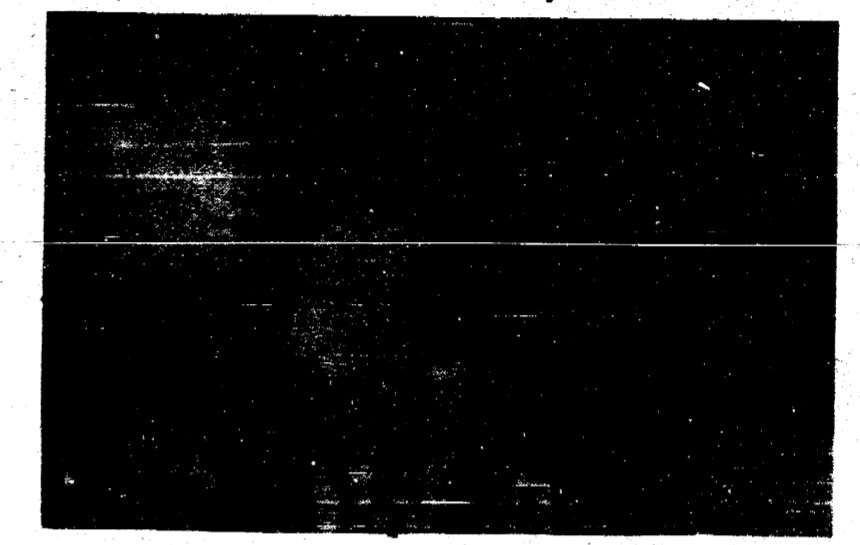
