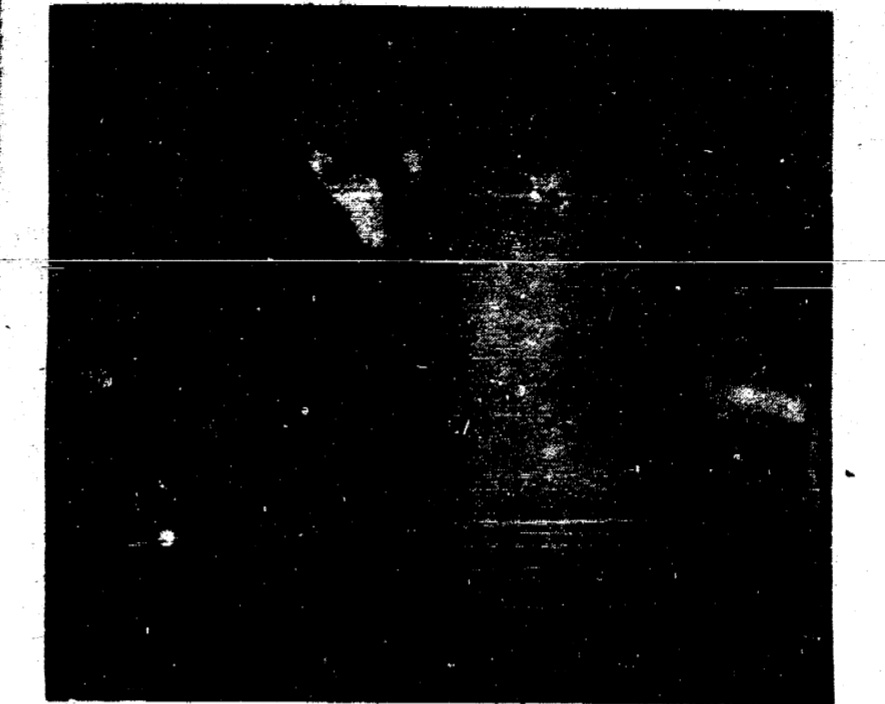

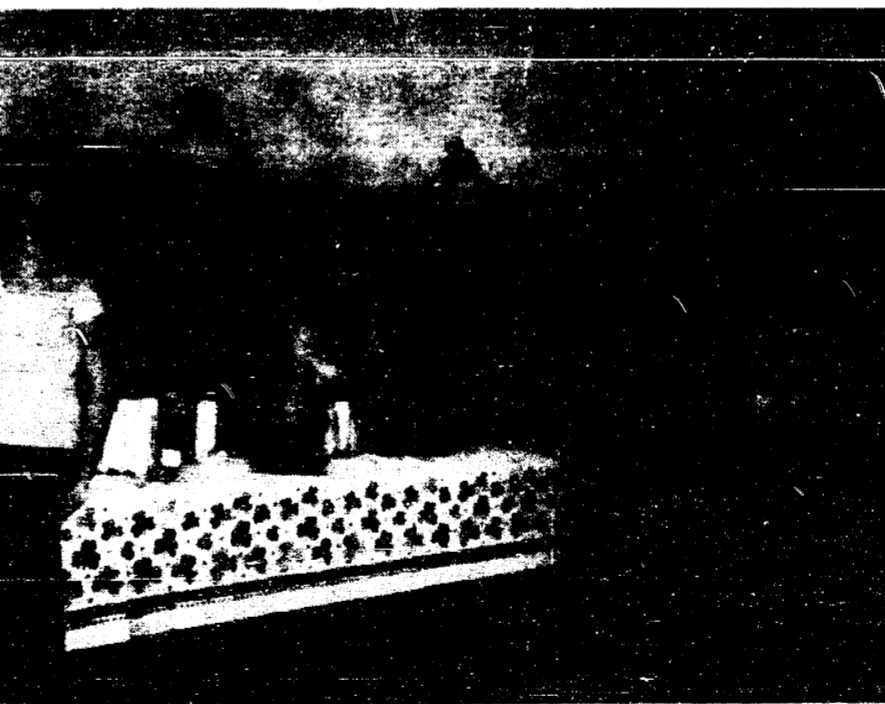

The band and orchestra enjoyed preparing for this special concert and the Senior Citizens appreciated being invited.

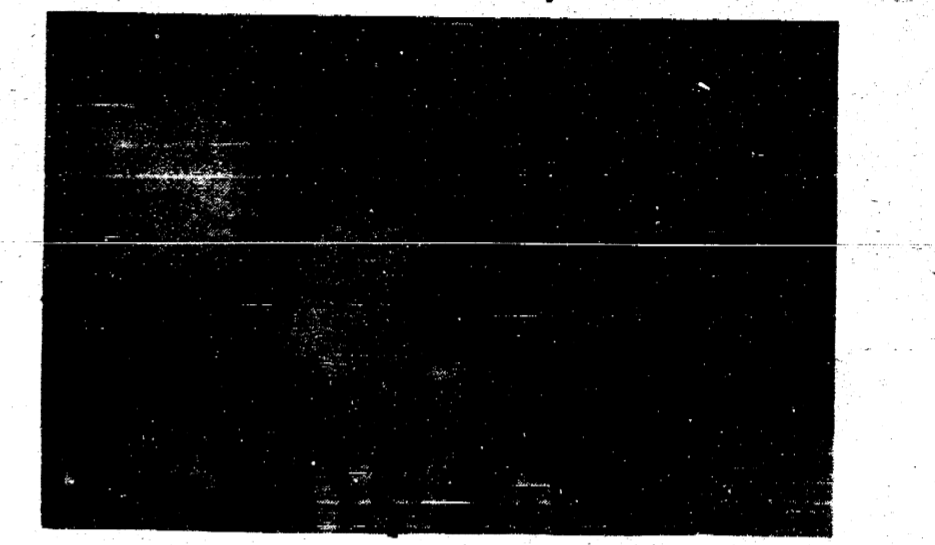

MAKE MINE MILK

Soaring coffee prices have caused a rumble among consumers in recent weeks. Their frustration is reflected in the slogan, "Boycott Coffee, Drink Tea."

Most farmers don't condone boycotts, but they have an idea for a substitute for those who just can't handle today's coffee prices. They believe that people will feel better, look better and function better if they start out their day with a glass of "nature's most perfect food"—milk.

People who have trouble getting motivated in the morning without that first cup of coffee, but are determined to kick the habit, may find that milk is an even better "eye opener." And a steaming cup of cocoa—made with milk—also makes a good nightcap.

The per capita consumption of milk is not keeping pace with the population growth in this country. One of the alarming trends is that our young people are not drinking as much milk as they once did. More than 51 percent of all milk is consumed by youngsters up to seventeen years of age.

Adults, however, need to set an example for their children. We can't expect them to consume the milk their bodies need if we select other, less nutritious beverages ourselves.

"Make Mine Milk" is a slogan being used right now by the dairy industry. It has a nice ring to it. There are even

buttons for dairy industry people to wear as they go out to eat.

It's a timely campaign we all would do well in joining.

The next time you eat out, and the waitress asks you "what'll you have?"—tell her loud and clear, "Make Mine Milk!"

### Ask COPE

Question: My child is 11 months old and just now sitting up. He also seems to be having trouble grasping and holding various objects. Do you feel there is need of concern for his seemingly slowness?

Answer: Each child is born with his own yardstick of growth. Parents with several children soon discover that each child may walk, talk, and run, for example, at different times. Such differences are normal and to be expected.

However, there are certain signs and symptoms—differences in development—about which a physician should be told. When your child is examined, the experienced eye of the physician will be alert also to differences which may not be quite so obvious.

The value of seeking help is not limited to relieving a parent's anxiety and fear. Early detection and diagnosis of cerebral palsy and other physical disabilities—make it possible to provide treatment and training that can reduce the extent of disability and prevent severe deformity.

1. Abnormally slow development of a child's muscular control and coordination may be the first sign of trouble. Help should be sought when a child fails to turn himself over by 5 months of age, a child cannot sit up without support by 10 months of age, a child cannot walk without help by 18 months of age.

2. A physician will pay close attention to a parent's complaint that, despite all efforts, a baby is extremely irritable or cranky, is difficult to feed, has difficulty in sucking.

3. A baby who is listless and disinterested in people and objects around him may arouse concern, as well as an infant who seems to have difficulty in waving an arm or leg.

4. A child may need to be examined, also who: moves very awkwardly or hesitantly, can't rise by himself after falling.

Chocolate brownies are an American invention and loved from coast to coast. This recipe makes a rich, "fudgy" treat, fragrant with cinnamon to enhance the chocolate flavor. As a bonus, it's very easily made.

#### CINNAMON BROWNIES

- 3/4 cup butter or margarine
- 4 squares (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon grated orange peel
- 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

In a medium saucepan melt butter and chocolate over very low heat. Remove from heat; stir in sugar and eggs; set aside. In a medium bowl combine flour, cinnamon, baking powder, salt and orange peel. Stir into chocolate mixture just until smooth and well blended. Stir in nuts. Spread in a greased 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) until mixture starts to come away from sides of pan, about 30 minutes. Cool slightly on a wire rack. Cut into squares; remove from pan and cool completely. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar, if desired. Yield: About 30 brownies.

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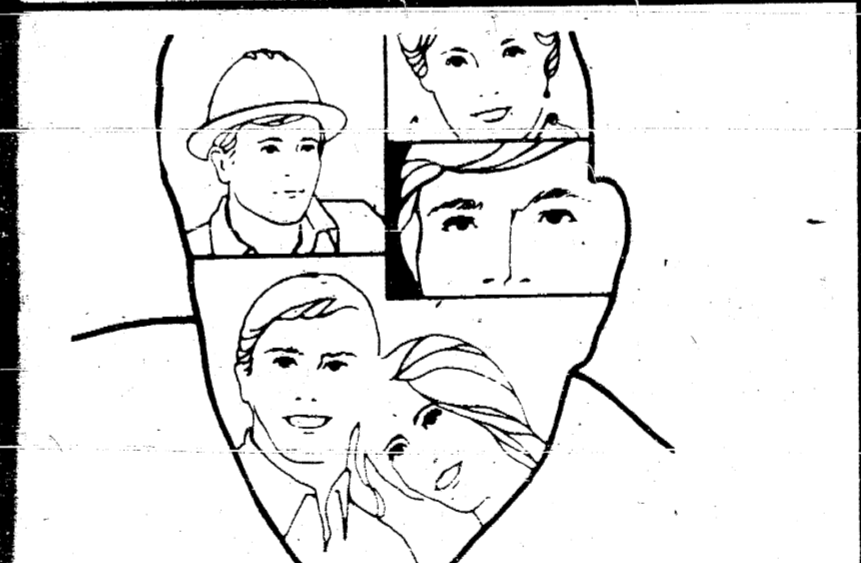

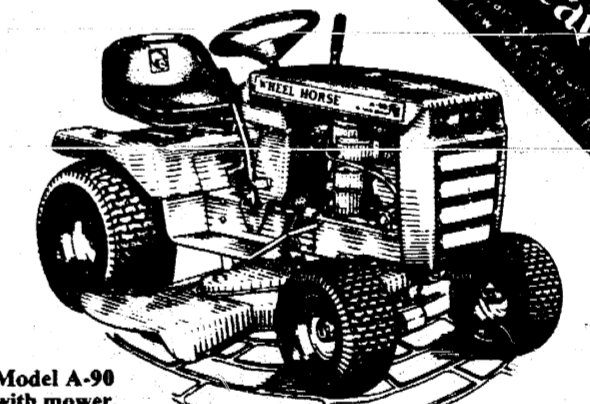

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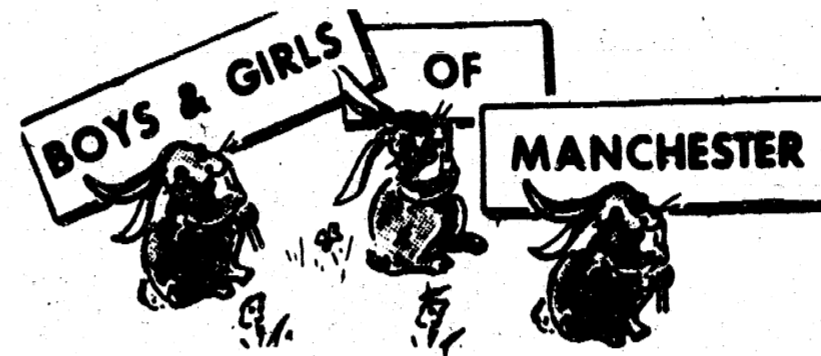

March of Dimes Walkathon

Since this will be Manchester's first Walk-a-thon, many of you may not know what one is, or how it works. This article will do its best to explain a walk-a-thon.

The main ingredient, of course, is the walkers who have sponsors. Each walker pre-registers and is sent a sponsor sheet. The walker takes this sheet to friends and relatives, asking them to pledge an amount of money for each mile the walker completes in the walk route. The amount may be as much or little as the pledger feels he or she can give. On the day of the walk, the walker has a walk card that he or she gets validated at each checkpoint, to show how many miles are completed. After the walk, the walker returns to the pledger and collects the amount of money totaled, and turns it in to the March of Dimes people in charge of the walk.

A 15 mile route has been planned by the Manchester Police Department. It starts and finishes at the high school, April 23, 10 a.m., and goes northeast of, through, and south of our town. Along the route are 5 check points, where a walker can rest, use bathroom facilities, get a snack, and if need be, have the assistance of a nurse or first aid person. All during the walk, there will be well marked cars driving the route, to pick up any walker whose feet just plain give out, or should need assistance of any kind. The walkers will be cautioned before the walk, NOT to get into any car that does not have official March of Dimes identification on it, and to be SURE to walk in groups. The route will be clearly marked with March of Dimes Foot Markers, and maps of the route will be available the day of the walk, with the check points clearly marked.

Each walker completing the walk will receive a patch for his or her jacket. There will be prizes for individuals, and organizations, and give-away prizes, too. Lots of fun, lots of prizes, and lots of peace and quiet the Sunday after the walk. Mom and Dad, Encourage the kids to get out and walk. Better yet, join them for family fun and exercise. March Madness Finale Saturday

March Madness is a name used for Michigan High School Basketball's new season—meaning in March all state squads begin their trek to see who is the best in each of the 4 classes.

Saturday at Crisler Arena, 8 teams entered the arena and 4 left victorious. The remarkable thing that could take place Saturday is the Detroit Catholic League could depart with a victory in each class. A year ago 2 squads from the Detroit Catholic League won but this year's "4" would be an unprecedented first.

In Class A we have Birmingham Brother Rice (21-3 ranked 8th in state) squaring off against Lansing Everett (26-1 ranked #1)-In Class B we have Dearborn Divine Child (25-1 ranked #2) battling Granville (26-0 only undefeated team left in the state ranked #6)-in Class C we have Detroit Redford St. Mary (22-4 ranked #6 who destroyed the defending champs in semi's by 29 points), they will face Saginaw Sta. Peter & Paul (23-4 ranked #8) and in Class D we have Detroit East Catholic (23-1 ranked #1 only loss to a class A non-league team) meeting Maple City Glen Lake (25-2 ranked #9).

Even now the odds are long but Lansing Everett, Granville, Saginaw Sta. Peter & Paul and Maple City Glen Lake will each have to perform in top gear to defeat the powerful "4" Parochial entries from the southeast corner of the state.

As fate would have it the Detroit squads departed with only 2 of the 4 championships. Divine Child (Class B) started the day off with a hard fought 4 point victory over Granville, 49-45. Granville seemed to set the tempo as they led 27-26 with seconds left till halftime, and the half closed with Granville up by 3. Divine Child came back by out-scoring them 16-10 to enter the final eight minutes ahead 42-39. Divine Child began stalling with 6 minutes left and a 3 point lead and they held Granville off to be the state's Class B Champions.

The afternoon game pitted Lansing Everett against Brother Rice for the Class A title. You could say this one was one of the best games I've seen as the Brother Rice Warriors took a 2 point lead after 1 period. Everett crawled within 1 at intermission 25-24. The Warriors again out-scored Lansing in the third period to hold a 3 point advantage with 1 period left. It looked bad for Lansing as Brother Rice lead 39-34 with under 1:30 left. The warriors went into a four corner stall and as the clock ticked

45 seconds--I said bye-bye Lansing. Lansing made 2 excellent steals and at the 20 second mark it stood tied 47-47. Lansing's all-stater Earvin "Magic" Johnson dribbled down court and put a 20 footer off glass--only problem was, it didn't fall in--Lansing grabbed the rebound and put it home to go delirious with a 2 point lead and 3 ticks remaining. Brother Rice's all-stater Kevin Smith wouldn't die as he sent the pigskin aloft from mid-court at the buzzer. It hit nothing but backboard and net to send the game into overtime. The miracles ended right here for Brother Rice as Lansing zoomed out to a 10 point lead and finished up 6 to win, 62-56. The opposing all-staters put on some shooting show as Smith popped for 25 and Johnson burned the nets for 34.

In the Class D contest the Maple City-Glen Lake Lakers pulled the upset over the East Catholic Chargers. The Lakers showed they could shoot as they took the 42-35 lead to the locker room at half. The Chargers came charging back in the third to lead 56-53 and I felt it was over for the Lakers as East

Catholic were up 3 at 1:13. After missing 3 freebies the Laker's all-stater, Geoff Kotila, hit 1 from the charity stripe at 38 seconds and banked in a 2-pointer at 19 seconds and knotted the score at 68 all. The Chargers all-stater took the last second shot but it didn't hit and on the rebound an East Catholic fouled Kotila. This left 1 second and Kotila shooting 1 & 1--Geoff calmly swished both to give his squad the championship.

The Class C was the laugher as Redford St. Mary's sailed to an easy win over Saginaw Sta. Peter & Paul 61-47.

I saw all 4 high school contests plus I set a second TV beside the first to watch the N.C.A.A. semi's. Monday, Marquette downed North Carolina for the college championship.
