Saturday at Crisler Arena, 8 teams entered the arena and 4 left victorious. The remarkable thing that could take place Saturday is the Detroit Catholic League could depart with a victory in each class. A year ago 2 squads from the Detroit-Catholic League won but this years "4" would be an unprecedented first.
