To The Walk-A-Thon Sponsors

There has been some question about a number of walkers, who were given credit for more miles than they walked. You are certainly entitled to an explanation of what happened.

When I returned to the high school after working the Athletic field checkpoint, I was informed that the woman from Ann Arbor, who was advising us, had been giving the early returnees credit for many more miles than they had walked. Discussing it among ourselves, (Carol Williams, myself, and those who were working at the registration tables), it was very apparent that NONE of us felt this was a fair and proper practice. Therefore, Carol and myself discussed the problem with the advisor, and it was finally decided that, unless the walker actually walked the biggest share of the distance to the next checkpoint, he or she would not get credit for that checkpoint. The ones who had been given extra credit, were changed on our walk records. Unfortunately, the walkers had already left with their walk cards, and we were not able to change the cards. The total amount in last week's paper was figured on the revised mile count. We perhaps, were remiss in not trying to contact the people to correct their cards; but our feelings were correct, as born out by these walkers telling their sponsors that they did not walk that far. For this, we are very proud of these walkers.

These were our feelings on the problem. (1) It was definitely not fair to those who were still out there, struggling on, in the wet and cold. (2) The walkers did not expect credit for miles they did not walk. (3) It was not only important to earn money for the March of Dimes, but also important for the young people to learn a little about integrity and honesty, and for them to honestly earn the great feeling of doing something for someone, in spite of unpleasant conditions. A true feeling of accomplishment was their right, as they came to do a job, and voted to do the whole job. These people set out to do a difficult job to benefit others, and their accomplishment was tremendous. It would be unthinkable for us to dim this

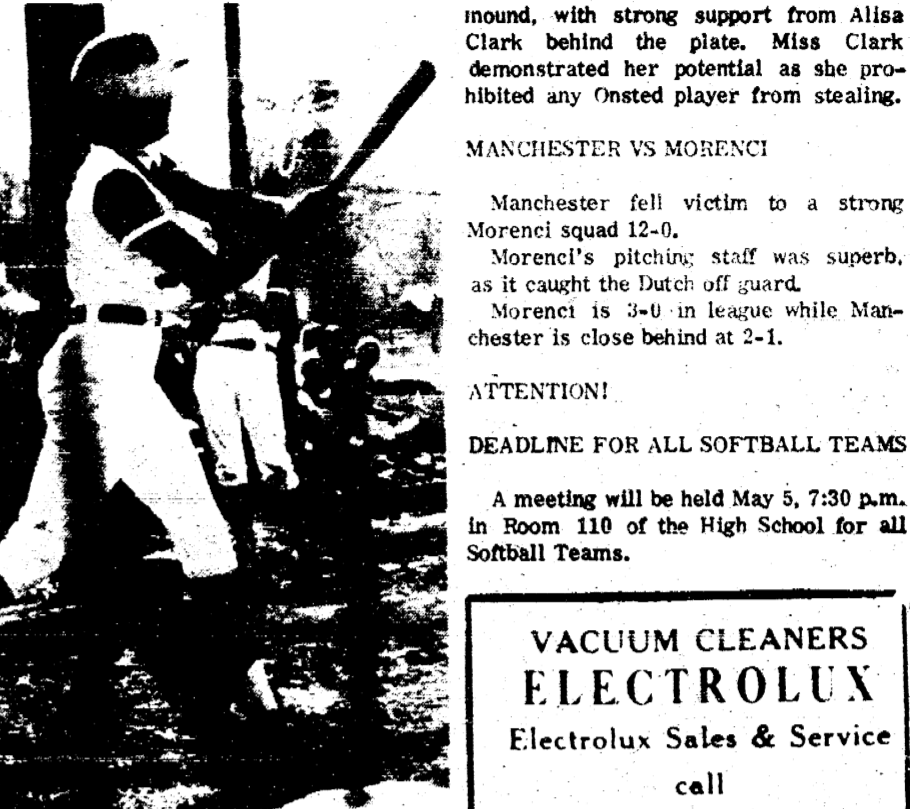

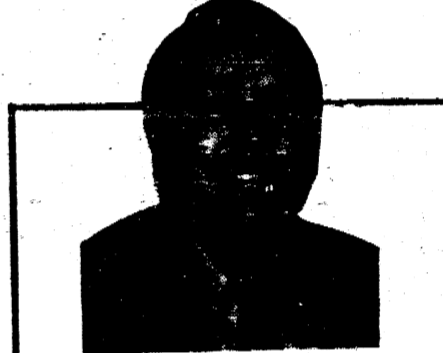

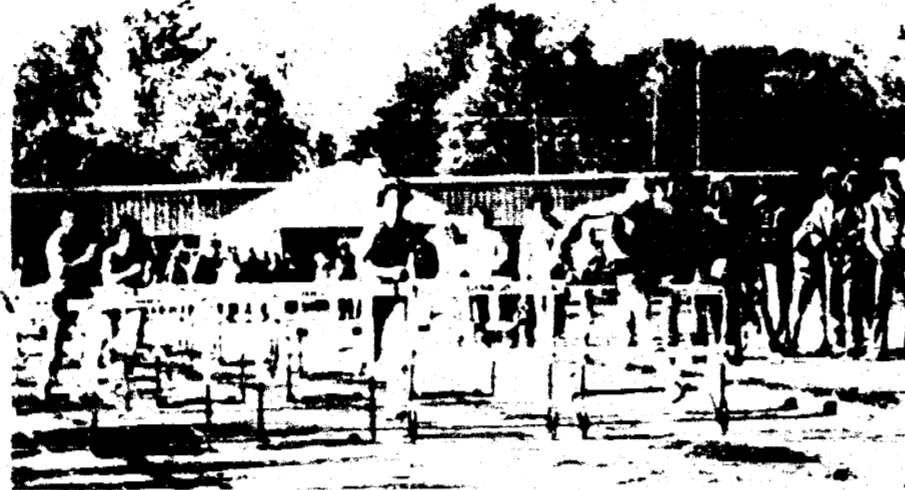

STUDENTS PRACTICE CONSERVATION



last week, the sixth grade of Manchester Middle School attempted to stop erosion problem at Klager Elementary at the High School. Under the direction of Roger Boyce, Science Teacher, the students, who had just completed a unit on conservation, began their project by picking up the eroded ground. They then moved rocks, filled in gullies, and seeded the area before they fertilized and watered it with grass seed. The newly seeded area was then covered with straw mulch to prevent it from being washed

away. To raise money for supplies, the sixth graders collected aluminum cans which were delivered to a recycling plant for fifteen cents a pound. The total weight of the collected cans came to forty pounds. The students received six dollars with which they purchased fertilizer and grass seed from Frank's Nursery.

Armed with shovels, rakes, and hoses, the students hiked to their destinations, picking up litter along the way. The sixth graders not only practiced three types of conservation measures, but they also enjoyed getting out of their classrooms and into the sunshine and fresh air.

All of the students have expressed a keen interest in the project and will be anxiously watching over the next few months to see if their hard work will be rewarded.

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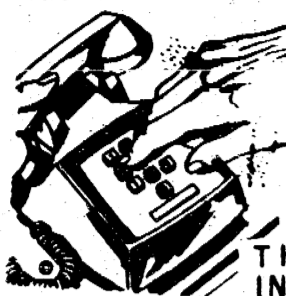

As reported to you earlier in this column, The University of Michigan was to have done an accreditation evaluation and reported back to my office and the Board of Education. I am giving you the content of the report verbatim so that you can become familiar with the facets of concerns, etc. While the date of the report is given as 23 March 1977, you should know that the report was postmarked in Ann Arbor on April 28, 1977, thus, we have just received it in our office. The report is as follows:

Report of Accreditation Evaluation
Manchester High School 23 March 1977
School Date of Report

24 February 1977 Phillip F. Hanson
Date of Visit Consultant

This report contains the observations of the university consultant who was responsible for the accreditation visit to your school. It consists of commendations, suggestions for your consideration, and violations of accreditation standards.

Manchester cut back programs for students; thus, Manchester fails to meet University of Michigan Accreditation Standards. The following lists the violations:

1. Manchester offers three and a half units of language arts; five units are required.
2. Manchester offers one half unit of physical education; two units are required.
3. Manchester offers no health at all; one half unit is required.
4. Manchester offers no art at all; one unit is required.
5. Manchester offers two units of fine

arts; three units are required. In addition, Manchester offers no counseling program, with a counselor and no counseling office. The assistant principal during the fall semester was assigned some counseling duties, but he is now acting principal since the principal was promoted to the central office staff.

A pleasant visit to the school revealed a friendly staff and student body, well-managed classes and productive. The reduced schedule curtails library/media center usage, although the media center is a very attractive room.

Manchester students continue sharing some vocational programs with nearby high schools, and some other sharing occurs in special programs.

Manchester High School has been accredited by the University of Michigan since 1935. We become discouraged seeing the school not meeting many standards. The University of Michigan will assist the school in any way possible.

We hope this report will be of assistance to you, the staff, and the Board of Education. If you have any questions, please contact us.
