LINDA SIMMONS RECEIVES GIRL SCOUT AWARD

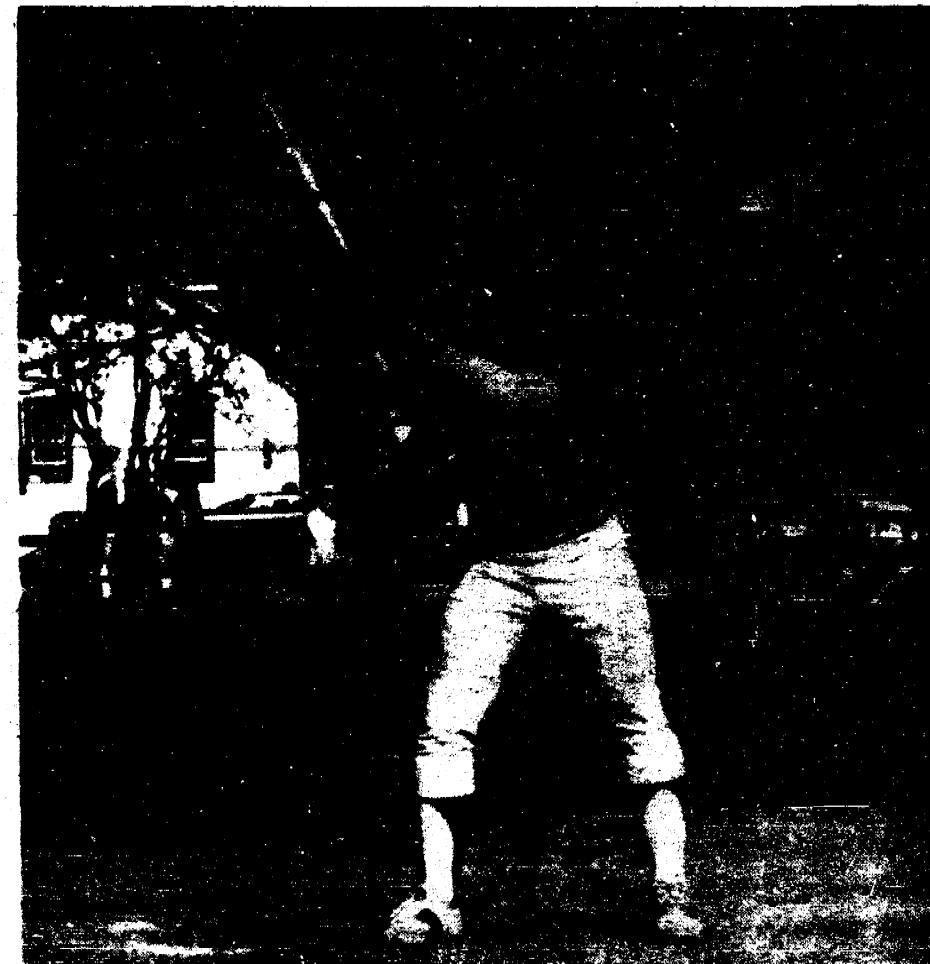
At the annual meeting of the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council on April 21st in Ypsilanti, Linda Simmons received an award for "her participation and individual responsibility in Council activities." Linda, a Junior at Manchester High School and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Amedeo Simmons of Hibbard Street, has been active in scouting for seven years. Most recently, she has been a Girl Delegate to the Council, a Brownie helper, a Volunteer Personnel Committee member, a Girl Advisory Board member, and Chairperson for the Spring Fling. In addition to her Girl Scout activities, Linda is a member of her church Youth Group, the High School Yearbook staff, the drama group, is statistician for the varsity basketball team, and member of a newly formed group of student aides to senior citizens. Linda feels that Girl Scouting "is a good way to learn, for everybody involved. You can have fun and new experiences in Scouting that wouldn't be possible otherwise."

Others from Manchester attending the 112 delegate Council meeting were Mrs. Dianne Schwab, Mrs. Karen Paul, Mrs. Geneva Walkow, and Senior Scouts Carolyn Schwab and Barbara Paul. The delegates represented 2700 adults who each year work with over 17,000 girls in Washtenaw, Livingston, Western Wayne and Northern Monroe counties. During the day-long meeting, delegates adopted by-law changes, elected new officers, and presented additional awards to outstanding volunteers. In late day action they asked that the local Board withdraw its congratulations to the National Board for endorsing ERA. The delegates felt that the local Board had spoken for them without prior consultation, and felt that endorsing ERA was, perhaps, an action that conflicted with the National Girl Scout policy limiting legislative activity. Support for the local board's action had centered on the Council's long standing commitment to affirmative action in hiring and equal opportunities for women.

April 18, 1977
Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:25 p.m. Present were Daniels, Denhoff, Duncan, Fitzgerald, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Padley. Minutes from the April 4, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved with corrections in a motion by Fitzgerald, supported by Denhoff. All years, carried.

Ann Rudder presented the completed Chi-Bro Park application for signature and explained the procedures taken. She could give no definite deadline by which we will be notified by the State, but suggested checking periodically on the application.

Little presented appointments to the Village Planning Commission. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Scully to approve the following appointments with the understanding that any member appointed to the Planning Commission has the freedom to resign, at which time Council will appoint a new member. Chapins assured the Board that there would be adequate parking on-site or provided elsewhere off-street. There will be no burning on premises; the site will be served by a single trash container. The units are not designed for families with children, according to Chapin. 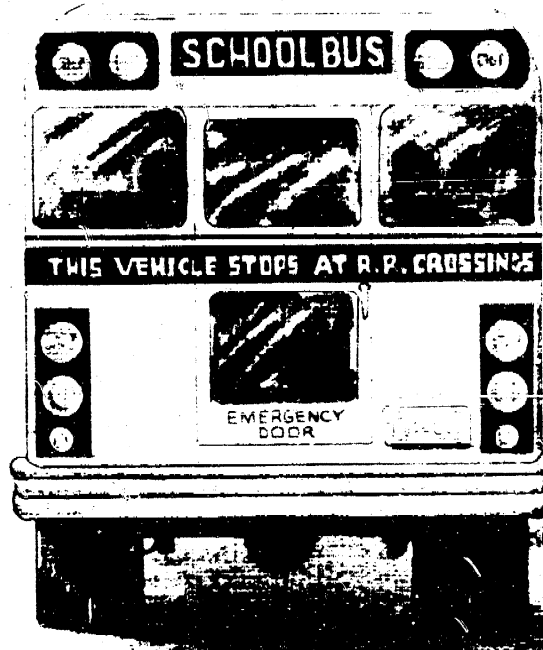

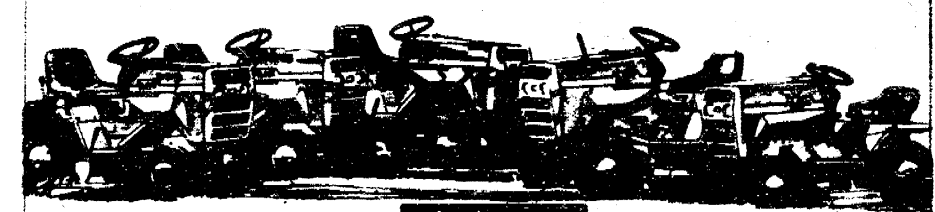

MANCHESTER VILLAGE PLANNING COMMISSION

March 30, 1977

In lieu of the regular April meeting, the Manchester Village Planning Commission met at the Village Hall, with members present: Broucek, Leeson, Whittington, Daniels, Krauss, Tracy, and Chapin.

The meeting was called to order at 7:40 p.m. by Ch. Broucek.

Minutes of the March regular meeting were read, and on the motion by Chapin, seconded by Krauss, were unanimously approved.

Mr. Tom Marshall, of Tom Marshall Ford Co., presented a proposal to construct a car-wash facility on his property in the corner of West Main and Elton Streets. Such a facility would necessitate rezoning part of the property. In answer to questions raised at the meeting of November 6, 1975, when the proposal was first presented, Mr. Marshall showed plans and site layout for the car-wash. It was moved by Whittington that we approve the project, and recommend to Council that the property (a small triangular plot adjacent to the garage parking lot and facing on Elton Street; too small to be used as a dwelling lot.) be rezoned from R-1B (Single-Family Residential) to C-2 (General Commercial). The motion was seconded by Krauss, and unanimously approved.

Mr. and Mrs. Mark Chapin were in attendance to request a variance from the zoning for their property in the south-west corner of Duncan and Clinton Streets

(zoned) R-1B: Single-Family Residential, in order to obtain permits to complete conversion as a four-family dwelling. Prior to the present ordinance, the home has been used as a two-family dwelling. It was moved by Daniels that we recommend to the Zoning Board of Appeals that the desired variance be granted. The motion was seconded by Krauss, and the voice vote was 6 "aye", Mrs. Chapin abstaining. Declared passed.

With regard to possible revisions to the existing Sign Ordinance, especially as it applies to signs in the Central Business District, it was moved by Tracy that we individually review its provisions in the light of pros and cons which have been raised, and have recommendations for final action at the May meeting. The motion was seconded by Daniels, and passed unanimously.

Exit Member Krauss at 9:35. "Sewer and Treatment Plant proposals" It was moved by Broucek that in the light of the fact that the proposed Federal sewer program involves an expenditure of in excess of \$6000, per household it is the recommendation of the Planning Commission that the Village Council do everything possible to avoid further involvement in the project. Motion was seconded by Tracy, and the voice vote yielded 4 "aye", 1 "nay", 1 abstention. Declared passed.

The next meeting is to be held the first Wednesday in May.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

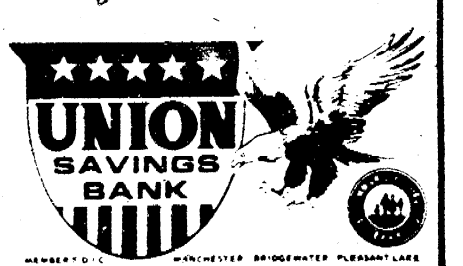

Dave Hoover... Despite a fine effort by the sprinters, the Clinton Redskins won the mile relay hang onto an 81-77 win at their home track. The meet was just as close as everyone thought it would be but the looseness came from the sprint points other than the usual distance points. The Dutch were 1,3,4 in the 100, 1,3 the 220 and 1,4 in the 440. Pete Tassie on the 100 in 10:3 and burned to the top in the 220 in 23.3. Dave Hoover cruised thirds in both these events, running personal best 10.55 in the 100 and 24.9 in the 220. Tom Fitzgerald added the fourth place as he turned in a personal best 10.85.
