OUTSTANDING STUDENT AT ALMA

While many people limit their enjoyment of spring flowers to a Sunday afternoon stroll through the woods, 35 Alma College students have a week in April and three more in May to learn about and appreciate the beauty of woodland flowers, trees, shrubs and ferns.

Among them is Lisa A. Cresswell of Ann Arbor. She and the other Alma students are enrolled in a biology course, Spring Flora of the Great Lakes Region, during Alma's four-week Spring Term which began April 25. Alma students take only one course during this term.

The course is taught entirely during field trips with four-hour excursions in Michigan each day during three weeks of the term. Then the group takes off on a one-week camping trip to study plant life in the Hocking County area of southeastern Ohio and the Natural Bridge and Koomer Ridge areas of eastern Kentucky.

In the course Alma students learn to identify about 350 trees, shrubs, ferns and spring flowers of the southern Great Lakes region. They also learn the characteristics of the major plant families and are introduced to major vegetational types of the Ohio River Valley and lower Michigan.

The brief Spring Term at Alma is ideal for this course, according to Dr. Ronald O. Kapp, instructor of the course who is the college's provost and vice president for educational affairs as well as a professor of biology. Studying the flowers, which develop rapidly, is more efficient in the concentrated time block.

he says. Extended field trips, such as the week-long venture to Ohio and Kentucky, would not be possible during longer terms when students have more than one course, he adds.

Lisa A. Cresswell is among the outstanding scholars on Alma College's Term Honors List for the second term of the 1976-77 academic year.

DUTCH UPPERCLASSMEN ANNIHILATE MORENCI

While the freshmen and sophomores were at the Pinckney Fresh-Soph Invitational, seventeen Juniors and seniors (along with sophomores Tom Tassie and Kurt Norgaard) made the long venture south to Morenci and whipped the Bulldogs 107-51. The Dutchmen victory was never in jeopardy as Manchester enjoyed a well-paced and relaxed victory rather than a close and tension filled meet that had become common the last couple of weeks.

Meanwhile, the underclassmen were having a tough time as Steve Eversole was the sole medalist for the Dutchmen. Eversole picked up two thirds, running the two mile in 10:34.0 and cruising the quarter mile in 54.1.

In Morenci, Pete Tassie picked up this usual 20 points, giving him 195 on the season, a school record. Tassie won the high jump at 5'4", the 120 high hurdles in a school record clocking of

14.7, the 330' low hurdles in 42.2, and the 220 in 24.0, once again. Dan Clark, who is undefeated in dual meets, won the shot put with a toss of 52' 6 3/4", and was second in the discus with a throw of 123' 3 1/2". It was the other way around for Greg Daniels, who was the runner-up in the shot put with a throw of 45' 1 1/2" and the discus winner at 128' 9 1/2". Daniels also accompanied Tom Tassie, Bob Padley, and Darrell Clark on the winning mile relay team, clocked in 3:56.1. Terry Brown sailed 11'6" to take the pole vault for the second dual meet in a row. Bob Smith led a 1, 2, 4 finish in the mile as he burned to a 4:57 on the relatively slow Bulldog cinders. Keith Moore was second in five minutes flat, and Brown crossed fourth in 5:26. In the two mile, Moore took the lead and never slowed down as he won by over thirty seconds in 10:25.0. Two Dutchmen broke the tape for the first time as seniors. Bob Padley and Dave

Hoover won the 880 yard run and 100 yard dash respectively. Padley was timed in 2:10 and he was also third in the 440 in 58.0. Hoover covered the 100 in 11.1 and was second behind teammate Pete Tassie with a 25.1 clocking in the 220. Hoover also led off the winning 880 relay team. Tom Fitzgerald, Lester Janish, and Dan Hassett made up the rest of this team that ran a 1:43.0.

At Saturday's Addisor Relays, the somewhat groggy Dutchmen produced only four placing relay teams, with three of those teams getting medals. The four mile relay of Keith Moore (4:43), Bob Smith (4:52), Steve Eversole (4:40) and Dan Heslip (4:40.5) won in 18:57.05. The shot put relay of Dan Clark (53'3 1/4"), Greg Daniels (44'4") and Lester Janish (36") also won, with a combined effort of 137' 7 3/4". The same trio got a fifth place ribbon with a combined discus distance of 332'1". The Dutchmen two mile relay of Smith (2:13.4), Bob Padley (2:08), Moore (2:09) and Eversole (2:01.2) took a third with an 8:31.6 clocking. Eversole's effort in an OPEN half mile rather than in a relay, would have set a school record. Next week the Dutchmen dual the Panthers in Addison, and then travel to Hudson on Saturday for the first of the three most important meets of all: the Regionals. Special Note-The Dutch track team congratulates our baseball team on being crowned the Napoleon Invitational Champions.

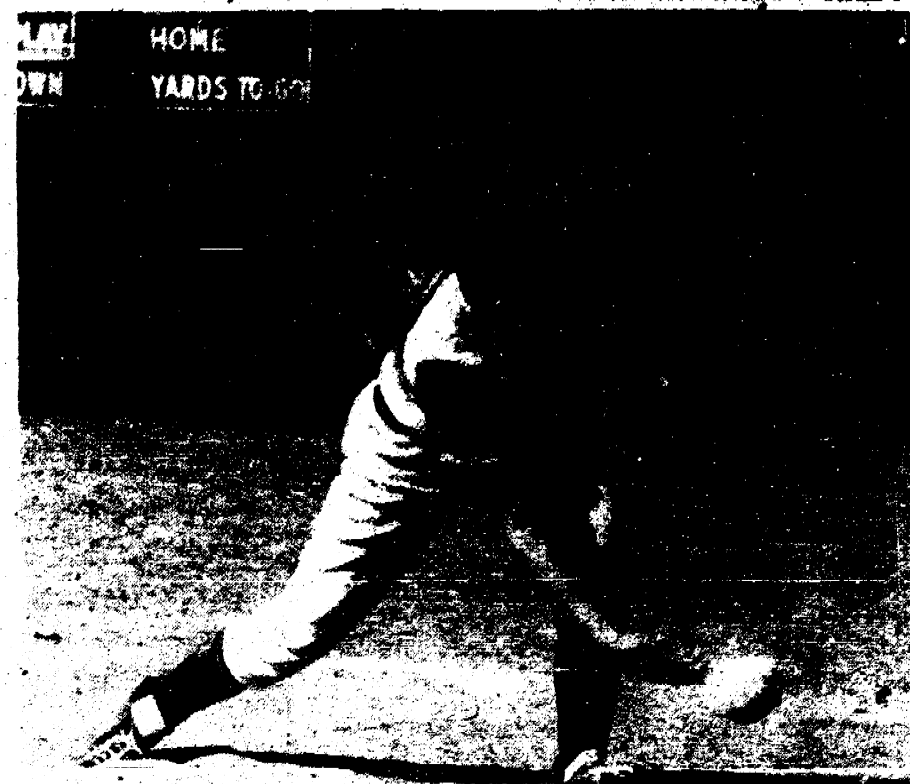

Varsity girls #1 pitcher: Kay DeClaire.

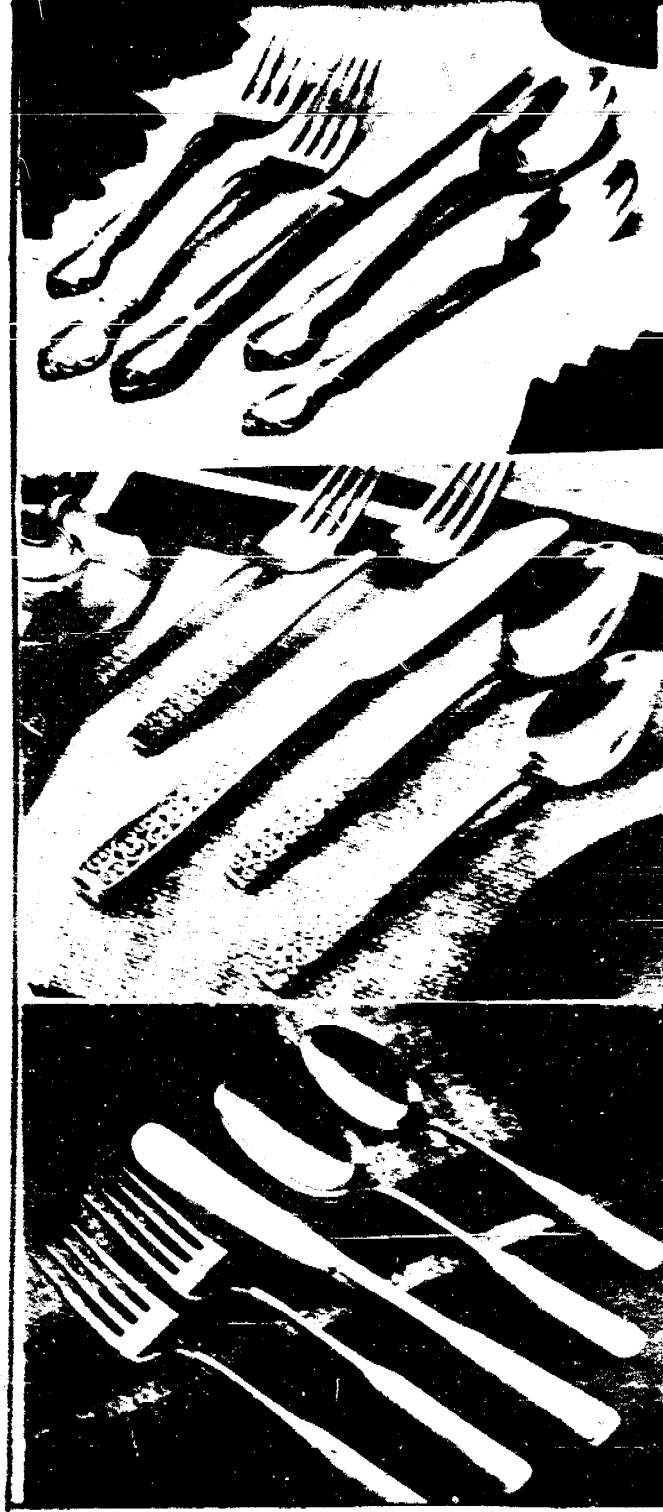

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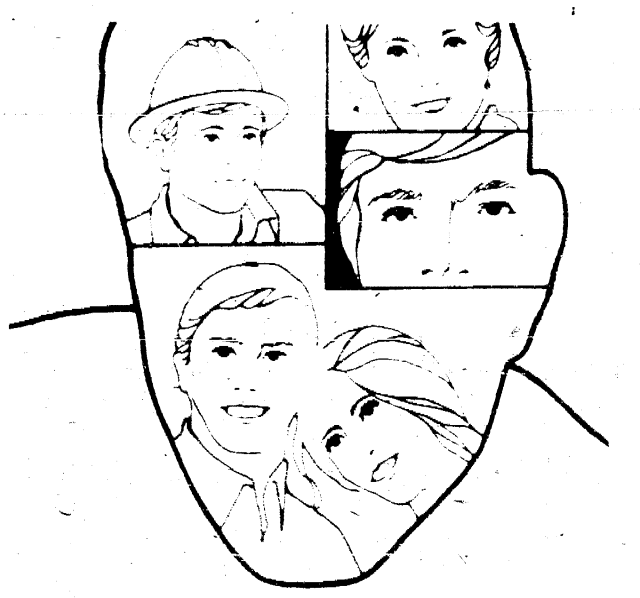
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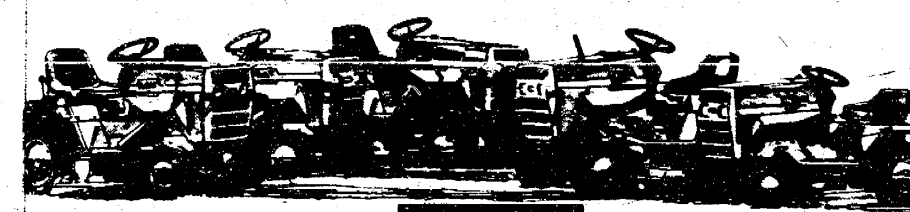
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Mother And Daughter Banquet

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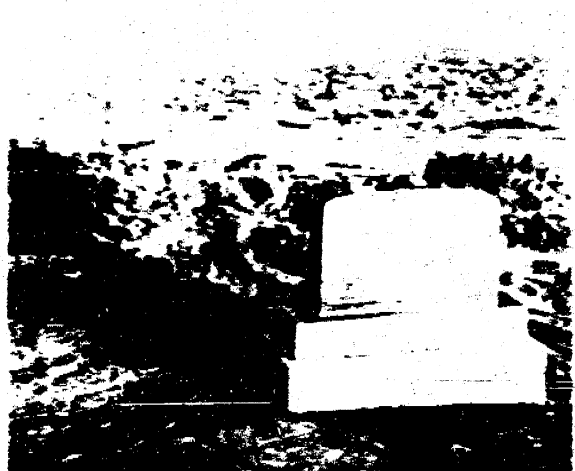


Michigan's State Tree

Dan Clark and Terry Rowe were single winners, Clark taking the shot put with a 52' 11 1/4" effort, and Rowe with a 19' 1 1/2" long jump.

On Saturday, the Dutchmen traveled to Hudson for the regional meet and came out in a somewhat disappointing fifth (they'd hoped to be in the top two). The Tigers proved to be bad hosts as they won the meet, while sending all five relay teams to the state meet on June 4 in Ithica. The Dutchmen will have representatives in for events as Dan Clark became the regional champ in the shot put, Clark tossed a 54'9". Pete Tassie was one of only two of the meet's double winners as he took both hurdles, the highs in 15.0 and the lows in 40.0. Dan Heslip will run the two mile at state as he was third Saturday, clocked in 10:21.8. Keith Moore picked up a fifth place medal in the two, Moore was timed

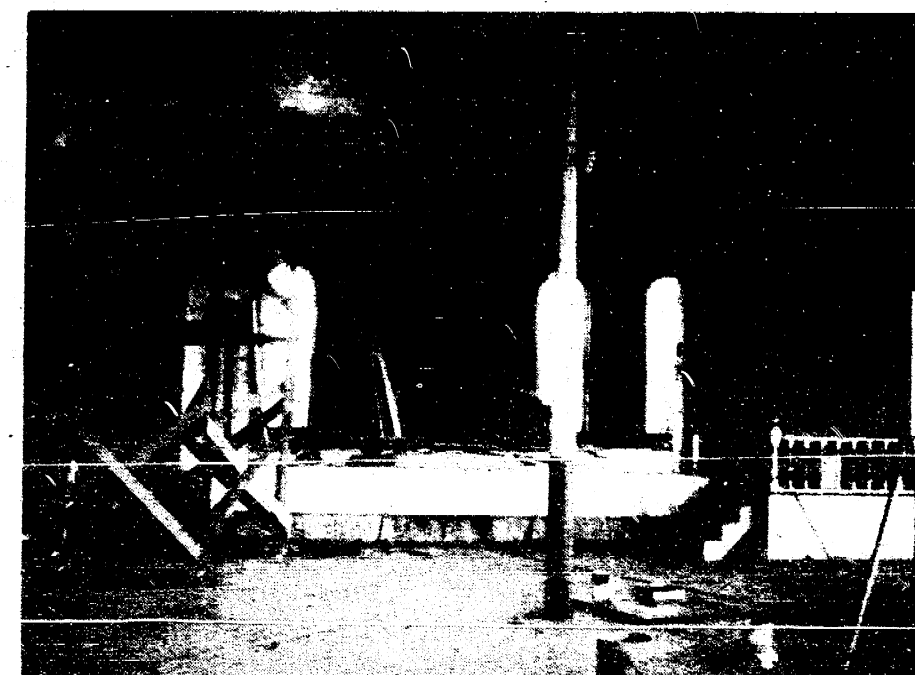
