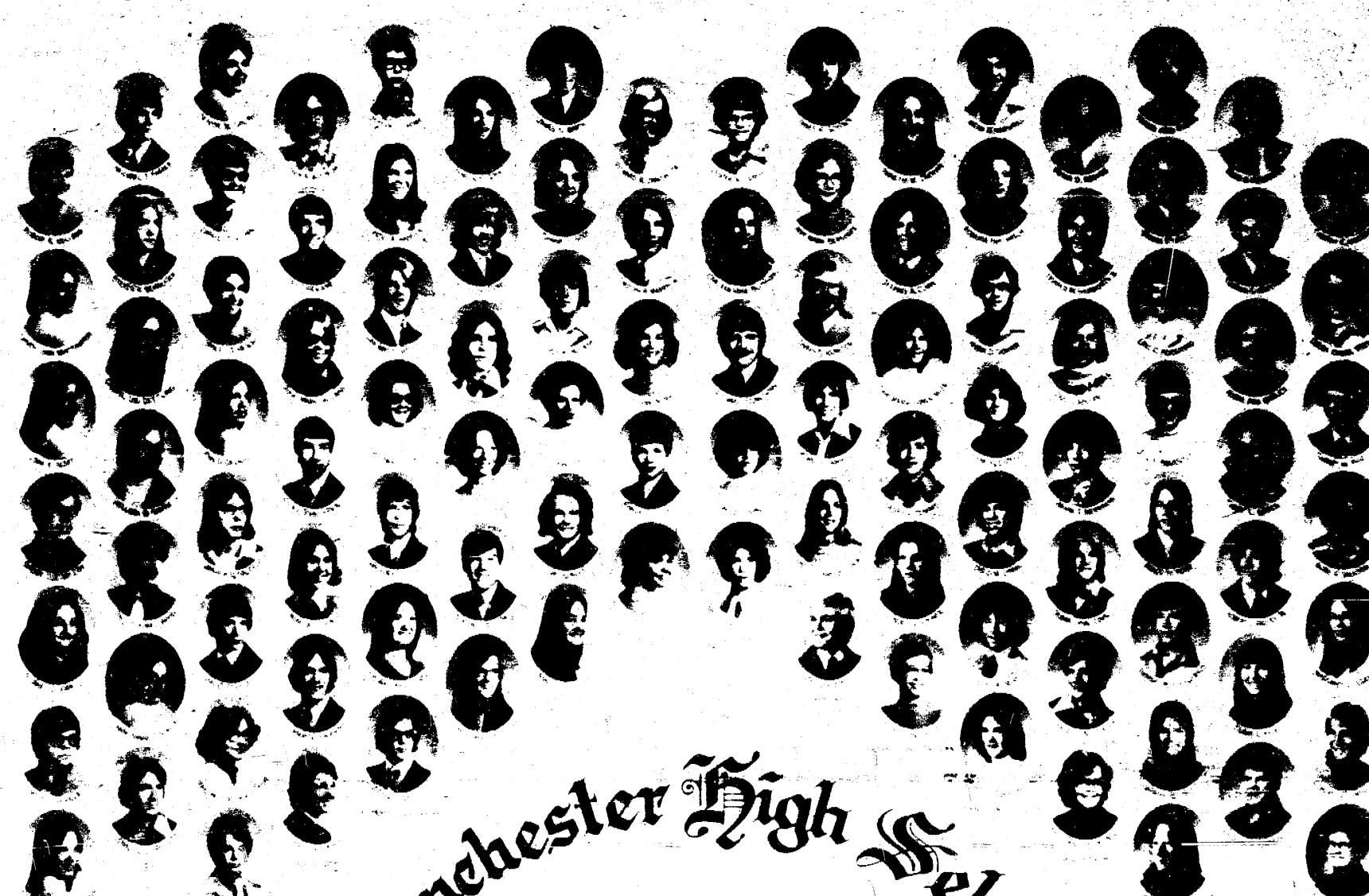

## VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE No. 99

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NUMBER 76, AS AMENDED ENTITLED: AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION OF ADDITIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER AND FOR THE COMBINED OPERATION OF THE WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM AND THE SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM OF THE VILLAGE AS A SINGLE SYSTEM; TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SELF-LIQUIDATING REVENUE BONDS TO PAY THE COST OF SAID IMPROVEMENTS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 94, PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN, 1933, AS AMENDED; PROVIDING FOR THE FIXING, COLLECTION, SEGREGATION AND DISPOSITION OF THE REVENUES OF SAID COMBINED WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEM AND PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS OUT OF THE REVENUES THEREOF; AND CREATING A STATUTORY LIEN ON SAID REVENUES.

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCES:

Section 1. Section 10, of Ordinance No. 76, as amended by Ordinance No. 90 is further amended by deleting therefrom and substituting the following therefor:

Section 10. The rates to be charged for water and sewer service furnished by the system shall be those presently in effect in the Village until June 30, 1977 as established by Ordinance No. 76 as amended by Ordinance No. 90 of the Village, and commencing July 1, 1977 shall be as follows:

**WATER CHARGES**  
A. Consumption charge for first 10,000 gallons or part thereof \$14.00 per quarter (3 months), and thereafter at the rate of \$0.20 per thousand gallon.  
Minimum charge \$14.00 per quarter.  
B. Premises without a meter shall be charged \$14.00 per quarter while connected to the system with the shut-off valve turned on.

### SEWER CHARGES

A. A quarterly sewage disposal charge of 100% of the water charges, for the same premises for the same period of time, shall be made against all connected premises.  
Minimum charge \$14.00 per quarter.  
B. Premises without a water meter or premises not connected to the water system shall be charged \$14.00 per quarter while connected to the sewage disposal system.

### PARTIAL QUARTERLY USE

When service is furnished for only a portion of the quarter, the foregoing water and sewage disposal charges will be prorated on a monthly basis. Service for 16 days within a month will be charged as a full month, service for less than 16 days will accumulate with the consumption in the following quarter.

### MULTIPLE USE CONNECTIONS

At least one water meter shall be installed in all connected premises where multiple family, multiple commercial, or combinations of family and commercial use exist. The foregoing charges apply without alteration. Separate water meters with lock-off valves may be installed for each family or commercial unit at the property owner's request. The foregoing charges are then applied to each meter installed on said premises for both water and sewage disposal.

**PREMISES OUTSIDE VILLAGE LIMITS**  
Water and/or sewage disposal service may only be provided to premises outside the village limits at double the foregoing charges.

**SERVICE TURN ON AND TURN OFF**  
A fee of \$8.00 is charged for turning on water service once it has been turned off, except when turn off is required for repair and maintenance of the water lines. There is no charge for making a final meter reading, final billings, and transfer of property owner's name when service is not actually turned off.

**VERIFICATION OF METER ACCURACY**  
Meters will be checked for accuracy upon request and if necessary, repaired, or replaced as required at no charge. A service fee, after the first 30 minutes, at current village labor rates, plus any sub-contract costs will be charged when the meter is found not to be defective.

**WATER SPRINKLER SYSTEMS**  
A quarterly fee of \$25.00 shall be charged for each fire protection sprinkler tap in.

**DAMAGE TO VILLAGE METERS**  
Meters which become damaged due to freezing, misuse, or negligence will be repaired at the property owner's expense.

**BILLING**  
Billing for water and sewer charges shall be made quarterly and bills shall be sent to consumers quarterly and shall become due and payable thirty (30) days after the date of such bill. For all bills not paid when due, a penalty of ten (10%) per cent of the amount of such bill shall be added.

**SPECIAL RATES**  
For such consumers which the Council may determine to be special cases and for large consumers of water who do not use the sanitary sewer system for all of their waste water, the Village Council may establish by resolution special rates.

**ENFORCEMENT**  
The charge for water or sewer services which are under the provisions of Section 21, Act 94, Public Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, made a lien on all premises served thereby, unless notice is given that a tenant is responsible, are hereby recognized to constitute such lien, and whenever any such charge against any piece of property shall be delinquent for six (6) months the Village official or officials in charge of the collection thereof shall certify annually, on April 1st of each year, to the tax-assessing officer of the Village, the fact of such delinquency, whereupon such charge shall be by him entered upon the next tax roll as a charge against such premises and shall be collected and the line thereof enforced in the same manner as general Village taxes

against such premises are collected, and the line thereof enforced: Provided, however, where written notice on a form furnished by the Village is given that a tenant is responsible for such charges as provided by said Section 21, no further service shall be rendered such premises until a cash deposit of not less than Thirty-Two (\$32.00) Dollars shall have been made as security for payment of such charges.  
In addition to other remedies provided, the Village shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water to any premises for the non-payment of water or sewer rates when due. If such charges are not paid within sixty (60) days after the due date thereof, then water service to such premises shall be discontinued. Water services so discontinued shall not be restored until all sums then due and owing shall be paid plus turn-charge of Eight (\$8.00) Dollars.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately on and after its legal publication.  
Made and passed by the Manchester Village Council at a regular meeting thereof on May 23, 1977.

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### School Board Minutes

April 18, 1977

The regular Board of Education Meeting was called to order at 8:05 P.M. by President Wm. Bunney in the gymnasium. Maxine Frey took roll call. All present with the exception of Mr. Vogel who had notified Mr. Green that he would be at the meeting as soon after 9:00 P.M. as possible.

President Bunney asked Helen Kensler to read the minutes of the March 14th meeting and the 2 special meetings.

Moved by Macomber, supported by Westfall to approve the March 14th minutes as read. All yeas. Motion carried.

The minutes of the Special Meeting of March 28th were read and corrected. Jim Walkow moved to approve the minutes as corrected. Supported by Susan Westfall, all yeas. Motion carried.

Moved by Macomber and supported by Feldkamp to approve the minutes of the Special Meeting of April 12, 1977 as read. All yeas. Motion carried.

Maxine Frey gave the Financial Report (copy in supplemental file).

President Bunney asked for Board approval of the April check register. Susan Westfall asked if the balance of the 1967 Building & Site Fund for Klager could be used for something to clear the \$28.23 balance.

Reno Feldkamp suggested replacing some pine trees at Klager that had died. It was agreed upon to do so.

Susan Westfall made a motion that the Financial Report include taxes receivable for the current year levy on the balance sheet. Supported by Helen Kensler. All yeas. Motion carried.

There were questions on check numbers 7726 and 7810. Helen Kensler moved to approve the April check register. Supported by Reno Feldkamp. All yeas. Motion carried.

President Bunney addressed 4 Senior

Boys, at this time to state their grievances to the Board regarding their being sent home from the Senior Trip.

Kevin Evans said they wanted their money back. This would amount to \$7.00 per day per student, which was meal allowances. Tom Krzyzaniak was not sent home from the trip but spoke on the behalf of the 4 boys that were.

President Bunney asked the boys if they were here for justice or a refund of their money only. They again stated their money.

Kevin Evans said they weren't the only one's who were drinking on the trip. Everyone, students and chaperones were drinking at Bush Gardens. One of the boys had a picture of other people drinking at Bush Gardens. He asked if the Board wanted to see it. Mr. Walkow said yes and it was passed around for all Board Members to view.

Mr. Green read a statement from Mr. Ed Daly from the Daly Travel Agency concerning the events which took place from the time the boys room was searched until they were put on a bus back to Michigan. Mr. Green also read a daily report from Mrs. Panches and Mrs. Heinrich detailing the entire classes behavior for the whole trip. (copies of all reports in the supplemental file.) Mr. Green also read the Travel Agency contract conditions.

Kevin Evans said in some girls rooms on the floor below them on the same night that their room had been searched, there was beer spilled all over and some was hid in the bathtub. He said other rooms had not been searched as thoroughly as theirs had.

Jim Kemeter said the rule regarding Boys and Girls in each others rooms was not enforced. The chaperones were standing in the halls and saw this and didn't say or do anything. Why weren't all rules enforced for everyone?

A lengthy discussion followed.

Susan Westfall asked the boys the following questions:

Were you drinking? They answered yes. Did you understand the rules about drinking? They answered yes. Did you hide beer in your room? They answered no. Some girls hid the beer and said they would be back. They never came back.

Supt. Green stated that according to the conditions of the contract with the Daly Travel Agency no money would be refunded under any circumstances.

It was stated that the Board of Education did not single these 4 boys out. If they would not have been drinking, they would not have been sent home.

President Bunney asked the Board to act on the request of the boys for the return of their money.

Susan Westfall moved that they deny their request on the basis that there was no money to refund. Supported by George Macomber.

Supt. Green asked if they were denying the return of the money because of policy or because there wasn't any money left? Susan Westfall said these were 2 separate issues.

The Board voted on the motion on the floor. All yeas. Motion carried.

There were comments from Mr. Savage regarding the educational value of the Senior Trip. And that the Board should seriously consider doing away with a Senior Trip.

Pat Settles agreed with Mr. Savage's

comments and suggested that the Board might look into the possibility of having a Freshman or Sophomore Trip.

Susan Westfall requested that this be put on the agenda in the near future.

President Bunney asked for a motion to pass a resolution to hold an annual election on June 13, 1977. Moved by Feldkamp supported by Macomber. All yeas. Motion Carried.

The Board of Education established 17.78 as the amount of mills it would ask for. The number of proposals or the length of time was not decided upon. The motion to establish millage was made by Susan Westfall, supported by Helen Kensler. All yeas, motion carried.

Supt. Green announced the names of 4 people who have filed nominating petitions for the 1 year term vacancy on the School Board. They are James D. Detling, Patricia Settles, Glenn N. Miller and Corlias Mick.

Supt. Green stated that there would be a workshop on Student Activities Policy in grades K-12. Mr. Korican is working on this and will draw into his work field trips that are applicable and educational.

Susan Westfall asked if this could be reviewed at the June Meeting. Mr. Korican said probably at the August meeting.

A brief discussion followed regarding the approval of the Sr. Trip for next year. Susan Westfall moved to approve

a Senior Trip for 1977-78. Supported by Lou Vogel. All yeas. Motion Carried.

Mr. Bart Bartels requested the use of school buses for the summer recreation program. A driver and the gas are provided for by the recreation program. Supt. Green recommended the Board give its approval to use the buses so Mr. Bartels can plan his program.

Moved by Walkow, supported by Macomber. All yeas. Motion Carried.

Supt. Green stated Mrs. Elvira Vogel was a candidate from our area running for re-election on the WSDO Board of Education and recommended the Board move to cast its vote in Mrs. Vogel's behalf. Moved by Susan Westfall, supported by Reno Feldkamp. All yeas, except Mr. Vogel who abstained. Motion carried.

President Bunney instructed the Secretary of the Board, Helen Kensler, to be the official voting delegate and to cast our vote for Mrs. Vogel.

Moved by Helen Kensler supported by George Macomber to send a copy of the resolution and endorsement of Mrs. Vogel to the other schools in Region 5. All yeas, except Mr. Vogel who abstained.

Supt. Green made a recommendation to rescind the motion to dismiss Melinda Crombez Trout due to a technicality in

the Master Contract, and to adopt a resolution to put her on tenure status. Moved by Helen Kensler, supported by Jim Walkow.

President Bunney asked if there was any discussion. Susan Westfall said she was voting no only as a protest vote. It was not the Board's intent to grant Mrs. Trout tenure and it was too bad about the technicality and she hoped the problem would be corrected. A roll call vote was taken, Macomber-no, Feldkamp-no, Kensler-yes, Vogel-yes, Walkow-yes, Westfall-no, Bunney-yes. Motion carried.

Supt. Green said there were 3 technicalities. The Board had been advised by its attorney that we would lose the grievance filed by the Manchester Education Association.

The 3 technicalities were 1) only 1 written evaluation was done by the building principal during the 1st semester instead of 2. 2, she has been moved to 3 buildings in 3 years. (this would weaken arbitration) 3) she was not given written ways to overcome teaching deficiencies.

Supt. Green recommended the Board adopt a resolution to place Mrs. Trout on tenure. Moved by Helen Kensler supported by Jim Walkow. A roll call vote was taken as follows: Macomber-no, Feldkamp-no, Kensler-yes, Walkow-yes, Westfall-no, Vogel-yes, Bunney-yes. Mo-

tion ca. 3d.

Supt. Green discussed the recent vandalism at the high school and how much it would cost to replace 24 broken windows (approximately \$3.50 per sq. ft.) He said something would have to be done on our part as the police are doing as much as they can. They have been most co-operative in assisting us but cannot be here all of the time.

Supt. Green commented on Bus #1. He said the parents of the children that ride this bus are very concerned and most co-operative. And, by working with parents, problems can be solved.

Supt. Green read a communication from Onsted Comm. Schools inviting the Secretary of the Board of Education to a meeting on May 11, 1977, regarding the proliferation of athletics. Helen Kensler, Susan Westfall and Bill Bunney as representatives of the Board of Education and Jim Fielder as Athletic Director will attend. Mr. Brian Schick addressed the Board asking if he could also attend. Mr. Green said he would discuss it with him.

Mr. Macomber had several questions:

1. Do we have the bus washer out? Mr. Green said it had been stolen.
2. Who does teacher evaluation sheets? Mr. Green said building principals do them, they are due on May 27, 1977. But they can be done at anytime if a specific teacher is in question. Tenured teachers have 1 evaluation done and non-tenured teachers have 2 done each semester.
3. Why aren't covers on typewriters when they are not in use? Mr. Korican said

he has discussed this with the typing teacher and they will be used from now on.

Mr. Macomber brought up the subject of not furnishing vehicles for employees. He said he had brought this up in December and it was defeated. There was a lengthy discussion on the pros and cons of Mr. Kemeter driving the yellow pick-up home.

Mr. Macomber made a motion that no employee be furnished with a vehicle or gas to get to and from work. Supported by Jim Walkow. A roll call vote was taken, Macomber-yes, Feldkamp-yes, Kensler-no, Vogel-no, Walkow-yes, Westfall-no, Bunney-no, Motion defeated.

Mr. Macomber made a motion that no one be put on the Manchester Community Schools payroll as that no employee's salary be increased or decreased without Board approval. Supported by Helen Kensler.


Supt. Green asked where this had occurred if it had ever occurred. Mr. Macomber brought up the point of the custodians being taken off an hourly wage and put on salary with increases and benefits. 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
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

**177 GRADUATE AT ADRIAN COLLEGE**

James P. Baker; son of the late James H. Baker and Mrs. Phyllis C. Baker, 320 Territorial St.; biology major; B.S. magna cum laude was among the one hundred and seventy-seven students including those who completed requirements in August and December, 1976 and May, 1977, who were awarded degrees May 22 as Adrian College held its 117th Commencement.

The Rev. Dr. Robert D. Swanson, president of Alma College delivered the commencement address.

One hundred and fifty-two students completed requirements for degrees during the spring semester at Adrian. Another 16 finished in December and nine completed their work last August. Only one commencement is held during the year and all 177 students were invited to take part.

Most of the students were awarded Bachelor of Arts degrees, but 21 elected the course of study leading to the Bachelor of Science diploma, five were awarded the Bachelor of Music Education and four students received the Master of Science in Education degree.

Fourteen students graduated summa cum laude, "with highest honors," signifying they maintained at least a 3.8 grade point average on a 4.0 (A) basis. Ten others had magna cum laude affixed to their diplomas (representing at least a 3.65 average), and nine graduated cum laude (3.5).

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**Tassie Honored By Area Coaches As Dutch Competitor in Track Classic**

While most track and field athletes are hanging up their spikes for the season, Pete Tassie, the Greatest Runner in Manchester Track History (in the unbiased opinion of this reporter), and a few equally elite teammates were competing in the 4th Annual Downtown Kiwanis Club of Ann Arbor's Meet of Champions. The meet, organized in 1974, by our own track coach, Larry Steeb, puts the best athletes in Washtenaw Co. in head to head competition. By virtue of Tassie's victories in the high and low hurdles, he was named by the area track coaches as the Outstanding Track Performer of the Meet. Tassie's performance in the high hurdles, 15.0 was not particularly fast by his standards (though it tied the meet record), as Pete likes to run consistently in the fourteens, but it came after an almost unbelievable 38.3 in the 330 lows on the hot, exhausting day. This, in itself, shows the amplitude of Tassie's talent, as he beat Ann Arbor Huron's Andre Williams, who won the 100 (9.9), and 220 (22.2, both meet records) and Pioneer's Steve Postema, who won the mile (4:33.7) and two mile (9:56.5), for the honor.

The Dutchmen also proved to have the best shotput duo in the area as Dan Clark bested the field with his toss of 54'7", adding this title to the league and regional championships he captured last week. Greg Daniels just missed his personal best and took a fourth place medal with a toss of 47' 10". Daniels ended his career with a bang as he twice threw 131' in the discus to again capture fourth with a best of 131'9". Super-Soph Steve Eversole burned to a 2:01.6 to place fourth in a strong field headed by Carter Bishop of Saline who won in 2:00.5. Eversole, who has been hampered with a bad leg muscle, could only manage a 57.7 in the 440 but in a five man field it was enough to earn him another medal.

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MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL AN 8-OUNCE GLASS OF WATER

A couple went to a restaurant for lunch, ordered and waited for their glass of water. Then they noticed a placard which said, "We are serving water upon your request only...because we care about your future." The placard went on to explain the new policy was started because "Water conservation starts at home... yours and ours."

At first it was difficult for the couple to accept; it was traditional for the waitress to bring a glass of water. But, as they thought about it, each began to realize that the 200 years of abundance just might be drawing to an end. It was an uncomfortable moment because it represented a threat, a warning of things to come if something isn't done now about conserving the natural resources of our land.

On the back of the placard it was noted that every 8-ounce glass of water served requires another 16 ounces to rinse and wash it, making a total of three glasses full of water for every glass served. In addition, every 100 racks of glasses through the restaurant's dishwasher equals 13 kilowatt hours of electricity. It was also pointed out that 13.2 therms of gas or 326 kilowatt hours of electricity is required to raise every 1,000 gallons of water 100 degrees in temperature, to the level necessary for sanitation.

Frightening? You bet! Multiply these figures millions of times and you quickly realize it doesn't take a mathematical wizard to see how much energy is consumed each day in our nation just for a glass of water for each diner. Then consider the expenditures of energy and other resources and the frightening future looms on the horizon.

Unless, of course, the resources are replaced and protected. But, this isn't happening very quickly. Government and industry are moving to protect our fuels, water, environment and all the rest, but it takes everyone's participation.

What do you propose to do to assure that the glass of water you request is available?

Out in the Pacific Northwest, bumper stickers are making the rounds with a message that's appropriate for water conservation--and June Dairy Month--or any time of the year. It reads: "Make a Farmer Happy.....Save Water.....DRINK MILK."

That's not the full answer, of course, but it does make people stop and think that our natural resources can't be taken for granted any longer.

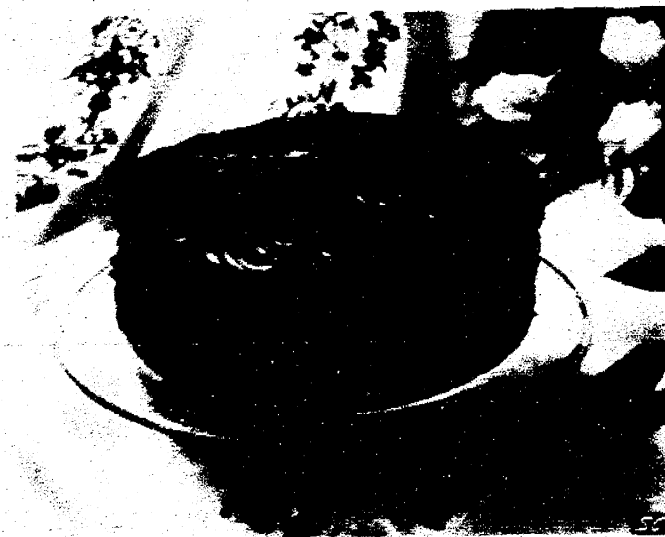
