Editorial TRACKMEN TO RUN 24 HOURS

In Monday, June 13, the voters of the Manchester School District will go to the polls to determine who shall fill the vacant seat on the Board of Education. There are four people running to fill this vacancy. A vote for the person you feel most able to meet the obligations of the office is vital to our democratic government, but also vital is the fulfillment of these obligations since elected to office.

The question arises, have we had full commitment from our present board, have they acted in good faith, doing the job they were elected to, listening to the input of their constituents, or have they been ineffectual, trying to sweep the problems under the carpet thinking they will go away if we just ignore them? As early as last November the president of the board was approached and informed that the school system had grave and serious problems and action should be taken immediately to rectify these problems. The board did not act, they felt that everything was going very smoothly, and they sat still. Again in February they were approached, again they sat still and did nothing.

A group of concerned citizens met and discussed the issues, informed the board of the feelings of the people involved and again they chose to do nothing. Last year the tax was the highest ever and yet curriculum was cut to the bone, and we have been placed on probation by the University of Michigan concerning our accreditation.

It might have been possible to save most elective courses if a repayment plan of State Aid had been presented. It was TOTALLY UNNECESSARY to pay the entire amount in one year!

Now we have the opportunity to act in a decisive manner. Do we go to the polls next Monday with a yes vote, a vote of confidence, a vote of a job well done? Or do we vote No and hope for a complete new slate, someone that will listen to the people, consider why they were elected, to do their homework and find out the responsibilities involved.

As every community experiences growing pains, we also are feeling the pains of growth, the influx of "outsiders". We cannot go back to the '50's or '60's, and stay with status quo. We have to grow, mature, and meet the problems head on, to make a definite commitment with strong leadership. We are now without strong leadership, we are adrift on a stormy sea, without a competent captain.

If you feel we have indeed been well represented, then cast your ballot as yes, raise the millage and take what they will give you for your tax dollar. If you feel that you have been short changed, then the alternate is a no vote, a vote of no confidence, and a hope of a new regime, one that will listen to the voice of the people.

Let your conscience guide your decision be it yes or nay.

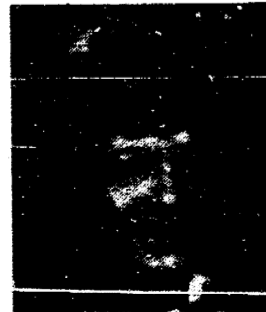

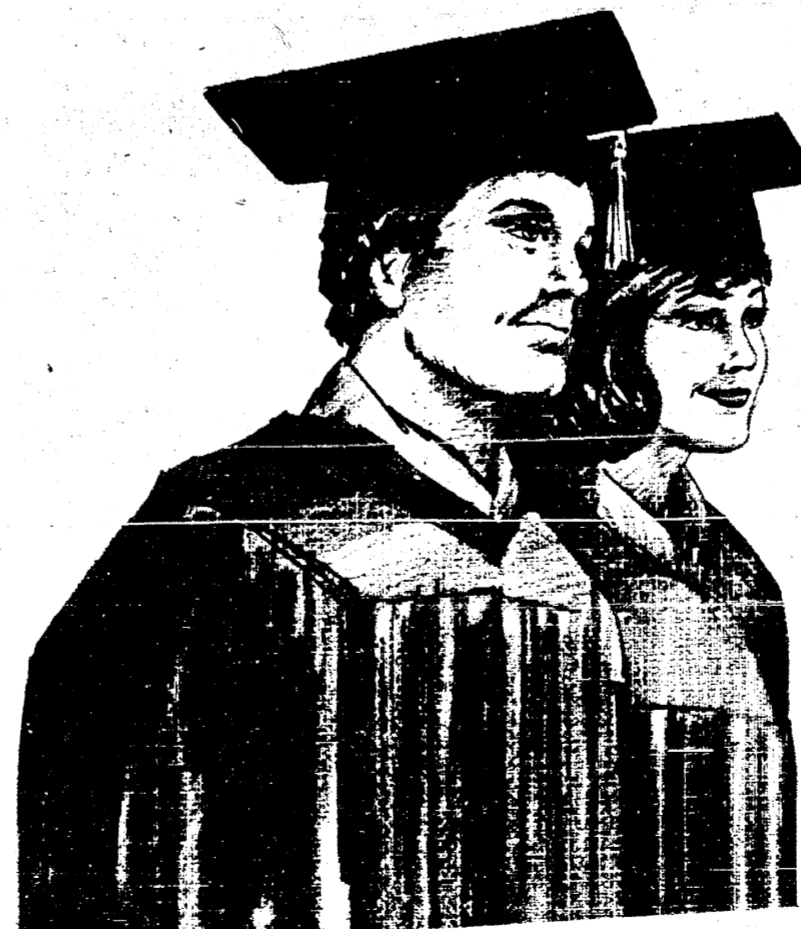


