

Village Council Proceedings

May 23, 1977
 Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Lyle L. Moore. Present were Daniels, Demott, Fitzgerald, Schaffer, Kelly and Esposito. Absent: Dennis and Padley.
 Minutes from the May 11, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Fitzgerald, supported by Daniels. All ayes, carried.

Don Novess was present with a variance request to allow construction of a detached garage within the 8 foot side yard setback requirement. A hearing was set for 8:00 p.m., June 9, 1977 before the Planning Board of Appeals. Property owners within 200 feet of the premises located at 211 N. Duane will be notified by certified mail.

Dr. Marafioti of the Michigan State Health Department presented information regarding the increase of cancer allegedly due to the fluoridation of drinking water. Actually the only concern of the increase are those related to the residential, industrial and many areas, primarily due to smoking. This is based on national as well as state-wide information and studies. At present a bill is before the State Legislature to again put the fluoridation issue to a vote, possibly allowing each community its own choice again. Presently, Manchester is governed by a State law requiring the use of fluoridated drinking water.

Don Limpert was present regarding the main extension he had installed for his present apartment building on Washington Street, as well as buildings intended for future construction. Fitzgerald felt that a maintenance easement was necessary for any mains to private property. There was then a discussion about an extension into private property, actually being a private service which should be maintained by the property owner. Daniels was asked to see Attorney Schaffer.

Proposed Ordinance #98 was discussed. The ordinance concerns water and sewer rates. The minimum gallon use was raised to 10,000 gallons from 5,000 with the minimum water charge raised to \$14.00 a quarter and 20 thousand gallons over the 10,000. The minimum sewer charge was raised to \$24.00 a quarter. The use rate is 100% of the water rate. Sewer system charges were raised to \$20.00 a quarter. The proposed ordinance would go into effect July 1, 1977 affecting the billing received by the customers in the fall. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Demott to pass Ordinance #98. In Ordinance to Amend Ordinance Number 75, as Amended Entitled: An Ordinance to Provide for the Acquisition and Construction of Additions and Improvements to the Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System of the Village of Manchester and for the Continued Operation of the Water Supply System and the Sewage Disposal System of the Village as a Single System to Provide for the Issue of Self-Liquidating Revenue Bonds to Pay the Cost of said Improvements under the Provisions of Act 94, Public Act of Michigan, 1970, as Amended: Providing for the Fixing, Collection, Segregation and Disposition of the Revenues of said Com-

mitted Water Supply and Sewage Disposal System and Payment of said Bonds out of the Revenues thereof and creating a Standing Fund of said Revenues, all as set forth in a copy of the ordinance is to amend Ordinance Number 75, as Amended, the minutes in the official minutes book.

Fitzgerald advised Council that the tree trimming and removal for this year was completed. A water service has been replaced on South Main Street. Additional pipe has been installed on the subject side of the Chart residence at South Main and cleanup completed. Work was done at N. Main in an effort to locate a water main. Catch basins have been cleaned as time allowed. All Village grounds have been mowed and mowing equipment repaired as needed. Some patching of asphalt has been done.

Lisle reported that he had received notification that the Old-Bro Park application had passed the State Park Review. He indicated that he would check with Tom Tanker regarding any necessary further steps on the Village's part.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Kelly to thank Baumgartner's for the flowers and centerpiece donated for Mayor's Exchange Day. All ayes, carried.

Washtenaw County Department of Social Services contacted Manchester about providing work in the Village which would be paid for by the Social Services Department. Council indicated that the matter should be pursued for further information.

A permit copy was received from DNR regarding a proposed parking area, 1.17 acres, in the County's back area. Any objections by Council should be voiced at this point before the application is approved. There were no objections.

Attorney Schaffer's opinion regarding the water of water and sewer rates was read. No free service can be provided, which would include tap fees. However, any costs normally borne by the Village, but actually paid for by the property owner in extending a service, can be repaid the property owner by a specific amount by waiving tap fees by that specific amount.

Demott set a budget hearing for the Fiscal Year 1977-78 and the Paying Sharing Funds for 8:30 p.m., June 9, 1977. The motion was supported by Schaffer. All ayes, carried.

Limpert questioned a bill he had received for Public Works services to put out a fire on the railroad. Daniels indicated that the Fire Chief had directed him to put out the fire. It was suggested that the Township be billed for the service in that case. Limpert said that he had contacted him at the time regarding the brush fire he had set and that he was on the premises.

Moved by Demott, supported by Kelly to adjourn at 10:00 p.m. All ayes, carried.

PROGRESS REPORT ON THE NEW TRACK AND SMALL FIELD

In this time, final grading of the infield, planting the grass seed, grading the base of the track, clearing and grading the area at the north end of the track, has been completed.

Following is a list of the various contractors of equipment. Without this and all the donated labor, the progress so far, could not have been accomplished at such a reasonable price.

Tractor - tractor and grader, Jim Mann - tractor, Shaver - drag and spreader, Wayne Trill - tractor and spreader, Don Brigham - stone spreader, Carllich Construction - grader and tractor, Superior Land Development - bulldozer, Gen. Macomber - tractor, Union Construction Co. - tractor. Please forgive us if we have failed to mention someone.

It is anticipated that the next step will be to place the gravel base for the track, grade and compact with equipment furnished by Midwest Engineers. At this point we believe the entire cost will be less than \$2,000.00.

As a member of the School District, please review for yourself, what has been completed. We believe you will be gratified in seeing what has been accomplished, without the help and co-operation of those who have already given of their time and equipment, the progress would have been zero.

The estimated cost to complete the infield for track events, an all-weather surface on the track, proper drainage and a 4 ft. high fence around the track, can be done for \$51,000.00.

At a later date there are other things to be considered, bleachers, ticket booth, concession stand, restrooms, press box, walkways, outside fence and lighting.

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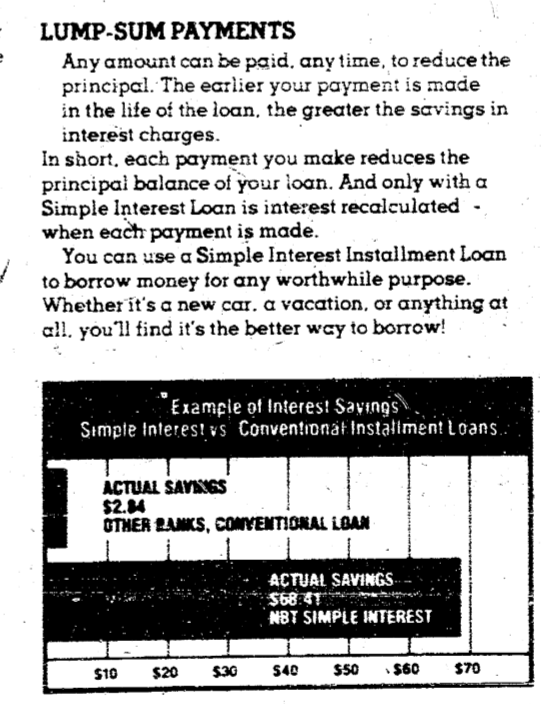

An automobile bumper sticker was spotted in traffic the other day. It said, "I Have Found a New Word for American Agriculture--Thanks!"

But, what does it say to the farmer? "Thanks!" A small word which says volumes. It says we appreciate:

All the times you get up before dawn to check a newly-born animal just struggling to get its legs unfolded; to check the moisture on the perfectly ripened grain in the swath waiting to be harvested; to look at the sky to see if another day of rain is coming to ruin what little crop is left after yesterday's hailstorm. All the years you've struck out when the crop burned up and there was no

harvest; the market was at the bottom when the crop was good, and when the buying price went sky high and you had nothing in the bins.

All the times you invested all your savings to buy a large tractor or implement to help make the work a little easier only to find out that payment money wasn't there at the end of the year; credit was tight; the urban-oriented legislature and Congress imposed new regulations to make your paperwork so time consuming that you have to work half the night to stay ahead of it;

All the times your prize beef herd came down with a disease just at market time and had to be destroyed; All the times you came to town and heard someone say "dumb farmer" and you just grin and bear it knowing that anyone who would say such a thing is really the dumb one;

All the times that you got blamed for the price of food when you get only pennies for your product compared to

what all the middle men between you and the consumer get.

But, most of all, for hanging in there and saying, "Hang it all, next year is going to be better."

Renovated Theatre, Comes Alive After 50 Years

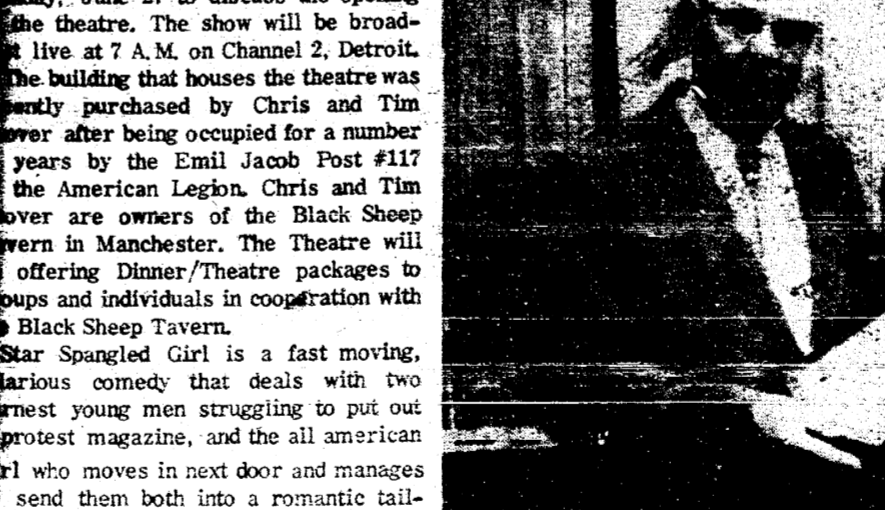

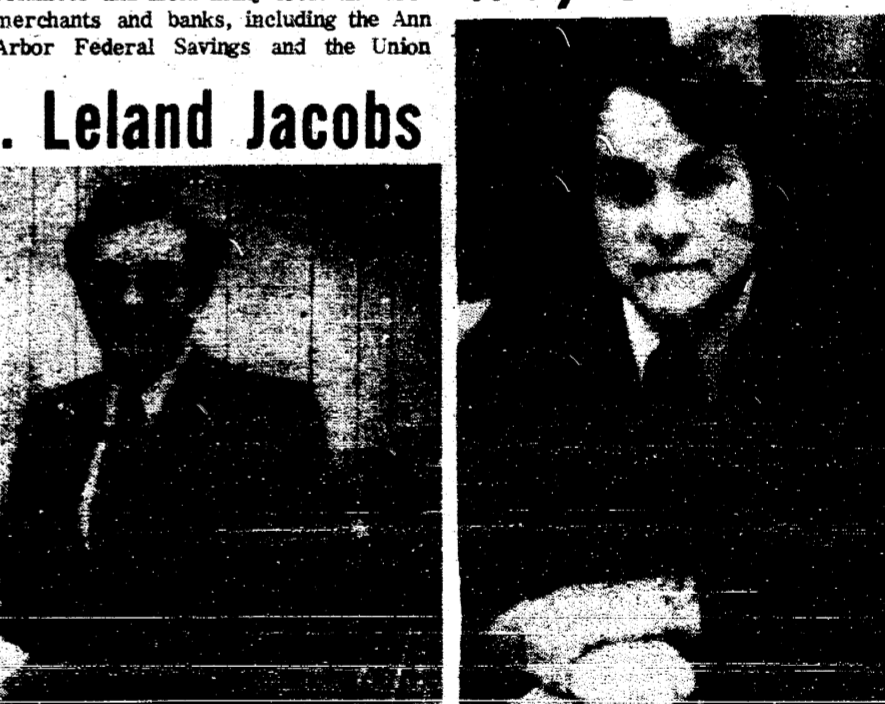
