Village Council Proceedings

June 26, 1977

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Trustee Scully at 7:17 p.m. Present were Duncan, Fitzgerald, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Daniels, Denhoff, Little and Padley. Minutes from the June 6, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Fitzgerald, supported by Schaffer. All yeas, carried.

The proposed financial grant for the Manchester Arps Schools was discussed. Council felt that any interest gained while retaining the money in a savings account for distribution by the schools would offset Village expenses incurred for book-keeping. Since the Village would be held accountable for the use of the money, it was felt that a representative of Council should sit on the grant control board with equal authority. It was moved by Schaffer, supported by Duncan to appoint Denhoff, Financial Trustee on Council, as the Financial Officer for Grant Project "Double SOS". The Project Director is John McGuire. All yeas, carried.

A proposed conditional use for the American Legion was discussed. Moved by Schaffer, supported by Duncan to table the issue of a conditional use or variance request due to inadequate information. All yeas, carried.

A letter from the US Post Office was read concerning a site relocation which is being proposed since the volume of business has increased such that a larger facility will be needed with better access. The US Post Office would like to relocate within a 1/2 mile of the present site and asked suggestions from Council. The matter was discussed with someone pointing out that the present lease runs until June of 1979. The building would be built and then leased by the Post Office, so whatever financial agreement would best suit the Post Office would probably dictate the location somewhat. Moved by Schaffer to keep the Post Office in the General Business District, but not on Main Street, with first preference being the present location, otherwise as close to downtown as possible with adequate off-street parking provided. The motion was seconded by Duncan. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald listed Public Works activities. Maintenance work has been done at Carr Park; Macomb Street has been wedged in preparation for paving; the sewer from Granger to Sunset has been flushed, as well as the area along the river from Auburn Street to the lift station; roadsides and parks have been mowed; man-

holes have been lowered in preparation for paving; the fire hydrant at the treatment plant has been replaced; the water ditch on Adrian Street has been repaired; and new graving has been installed.

Zsenyuk asked Council to consider two parking spots in the Central Business District for handicapped. A selection was made and will be appropriately signed and painted.

Duncan read suggestions from the Planning Commission for the sign ordinance taken from the Village Planning Commission's May 18, 1977 meeting. Schaffer will contact Roesch regarding the legal incorporation of the material in a sign ordinance. Basically it would permit one sign per entrance, 20 square feet on a side, hanging not less than 9 feet from the sidewalk and extending out no more than 5 feet from the building, illuminated by reflected light only.

A letter from the Ann Arbor Transportation Authority was read concerning a proposal for Dial-A-Ride in this area. Zsenyuk offered to check further regarding the cost sharing, scheduling, pick-up station, to whom it would be available, fares and children riding.

A recommendation was received and read from John Adams of McNamee, Porter and Seeley concerning the NPDES permit which should be renewed at this time, so that the Treatment Plant can operate as it has been until the Federal Grant for improvements is offered and either accepted or rejected. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Schaffer to approve the signing of the NPDES permit. All yeas, carried.

After perusal of the Accounts Receivable and discussion of several invoices for which complaints had been received in the past, it was moved by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald to cancel invoice #584 to Robert Achtenberg for \$25.18. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Schaffer, supported by Duncan to approve an agreement with Washtenaw County for printing of the Village tax bills. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Duncan, supported by Fitzgerald to pay all Cash Disbursements as listed. All yeas, carried.

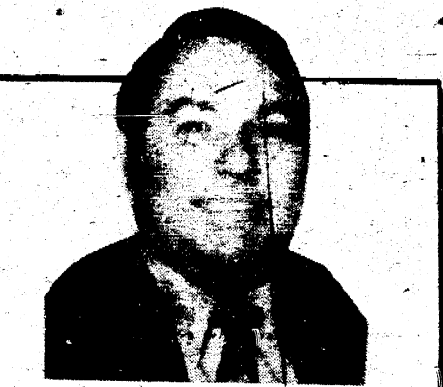

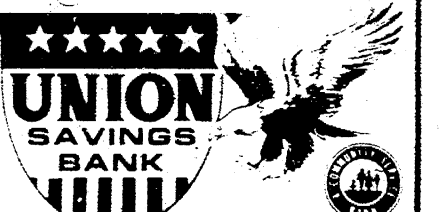

A WORLD FULL OF DON'TS

Almost every day, the news media reports on the latest health hazards discovered by zealous researchers. The list is getting pretty long--DES, cholesterol, chlordane, heptachlor, Red Dye No. 2, cyclamates, saccharin, just to name a few. At the rate things are going, it won't be long before we'll be cautioned against any substance that can be eaten, applied, injected or sprayed. Even Mom's apple pie won't be safe.

Harrell Degraff, retiring president of the American Meat Institute, summed it up this way recently as he addressed the Institute of Animal Agriculture: "Don't eat sugar. Scientists have detected a correlation between blanched foods and stomach cancer. The same hazards can be alleged against refined flour and polished rice.

"Don't eat eggs or apples or carrots or rice or oats or barley, or plums or cherries, or garlic or wheat bran, or wheat germ or safflower oil or soybean oil, or corn oil, or honey. They contain estrogens. For the same reason, don't

eat green vegetables.

"Don't breathe. You will inhale carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide and oxides of nitrogen and sulfur. Obviously, don't drive or ride in an automobile. In the U.S., 50,000 persons a year are killed by automobiles.

"Don't eat salt. It may elevate your blood pressure. Don't eat rutabaga, turnip, cabbage, spinach and carrots. They may be goitrogenic.

"Don't engage in sex. It has been alleged to cause both heart attacks and cervical cancer."

To this list we'd like to add some of our own don'ts: Don't walk through a bull pen. The EPA says that's hazardous--you might slip on something and hurt yourself.

Don't farm. It's one of the three most dangerous occupations. Don't use insecticides. They kill bugs and other insects, and it's for sure they will kill rats.

Don't go near farm machinery. It may be harmful to your health, according to some OSHA regulations.

One could go on and on listing substances and activities that could be dangerous to your health. Unfortunately, some scientists and researchers do just that. It's a wonder that the human race has survived at all, to say nothing of the fact that we live longer, healthier lives than ever before in history. Evidently,

hazard-happy people have decided to disregard that simple piece of information.

Manchester Township Report

June 13, 1977

The regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board was held at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, June 13, 1977 at the Village Hall. Board members present were: Fielder, Burch, Macomber, and Lentz. Also present were Constable Moore and Harold Burch.

The clerk read the minutes of the May 9, 1977 meeting. They were approved as read. Enter Board member Widmayer 8:10 p.m.

The clerk presented the following bills to be paid:

We had a credit of \$42.51 from Michigan Bell for taxes charged on office phone over the years. Our bill for the month was \$31.49 so we still have a credit of \$11.02.

By a motion by Widmayer and supported by Macomber, the bills are to be paid as presented with the exception of No. 5, to the Village of Manchester--Public Works Service 12-9-75 for \$191.00. We will investigate into it more fully. The clerk was instructed to write the Village a letter stating this.

Widmayer, moved, supported by Macomber to authorize the Manchester Fire Dept. to purchase a new pump and have it installed and pay for it out of the equipment fund. Roll call vote: Aye, Burch, Fielder, Lentz, Macomber, and Widmayer. Nays, none. Carried. Widmayer will find the cost and let the clerk know when it is to arrive.

Harold Burch stated he has not yet contracted for the library roof but will do so.

Mr. Burch told the Board that Tom Marshall, Jr. is interested in learning the maintenance and repair of the voting machines. Mr. Burch, who is the custodian of the machines at this time, would like to have someone else take over in the next few years and recommends Marshall. After discussion, Lentz made the motion, to pay Tom Marshall's expenses, meals, mileage, and lodging, to go to a two day seminar at Jamestown, New York. Ma-

comber supported the motion. All ayes, carried. Mr. Burch also explained the lubrication of the machines that should be done. When Tom goes to the Seminar, he can obtain more information on this and perhaps bring back the lubrication. Mr. Burch consented to tell Mr. Marshall of the Board's decision. Exit Harold Burch 8:57 p.m.

Enter: Geo. Macomber 8:58 p.m.
Burch made a motion to set the fee for the members of the Board of Appeals at \$10.00 per meeting retroactive to May 28, 1977. It was supported by Widmayer. All ayes, carried.

The fees of the Manchester Township Zoning Ordinance were discussed. Burch made a motion to adopt a Resolution to change the schedule of Fees under the Manchester Township Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Article XVII Site Plan Review Sec. 17.03 Application and fees from \$150.00 to \$300.00.

Article XXI Amendment Procedure Sec. 21.01 Initiating Amendments and Fees from \$150.00 to \$300.00.
Other Fees remain unchanged.

It was supported by Macomber. Roll call votes: Burch, aye; Fielder, aye; Lentz, aye; Macomber, aye; Widmayer, aye. All ayes, carried. Resolution adopted.

Macomber moved, supported by Burch to reappoint Lewis Kelum to the Manchester Planning Commission commencing May 1976 and expiring May 1979. All ayes, carried.

Burch moved, supported by Widmayer to reappoint Jeannette Kirk to the Manchester Township Planning Commission commencing May 1976 to May 1979 for a 3 year term. All ayes, carried.

The clerk read a letter from the Dept of Social Services, Lansing, Michigan; regarding existing adult foster care facilities, foster family group homes for children and child caring institutions. The state will keep in close contact with the Township regarding this.
A letter was read from Attorney Roesch

concerning the procedure in establishing our own Police Dept. Letter submitted to minutes. Discussion followed. Macomber moved to adopt the following Resolution: "Resolve that Manchester Township does hereby establish a police department which shall consist of one or more police officers to be appointed by the Township Board and that the sum of \$2,000.00 is appropriated for the operation thereof for the balance of the current fiscal year of the Township."

Supervisor Fielder was given the authorization of the Board to negotiate with the Village to haul away the debris from the fire hall site.

Being no further business, Burch made the motion, supported by Widmayer to be adjourned. All ayes, carried.

WHAT'S COOKING IN MICHIGAN

It's blueberry time in Michigan and you can celebrate right now. You'll find these tasty berries in grocery stores through the end of August. An even better idea is to go out and pick your own right from the fields.

Our state, according to Michigan Department of Agriculture figures, produces around 35 million pounds of blueberries annually, with about two-thirds of production going to processing plants. Michigan leads the nation in production.

While there's nothing much better than milk and sugar on blueberries, my wife and I love blueberry pancakes for a late Sunday breakfast.

Beat one egg well. Then beat in 1 1/4 cups' buttermilk, two tablespoons soft shortening, 1 1/4 cups sifted flour, one teaspoon sugar, one teaspoon baking powder, and one-half teaspoon each soda and salt.

Beat the batter until smooth and make small pancakes in a medium hot frying pan. I'll bet you think I forgot the blue-

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berries. Not so, my friend.
At this point take a handful of whole, washed blueberries and sprinkle them onto the uncooked tops of the pancakes. When brown on the bottom, flip the pancakes over and finish cooking. The blueberries cook beautifully and retain their delicious flavor.
When served, spread fresh butter on them and some blueberry pancake syrup and you'll get the day off to a proper start.

PROJECT COPE

Question: I think that my four year old daughter may have some serious problems. She doesn't talk very well and seems awfully slow to catch on to things that my other children could do at a much younger age. If I want to refer my child to the school system for testing, how do I do it? What will happen?

Answer: If you are worried about your child and want to talk over your concerns or make a referral, you, as his parent, or a teacher, doctor or other professional who has your permission, should call the Director of Special Education, in Region V, which includes the Manchester, Chelsea, and Whitmore Lake School Districts, this person is Dr. Henry DeYoung (475-9131, ext. 48). He will take your referral and forward it to the leader of the diagnostic team. By law the school cannot ignore a referral.

Professional staff with special training will evaluate your child using tests and methods appropriate for the suspected impairment. After all evaluations are completed, a group called an EPPC (Educational Planning and Placement Committee) will be called together. You will be invited to attend, as well as at

least one school administrator, one teacher, and one person with special training and experience in evaluating the suspected impairment. The EPPC will analyze all of the information available about your child's problem; will diagnose the nature of the problem; and will consider all of the educational options available, recommending the most appropriate educational program for your child. You have the right to appeal decisions about your child's educational placement with which you disagree.

The local school district is responsible for providing special education programs and services, including transportation. It may provide service directly or may contract with another school district or agency to provide them.

At least once a year, your child's progress must be reviewed and reported to you. On the basis of the review, a child's placement may be changed. You always have the right to see your child's school records, including reports which describe how well he is progressing with his special educational objectives.

(Project COPE is a federally funded program which is being operated during the current school year by Special Education Region V for Chelsea, Manchester, and Whitmore Lake School Districts. Its aim is to inform the community about special problems and needs of preschool children. Those who have questions, concerns, or who wish to refer a child for diagnostic services can contact Ellen Eagan, Project COPE Co-ordinator at 475-9131 ext. 50 or Dr. DeYoung at ext. 48).

Sandy Winzerm and Joyce Spiess joined 4,000 doctors, nurses and parents with children at a four day Conference which brought together medical experts from all over the world. "Developing nations could save one billion dollars a year if all their mothers breastfed - a fact which should make La Leche League as powerful as OPEC", Dr. Marshall H. Klaus M.D., author of MATERNAL-INFANT BONDING told the 6th International Conference of LA LECHE LEAGUE INTERNATIONAL in Toronto on Wednesday.

Stressing the beneficial properties inherent in mothers' milk, the noted physician and author, who is professor of Pediatrics at the University Hospitals of Cleveland, cited specific examples in various parts of the globe where babies owe their lives to human milk. "In 1971 and '72 almost 50% of premature babies who developed diarrhea in sections of Argentina were dying from the affliction", Dr. Klaus stated. "In 1973 a system was implemented whereby milk from mothers of full-term babies was supplied to the premises at a teaspoon each lb. of infant weight, and the diarrhea completely stopped!"
