24th Chicken Broil Sets New Record



Last Thursday was a great day for Manchester. 550 volunteer men and boys from our community prepared and served 10600 charcoal broiled chicken dinners to our residents and visitors. Our 24th Annual Broil sponsored by the Manchester Optimist Club and the Jaycees drew the largest crowd in the history of this event.

The guest register recorded visitors from all areas of Michigan, from thirteen other states and from Canada, British West Indies, Columbia, England, Germany, Korea and Japan.

The weather man dealt the proceedings a temporary blow by unleashing a short downpour in mid afternoon but the spirits of our visitors and the workers were not dampened.

A quick strategy session resulted in the location of an additional 3000 pounds of charcoal to rekindle the pits. After a delay of one and one half hours the grill assembly line was again turning out those famous butter basted Manchester chicken halves. It was 10:30 when the last visitor was served and the weary volunteers turned in their aprons, caps and gloves. And it was not long after, while the coals were still smoldering, that Gene Bentschneider and his committee met to formulate plans for next year's 25th silver anniversary of this now famous community project.

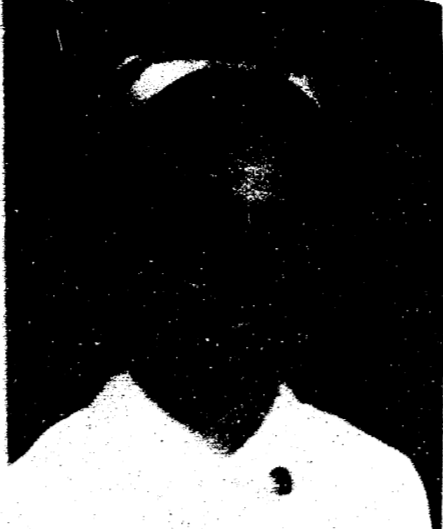

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION
MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU
LANSING, MICHIGAN
NEW OSHA ADMINISTRATOR IS O.K. - GENERALLY SPEAKING

There's a new booklet out, published by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, better known as OSHA. Its title is, "To Shift To Common Sense Priorities," and in it the new OSHA Administrator, Dr. Eula Bingham, calls for an expansion of educational efforts and a re-focusing of the agency's inspection efforts on the most serious health and safety hazards. Apparently, emphasis will be on health hazards that cause irreversible injury -- cancer, lung disease, nerve damage, and "all the rest."
Dr. Bingham's apparent goals, the de-emphasis of regulation replaced by an increased emphasis on education, are indeed admirable. OSHA's critics have requested this change for a long time. But the administrators "all the rest" generalization hits a nerve like no chemical ever could.
At a recent farm broadcasters' meeting in Washington, D.C., Dr. Bingham continued to speak in broad generalities. Here are some examples:
On respect for agricultural chemicals -- "I've seen farmers clear the nozzles of chemical applicators with their mouths. Look, I've been on a farm; I know what they do."
On the use of diethylstilbestrol (DES) as a cattle feed additive -- "What happens if pregnant women accidentally consume the hormone? This is a problem, but we don't know how serious. However, we have to take necessary precautions."
The DES generalization came later, during questioning by a Missouri farm broadcaster. "Mrs. Bingham," he said, "how many cases of cancer can you cite to us that have resulted from the use of DES as a cattle feed additive?"
"Oh, I can't...uh, that's not...," Dr. Bingham stammered. Finally, "I cannot cite any."
"Why was it withdrawn?"
"I don't know. I had no input into that decision," she answered. Finally, she admitted, "I had no idea it had been withdrawn. I thought it was still available."

 1/2 cup pecan
 1/2 cup walnut
 1/2 cup hazelnut
 1/2 cup cashew
 1/2 cup pistachio
 1/2 cup almond
 1/2 cup walnut
 1/2 cup pecan
 1/2 cup hazelnut
 1/2 cup cashew
 1/2 cup pistachio

Combine all ingredients in small bowl; mix well. Store in refrigerator. Keeps about 2-3 days.

Combine peaches and sugar in boiling water. Add cold water, cream, sugar and vanilla. Place bowl of peaches mixture in larger bowl of cold water. Stir until slightly thickened. Spoon over cake squares; top with whipped topping. Makes 2 servings.
