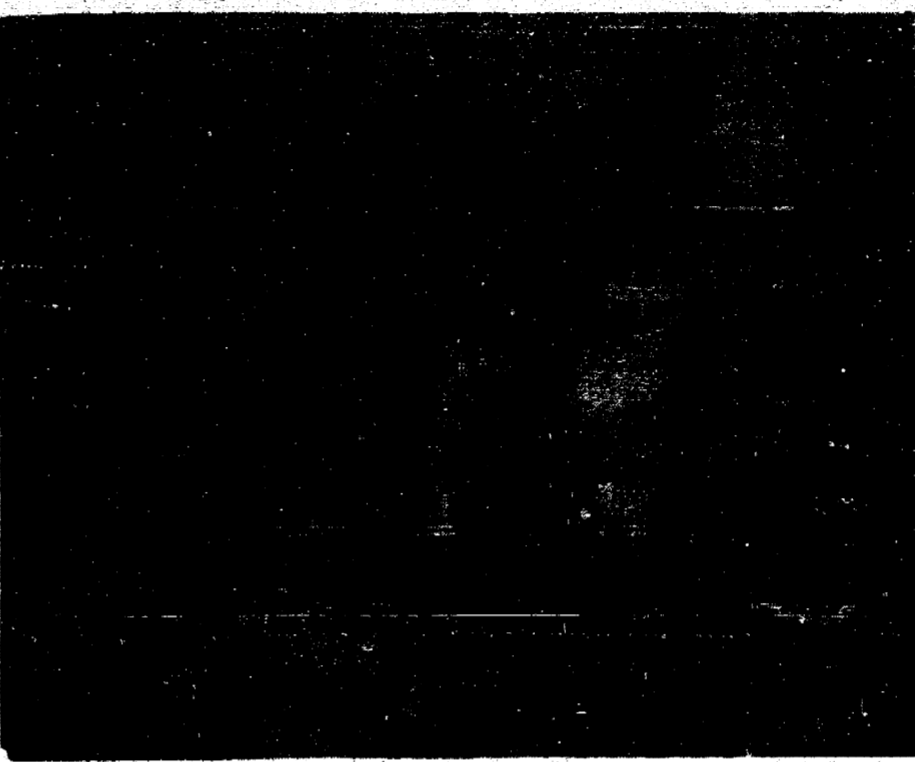

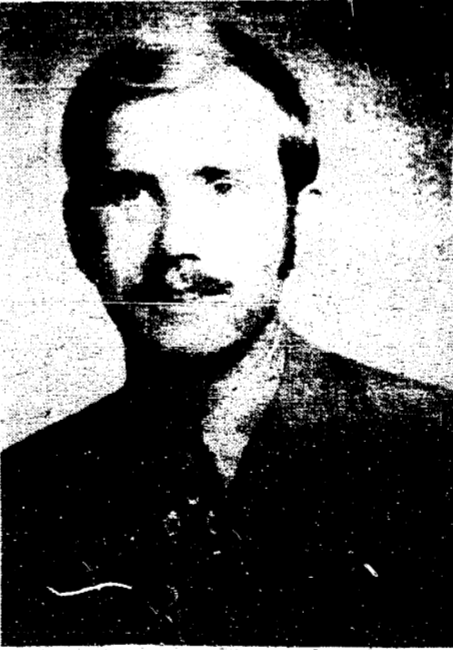

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

July 11, 1977

The Annual Reorganizational Meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. in the Study Auditorium by Acting-Superintendent John McGuire.

The first item on the Agenda, was the Oath of Office of Mrs. Corliss Mick, administered by John McGuire.

Next was the Election of Officers. Mr. McGuire asked if the Board wished to vote by secret ballot or roll call vote? It was decided to vote by roll call.

Reno Feldkamp nominated William Bunnay President, supported by Helen Kensler.

Mr. Bunnay stated that the only way he would be able to accept the nomination for President would be to withdraw from the Negotiation Committee and he would have to lose very heavily on the Vice President. He would accept only under these conditions. A roll call vote was taken, all yes. Motion carried.

The meeting was turned over to President Bunnay who asked for nominations for a Vice-President. Moved by Walkowe, supported by Westfall that Reno Feldkamp be nominated for Vice-President. Mick, no, Walkowe-yes, Feldkamp-abstain, Macomber-no, Kensler-yes, Westfall-yes, Bunnay-yes. Motion carried.

Moved by Westfall supported by Macomber that Helen Kensler be nominated for Secretary. All yes with the exception

of Helen Kensler who abstained. Motion carried.

Helen Kensler nominated Susan Westfall as Treasurer. Supported by Walkowe, Macomber-no, all others yes. Motion carried.

Helen Kensler read the minutes of the June 20th, 1977 Board meeting. President Bunnay asked if there were any corrections or additions to the minutes. Susan Westfall stated that the Secretary of the Pleasant Lake School would not be full-time, her hours would be changed so that she is there while school is in session. Mrs. Westfall also stated that the Director of Community Education's contract be tabled indefinitely, instead of until July as stated in the minutes.

Mr. McGuire wanted a clarification on his statement regarding the \$2,422 with regard to the summer program that Mr. Tassie has set-up. The figure of \$2,422 is incorrect and should be \$3,368. This money is being put into the budget and will be reimbursed at the end of the school year by the state and county.

Helen Kensler stated that the length of Don Tassie's contract and his salary had been omitted in the June 20th minutes. The motion read as follows: Reno Feldkamp moved Don Tassie's contract be set-up for 48 work weeks with 3 of those 48 weeks being vacation. Salary \$21,000. Supported by Westfall. All yes. Motion carried.

Mr. Macomber questioned the reasoning of the Board regarding Mr. Tassie's questions as to whether the subject of

principals salaries was a closed issue. Mr. Bunnay told Mr. Tassie he could discuss it with John McGuire, but, as of now, Board action stands. Both Mr. Tassie and Mr. Schick's contracts had been acted upon. At the next meeting, Mr. Tassie's weeks were lowered, but, salary remained the same. Mr. Schick's weeks were lowered and salary raised. Mr. Macomber said he didn't think this procedure was proper. A discussion followed. President Bunnay said if there were any further questions, he would refer them to John McGuire and continue with the business at hand.

Moved by Kensler, supported by Westfall to approve the June 20th minutes as corrected. Mick-abstain, Macomber-no, Walkowe-yes, Feldkamp-yes, Kensler-yes, Westfall-yes, Bunnay-yes, Motion carried.

The June 27th minutes were read and corrected as follows: Brian Schick's work weeks were stated as being 43 weeks, it should have been 46 work weeks.

During the interview with Mr. Korican, Mr. Macomber asked if Mr. Korican thought he needed an assistant Principal. Mr. Korican said it was his understanding that it was the Board's intent not to have an assistant Principal. He said he didn't think it could be done as well without an assistant principal but the Time-Out counselor would help.

Moved by Feldkamp supported by Westfall to approve the minutes as corrected. Mick, abstain, all others yes. Motion carried.

John McGuire gave the Financial Report as follows: SDR-\$262,000.00. Checking account balance \$882.45 giving a total of \$262,882.45. Copy of financial report in supplemental file.

The transportation committee gave the Board a report to study for the next meeting.

EGG ON YOUR FACE?

Beef, bacon and eggs, peanut butter
(whoops!), saccharin, sugar, milk--and
even water--are among the growing list
of foods and beverages that scientists
and/or government have decided are
"dangerous" to our health. Almost every
day, the media brings consumers reports

of another decision that takes some of
the joy out of eating.

It's enough to make farmers wonder-
what is the purpose of producing food,
if not to eat? A Florida columnist recently
gave them hope that as government deci-

light green gown with beige lace sleeves and a white tulle skirt. Her hair was styled with green daisies and baby's breath and she carried a matching accessory.

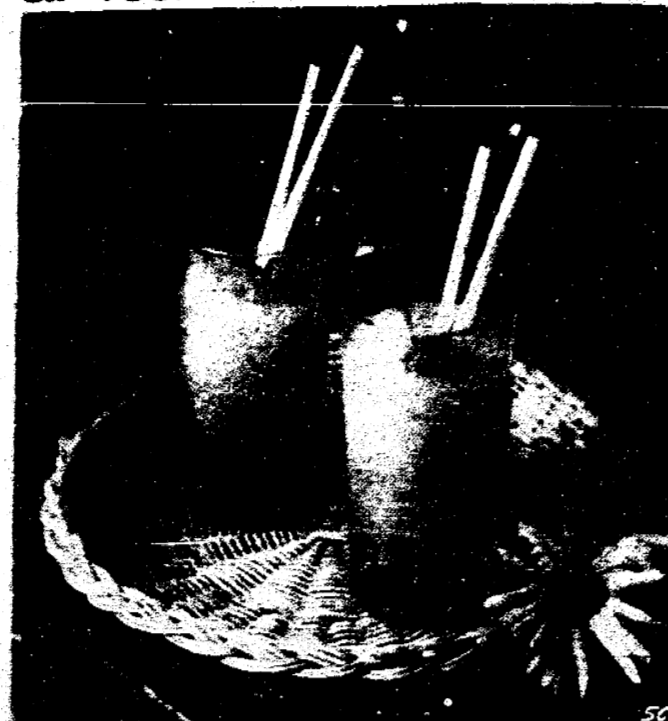

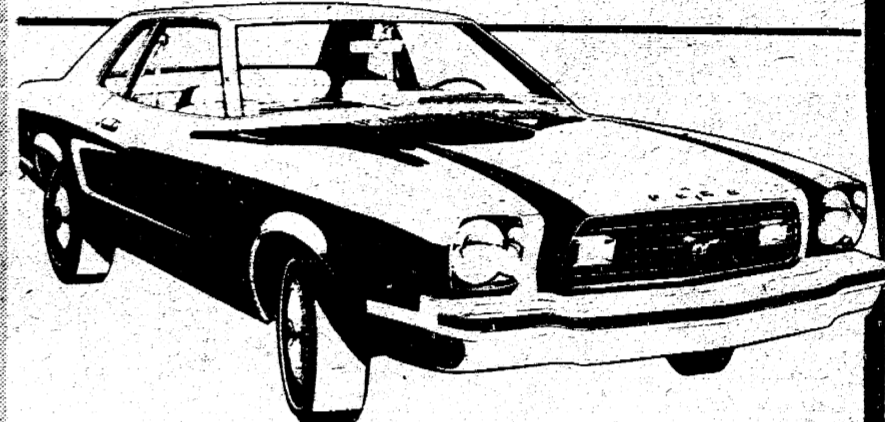

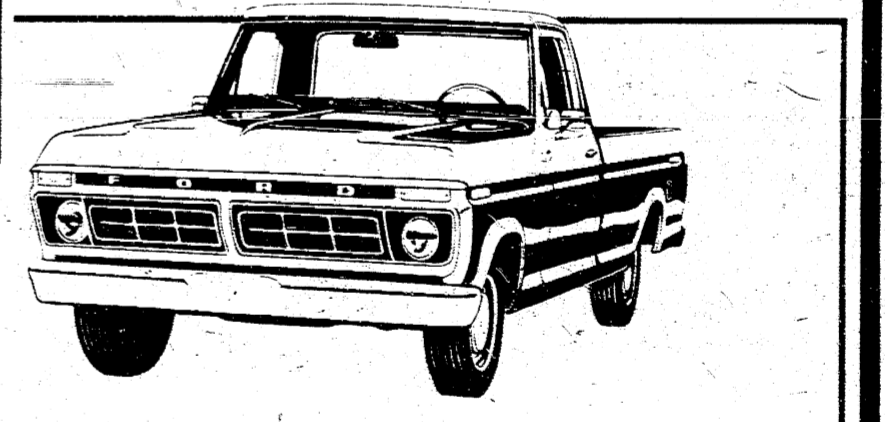

GOVERNMENT PROGRAMS NOT ANSWER TO FARM PRICE PROBLEM, SAYS FARM BUREAU V.P.

A "depression market" is the price farmers are paying for their response to concerns about world hunger, according to John Laurie, Tuscola County dairy and grain farmer who serves as vice president of the 63,000 family-member Michigan Farm Bureau.

"In the last two years, the American

farmer has responded to concerns about world hunger and to assurances by government for a greater access to world markets," said Laurie. "And now, because of his concerns, this same farmer is left with a depression market."

Producers of wheat, corn and other commodities throughout the United States are the victims of over-production, both here and abroad, resulting in severely depressed farm prices. Laurie called the current farm price situation a "serious problem," but warned that government programs are not the answer.

"It is not surprising that some farmers, in this unbearable economic situation, ask for government target prices and loan rates. But we have only to review the history of such programs," he warned. "They perpetuate rather than solve the problem of low market prices. In the long range, this route is disastrous for agriculture."

Laurie said there is a role for government, however, in the areas of encouraging foreign market expansion and research and development of other feasible uses of grain, such as "gas-a-hol" for energy.

The farm organization has actively lobbied for a comprehensive national marketing and bargaining law to provide producers with organized strength in negotiating prices for their commodities. In action last week, the Michigan Farm Bureau board of directors requested that the American Farm Bureau Federation establish a Farm Bureau owned and operated cooperative export market facility.
