The regular meeting of the Manchester Township Board was held Monday, July 11, 1977 at 8:00 p.m. at the Village Hall. Board members present were: Burch, Widmayer, Lentz, Macomber and Fielder. Also present was William Powers.

The clerk read the minutes of the June 13, 1977 meeting. They were approved as read. Enter Charles Moore \$111 p.m. The treasurer passed out the financial report for the quarter. They are filed with minutes.

The clerk was instructed to call John Otos, representative of Burnham and Flower, Agency and set up a special meeting for Friday July 15, 1977 at 7:00 p.m. at the Village Hall to decide on insurances.

Widmayer reported that the estimate of a new pumper would be around \$4500.00. However, there is a possibility that they can purchase a rebuilt one.

Burch made the motion to pay Washtenaw Co. Rd. Comm. \$3380.00 for the application of the chloride. It was supported by Widmayer. All ayes, carried.

Mr. Powers inquired if there has been any action on his request for rezoning in Park Heights. He was told that it had been denied. He asked the reason and was told the Planning Comm. had recommended to the Board not to rezone because we prefer the growth to be in the village, which is part of the township. He requested a copy of the minutes of the Planning Comm. The clerk was instructed to send them to him. He also complained of the roads in Park Heights, stating that they get almost no attention. He asked how to get some action. He was told to call the Washtenaw Co. Rd. Comm. He asked the Bd. if it could help and he was told, we will try. After obtaining some information from the Wash. Co. Rd. Comm. we will get in touch with Mr. Powers. He requested that North Drive, Valley Drive and Walnut get some attention so fire trucks, etc. would be able to reach everyone involved in that area. Exit Mr. Powers 8:00 p.m.

Macomber made the motion, supported by Burch to grant permission to the clerk to pay the light and gas bills before the meeting in order to save the penalty for late payment. All ayes, carried.

The clerk was granted permission to amend the minutes of May 9, 1977 concerning the appointment of Ron Mann and Harold Sutton to the Planning Comm. It stated they were appointed for 4 years when it should have been three. The motion was made by Widmayer and supported by Macomber. All ayes, carried.

Fielder announced that another public hearing for the application of Tom Walton for rezoning will have to be held as an error had been made in printing the notices in the paper.

After discussion on the bill, to Village of Manchester for \$191.00 for public works service which was presented last month, Macomber made the motion supported by Lentz to pay the bill. All ayes, carried.

Supervisor Fielder reported he had appealed to the Michigan Tax Comm. because Washtenaw County had 41 million dollars added to their valuation. This meant at least 2.7% raise of valuation for Manchester Township.

Being no further business, Burch made the motion, supported by Macomber to be adjourned. All ayes, carried. Adjournment 10:01 p.m.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

July 18, 1977

The regular Board of Education Meeting was called to order by President Wm. Bunney on July 18, 1977, at 8:10 P.M. in the Study Auditorium.

Helen Nickerson took roll call. Absent: Reno Feldkamp and Helen Kensler. Susan Westfall read the minutes of the July 11, 1977 meeting.

Helen Kensler came in at 8:15 P.M. President Bunney asked if there were any corrections or additions to the Minutes?

Mr. McGuire said that under the Appointment to Committees Section the Washtenaw Intermediate, School District Representative should read Washtenaw School Officers Association representative.

Mrs. Mick said that it was she that said clarification in regard to the Board's intent for the Professional Council will probably have to take place at the negotiating table.

In reference to Mr. Wilkinson of the MASE, his name is Varl Wilkinson not Phil Wilkinson as previously stated.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to approve the minutes as corrected. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire gave the financial report

of the Internal Account. Copy in supplemental file.

Mrs. Westfall asked that the Board be furnished with a report from the Internal Account each month.

Next were reports from the various committees:

BUILDING & GROUNDS: Mr. McGuire gave a report from Schneider's Climate Control on the boilers and heating system. He stated that another company, Powers Regulator would also be coming in to give an estimate on repairs.

Mrs. Mick said she was hesitant to accept the first bid. Also, that there should be a ceiling put on the amount of money spent for repair. This is due to the fact that an exact dollar figure cannot be given. The boilers have to be opened up to see what has to be repaired or replaced.

Mr. McGuire also stated that this is the year that our insurance representative inspects our heating system.

A discussion followed regarding the bids received for repairing the roofs. The bids were not comparable. It was mentioned that perhaps a consultant be hired to write up specifications and inspect the work after it was completed.

Mrs. Westfall asked that the Building and Grounds Committee give the Board a recommendation to go on. Mr. Macomber said he thought there could be

a recommendation in a week or so.

TRANSPORTATION: The topic of the town bus run and the afternoon Kindergarten run was brought up and a lengthy discussion followed. Moved by Walkowe supported by Macomber that we run the A.M. town bus run and the P.M. Kindergarten bus until we can't afford it any longer and then discontinue them. Susan Westfall said she would not support the motion because of cuts in program such as, strings and guidance at the elementary level.

Helen Kensler said that she thought the Board should set some guidelines. We are the only school around that has a town bus. She thought the money could be spent elsewhere. She would not support the motion.

Mr. McGuire stated he had an appointment with Paul Linebaugh from W.I.S.D. the next day to discuss alternate starting times to eliminate the elementary children having to wait around.

Mrs. Mick asked if 2 bus runs were legal. Mr. McGuire answered yes, and if he recalled correctly, Whitmore Lake has 3.

Vote on Mr. Walkowes motion - Mick-yes, Walkowe-yes, Macomber-yes, Westfall-no, Kensler-no, Bunney-no. Motion defeated. No majority.

Mr. McGuire was asked if it would be feasible to charge the town families for their children to ride the bus. Mr. McGuire said he would get a clarification from the State Department.

The Bus committee was asked to come back with an alternate recommendation.

NEGOTIATIONS: Mr. McGuire gave each Board Member a copy of the Custodian's proposed contract. He said the financial part had not yet been established.

President Bunney recommended the Board review the contract but wait until the financial status had been established and then move to Executive Session to discuss it.

FINANCE: Additional Payment to Mr. Korican and Mr. Fielder for their increased responsibilities and duties after being appointed Acting High School Principal and Assistant High School Principal respectively for the remainder of the 1976-77 school year was discussed.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler that \$750 be paid to each of them thru the payroll account.

Discussion: Mrs. Mick said before she could increase an Administrative salary she would like to know what we bought for the money. She would like to move to executive session to review credentials.

Mr. McGuire said we are not buying services. They are services already

rendered. President Bunney asked Mrs. Mick if she still wanted to review credentials. She answered yes. President Bunney said there was a motion on the floor that had to be acted upon.

Vote: Mick-no, Walkowe-yes, Macomber-no, Westfall-yes, Kensler-yes, Bunney-yes. Motion Carried.

Mr. McGuire recommended that Phillip Mains be given temporary assignment of Director of Auxiliary Services. His salary would be \$90.69 per day. Prorated on his present salary of \$19,500.

Mrs. Mick moved the Board adjourn to Executive Session to look at Mr. Mains credentials. Supported by Macomber. All ayes. Motion carried.

The Board adjourned to Executive Session at 9:45 P.M.

President Bunney called the meeting back to order at 10:30 P.M.

Moved by Walkowe supported by Westfall that Phillip Mains be given a temporary assignment of Director of Auxiliary Services. All ayes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire stated that Mr. Kocostid had been promised employment during the summer months by Mr. Green. At this time he is not employed, and is not re-hired.

Parks and Recreation: VIP2 Program Underway

Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation Commission is sponsoring a new program for senior citizens that will benefit all County residents. Entitled Vital Information Program for Very Important Persons or -VIP2, the program is designed to provide medical and other emergency information to those who might find an elderly person ill or injured. Names of relatives, doctors and types of prescribed medication for each participating senior citizen will be listed on a standardized form, placed in a plastic tube and secured to the inside of the elderly person's refrigerator. Consequently, neighbors and rescue personnel are able to obtain this critical information in emergency situations.

Introduced in Monroe County by the Sheriff's Department, this information program has been enthusiastically received by hundreds of senior citizens. Richard Marsh, the program's founder, explained that refrigerators are used "because they are fireproof and easily accessible."

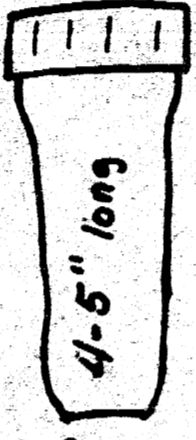
The procedure to distribute the VIP2 tubes will be as follows: letters of explanation with VIP forms attached will be available at all Senior Citizen centers in the County. Other places where they will be available are Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation, 2355 W. Stadium, Ann Arbor; local public libraries; and local police and sheriff stations. If a group of Senior Citizens would like to have the forms distributed at their meeting they should contact Parks and Recreation or the Washtenaw County Sheriff Crime Pre-

vention Department, 971-8400 ext. 84, to set up a date. All the information on the form is confidential and no copies or lists will be made of participants' names.

The Veteran's Administration Hospital in Ann Arbor has donated all of the tubes for the VIP. Tapes to secure the information is being donated by Meljer Thrifty Acres. In addition, the Sheriff's Department and the RSVF are assisting the Parks Commission in sponsoring this program. The Sheriff's Department has informed all rescue personnel in the County of the program. RSVF is recruiting Retired Volunteers to assist in delivery of the tubes.

BEFORE YOU CONSIDER CONVERSION ...CONSIDER THE COSTS

Concerned about high food prices? Ever consider growing your own food supply... just as families once did back in "the good old days"? What would it cost to convert your family unit into self-sufficient food producers?

Land might be the big problem, but with the advancements agriculture has made in the last 200 years, it doesn't take as much as it once did. For example, enough wheat for all of the flour and cereal a family of four would need in a year can be grown on a third of an acre of land, and corn products such as meal, cereal and syrup require hardly any land at all.

Your milk, butter, cheese and ice cream requirements could be supplied from two months' production of a top dairy cow, and the family's beef needs would be equivalent to just about one live steer.

You are referring to time savings.

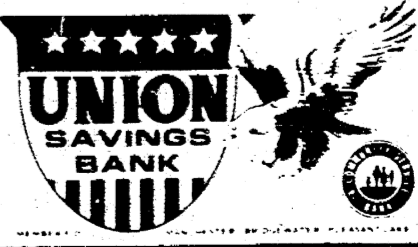
For brevity sake, let's call these time saving CD's.

Better yet, when you have those extra bucks and want that higher rate of interest, come in and talk to me.

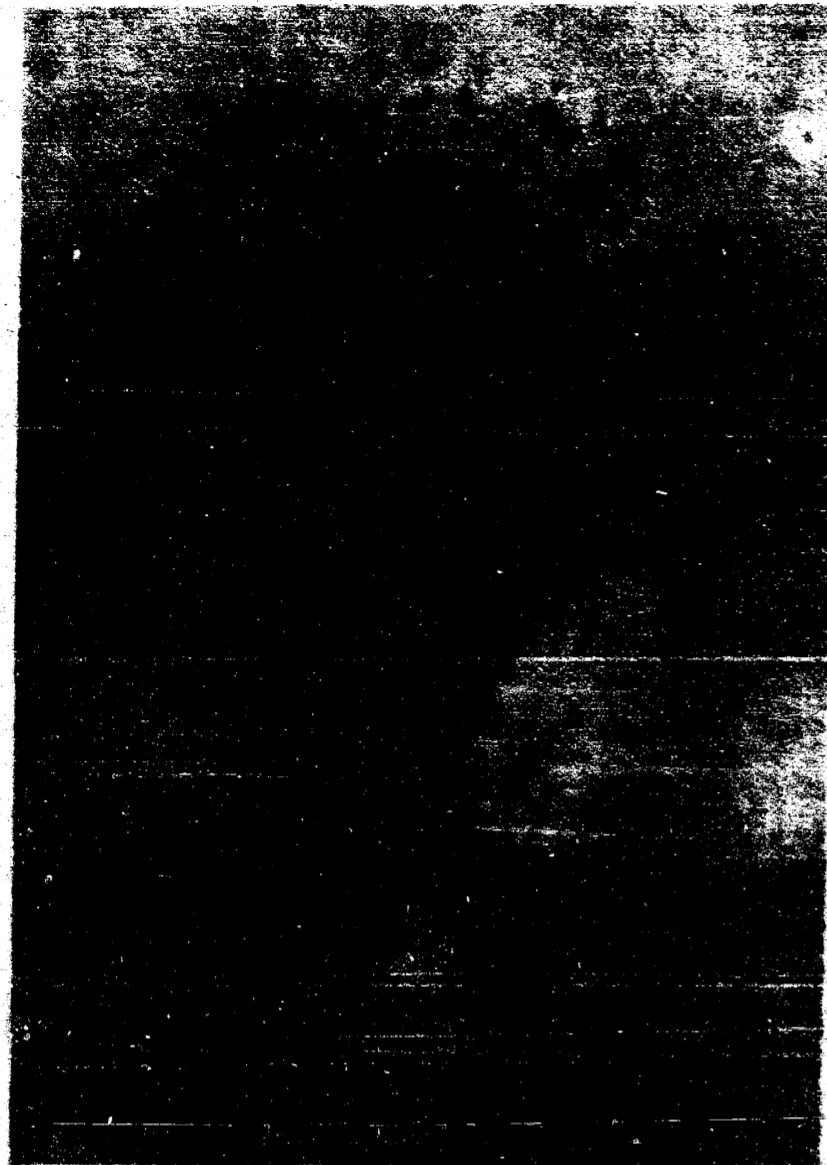
