Age 62 years, died Thursday at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

He was born May 24, 1915 in Manchester, the son of Hollis and Nellie Kahl Knickerbocker.

He was married to Helen Meyer on February 26, 1939. She survives.

He was a Chrysler Proving Ground employee until his retirement in 1975. Since then he has been a mechanic for the Village of Manchester.

Mr. Knickerbocker was a member of the Manchester United Methodist Church.

In addition to his wife he is survived by two sons, David of Byron and Earl of Napoleon; three daughters, Mrs. Roger (Connie) Crist of Owosso, Mrs. Irving (Karen) Roberts of Manchester and Mrs. Greg (Mary) Gardner of Manchester; ten grandchildren; one Great-Granddaughter; two brothers, Lavern of Bonita Springs, Florida and Earl of New Port Richey, Florida; one sister, Mrs. Dorothy Stoll of Ann Arbor.

He was preceded in death by two brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services were held Saturday 1 P.M. at the Manchester United Methodist Church. Rev. Walter Demberg officiated. Burial followed in Oak Grove Cemetery.

Clarence E. Knorrp lived in Manchester on June 6, 1963, son of Charles A. and Mary Ann Knorrp died on Sunday, August 7 at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak.

Mr. Knorrp was believed to be the first certified genealogist in Michigan and a member of the American Gene Society, a charter member of the Bloodfield Hills Rotary Club and a 32nd Degree Mason.

A resident of the Detroit area since 1911 and Bloodfield Hills since 1952. Mr. Knorrp was a diamond buyer for Wright-Kay Jewelers in Detroit and Birmingham for 40 years. He attended the Cranbrook Art Institute for the study of gemology. He retired in 1952.

Surviving are his wife Gladys, one daughter Mrs. Thomas (Mary Ann) Geiger of Valencia, Pennsylvania, one sister Miss Linda T. Knorrp of Manchester, four grandsons, two nephews Charles M. Knorrp of Manchester and Charles T. Knorrp of Ann Arbor and one niece Mrs. Carl (Darlene) Ricker of Ann Arbor.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

SPECIAL MEETING

July 28, 1977

President Wm. Bunney called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM in the Study Auditorium.

Helen Kessler took roll call with all members being present with the exception of Corliss Mick who entered at 7:45 PM.

Mr. Bunney turned the meeting over to Tony Duerr the attorney representing the School District in the case against Mr. Green. Mr. Duerr gave some background information beginning with -

Spring of 1977 - The Board of Education extended Mr. Green's contract for 3 years, to June 30, 1980. The contract does not define cause for dismissal.

June 2, 1977 - Mr. Green was arrested by Police at a rest area on I-94 at the Baker Road exit. He was charged with 1) being a disorderly person 2) indecent or obscene conduct and 3) masturbating in a public place.

June 6, 1977 - (Monday) Tony Duerr was contacted by Bill Bunney to represent

the school district.

June 8, 1977 - Board met in public session with Tony Duerr and suspended Wm. J. Green with pay. At this time, Mr. Green could not have been discharged from his duties without a trial.

June 9, 1977 - Mr. Duerr contacted the Asst. Prosecuting Attorney Lynwood Noah and the Arresting Officer. The prosecuting attorney would not release any information, nor would the arresting officer testify prior to Mr. Green's trial. Their information could have jeopardized a fair trial. Result: The Board could not bring charges to dismiss Mr. Green or offer him a settlement without these reports. And, School Boards do not have subpoena power of arrest records. The Board was stymied.

June 13, 1977 - Mr. Green was scheduled to be arraigned. He did not appear. The court requested that he appear at a later date. Mr. Duerr talked with James Daly, Mr. Green's attorney regarding Mr. Green's right to disability insurance under

his contract.

June 14, 1977 - provided James Daly with Medical Insurance benefits. There were no disability insurance benefits in Mr. Green's contract. Mr. Green's pay continued in accordance with Board action. It was established that Mr. Green had 15 sick day benefits.

June 21, 1977 - Board met, took no action.

June 23, 1977 - 2nd arraignment took place and a trial date of July 19, 1977 was determined. Mr. Green was released on his Personal recognizance.

Mr. Duerr, Bill Bunney and Jim Daly met to explore the possibility of a settlement in exchange for Mr. Green's resignation. The Board was not willing to make a large settlement. No recommendation came from that meeting.

It was discussed whether or not Mr. Green would qualify for Disability Insurance during the enrollment period if his pay were to continue thru October.

Mr. Durr explained that some of the insurance coverage stipulations are: 1) that you be a full-time employee during open enrollment 2) have not been in contact with a doctor for a specified period of time prior to enrollment.

July 1, 1977 - Pay period came up. Bill Green was paid.

July 14, 1977 - Pay period came up. Bill Green was paid.

July 23, 1977 - Trial date - Continued of charges in a jury trial.

This leaves the Board with a number of options. 1) remove him to his position 2) discuss him 3) present charges; hold a hearing 4) attempt to negotiate further settlement on contract.

The Board need only establish that he was convicted of being a disorderly person and prove that this conviction is adequate cause for dismissal.

The Board should keep in mind what the duties of a Superintendent are and if in fact he has lost the respect and good will of the Community. The Board may also feel a Superintendent should set an example of high standards.

There are no cases in Michigan involving School Superintendent's that pertain to this situation.

Mr. Durr further stated that the course before the Board might be where or how to go from here.

Mr. Durr answered questions from the members of the Board. Jim Walkow asked what difference it made if a teacher was

charged with the acts in question or a Superintendent. Mr. Durr stated that the teacher issue was less. The decision to revoke a teaching certificate would be left up to the Teacher Tenure Commission, not the court.

A discussion followed regarding Mr. Green's teaching certificate. Whether it was automatically revoked under Michigan State or whether there was due cause for revocation.

Susan Westfall asked if the Board held a hearing would the decision of the Board be binding or would Mr. Green be able to appeal. Mr. Durr said there would be no one to appeal to.

The question was raised whether or not a law suit could be brought against the Board. Mr. Durr said if there was an adequate fair hearing and they fully observed legal procedures there would be no cause for a law suit.

Susan Westfall asked what events take place if a hearing is scheduled. Mr. Durr stated the Board would have to authorize him to prepare charges, to notify Bill Green and his lawyer of the hearing date.

A long discussion followed regarding whether or not Mr. Green's sick days and vacation days stipulated in his 1977-78 contract were already earned. The contract is not specific. It would be the decision of the Board.

Mr. Durr answered questions from the Board members regarding the procedures to follow if the Board would offer Mr. Green a settlement for his resignation.

Moved by Carlisle Mick supported by Jim Walkow that a public hearing be

scheduled on August 17, 1977 and Mr. Green be notified of said hearing. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Jim Walkow supported by Ram Feldkamp to authorize the Board's attorney, Tony Durr, to offer \$2,000 on August 17, 1977 in the Study Auditorium. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Leslie asked the Board why they did not ask Mr. Green to resign. Mr. Durr said that had been implied.

Much discussion followed regarding Mr. Green's 1977-78 contract with regard to sick days, vacation and personal days stipulation and whether or not the contract had been viewed by an attorney prior to the Board signing it.

Mr. Macomber stated his personal attorney had gone over the contract and assured him it was nothing out of the ordinary.

A discussion followed with regard to having a court reporter at the August 17th hearing. Moved by Westfall supported by Durr to authorize Mr. Tony Durr

to obtain a court reporter at the hearing. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Jim Walkow supported by Ram Feldkamp to authorize the Board's attorney, Tony Durr, to offer \$2,000 in return for Mr. Green's resignation by August 1, 1977.

A discussion followed. Vote: Mick no, all others yes. Motion carried.

President Durr asked the Building and Grounds Committee if they wanted to present their proposals or table them until the next meeting.

Moved by Walkow supported by Macomber to table the Buildings and Grounds report. Mick-no. All others yes. Motion carried.

Moved by Feldkamp supported by Walkow to postpone all other items on the agenda until the next meeting. Walkow yes, Feldkamp yes, Kessler no, Westfall no, Macomber yes, Mick no, Bunney

no. Motion defeated. Helen Kessler asked John McGuire if any recommendations had been made for the hiring of an Ag Co-op teacher.

Mr. McGuire said Dave Miras and John Korician had screened the applicants and were down to 2 candidates. One candidate resigned.

Mr. McGuire recommended the hiring of the remaining candidate, Mr. Craig Outwater as Ag Co-op Teacher.

Mrs. Mick asked to see the credentials of Mr. Outwater. After the board viewed the credentials of Mr. Outwater, Susan Westfall moved that we tentatively hire Craig Outwater assuming his final teaching certificate will be awarded to him. Supported by Mick. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Outwater just graduated from Michigan State University and we have been assured that he will receive his certificate.

Moved by Walkow supported by Macomber to rescind Mr. Walkow's prior motion to table the Buildings and Grounds Committee's recommendations. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Macomber presented the recommendations from the Buildings and Grounds committee. D Enterprise roofing and Sheet

Metal Co. be awarded the job on the roof at Pleasant Lake at a price of \$11,904. 2) George Warren be hired as a consultant on all other roof repairs: Klager, High School, Middle School and Nellie Ackerson. Not to exceed \$11,000 to \$12,000 and hire local people and the custodial staff to do the work under Mr. Warren's supervision. 3) Schneider Climate Control repair boilers, not to exceed \$20,000. John McGuire said he would recommend Schneider's because they had worked on our boilers before and knew some of our problems.

Moved by Macomber supported by Feldkamp that the roofs be fixed as specified at Pleasant Lake for \$11,904 and the contract be given to Enterprise Roofing of Adrian. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Macomber supported by Kessler that we hire George Warren to work with some of our people to fix the roofs at Klager Middle School, Nellie Ackerson and the High School not to exceed \$12,000. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Macomber supported by Westfall that Mike Schneider be hired to repair the boilers and heating system not to exceed \$20,000. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Savage asked why there weren't any negotiation meetings going on with the teachers.

Mr. McGuire stated they had been con-

tacted that morning by Mr. George Johnson and the 2 dates that the teachers had given him to set up meetings for were not acceptable. One date was that very night when the Board had a meeting scheduled and the other was August 2, when Mr. Johnson was not available. There was a discussion on meeting the 4th and 5th of August, but a meeting place could not be decided upon. The Board wants to meet in the High School and the Association does not want to meet on school grounds.

Mr. Macomber said he had heard school was to begin on August 29th and wanted to know if that was so.

Mr. McGuire said it was only a rumor. However, if a reasonable amount of time would expire between negotiations the Board can arbitrarily set a date for school to begin.

A lengthy discussion followed regarding teacher negotiations.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kessler that the meeting be adjourned. All years. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned 9:55 P.M.

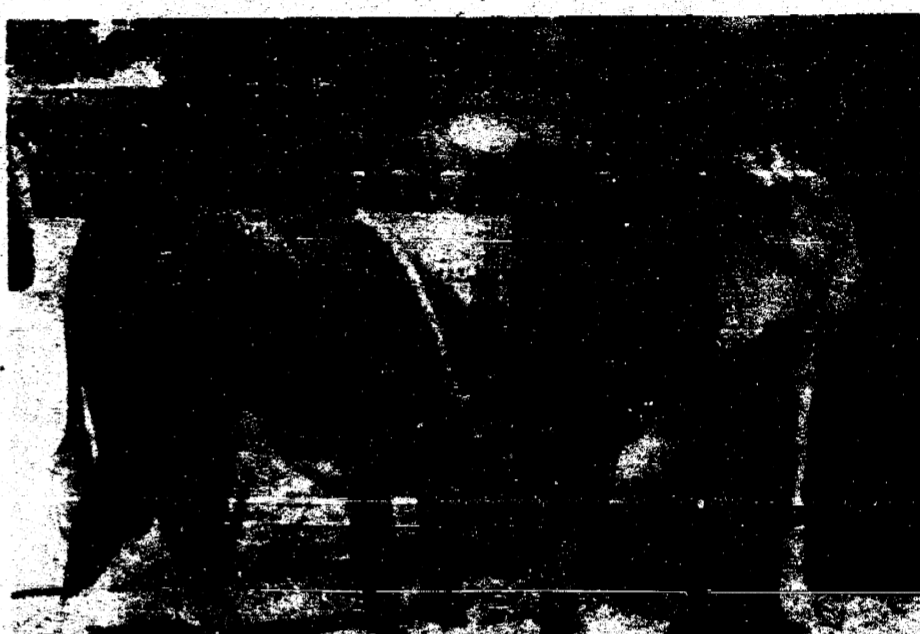
