## Manchester Community Schools To Open Tuesday, September 6th

Students in the Manchester Community Schools will return for the 1977-78 School year on September 6, 1977. All students in grades Kdg-12 will attend a half day on the opening date. Buses will be leaving fifteen minutes earlier in the morning due to the earlier starting time for school and buses will be returning your children home in the afternoon approximately forty-five minutes after the earlier dismissal time of 12:00 P.M.

Bus routes will be the same as last year for the first few days and if changes are necessary, they will be incorporated into the routes the second week of school.

Starting Wednesday, September 7, all classes will be FULL DAY and sessions as usual. Please have your child or children bring their own lunch until the sandwich program begins. Milk will be available.

**HIGH SCHOOL:** High School starting time is 8:20 a.m. Noon hour is 11:52 a.m. - 12:22 p.m. Dismissal time is 2:20 p.m. High School students will meet in a general assembly at 8:20 a.m. on Tuesday, September 6, 1977 in the gym.

**MIDDLE SCHOOL:** At the Middle School classes will start at 8:25 a.m. Students will be allowed in the building at 8:17 a.m. Fifth and sixth grade students will have their lunch period from 12:22 p.m. to 12:52 p.m., while seventh and eighth graders will be having their lunch from 11:52 a.m. to 12:22 p.m. Dismissal time for students at the Middle School will be 2:25 p.m. On the first day at school, September 6, all Middle School students will report to the gymnasium in the middle school at 8:25 a.m. A short meeting will be held at this time.

**KLAGER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL:** At Klager Elementary School the doors will open at 8:30 a.m. for classes to begin. Third and Fourth grade students will have their lunch period from 11:30 - 12:05 and first and second grade students from 12:00 - 12:35. Dismissal time for students at Klager will be 2:30 in the afternoon.

**PLEASANT LAKE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL:** At Pleasant Lake Elementary School the doors will open at 8:30 a.m. for classes to begin. The students will have their lunch periods from 11:30 - 12:05. Dismissal time for students at Pleasant

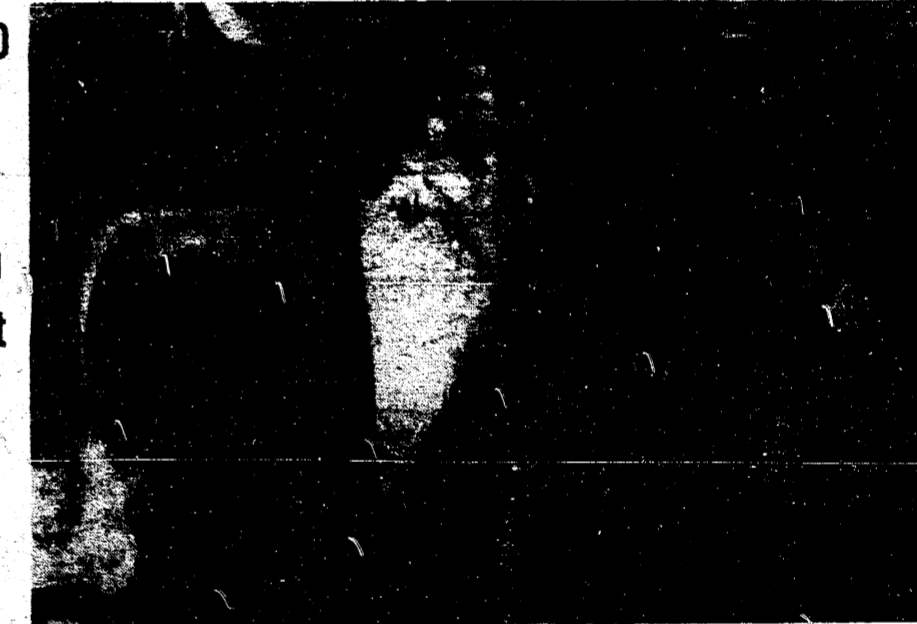

## A Report From Manchester Education Assoc

On August 15, representatives of the Manchester Education Association and the Board of Education met to receive the Association's proposals. Due to the lack of data, which was requested from the Board in June, the Association did not include the economic proposals.

In the spring the teachers had accepted the Professional Council recommendation of a school calendar for 1977-78. The

Professional Council is composed of representatives from the Board of Education and Education Association. The Board members and their spokesperson, Mr. George Johnson, did not know what the Council had recommended. The starting date of the school calendar was discussed and agreed upon by both the Board and the Association.

The Association and Board met in an all day and evening session August 15, 1977. Proposals of both parties were discussed. At the evening session a totally different calendar, then proposed by the Professional Council, was offered by the Board of Education to the Education Association.

The only agreements reached at this time is the starting date of school for the students and the first day of inservice for the teachers.

The next meeting is scheduled for August 29, 1977.

### BARBECUED SPARERIBS

Barbecued spareribs is one of the most frequently ordered dishes in Chinese restaurants. There are many different recipes for these succulent ribs, but here is one that contains no exotic or fancy ingredients. Everything in this recipe can be obtained at your regular market.

These ribs are easy, a little messy in the oven, but fun to make. The whole family will enjoy eating them. Serve with corn on the cob, salad and beer. Have plenty of damp rags or napkins on hand for finger wiping.

#### Chinese Barbecued Spareribs

Degree of difficulty: Easy  
Time: 1 1/2 hours (not including marination)  
Serving: Four  
Cost: Moderate

- Ingredients:**
- 7 rack spareribs, 2 to 3 pounds
  - 4 tablespoons soy sauce
  - 2 tablespoons dry sherry
  - 4 tablespoons chili sauce
  - 2 tablespoons brown sugar
  - 2 scallions cut in 2-inch pieces
  - 2 cloves garlic, crushed
  - 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
  - 2 tablespoons honey
  - Duck sauce

Remove any excess fat from the spareribs. With the point of the knife score the ribs by making shallow grooves on either side of the bones.

Mix all the remaining ingredients except the honey and the duck sauce in a bowl, making sure that the sugar has dissolved.

Brush the meat on both sides with the marinade. Lay the ribs flat in a roasting pan. Pour the rest of the marinade over the meat, cover with foil and refrigerate.

Marinate the ribs for at least 4 hours (overnight is ideal) turning and basting the meat halfway through.

Remove all shelves from the oven. Preheat the oven to 350°.

Reserve the marinade left in the roasting pan (you may use it for dipping the finished ribs while eating them). Rinse out the roasting pan and fill with 1 inch of water. Place in the bottom of the oven.

Lay the ribs across a grill-like oven shelf, drizzle 1 tablespoon of honey over them, and insert the shelf so the meat is in the upper third of the oven, over the pan of water. Roast for 30 minutes.

Turn the ribs, baste with some marinade and drizzle the remaining 1 tablespoon of honey over the meat. Cook for 30 minutes more.

Turn the heat up to 450°. Cook for 10 minutes more.

Remove the rack carefully and place on a cutting board. Cut into individual ribs. Serve, offering the heated marinade and duck sauce as dipping sauces.

### Board of Education

August 1, 1977  
The meeting was called to order at 8:00 P.M. by President William Bunney in the Study Auditorium.

Helen Kensler took roll call with all members being present.

The minutes of the July 18, 1977, Board meeting were read. Mr. Walkowe said his motion regarding the town bus run should have read as follows: that we run the A.M. town bus run and the P.M. Kindergarten bus until we can't afford it any longer and then discontinue them.

Moved by Westfall supported by Walkowe to approve the minutes as corrected. All yes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire asked the Board if it would be acceptable to them to put the July and August financial statement together and present it in September, due to the fact that there is not that much business transacted during those months. There were no objections from the board.

Mr. McGuire asked if there were any questions regarding the list of checks for outstanding bills. These questions were discussed.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler that the bills be approved and paid. All

yes. Motion carried.  
BUILDING AND GROUNDS—A discussion followed regarding the setting aside of \$7,000 to be used for priority items to be repaired. These items included such things as fire alarms, door locks, etc. These things need to be fixed in order to function properly.

Questions were asked whether or not the maintenance budget could run in a deficit. Mr. McGuire said it was possible. He also stated that if line items were changed there may not be \$7000 available in the maintenance area.

Mr. Bunney asked the Buildings and Grounds Committee if they had a recommendation regarding the \$7,000. Mr. Macomber said it was the Committees intent that these items be fixed before school starts.

Moved by Macomber supported by Walkowe that we expend \$7000 out of the maintenance budget to repair those items that the Buildings and Grounds committee has established.

Mrs. Mick said she agreed these things had to be done but was very hesitant about getting in debt, so she would have to vote no. All others yes. Motion carried.

The bid for the repair of the Press Box was discussed. There was a question regarding exactly what the bid would include. The bid read: press box repair and

retaining wall.  
Susan Westfall moved we accept the bid from Mr. Nickerson, with the stipulation that Mr. McGuire contact Mr. Nickerson to be sure the bid was to repair the retaining wall also.

Mrs. Mick said she didn't think the bid said what the Board was saying. She thought the Building and Grounds Committee should get some other bids and make recommendation. Vote: Mick-no, All others yes. Motion carried. President Bunney asked Mr. McGuire to contact Mr. Nickerson for a clarification of his bid.

TRANSPORTATION—A discussion regarding the town bus run took place.

Moved by Kensler supported by Walkowe that the Town Bus run be run as it was last year, not to include the PM Kindergarten pick up. Bus run to start in September and check in March to see if funds are low and if they are, discontinue it.

Susan Westfall said she would not support it for 3 reasons: 1) cut programs 2) not fair to offer a bus to some and not others and 3) can't see dropping it in the middle of the year if necessary.

Jim Walkowe said he was interested in the safety of the children first before education.

Helen Kensler said she would like special stops set-up. Not just stop anywhere.

Corliss Mick asked if there was any money available that could be paid to the Police Department for crossing guards. Mr. McGuire said he wasn't sure, however, if there was any money it would come from a State grant.

President Bunney asked if there were any further comments. There were not. A vote was taken on the motion on the floor. Susan Westfall no, all others yes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire read a letter of resignation from Ken Janofski effective August 12, 1977.

Mr. McGuire stated there are 2 proposals: 1) Hire a mechanic, either part time or full time, depending upon how much work we expect to do ourselves. If we would do most of the repair work here in our garage, we would need to

purchase some heavy duty equipment. Mr. McGuire said he had checked with some other school districts and they figure 1 fulltime mechanic to every 10 vehicles. Along with this, a person in the Central Office would do the paper work or possibly Mrs. Miller, with some of the work she is now doing be returned to the High School Office. Mr. McGuire recommended the Director of Auxiliary Services be responsible for the paper work.

2) Take bids from garages to do our mechanical work. A lengthy discussion followed. Mr. McGuire said he would recommend that we hire 1 fulltime mechanic, have the Director of Auxiliary Services responsible for the paper work and have one of the bus drivers responsible for the scheduling and assignment of extra runs.

Mr. Macomber said the Clinton School District has a part-time mechanic who also drives a bus. Their total expenditures to run their buses was approximately \$12,000 to run 14 buses. It cost Manchester \$35,461.25 to run 2 more buses.

Helen Kensler and Susan Westfall both said they thought that the amount of money spent on maintenance in Clinton was unrealistic. Helen Kensler said that the Superintendent at Clinton had said their employee is super conscientious and does more than is expected of him.

Mrs. Mick asked if a secretary could do the actual paper work after the Director of Auxiliary Services set-up the procedure.

Mr. McGuire said yes it could be done that way.

Jim Walkowe asked if the mechanic work could be done with a 1/2 time employee.

Mr. McGuire said no, not according to other Superintendents that he has talked with.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall that we place an ad in the paper asking for a fulltime mechanic.

Mick-no, Macomber-no, Walkowe-no, Westfall-yes, Kensler-yes, Bunney-no, Feldtamp-no. Motion defeated.

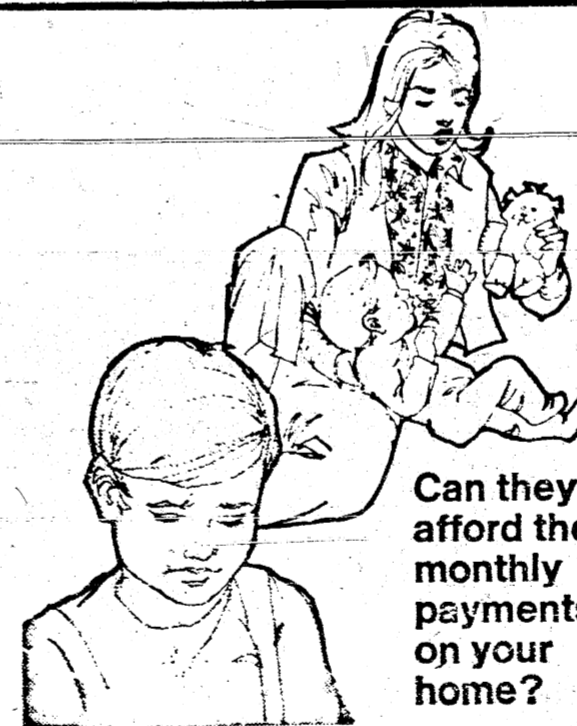
All yeas. Motion carried.

or Jim Fielder. All yeas. Motion carried. Moved by Mick supported by Macomber that the Treasurer be authorized to sign payroll checks in the absence of the Acting Superintendent. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire informed the Board that it would be necessary to borrow up to or the total amount of \$350,000 against our State Aid to meet our September payroll and other needs.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to borrow \$350,000 against our State Aid. Note to be dated September 8, 1977 payable on or before September 1, 1978.

All yeas. Motion carried. Mr. McGuire asked the Board if they wanted to take bids on this loan or negotiate lowest interest.

Bids could be acted upon at the August 15th meeting.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to take bids on our loan against our State Aid. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire stated there was a stumbling block on taking insurance bids. It would take from 60 to 90 days to prepare a bid and we don't have that much time. Our insurance premium is due. We may have to either renew our policy for a full year or perhaps for a partial year.

Mrs. Westfall asked if the error of Omission clause was in our policy, and if it was not we had better get it.

Mr. McGuire stated the gentlemen who helped Don Tassie on his Summer Special Ed. program would like his check written to him on August 9. This is not our policy, but he is leaving the country before the payroll will be written. The work is totally completed. However, if this is granted, Mr. McGuire stated it should happen only this one time and should not happen again.

Moved by Feldkamp supported by Walkow to write his check for him on August 9. All yeas. Motion carried.

President Bunney instructed Mr. McGuire to make copies of the material from MASH regarding their election of officers in Sept. so that each Board Member would have a copy to review. He also asked that the brochure for a Workshop at Eastern Michigan be run for each member.

Mrs. Westfall asked if the Administration could find out some information with regard to unemployment. If paying a rate VS. paying the actual would be to our benefit and if it's possible to change.

Mrs. Mick said she has had some calls regarding the agenda and previous Board

minutes not being put in the Enterprise. Mr. McGuire said he would see to it that the approved minutes be put in the paper after each board meeting. And the agenda for regular meetings would be no problem. However, for special meetings the Agenda items are usually not known in time.

Mrs. Westfall said in some Communities the weekly newspaper staff covers the Board meetings.

Mr. Steele was asked to do so a long time ago and he did not want to.

A long discussion followed regarding the Board minutes.

Mrs. Little asked if someone could explain the amount allotted for maintenance. Mrs. Mick stated in 1976-77 1 Mill was voted for maintenance which amounts to \$45,000. The 1977-78 budget figure is \$33,000 set aside for maintenance.

Mr. Chapin asked if there was an Internal Account. President Bunney answered yes there was. He asked if there was any money missing. President Bunney said yes, \$400. A Purchase Order was written to Mr. Green and a check issued for supplies. The supplies were never received nor was the money refunded.

Mr. Chapin asked if this could be looked into by the next meeting. President Bunney said yes it could.

Moved by Macomber supported by Walkow the meeting be adjourned. All yeas. Motion carried.

Meeting adjourned at 11:30 P.M.
