Girls Basketball-Bill Syms (junior high). Football (ass't)-Dick Fielder (varsity). Girls Basketball-Sheryl Lowe (junior varsity). Cross Country-Jim Brink. All yes. Motion carried.

After a lengthy discussion regarding the dividing of the Athletic Director's position into 2 parts, 1 Female and 1 Male, Susan Westfall moved to approve the plan and split male and female sports and change the Athletic Director to an administrative position and have 2 directors to evaluate coaches. Supported by Feldkamp. Mick no, all others yes. Motion carried.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to name Jim Fielder Boys Athletic Director and overall co-ordinator of Athletics. Salary to be set at a later date.

Dean Decker and Dave Korh have been hired to work on the roof repairs under the supervision of Mr. George Warren.

A lengthy discussion followed with regard to applying for State Aid monies under section 27 on our Debt Retirement.

It was decided by the Board that it would not be to the districts advantage to apply for State Aid.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler that we not apply for State Aid under section 27. All yes. Motion carried.

School Insurance was discussed, moved by Feldkamp supported by Westfall that we buy \$2.33 per student coverage which totals \$28,000 protection per student. All yes. Motion carried.

Moved by Westfall supported by Walkowes to support the Administrative recommendation to move the kindergarten class at Nellie Ackerson to Pleasant Lake. All yes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire stated to the Board that in the very near future a decision would have to be made with regard to the Director of Auxiliary services. He also wanted to set a time to meet with the Transportation and Finance Committees.

A discussion followed regarding Mrs. Stoll's request for 3 days pay. Due to her being placed back on hourly from salary, she lost 3 days pay because of personal matters which caused her to take time off.

SPECIAL BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

August 24, 1977

The meeting was called to order by President Wm. Bunney at 8:00 P.M. in the study auditorium.

Helen Kensler took roll call. Absent Feldkamp and Walkowes.

Fleet Insurance was the first item to be discussed.

Moved by Westfall supported by Macomber that we accept the bid from State Farm Insurance Co. of \$3,179.04 for Fleet Insurance. All yes. Motion carried.

This is a savings of \$1,323.33 compared with the bid from Farm Bureau Insurance Co.

BUS GARAGE
Mr. "Spike" Benedict from the Mobil garage will be working with another mechanic on the bus garage beginning August 25 thru the start of school on a temporary basis. At that time the Transportation Committee will come back to the Board with a final recommendation. If a recommendation is not available at that time, Mr. McGuire stated he would ask Mr. Benedict to stay with us on a temporary basis. If he would not be available, Mr. McGuire would hire a temporary person until the Board makes a final decision.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall that we hire Mr. "Spike" Benedict on a temporary basis to get our busses ready for school. All yes. Motion carried.

BOILER REPAIRS
Mr. McGuire stated he talked with Mr. Schneider from Schneider's Climate Control with respect to paying him on installments. Mr. Schneider said he would present bills for materials and work as it was completed, rather than the initial request of \$13,000 upon the acceptance of his bid.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to authorize John McGuire to agree with Mike Schneider that we will pay on an installment basis or completed work and parts. All yes. Motion carried.

HIRING OF TEACHERS
Upon the recommendations of John Kor-

ican and John McGuire, the Board moved accordingly:

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler that Judy Miller be hired for a 1 year contract to teach Home Economics. All yes. Motion carried.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall that we hire Robin Smeak to teach German with a 2 semester contract. All yes. Motion carried.

Mr. James Rommel was recommended by Brian Schick and John McGuire for the position of Guidance Counselor at the Middle School. Mick no, Macomber, Westfall, Kensler and Bunney yes. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire read a letter of resignation from Don Kirk. Moved by Westfall supported by Macomber to accept Mr. Kirk's resignation. All yes. Motion carried.

Due to Mr. Kirk's resignation, this leaves a 2nd Grade teaching position open. Mr. McGuire stated he had spoken with the Manchester Education Association thru Mary Ann Dettling and they have waived the 15 day waiting restriction. It would be his recommendation that the Board hire Yvonne Henry to fill that vacancy. Mrs. Henry was employed by the district last year under a 1 year contract as a 2nd Grade teacher.

Moved by Westfall, supported by Kensler that Yvonne Henry be hired as a 2nd grade teacher at Klager. All yes. Motion carried.

The Board asked to wait on hiring someone to fill the position of administrator/teacher at Pleasant Lake until the complete file could be reviewed.

The Board had asked for bids to repair 1) the Press Box and 2) the Retaining wall. No bids were received.

President Bunney said he thought that in lieu of not having any bids, someone should go out and solicit someone to get the press box repaired before football season.

Helen Kensler moved to rescind the motion at the previous meeting of August 15 to reject Mr. Nickerson's bid to repair the press box. Supported by Westfall, Kensler yes, Westfall yes, Mick abstain, Macomber no, Bunney no. Motion defeated.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to authorize the Acting Superintendent to get as much of the Press Box, retaining wall and the fence repaired with the

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agreement of the Athletic Committee with a ceiling of \$1,800.00. Westfall yes, Kensler yes, Mick no, Macomber no, Bunney no, Motion defeated.

A lengthy discussion followed regarding the procedure to solicit for bids and what exactly should be fixed.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall that we give John McGuire the authority to decide to get the press box fixed. Kensler yes, Westfall yes, Mick no, Macomber no, Bunney yes, motion carried.

The administrator/teacher position at Pleasant Lake was discussed.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to hire Ed Tubough as 4th grade teacher and Administrative Assistant at Pleasant Lake. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall that Ron Jansen be appointed assistant football coach at the Middle School. All years. Motion carried.

Don Tassie gave a report on his summer Special Ed. program. He said that the purpose of this program was to try to provide children who had lacked success several opportunities to improve socially & academically. The program ran for 4 weeks, 4 days per week, 6 hrs. per day. It was run on a day camp type basis, and children were included in the decision making process. There were 11 children involved, 1 certified teacher, 1 teacher aid and 1 high school student. The total cost of the program was \$2,467.00.

A discussion followed with regard to the amount of millage to be levied against our Debt Retirement.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to levy .58 mills for the 1986 Debt Fund, .70 mills for the 1987 Debt Fund and .55 mills for the 1978 Debt Fund, for the 1977 levy year. All yes. Motion carried.

The Director of Auxiliary Services position was discussed. Mr. Mains who has been filling the position of Director of Auxiliary Services on a temporary basis will be assuming his duties as Director of Community Education now that school is about to begin. Mr. McGuire recommended 3 alternatives to the Board. 1) delete the position for a period of time 2) appoint someone on a temporary basis 3) delete the position and share the duties and responsibilities among the administrative staff.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to authorize John McGuire to explore the possibilities of finding someone on a contractual basis to fill the position of Director of Auxiliary Services to take care of the necessary needs.

President Bunney asked if Mrs. Westfall's motion was authorizing John to fill that position. She said yes it was.

Mick no, Kensler yes, Westfall yes, Macomber yes, Bunney yes. Motion carried.

The number of credit hours needed for Seniors to graduate was discussed. Moved by Westfall supported by Mick

that credit hours be set at 18 with early graduation allowed for Seniors with 18 credits. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Westfall supported by Mick that Seniors with 16 credit hours be allowed to graduate with the permission of their parents and the administration. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Kensler supported by Macomber to grant a leave of absence to Janie Pitt for the 1977-78 School year. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire brought to the Board's attention a problem between the Bus Driver's Association and the Board of Education with regard to the leave of absence request of Pearlene Jordan. The Board granted Mrs. Jordan's request for a Personal leave of approximately 90 days. The Bus Driver's Association's agreement states that a personal leave of absence may be granted by the Board for a period of up to 30 days without pay, during which time the employee shall continue to accumulate seniority. Such leaves may be renewed or extended by MUTUAL agreement of the Board and the Association. At this point, the association does not agree with the Board.

Mr. McGuire's recommendation was that the motion granting Mrs. Jordan's leave be rescinded and another motion granting her a 30 day leave be made.

A lengthy discussion followed as to whether the motion should be rescinded or not.

Moved by Mick supported by Westfall that a leave of absence of 30 days be granted to Pearlene Jordan as an alternate course of action, the first course of action not being agreed upon by the Bus Driver's Association. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire asked for Board approval on the following transfers:
-Dick Fielder from 8th Grade Science to 8th Grade Science & Math.
-Ron Jansen from Middle School Physical Education to 8th Grade Science.
-Rebecca Mann from 8th Grade English to 8th Grade Social Studies.
-Sally Hanifi from 8th Grade Social Studies to 8th Grade English.

Moved by Kensler supported by Westfall to accept Mr. McGuire's recommendation on the transfers. Mick no, Macomber no, Kensler yes, Westfall yes, Bunney no. Motion defeated.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to approve the transfer of Dick Fielder to 8th Grade Science & Math from 8th Grade Science and Ron Jansen to 8th Grade Science from Physical Education. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire stated that Manchester along with 19 other schools in the county had entered into an agreement with the Washtenaw County Co-operative bid Association with regard to the milk program. 2 of these schools have withdrawn from this program, we have the same option.

However, it was Mr. McGuire's recommendation that we stay with the association because within 2 or 3 years he

feels we will see an overall savings.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler that we stay with the WISD Co-op and go with Driggs Dairy for our milk program. All years. Motion carried.

President Bunney said he has received many applications for the Superintendent's position. An interview Committee along with a screening process and date have to be established. President Bunney suggested the screening of candidates take place at the Flaming Pit in Ann Arbor. He explained that a conference room would be available to them at no cost. The only cost would be the meal for the placement Directors and possible lodging of 1 nite for the Directors that have to travel a long distance. The conference room would be available during the day for the Placement Directors to screen the applicants to a level that the Board would decide upon. The Board would meet with the Placement Directors at 5:30 to discuss the candidates that the Directors had screened.

The question was asked, how the Board got the Screening Committee.

President Bunney stated they consisted of Placement Directors from 7 Universities; Eastern, Western, Central, Michigan, Michigan State, Northern and Wayne State University.

A discussion followed regarding the screening process.

Moved by Westfall supported by Kensler to set September 14th at 5:30 P.M. at the Flaming Pit as the time for meeting with the Placement Directors in closed session to screen applicants. All years. Motion carried.

President Bunney asked for 3 volun-

teers to form a Committee to set up the interview process so when the candidates are screened a public interview can be held. Mrs. Mick, Helen Kensler and Pres. Bunney volunteered for that committee.

President Bunney asked for recommendations on the voting of the candidates for Michigan Association of School Boards, or no action at all be taken, or appoint someone to research further.

Mrs. Mick said that she would like to support Judy Rolyea. Moved by Mick supported by Macomber that the Manchester Board of Education support Judy Rolyea for 2 year term to the MASB Board. All years. Motion carried.

Corliss Mick asked that the tables be arranged differently at Board meetings. President Bunney said they could be moved out a little as long as he could still see all of the Board Members.

A lengthy discussion followed regarding an evaluation of the Summer Special Ed. Program.

It was asked if in fact we ended our fiscal year with a black balance. Mr. McGuire said yes, approximately \$9,000. A firm answer will be arrived at after the auditors have finished.

School starting times and the bus run that includes Hieber Rd, were discussed.

Moved by Macomber supported by Westfall that the meeting be adjourned. All years. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 11:40 P.M.


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


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
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
