Age 57 years, a former Manchester resident died Thursday at Park View Convalescent Center in Ypsilanti.

He was born August 5, 1920 in Ft. Barron, Alaska, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Wolfe.

**Village Planning Commission Meeting**  
 August 22, 1977

The regular (September) meeting was held this date, at the village hall, with members present: Bruce, Leeson, Daniels, Tracy, Albouse, and Duncan.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by Chairman Bruce.

Minutes of the last meeting of record, June 1, 1977, were reviewed, and as the motion by Daniels, seconded by Albouse, were unanimously approved.

A proposed Site Plan, dated July 21, 1977, for the American Legion development in the south-easterly quadrant of Duncan and Adrian Streets was studied. Mr. Ed Steele, representing the Legion, opened the meeting at 8:00, with additional site information and floor layout and elevation views of the building. The proposed Site Plan, with existing contours, anticipated land fills, existing street, etc., has been approved by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, and also the Washtenaw County Division of Building Inspection. However, there appear to be some discrepancies with the Village Planning Commission, especially with regard to size of parking spaces and driveway. It was moved by Albouse that further action be tabled pending clarification of the parking situation, to be presented at a special meeting as soon as the information can be made available. The motion was seconded by Daniels, and unanimously approved.

Adjournment was moved by Tracy, seconded by Daniels, and passed unanimously.

The meeting was declared adjourned, 9:00 P.M.

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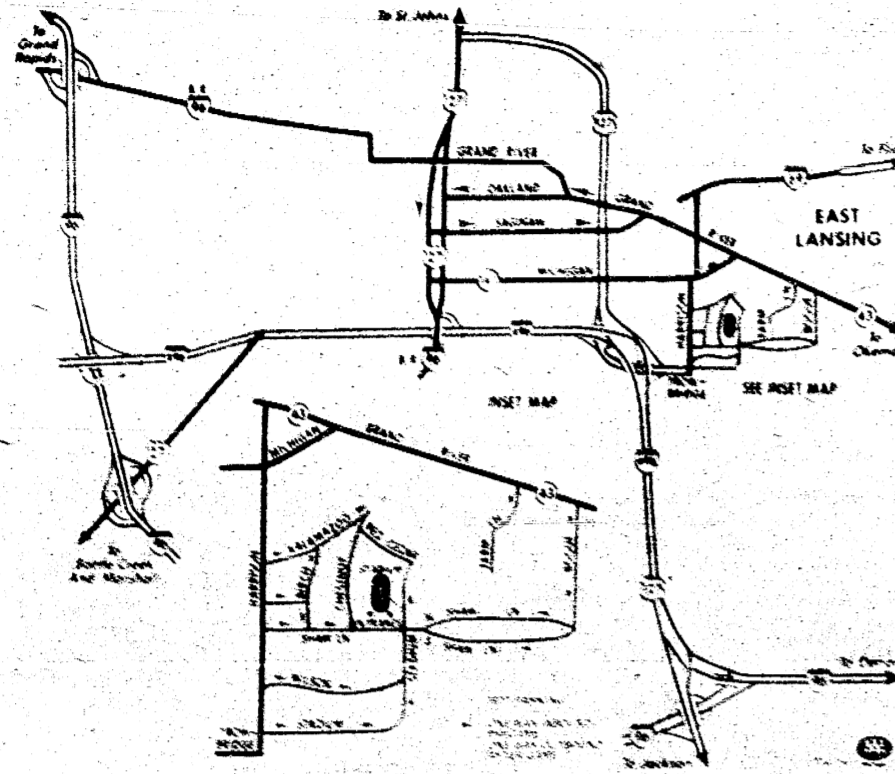
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BEST ROUTES AND PARKING AREAS FOR SPARTAN STADIUM



Motorists traveling to East Lansing for the Michigan State-University of Michigan football game Saturday (Oct. 8) should encounter few traffic problems on routes leading to the stadium area, according to Automobile Club of Michigan. However, two construction areas on I-96 could cause slowups for football fans from the Detroit and Grand Rapids areas. Detroit-area motorists will find a one-mile stretch of I-96 reduced from three lanes to two both ways near Kensington Metropark. I-96 also is reduced to one lane each way for bridge deck repairs at the junction of I-96 and I-275 just north of Grand Rapids. East Lansing streets leading to parking near Spartan Stadium are one-way in-

bound prior to the game and one-way out-bound afterward. There is parking for approximately 18,000 vehicles with a \$2 charge at campus-operated lots. Shuttle buses are available at the campus commuter lot at Farm Lane and Mt. Hope (not shown on map). The commuter lot has free parking for 6,000 vehicles with round-trip shuttle costing 75 cents. The lot can be reached by exiting northbound I-96 at Jolly Road, one mile north of I-96, and by following the signs posted along the way. Kickoff for the game is 1:30 p.m. Auto Club advises motorists to arrive at parking lots no later than 12:45 p.m. to avoid missing the kickoff.

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU LANSING

COOPERATIVES—GOOD FOR AMERICA

Remember the old philosophy—innocent until proven guilty? Today, it seems, public attitude has changed to—Guilty until innocent, through inquisition.

Farmer cooperatives, which have been around since the early 1800's, have had their turn in the "accused's box," and even though proven innocent, still bear the scars of public misunderstanding. In the frustrated consumer search for the elusive culprit that was causing increased food prices, farmer cooperatives were summoned to the witness stand as a suspect. They were BIG; therefore, they must be BAD.

They were big, but what the public forgot was that they were made up of many small farmers, some of whom could not survive, in this world of economic complexity, without their cooperatives. Groups of farmers, united through a cooperative, figure importantly in maintaining the family farm by combining efficiency in producing a commodity, with efficiency in processing and marketing it. This efficiency benefits the consumer as well as the farmer.

Perhaps cooperatives were not as aggressive as they should have been in sharing this economic fact of life with consumers, and their image was slightly tarnished by the public attacks on their system. They've been working to correct public misunderstanding, but a small article extolling the benefits of cooperatives does not make the impact on public opinion that a Sylvia Porter syndicated attack does.

October is Co-op Month, with the theme "Cooperatives are Good for America." Not just farmer cooperatives, but members of housing co-ops, credit unions, electricity and telephone services cooperatives, nursery schools, insurance companies—even bicycle cooperatives—will be telling the public why they are.

There are over 50 million people, members of more than 40,000 cooperatives in the United States, who believe that cooperatives are good for them, for their communities, and for America.

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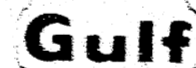

Principal John Korican announced today that two students at Manchester High School have achieved outstanding achievement in the 23rd annual National Merit Scholarship Program. These honors are the result of each student's outstanding performance on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT/NMSQT) which was administered nationwide to high school juniors in October, 1976. John Munson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Munson, of 9981 Bethel Church Road was selected as a National Merit Semi-finalist. A letter of Commendation was presented to Doug Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Wilson, of 14950 Buss Road.

Semi-finalists are the students who scored highest in their respective states, and they represent less than one-half of one percent of each state's secondary school seniors. Students selected for the commended student group represent less than two percent of the total of graduating U.S. secondary school seniors.

Only semi-finalists named in the fall of 1977 can advance to the finalist standing and be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1978. These are \$250 to \$1500 scholarships. To become finalists, semi-finalists must meet further requirements established for the competition that include being fully endorsed and recommended for scholarships by their principals, presenting school records that confirm high academic standing, and substantiating their PSAT/NMSQT scores with an equivalent performance on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT).
