

Board of Education

October 3, 1977

The Special Board of Education Meeting was called to order at 8:10 P.M. in the Study Auditorium by President Wm. Bunney.

Helen Kensler took roll call. Present: Bunney, Feldkamp, Macomber, Mick, Walkow, Westfall, and Kensler.

Administrators present: McGuire, Tassie and Tubaugh.

President Bunney said since the minutes had been passed out to the audience, the minutes would not be read. He asked the Board if there were any corrections of the September 19th Regular Meeting. Helen Kensler said she had three corrections. Moved by Walkow supported by Macomber to accept line item changes in the 1977-78 proposed budget. All yeas. Motion carried, should be inserted at the end of paragraph 2, page 3. Supported by Walkow should be inserted after moved by Kensler, in paragraph 7, page 4. Also, supported by Macomber should be inserted after moved by Mick in paragraph 9, page 4. Susan Westfall asked that she left at 10:35 be inserted between paragraphs 11 and 12, page 3.

Moved by Walkow supported by Feldkamp to approve the minutes as corrected. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire presented the financial report. Mr. McGuire said that trees had been purchased and planted at Klagier with the \$28.23 from the unused balance of the 1977 Building and Site Fund. Mr. McGuire asked if the Board wanted the financial report as it was presented, printed in the paper. Mr. Macomber said yes.

Mr. Bunney opened the bids for the station wagon. Tird Chevrolet submitted a bid of \$5,419.60 on a 1978 Impala 3 seated station wagon with a V-8 350 cu. engine. Tom Marshall Ford submitted a bid of \$5,261.33 on a 1978 L.T.D. 9 passenger station wagon with a V-8 351 cu. engine.

Walkow moved, supported by Westfall to accept Tom Marshall's bid of \$5,261.33. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire recommended that the Board finance the station wagon for 2 years, since the budget is tight. Discussion followed. It was decided to defer the matter until the next meeting. Mr. McGuire will get 2 or 3 options on financing of the station wagon.

A discussion followed on the 2 station wagons that the school owns. It was decided not to do anything about selling one of the wagons, until the new one had been received.

President Bunney presented the Board's objectives for the 1977-78 school year. Mr. Bunney asked whether the Board wanted to adopt all of the objectives or

part of them. A discussion followed. Susan Westfall offered to pull out the financial items, and break the objectives down according to committees.

Feldkamp moved, supported by Kensler that Mrs. Westfall categorize the objectives for the Board. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. Feldkamp asked whether any of the objectives should be looked into right away. Mr. McGuire said yes, three of the objectives needed attention. High School discipline, Teacher's evaluation, and the Hot Lunch program. Mr. McGuire said that the mandating of the Hot Lunch program by the State has been delayed until the fall of 1978, but there were large funds available. The Federal Government's program will pay 75% of the equipment for the bulk lunch program, but the school district would have to provide the facility. The pre-plated program would almost be fully funded. Mr. Bunney asked that the Hot Lunch program be put on the agenda for the Special Meeting on November 7th.

Mrs. Mick said that the Board objectives should be published. Mrs. Kensler said they shouldn't be published until the Board decided which objectives they would adopt.

Mr. McGuire said he would like the Board to act on the Teachers evaluation form, Teacher's handbook, and the Disciplinary Policy at the October 17th meeting. The Teacher's evaluation form will be taking the place of the old evaluation form. Mr. McGuire said he would like to implement the Teacher's handbook, and the Disciplinary Policy. A heated discussion followed.

Feldkamp moved, supported by Mick to refer the evaluation form, the handbook, and the Disciplinary policy to the Policy Committee. Mrs. Westfall said the evaluation form should not be referred to the Policy Committee, because that was an administrative decision.

Moved by Westfall supported by Walkow to amend the motion so that the evaluation form will be eliminated from the motion. All yeas. Motion carried. The vote was taken on the amended motion. Walkow no. All the rest yeas. Motion carried.

Kensler moved, supported by Westfall to give Mr. McGuire the authority to have our attorney check the policy. Mick no. all the rest yeas. Motion carried.

Mrs. Tauriainen asked why the meeting was not being taped. Mr. McGuire said that the tape recorder that the Board had been using had been taken back to Pleasant Lake School, and it was not discovered until a few minutes before the meeting, and the two tape recorders at the High School are inoperable.

Moved by Feldkamp, supported by Westfall.

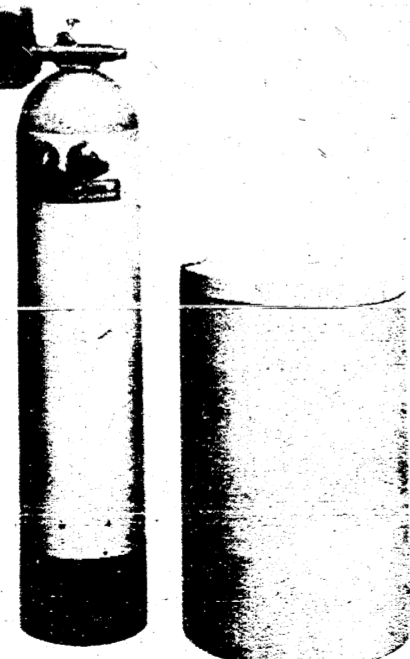

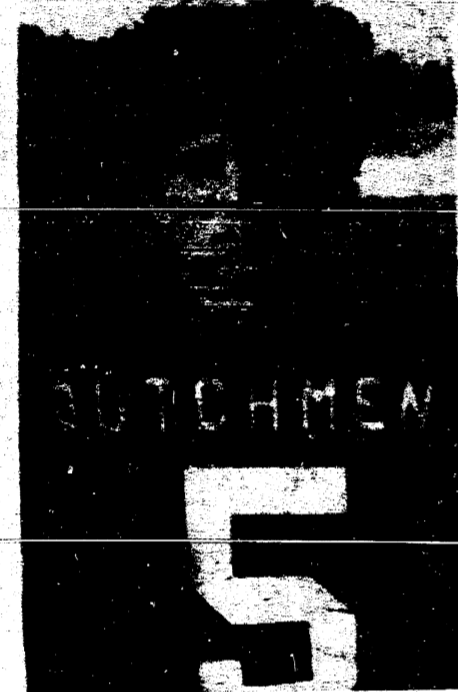

DUTCH STEAM ROLL UNBEATEN BLISSFIELD

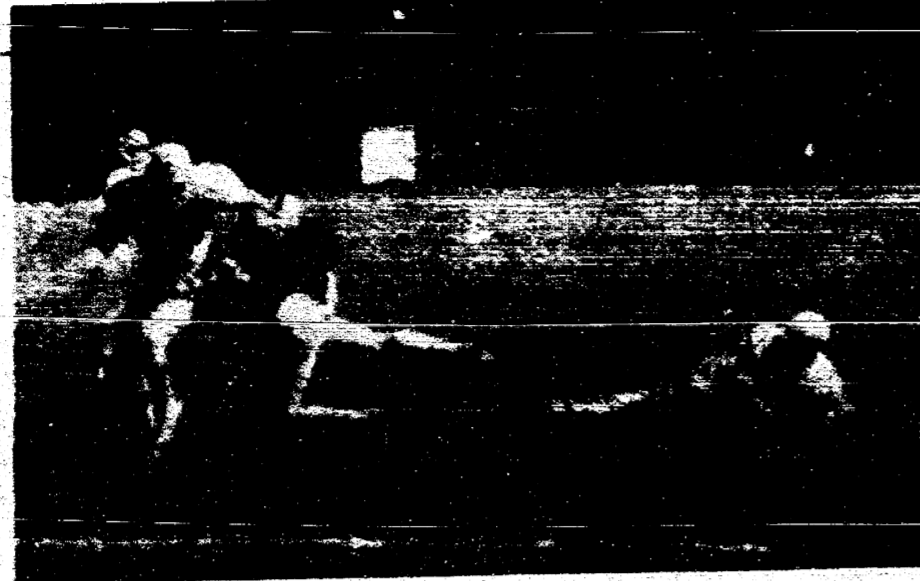


Bob Weirich-Offensive Player.

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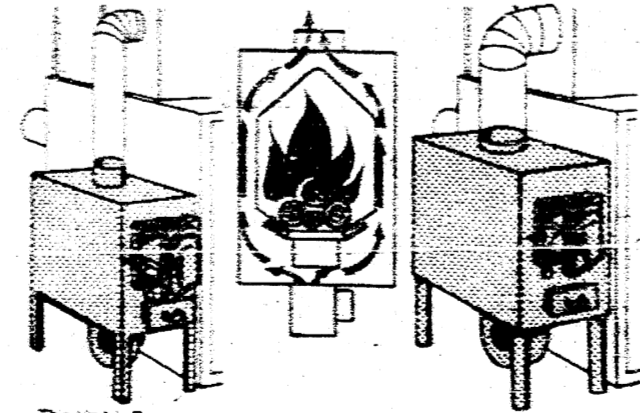
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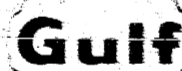


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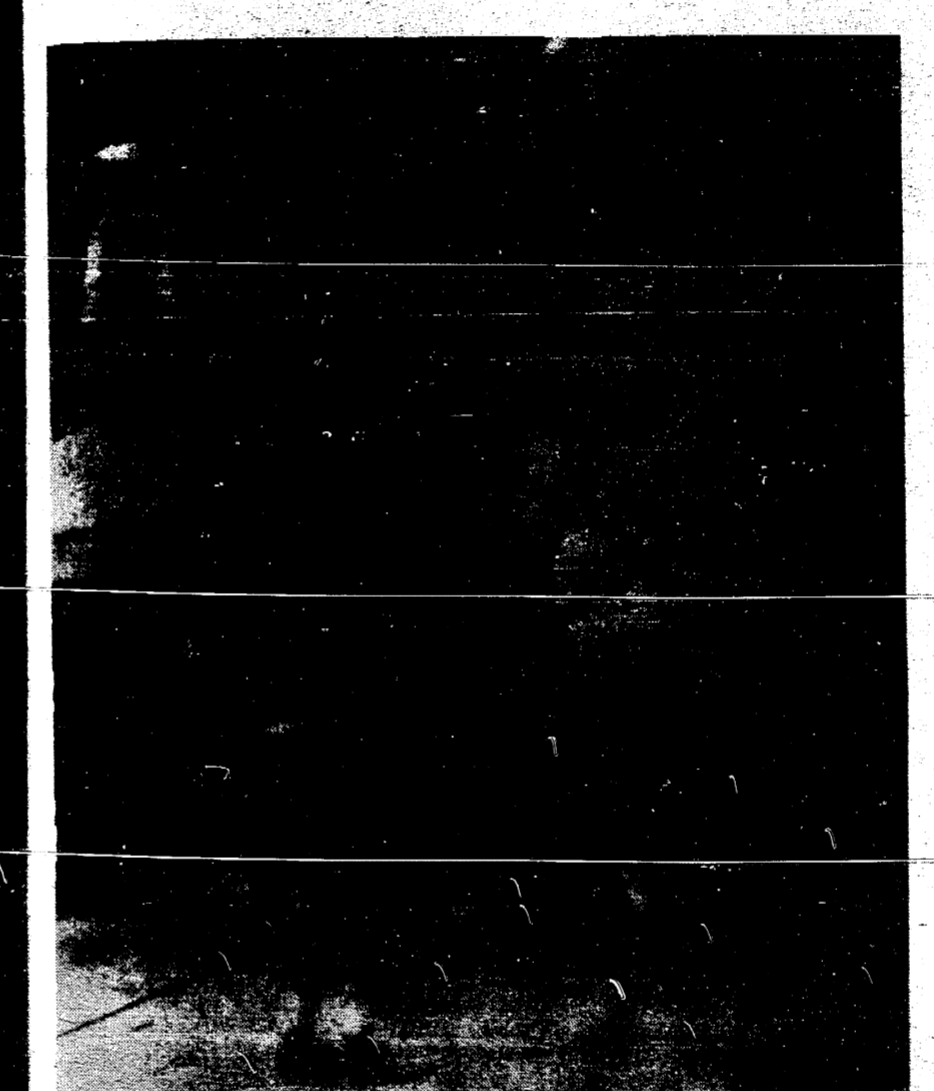

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ERA'S RPAR

One thing about Washington. If it has nothing else to do, it invents new words. Washington has brought more new words into the English language than citizens band radio has. The jargon of some government agencies has gotten so out of hand, they've had to start abbreviating some of their newly-invented phrases. That's where RPAR figures in. It stands for Rebuttable Presumption Against Registration. So, you see why the EPA decided to abbreviate it. It doesn't make any more

sense spelled out than it does abbreviated. But EPA's rebuttable presumption against registration does figure in on your daily life. About three times a day. Because RPAR can be related to higher food prices. The process allows for substitution of another chemical if one chemical is pulled off the market. Such is the case with Toxaphene. The EPA wants to ban that agricultural pesticide. It's been linked with liver tumors in mice which have been exposed to doses about a thousand times higher than humans might get for a lifetime. The EPA wants to pull it, and allow farmers to use a substitute. But there are no substitutes in Toxaphene's price range. And, claiming that there's no evidence that Toxaphene has ever hurt humans, farmers want to keep using Toxaphene.

Without Toxaphene, the cost of farming will go up, and more crops will be lost to insects. It's estimated that insect damage now costs agriculture about three-and-a-half billion dollars a year. Without Toxaphene, another billion would be added to that total.

Of course, these costs are eventually passed along to those of us who consume agricultural products. And that's just about all of us.

their blood pressure checked regularly. During days when you are not feeling quite right or feel dizzy your body could be giving you a warning about some of the illnesses associated with high blood pressure such as blindness, kidney disease, stroke and heart disease.

There will be two stations set up and conducted by personnel from the Saline Community Hospital. Everyone will have their blood pressure taken and recorded, you will then be informed if it is within the normal range or further tests should be taken. Everyone is encouraged to take advantage of this program offered by Community Education for their better physical health. As mentioned there is no charge for participation in this program.

Burch reported that there is \$6,373.76 in the General Fund. Robert Trent and Charles Steele were present on behalf of the Manchester Sportsman Club. 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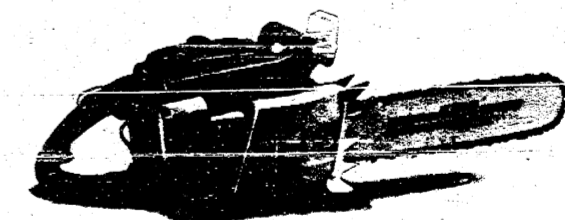
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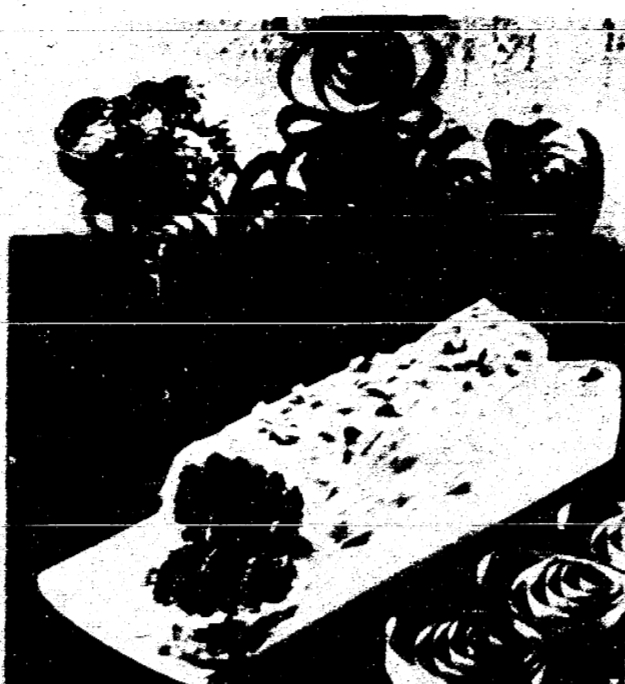

VERMICELLI WITH MUSHROOMS

- 1 pound fresh mushrooms or 2 cans (5 to 6 oz. each) sliced mushrooms
- 5 tablespoons butter or margarine, divided
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 1 package (16 oz.) frozen peas, thawed
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 5 ounces vermicelli, very thin spaghetti

Rinse, pat dry and slice fresh mushrooms (makes about 5 cups) or drain canned mushrooms; set aside. In a large skillet melt 4 tablespoons of the butter. Add onion and garlic; saute for 3 minutes. Add reserved mushrooms; saute for 5 minutes. Stir in peas, lemon juice, salt and black pepper. Cover and simmer for 5 minutes. Cook vermicelli as package label directs; drain. Place in a serving bowl; add remaining 4 tablespoons butter; toss to blend. Stir in mushroom mixture. Serve immediately with grated Parmesan cheese, if desired. Yield: 4 to 6 portions.

Household Hints

FIREPLACE BRICKS—Restore your red fireplace brick to its original color by first washing the bricks with water, and allowing them to dry thoroughly before putting boiled, linseed oil on the bricks with an old toothbrush. Be sure to put the linseed oil on sparingly, to allow the oil to be completely absorbed.

TONGUE SAVER—Use an ice cube in a saucer as a moisture when you have a lot of envelopes and stamps to lick.

CAKE BAKING—Airholes in your cakes can be prevented by pouring the batter through a slit spoon.

RENEWED UMBRELLA—You can make an old umbrella look practically new again by brushing the fabric with a solution of ammonia and warm water.

FRESH SMELLING CLOSETS—To keep your clothes closets clean smelling, try tying a pretty ribbon around a cake of toilet soap and hanging this in your closet.

YELLOWED LAUNDRY—If your clothing has acquired a yellowish tinge, try using a little less soap in your wash.

PIANO KEYS—Clean yellowed piano keys with a half lemon rubbed over them, and then covered with chalk dust. Let it dry, then brush the dust off, and polish the keys with a soft cloth.

SMALL RUGS—Stroke diagonally when vacuuming small rugs. The rug is less likely to wrinkle and get caught in the sweeper.

LEAKING VASE—Coat the inside of a leaking vase with a thick layer of paraffin. Allow this to dry, and it should last indefinitely.
