MANCHESTER COMMUNITY SCHOOLS today announced its policy for Free Milk, for children unable to pay the full price of milk served under the Special Milk Program. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility: Total Family Size and A Scale For Free Milk are: 1-\$5,350, 2-\$5,100, 3-\$6,390, 4-\$7,610, 5-\$8,740, 6-\$9,860, 7-\$18,890, 8-\$11,910, 9-\$12,840, 10-\$13,760, 11-\$14,680, 12-\$15,590. Each Additional Family Member \$910. Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply. Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes. In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for free milk for them, it should contact the school. Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free milk if total family income including welfare payments, unemployment compensation and sub-pay benefits fall within the prescribed family income guidelines. In the operation of special milk programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin. Under the provisions of the policy John McGuire will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he or she may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent, 710 E. Main St., Manchester, Michigan 48138 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an Outline of the hearing procedure.

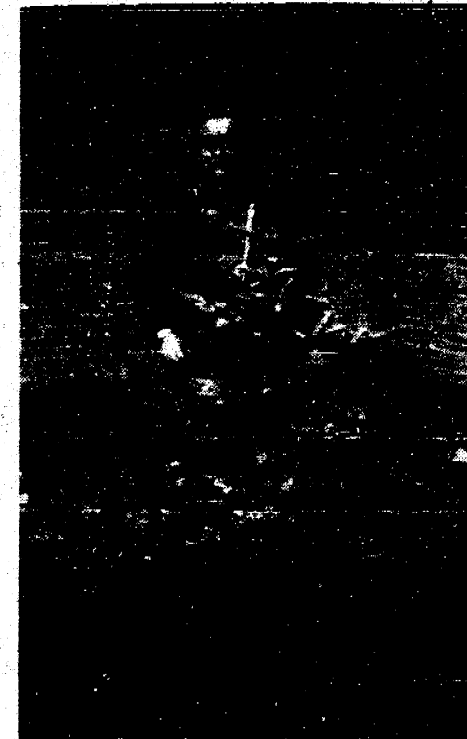

FIRST HONOR TO THE BOYS

Manchester Gives First Aid to Boys of Township Who Registered For the War.

One hundred twelve young men stepped proudly and manfully forward Tuesday morning and registered their names, showing their willingness to obey the first call of President Wilson for men to defend American rights and to give freedom to the peoples of the world.

The number may seem small in proportion to some villages no larger than Manchester, but when we take into consideration that there is very little manufacturing done here, our boys, all of whom want to work, seek employment in the nearby cities, we think the matter is explained.

Then they marched to Arbetter hall where Rev. Johnson gave a splendid talk, Miss Nagi and Will Kramer sang and those who cared to, remained and danced.

If you are not an athlete then you are nothing because what is there besides sports? Now, I have nothing against sports mind you, but I think it is about time the band started getting a better deal. Don't ever take the band for granted. Don't ever say that the band isn't spirited enough or doesn't care because when attitudes like these exist in our band, and they do, they are brought on by the lack of support and consideration by the people in this community. The Band is laughed at, kicked around and treated like dirt. Our half-time shows are not noticed and are often taken over by Athletic Booster announcements and cheerleader routines. We don't sound like the U of M band, but then how many people really care if we even bother to play? Our football players can't use equipment that is a year or two old. We have a baritone sax, a bass, baritone, french horns, woodwinds and percussion equipment that come from the Civil War ERA and the administration has not even thought about replacing them. Don't bother to say we don't practice as much as the athletes. I personally feel that I practice more in one month than any athlete does all season. I care about what I do in music and there are 40 others that care what they do also are proud of our band and I don't think any of the basketball, football, volleyball and other players come even close to deserving us at their games. Village Planning Commission

September 28, 1977

A special meeting of the Manchester Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present: Broucek, Leeson, Whittington, Krauss, Chapin, and Tracy.

The meeting was called to order at

7:30 p.m. by Chairman Broucek.

Minutes of the last meeting were read, and on the motion by Krauss, seconded by Whittington, were unanimously approved.

Purpose of the meeting was to further consider the American Legion project, which was tabled at the meeting of August 31, 1977.

Mr. Ed Steele, representing the Legion, entered the meeting at 7:55. Both the State and the County agencies have approved an additional ten feet of land-fill on the flood plain. Parking spaces are indicated as 9 feet by 20 feet, and driveways are to be 21 feet in width. Total parking spaces will be 102. Seating capacity of the building will be 400. Tracy moved that the Proposed Site Plan be approved with the provision that the parking areas and driveways be blacktopped within a period of one year from the date of occupancy permit. Seconded by Whittington, and passed unanimously.

(Note: Afore referenced "Proposed Site Plan"; by Ed Beaume, Manchester, Michigan; dated 31 July, 1977, Rev. 9-12-77, copy marked "Exhibit, 9-28-77, M.V.P.C., Laurin F. Leeson, Secretary, retained in file until completion of project.

Chapin moved that if no other business is forthcoming in the meantime, the regular meeting for October will be omitted. Motion seconded by Tracy, and unanimously passed.

The meeting was declared adjourned at 8:25 PM.

With reference to action taken, subsequent investigation reveals that the Zoning Ordinance, Article 51.0, Section 51.01 (Off-street Parking), sub-paragraph D, specifies the minimum width of parking spaces to be 10 feet; also, sub-paragraph D-1, specifies that aisles shall have a minimum width of 22 feet for ninety degree or perpendicular parking.

A telephone poll of members present at the meeting, by Chairman Broucek, indicates consensus that these specifications should be met. A representative of the Legion has likewise agreed. It is therefore recommended that final approval of the project by the Village Council shall be contingent upon compliance with these (2) exceptions from the referenced "Proposed Site Plan", and that a revised Site Plan, incorporating these changes shall be filed forthwith.

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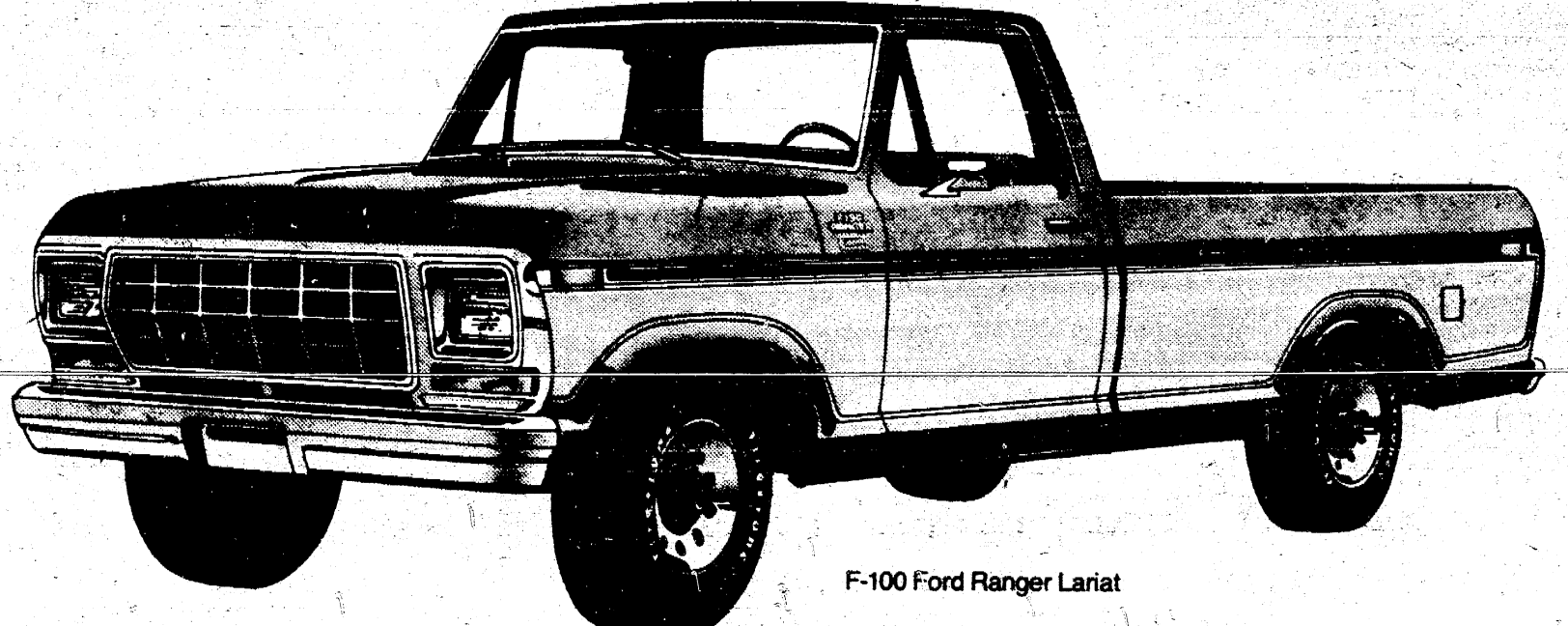

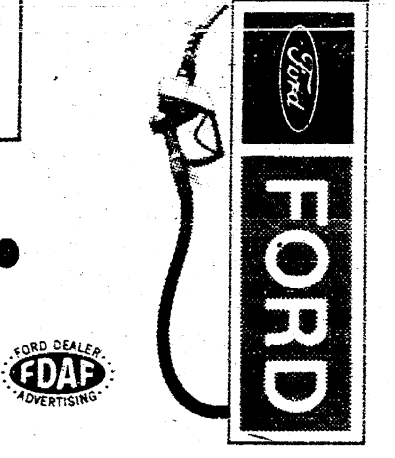

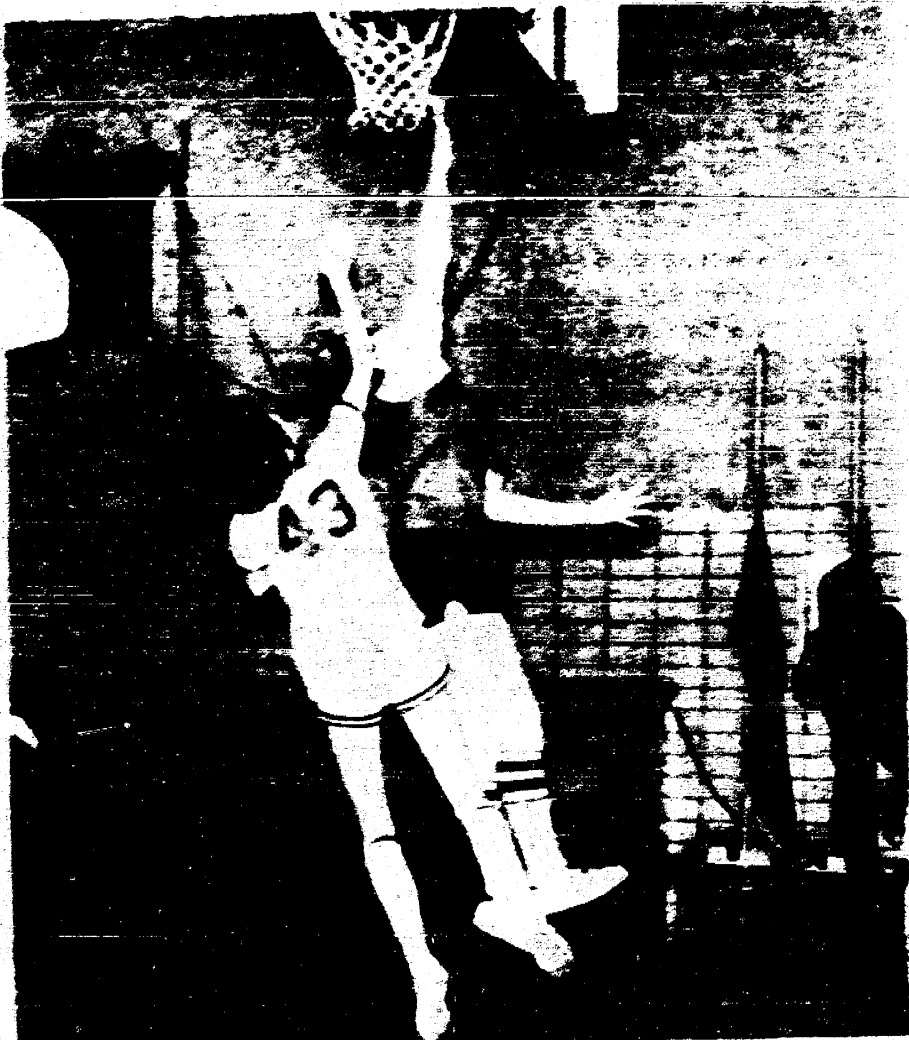
Dutch Drop Season Finale 20-16

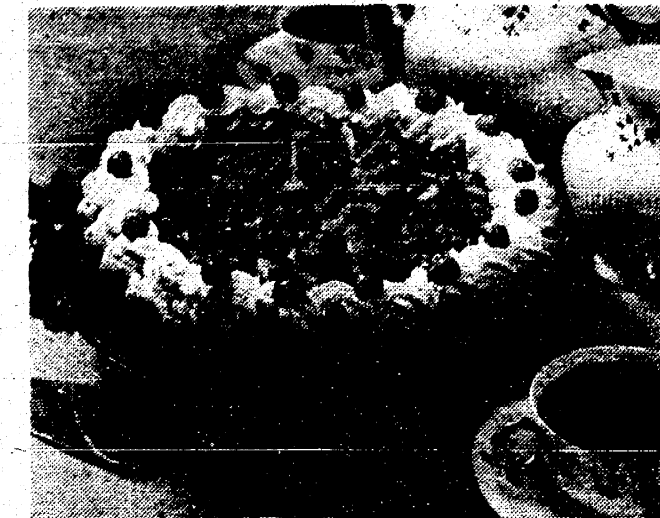

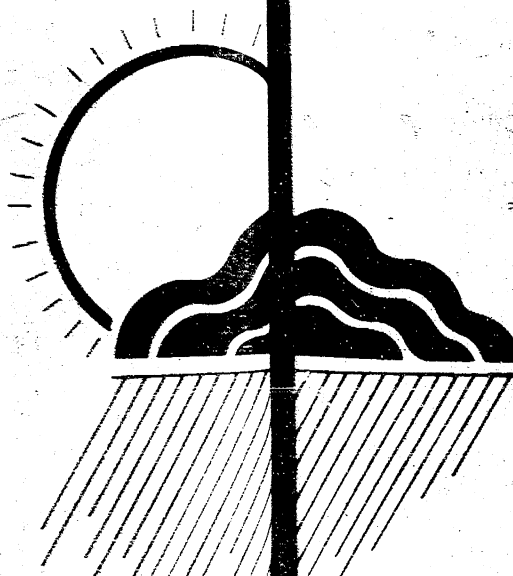
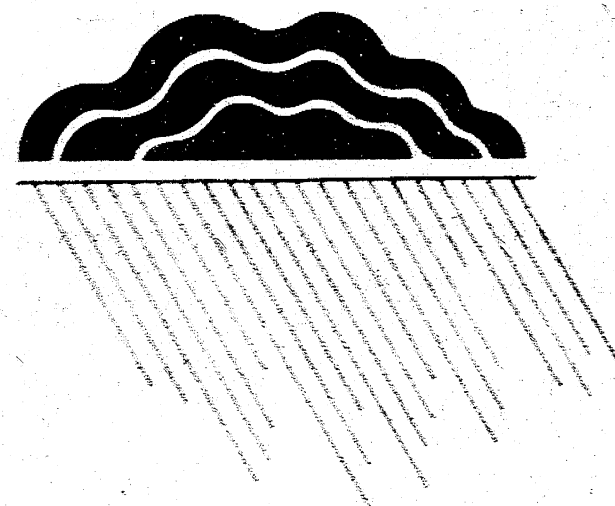

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

STUPEFYING FEDERAL REGULATIONS

There is a glimmer of hope that the Carter administration is trying to do something about those stupefying federal regulations.

President Carter has decreed that henceforth, all rules and regulations issued by the government shall be written in plain English and he has directed that his department and agency heads read all those issued regulations personally to make sure that the decree is carried out. The theory is, no doubt, that if a member of the Cabinet can understand a regulation, then anyone can understand it.

James H. Minor, regarded by some as the nation's foremost authority on bureaucratic language, and a lawyer himself, has been the main instructor at a series of special workshops that have been held for the writers of regulations.

"Regulations are almost guaranteed to be written in gobbledygook," says Minor, "because they are often drafted by lawyers who favor 16th century words like 'deemed' and 'whereas' and 'aforesaid.'"

He used this paragraph in the workshops to illustrate his point:

"We respectfully petition, request and

entreat that due and adequate provision be made, this day and the date hereinafter subscribed, for the satisfying of this petitioner's nutritional requirements and for the organizing of such methods as may be deemed necessary and proper to assure the reception by and for said petitioner of such quantities of baked cereal products as shall, in the judgement of the aforesaid petitioner, constitute a sufficient supply thereof."

Translated, he said, that means "Give us this day our daily bread."

But there's another side to be considered. If the government starts writing all those rules and regulations in plain English, what excuse are they going to have for not enforcing them?

October 17, 1977

Daniels was asked to wheel off the Village portion for distance and obtain information from McNamee, Porter and Seeley for the estimated 1971 job figures to ascertain what credit should be allowed Limpert on the Washington St. sewer extension.

Minutes from the October 10 Special Meeting were read and approved in a motion by Denhoff, supported by Scully. All yeas, carried.

Little reported that the Chi-Bro Park application had been received by U S Dept. of Interior, which is the final review stage.

Moved by Kennedy, supported by Denhoff to change the allocation of interest of the Sewer and Water Fund from the Park Fund to the Sewer and Water Fund. All yeas, carried. The clerk was asked to check into allocation of interest on Act 51 monies.

Schaffer listed permits: Building; Walz-Parr Road, Kwale-City Road, Dresch-Vernon Street, Scheid-Territorial, Irv. Roberts-Wolverine Street. Plumbing: Coffey, Rickelmann.

Jeff Schaffer, referring to the meeting with Allen Schaffer in Attorney Roesch's office asked about the possibility of any grant money being available from the EDA as mentioned at that meeting. 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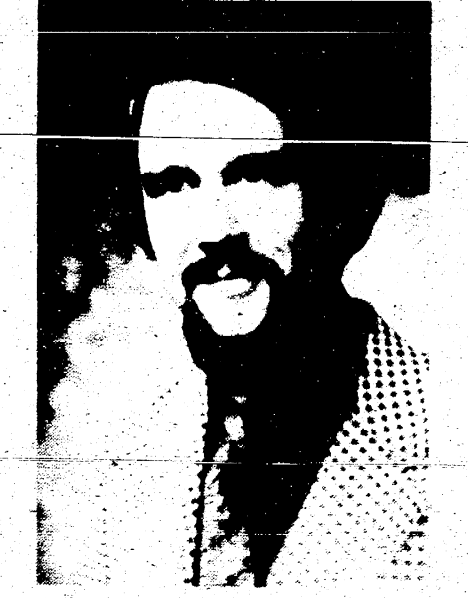

First, I asked this question, "What did you spend and what did you buy everyone last Christmas gifting season?" She didn't know.

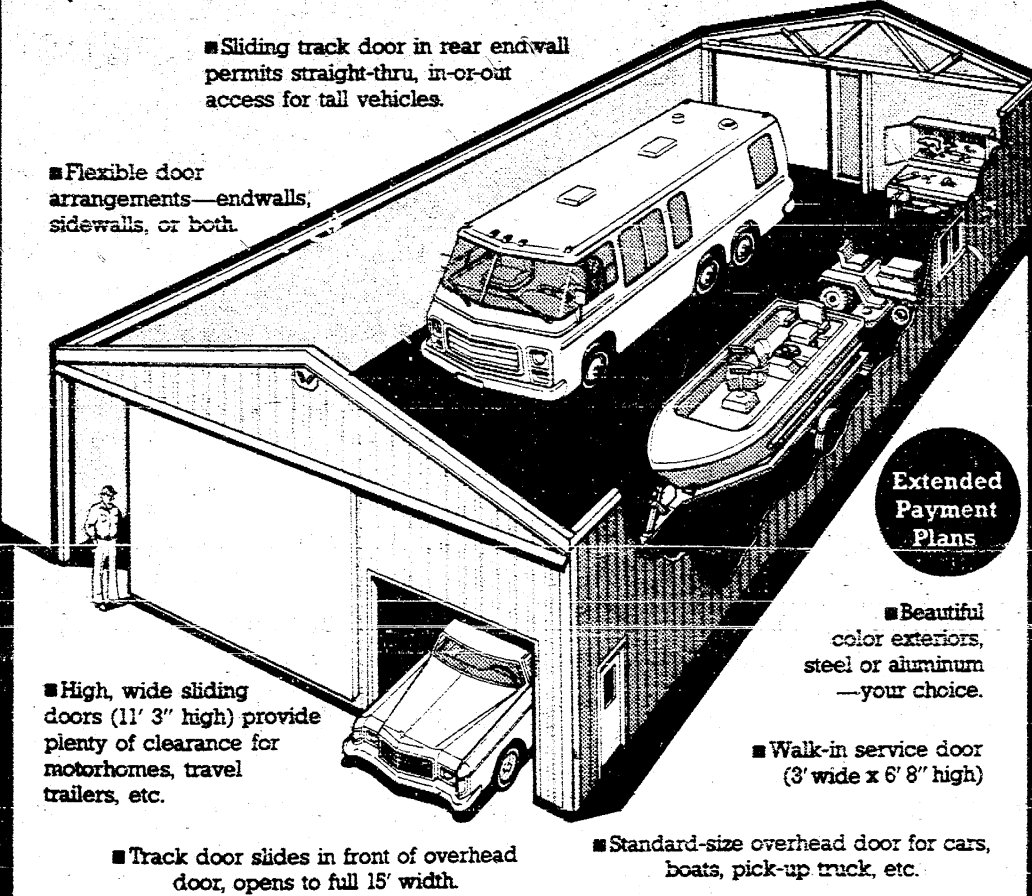
Then I explained that your check-book register can be used for this purpose, too. How nice it is to look back and say to yourself I know what I bought last year and now I know what I should be looking for this year.

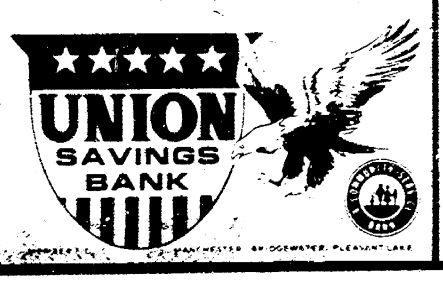
