STUPEPYING PEDEITAL REGULATIONS

There is a glimmer of hope that the Carter administration is trying to do something about those stupelying federal regula-

President Carter has decreed that henceforth, all rules and regulations issued by the government shall be written in plain English and he has directed that his department and agency heads read all those issued regulations personally to make sure that the decree is carried out. The theory is, no doubt, that if a member of the Cabinet can understand a regulation, then anyone can understand

James B. Minor, regarded by some as the nation's foremost authority on bureaucratic language, and a lawyer himself, has been the main instructor at a series of special workshops that have been held for the writers of regulations.

"Regulations are almost guaranteed to be written in gobbledygook," says Minor, "because they are often drafted by lawyers who favor 16th century words like 'doemed' and 'whereas' and 'aforesaid'."

He used this paragraph in the workshops to illustrate his point: "We respectfully petition, request and






