Farmers '78 Planting To Be Helped By Farm Survey

Estimates of number of cattle, hogs, and chicken plus acreage of winter wheat planted will be the target of a major nationwide farm survey. The survey will be conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in late November and December.

Don J. Fedewa, Statistician in Charge of the Michigan Crop Reporting Service, explained that estimates developed from this annual survey are considered critical and vital to those making decisions in agriculture. The information aids producers, processors, planners, and others in managing output and marketing operations. The livestock numbers developed from this survey will be used to make inventory adjustments in view of available feed supplies and prices. An item of special interest in the coming estimates, will be how the acreage of winter wheat farmers planted this fall has been affected by low prices, wet weather, and large U.S. and world supplies. The estimates will be available through the Michigan Crop Reporting Service office in Lansing in December for wheat, hogs, and poultry; and late January for cattle.

The survey results rely on cooperation from thousands of producers in Michigan and across the country. Farmers will be contacted by mail, telephone or personal interview. Producers visited by local USDA representatives serve as a cross section of all the nation's farmers. All responses are kept confidential.

**Red Cross Suggest
Highway Survival Kit**

Disasters on the highways during snow
storms and blizzards can be alleviated
if the traveller will carry a survival
kit with him during the winter months.
The American Red Cross Disaster Co-
chairmen for Washtenaw County, Dale
Richards and Jack Gray, have rec-
ommended that travellers carry the
following items in their survival kit when
travelling the highways during the winter
season:
1. Emergency drinking water in a plastic
jug.
2. Canned foods which can be easily
opened and eaten and a can opener should
be carried at all times.
3. Instant coffee and instant soups as
well as candy bars, should be carried for
each member of the family who is
travelling.

4. It is also suggested that a small
sterno stove with matches and a small
pan or kettle be carried for heating water.
5. Blankets or sleeping bags should also
be carried if the trip is to be an ex-
tended one.
6. A flashlight and emergency flares,
toilet paper and a disposable emergency
container for waste material should be
carried.
7. If individuals are going to be travelling
for any length of time, they should carry
prescriptions for drugs which they might
need.
8. And, last but not least, every auto-
mobile should have an emergency first
aid kit.
Snowmobilers and four-wheel drivers
for Washtenaw County, who serve under
the chairmanship of Daniel Windler, meet
the needs of stranded travellers and res-
idents of Washtenaw County who might be
isolated on back roads during heavy winter
storms.
The county is divided into fifteen emer-
gency zones each of which has as its
center a shelter in a public school build-
ing or major church in the area. Each
zone has a team of snowmobilers and
four-wheel drivers, as well as a shelter
management team to which individuals
may go in the event of a disaster whether
it be blizzard snow conditions, tornado
or other disaster.

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A MODERN MYSTERY.
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Village Council Proceedings

November 7, 1977

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:00 p.m. Present were Daniels, Denhoff, Fitzgerald, Kennedy, Schaffer, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Duncan. Minutes from the October 17, 1977 regular meeting were read and corrected. Moved by Scully supported by Denhoff to approve the minutes. All yeas, carried.

Little informed Council that the Chibro Park grant application had been approved for \$17,720. The final paperwork will take approximately 21 days. Enter Duncan at 7:15 p.m.

Public Works activities have included placing a new gas tank and pumps at the Public Works and Police Station, cleaning up leaves in the parks, winterizing the park restrooms, tapping in two water services, picking up leaves, sweeping streets, patching asphalt, checking fire hydrants and checking on sewer pipes with McNamee, Porter and Seeley for the time Mr. Limpert had installed the line to Mill Pond Village Apartments. The estimated price on the sewer at that time would be \$11.00 per foot for an 8" sewer.

Fitzgerald indicated that a dump truck had become available at Chrysler Proving Grounds. Quotes were requested from the local Ford and Chevrolet dealers to check on the feasibility of purchasing the vehicle

locally. Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Schaffer to seek formal bids from Tiro Chevrolet and Tom Marshall Ford with delivery dates, leaving the decision of purchase up to the Public Works committee subject to their reviewing the bids received. All yeas, carried.

Roesch advised Council of the amount of credit due Limpert based on 1971 prices. The following resolution was offered by Kennedy and supported by Duncan: WHEREAS D.E. Limpert Co., Inc. did in development of premises situated on North Washington Street in the Village of Manchester install a trunk sewer line in said street at a cost of \$3426.00 and WHEREAS \$1826.00 dollars of said cost provided sewer service to premises belonging to others and WHEREAS such extension is of general benefit to the Village of Manchester by expanding its sewer and water system and WHEREAS D.E. Limpert Co., Inc., in the process of developing abutting premises belonging to him located on North Washington by construction of additional residences thereon NOW: be it resolved that said D.E. Limpert Co., Inc. be given credit of \$1826.00 against service tap fees for connection to the aforesaid sewer line installed and paid for by him such credit to be personal to said company and not transferrable or assigned. Kennedy, Denhoff, Scully, Fitzgerald, Duncan; yeas: Schaffer; nay. Motion carried.

Hoesch presented the agreement with Union Construction Company which he had been requested to draw up. Moved by Duncan, supported by Denhoff to approve the accompanying agreement. Scully-abstain; Fitzgerald-yea; Duncan-yea; Denhoff-yea; Kennedy-abstain; Schaffer-nay; Little-yea; motion carried. A resolution (copy accompanying) was offered by Denhoff, supported by Fitzgerald regarding the allocation of credit per contract with Union Construction Company. Schaffer-abstain; Kennedy-abstain; Denhoff-yea; Duncan-yea; Fitzgerald-yea; Scully-abstain; Little-yea. Motion carried.

Ordinance 101, AN ORDINANCE TO DESIGNATE AN ENFORCING AGENCY TO DISCHARGE THE RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF ACT 230 PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN, 1972, STATE CONSTRUCTION CODE ACT, was presented for adoption. Moved by Schaffer, supported by Fitzgerald to adopt the aforementioned ordinance. All yeas, carried.

A resolution relative to the repair of water and sewer lines was proposed. Resolved by Kennedy, supported by Fitzgerald that when water or sewer service lines within the Village of Manchester are repaired by the Village of Manchester Department of Public Works, the actual cost of such repair including reasonable labor charges be billed to the owner of the premises serviced by such water or sewer service line where such repair within the property lines of the premises served and beyond the curb box or corporation stop. Cost of repair of water and sewer service lines from the distribution or trunk water and sewer mains to the curb box or property line shall be paid from the appropriate water and sewer fund. All yeas, carried.

Limpert made a presentation relative to the further development of the Mill Pond Apartments. He requested a site plan re-

view and would like to begin on building #2 an eight unit building, after all necessary requirements are met. Moved by Duncan, supported by Scully that the plans be forwarded to the Village Planning Commission for preliminary site review. All yeas, carried.

Limpert advised Council that he had purchased the old blacksmith shop with the intention of restoring it and giving it to the community, either to the Township or the Village. He has asked both governmental bodies to propose possible uses for the building which he will review before deciding to which unit the building will be given. Little asked Duncan to discuss the issue with the Planning Commission.

Zsenyuk advised Council that the police department is gearing up for the change to a 911 emergency listing. As of November 20 the 971-3911 number will be emergency help. The number will be manned by State Police. Hopefully, by the end of 1978 the number will be shortened to 911.

Zsenyuk presented a list of police officers cited for meritorious police work. They include: Michael Tindall, Michael Zsenyuk, Bart Van Matre, Donald Steele, David Minick, Angela Knauss and Dennis Sannes.

Kennedy related that he had been approached regarding the cold patching of an area on the corner of East Main and Adrian Street. Council related to him that the area would be repaved in the spring. A complaint was received from Tom Kallewaad regarding trucks on his lawn. Kennedy also indicated that he had been approached by Willard Mann on the Mill situation. Council felt that enough had been said on that matter.

Moved by Kennedy, supported by Denhoff to approve payment of bills as listed. All yeas, carried.

PROJECTS FOR KIDS

You've probably seen a sweet potato vine growing in a jar of water. But did you know that you could grow some flowering bulbs in water, too?

J. Lee Taylor, professor of horticulture at Michigan State University, says you can grow flowering plants from bulbs even in the middle of the winter. The trick is to choose the right bulb and take care of it properly.

The best bulbs for forcing into mid-winter bloom are the paper white narcissus, a yellow variety, Grand Soleil d'Or, is also sold for this use.

Put a layer of clean, washed sand or pea gravel in the bottom of a bowl two to three inches deep. Set the bulbs in the sand or gravel so the tops and necks are not covered. Then pour water into the bowl so that it comes almost to the surface

of the material.

Place the bowl in a cool place—about 60 degrees F.—that is brightly lighted. Check every day and add water as needed to keep the water level near the top of the gravel. Food stored in the bulb will be all the plant needs to grow and flower. Blossoms should appear in six to eight weeks.

If you want a more difficult project, try forcing hyacinth bulbs. Special hyacinth glasses can be used for forcing. They are not necessary, however. You can substitute an ordinary paper or plastic cup and an empty jar.

Cut a hole in the bottom of the cup so the bulb will sit in the bottom without falling through. Fill the jar with water and set the cup with the bulb in the top of the jar. The water level in the jar should be just below the roots of the bulb.

Hyacinths are cold-climate bulbs. They need a cold treatment before they will bloom. Hyacinth bulbs planted outdoors get their cold treatment in the ground. Cold-treat bulbs for forcing indoors by placing the bulb and glass in a cool, dark place—about 45 degrees F.—for 10-12 weeks.

Check the jars regularly and add water as necessary. When the bulb sprout is two inches long, or when you can see or

feel the flower bud, move the jar into a brightly lighted spot. It will bloom in one to three weeks.

Bulbs that have been forced once should not be forced again. Narcissus should be thrown away after they have flowered. Hyacinths may be planted outdoors, but they will probably not do well.

WHAT HAPPENED TO STEEL?

The Council on Wage and Price Stability recently reported the American steel industry is beyond help. The report said steel prices have jumped 79 percent since 1972 and steel workers earn 60 percent more than other industrial workers. With this terrible inflation, the steel industry has priced itself out of the world market and made it cheaper to import steel here at home.

When a commodity as basic as steel is in trouble, it spells trouble for our whole economy, but maybe there is a lesson in it all.

Steel got this way by giving into excessive wage demands. Failing to modernize, falling victim to government regulation and arbitrarily hiking prices to make up for it. It would be easy for agriculture to fall victim to the same excesses.

We could raise price supports higher and higher until one day agriculture too would be priced out of the world market.

Let's say we did raise price supports to high levels and government came along with more regulations on pesticides or regulations on the size of farms. Even-

tually price supports would have to be higher as regulations pushed up the cost of farming. Before long, agriculture would find itself in the same shape as steel, calling for relief from imports with which it can no longer compete.

Fortunately American agriculture is still very competitive on the world market, perhaps more so than any other segment of our economy. We could even be more competitive if trade barriers did not stand in our way but as in the case of our own steel industry, when other nations cannot keep up, they tend to protect their producers from the competition.

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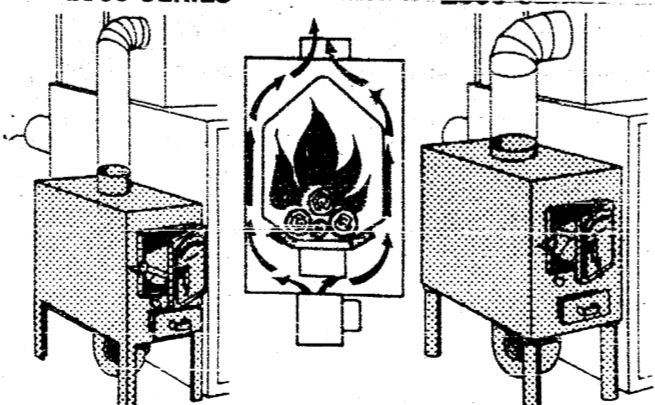

Turkey Tomorrow

Turkey Curry On Rice

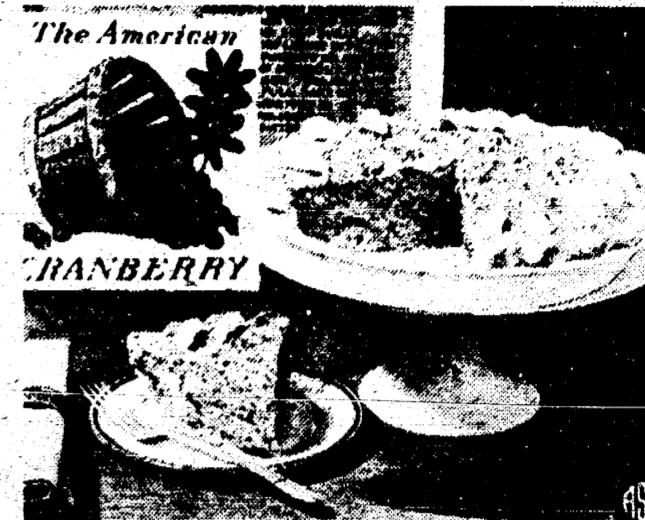

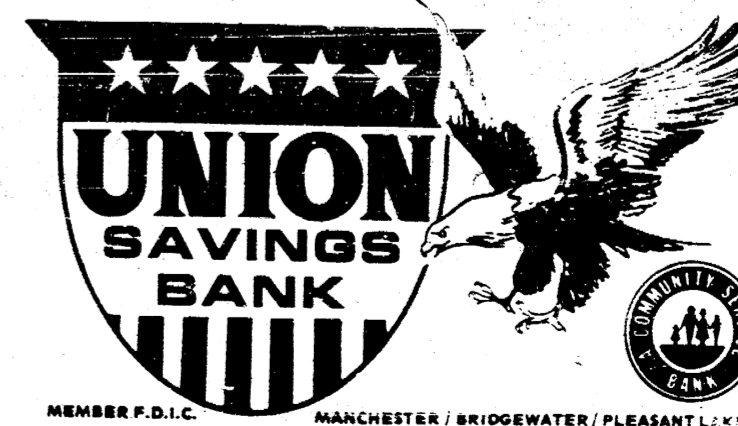

In 1957, three young men, Bob Shane, Nick Reynolds and Dave Guard, decided to form a group called The Kingston Trio. They selected that title because their music had a calypso sound to it and the name "Kingston" evoked Jamaican vibrations.

They were playing night clubs in the San Francisco area and were booked at San Francisco's Purple Onion for a one-week stand. That one week turned into a standing-room-only, seven-month engagement. The Trio was the first group to perform popular songs in the folk style with strong rhythmic background and their own unique brand of folk music and entertainment caught on quickly.

While playing an engagement in Hawaii, "Tom Dooley" hit. The Trio cut short their engagement and returned to the Mainland to go on a nationwide tour. One of their stops was the famous engagement at San Francisco's Hungry 4. The Kingston Trio's first LP on the Capitol label was on its way to becoming a household word. "Tom Dooley" was one of the biggest record sellers of the year in 1958 and it was followed by hits like "Tijuana Jail," "Where Have All the Flowers Gone?," "Scotch and Soda," "Rev. Mr. Black," "Greenback Dollar," "The M.T.A.," and others.

As the Trio's popularity grew, they appeared on the top network TV shows and performed to packed houses around the world. The Trio also were enormously successful on college concert tours.

"Life Magazine" honored them with a cover story and with the title of "Best Group of the Year." They appeared in concert with Barbara Streisand, Henry Mancini, Dave Brubeck, Bill Cosby and Keely Smith. In all, the Trio has no fewer than seven gold albums to its credit.

During the Trio's rise to the top, they met John Stewart, a performer and songwriter. When Dave Guard decided to go his own way in the spring of 1961, John joined Nick and Bob.
