Disasters on the highways during snow storms and blizzards can be alleviated if the traveller will carry a survival kit with him during the winter months. The American Red Cross Disaster Cochairmen for Washtenaw County, Dale

Richards and Jack Gray, have recommended that travellers carry the following items in their survival kit when traveiling the highways during the winter

1. Emergency drinking water in a plastic

Canned foods which can be easily opened and eaten and a can opener should be carried at all times.

Instant coffee and instant soups as well as candy bars, should be carried for each member of the family who is

4. It is also suggested that a small sterno stove with matches and a small pan or kettle be carried for heating water.

5. Blankets or sleeping bags should also be carried if the trip is to be an ex-6. A flashlight and emergency flares, toilet paper and a disposable emergency container for waste material should be

7. If individuals are going to be travelling for any length of time, they should carry prescriptions for drugs which they might

8. And, last but not least, every automobile should have an emergency first aid kit.

Snow mobilers and four-wheel drivers for Washtenaw County, who serve under the chairmanship of Daniel Winkler, meet the needs of stranded travellers and residents of Washtenaw County who might be isolated on back roads during heavy winter

storms. The county is divided into fifteen emergency zones each of which has as its center a shelter in a public school building or major church in the area. Each zone has a team of snow mobilers and four-wheel drivers, as well as a shelter management team to which individuals may go in the event of a disaster whether it be blizzard snow conditions, tornado or other disaster.







PROJECTS FOR KIDS

You've probably seen a sweet potato vine growing in a jar of water. But did you know that you could grow some flowering bulbs in water, too?

J. Lee Taylor, professor of horticulture at Michigan State University, says you can grow flowering plants from bulbs even in the middle of the winter. The trick is to choose the right bulb and take care of it properly.

The best bulbs for forcing into midwinter bloom are the paper white narcissus. A yellow variety. Grand Solell d'Or, is also sold for this use.

Put a layer of clean, washed sand or pea gravel in the bottom of a bowl two to three inches deep. Set the bulbs in the sand or gravel so the tops and necks are not covered. Then your water into the bowl so that it comes almost to the surface

of the material.

Place the bowl in a gool place--about 60 degrees F--that is brightly lighted. Check every day and add water as needed to keep the water level near the top of the gravel. Food stored in the bulb will be all the plant needs to grow and flower. Blossoms should appear in six to eight

If you want a more difficult project, try forcing hyacinth bulbs. Special hyacinth glasses can be used for forcing. They are not necessary, however. You can substitute an ordinary paper or plastic cup and an empty jar.

Cut a hole in the bottom of the cup so the bulb will sit in the bottom without falling through. Fill the jar with water and set the cup with the bulb in the top. of the jar. The water level in the jar should be just below the roots of the bulb. Hyacinths are cold-climate bulbs. They seed a cold treatment before they will bloom. Hyacinth bulbs planted outdoors get their cold treatment in the ground. Coldtreat bulbs for forcing indoors by placing the bulb and glass in a cool, dark place--

about 48 degrees F--for 10-12 weeks. Check the jars regularly and add water as necessary. When the bulb sprout is two inches long, or when you can see or

WHAT HAPPENED TO STEEL?

mally price supports would have of farming. Before long, agriculture w find itself in the same shape as calling for relief from imports with w

Fortunately American agriculture still very competitive on the world me perhaps more so than any other seof our economy. We could even be competitive if trade barriers did stand in our way but as in the eour own steel industry, when other nati cannot keep up, they tend to protect producers from the competition.







OUTER SPACE

Among the hardware orbitting the earth is a satellite that is being used to help U.S. farmers keep on top of crop pro-

The LANDSAT II satellite measures energy reflected from the earth's surface. Each erop reflects different amounts of energy to the satellite so that once the information to fed to a computer, the picture that's read shows what is planted on U.S. farmland.

But there's a catch. The satellite is pretty good at telling the difference between planted soybeans and corn. However, it sometimes gets corn and trees mixed up since they happen to reflect about the same amount of energy during certain periods of the growing season.

Enter the good old human being. Researchers check the computer picture with what they know is planted. Where go they get that information? From the groundwork done by USDA's Crop Reporting Board. The Crop Reporting Board gethers information from interviews with farmers, on-site inspections and from answers to survey questions mailed in by farmers. The information covers 1/2 of one percent of the total acreage in the United States. The satellite people take this small sample, the computer picture. and then project acreage for the entire

They are not able to beat the Crop Reporting Board people in timeliness yet, but in the future both sets of information may play a large part in farmer decisions such as whether to graze wheat or harvest it for grain.

It may come from outer space, but information that helps the farmer get an edge on the market will be well used


