Health Department Offices Moving

On December 17, 1977 the Health Department offices located in the County Building will move to 2355 West Stadium. This move will be a consolidating one for the Health Department because the Ann Arbor Nursing Division and Immunization Clinics have been in this building for over a year.

Specifically, those moving are administrative personnel of the Health Department including the Director, Dr. John B. Atwater, Assistant Director, Richard Yarmain, and Director of Nursing, Adah Davis. The entire environmental Division of the Health Department which includes all of the sanitarians for the county, the office of the emergency service coordinator and the Washtenaw County Office of the Comprehensive Health Planning Council of Southeastern Michigan will also be relocated.

The public is advised to go to the West Stadium offices for the services previously rendered from the County Building. Such services include validation of overseas immunizations, delivery of biologics to physicians, health permits for sewage and water supply systems, receipt and inspection of water samples from swimming pools and private residences, licenses for refuse transport units, licenses for food service establishments (both year round and temporary) and licenses for campgrounds and mobile home parks.

The Family Planning Project also will be moving from its present location at 555 Towner, Ypsilanti to join the 2355

West Stadium location. The new number for the Family Planning Project will be 994-2491.

All other phone numbers will remain the same.

MEASLES OUTBREAK IN WASHTENAW COUNTY

Washtenaw County is experiencing an outbreak of measles and many of the cases reported have been particularly severe. Most of the cases appear to be coming from the Ypsilanti and the out-county areas especially from the southern portion including Milan and Saline, and include children from infancy through high school age. Through October of this year there had been only seven cases of measles reported in the county, but twice that number were identified in November and the case reports are increasing rapidly during the first week of December, according to Dr. John B. Atwater, Director of the Washtenaw County Health Department.

Dr. Atwater indicated that although reported measles cases across the County are up by approximately fifty percent

over last year, and more than double the five year average, there are not known to be any other outbreaks in Michigan similar to what is happening here.

Measles (rebeola) sometimes called "hard," "red," "7-day," or "old fashioned" measles can be a very serious disease. Complications can include ear infections, pneumonia, deafness, blindness and convulsive disorders or other forms of brain disease. Encephalitis occurs in approximately 1 case in 1,000 and may result in permanent brain damage.

Measles is a preventable disease and immunizations against it are required for school entry by all the school districts. The vaccine is safe and better than 95% effective. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the U.S. Public Health Service and the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Infectious Diseases both strongly recommend that whatever steps are necessary be taken to assure that all children entering school are protected and that all susceptible children be promptly immunized when measles occurs in a community as is now happening in Washtenaw County.

Susceptibles to measles are defined as persons who lack: 1) physician certification or other acceptable evidence of having had measles, or 2) certification of adequate immunization with live measles vaccine when 12 or more months of age. The following persons cannot be considered adequately protected and should be re-vaccinated: 1) children previously vaccinated with live measles vaccine before they were 12 months of age 2) persons previously vaccinated with killed measles vaccine 3) persons previously vaccinated with live measles vaccine within 3 months after receiving the killed measles vaccine.

If a person is not sure of his or her

immunization status, revaccination is recommended. Infants as young as 6 months may be vaccinated if there is likelihood of exposure to natural measles.

The Washtenaw County Health Department is advising local physicians of the problem and recommending that immunization schedules be altered accordingly. The Department urges that parents who are unsure of their children's measles immunization status check with the child's own physician as to their need for protection. Children who are not under the care of a private physician or clinic may be brought to the Health Department immunization clinics, with their records of past immunizations. Clinics are held in Ann Arbor on the third Saturday morning of each month and in Ypsilanti on the second and fourth Saturdays. 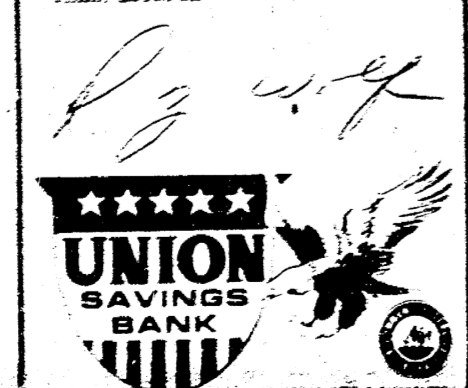

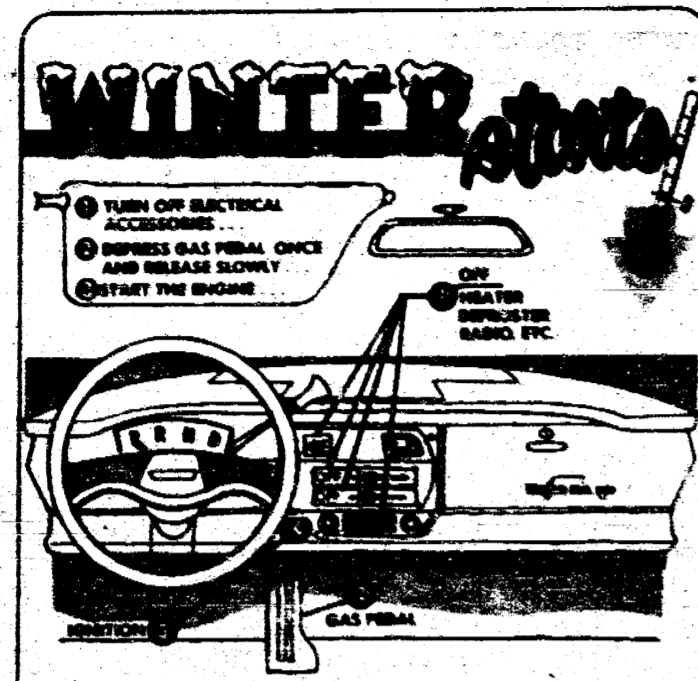

Michigan's Winter Wonderland is paradise for skiers, but the accompanying cold weather will make the going all downhill for motorists with car-starting problems. Engines that are "ice cold" usually are difficult to start. Automobile Club of Michigan estimates eight percent of winter road service calls come from motorists who fail to use the proper car-starting technique. For added ease in winter starting, Auto Club suggests this simple 1-2-3 method: (1) With the transmission in park, turn off electrical accessories so there is no extra strain on the battery. (2) Push the gas pedal to the floor and let up slowly to set the automatic choke. The accelerator should not be pumped since this will flood the engine. (3) Engage the starter for 10 seconds. Should the engine fail to start, repeat steps 1 and 2. If you flood the engine, depress the gas pedal to the floor, hold and engage the starter. The accelerator should be kept down until the engine starts. Motorists should keep their fuel tank full to avoid fuel line freezing and follow their owner's manual for winter maintenance schedules.

Pasadena On January 2 . . .
Flowers And Football



Exciting gridiron action will be featured in the 64th Rose Bowl Football Game—the "Granddaddy of All Bowl Games"—when Michigan meets Washington on Jan. 2, 1978 at 5 p.m. EST (4 p.m. CST) over the NBC Television Network.

Millions of people around the world will have a chance to welcome 1978 twice over on New Year's Day and then again on Jan. 2—with the help of the 56th Tournament of Roses Parade and the 64th Rose Bowl Football Game, both to be held on Jan. 2, 1978.

Since New Year's Day falls on a Sunday, tradition calls for the two spectacular events to be moved one day in deference to those attending church services along the Colorado Blvd. parade route. The Sunday-to-Monday switch has occurred 12 times in the parade's history and nine times in the game's history.

The morning parade is a two-hour floral pageant under the theme "On the Road to Happiness." The Rose Parade, which has traversed the streets of Pasadena since 1890, features 61 flower-covered floats, 22 bands with over 4,000 musicians and 250 equestrian riders. The 5 1/2 mile procession will be seen by more than 1.5 million roadside spectators and 125 million television viewers worldwide.

Former President Gerald R. Ford will lead the parade as Grand Marshal. He is the third U.S. President to serve as Grand Marshal. Others honored include Herbert Hoover (1945) and Dwight D. Eisenhower (1964). Richard M. Nixon was selected twice as Grand Marshal, both times as Vice President of the United States.

Reigning over the pageantry will be the 56th Rose Queen, Marcia Lynn Caron, and her Royal Court of six princesses. The famed Rose Bowl stadium will be the spotlight of the afternoon action, where Big Ten co-champion Michigan and the Pacific-8's Washington Huskies meet in gridiron play.

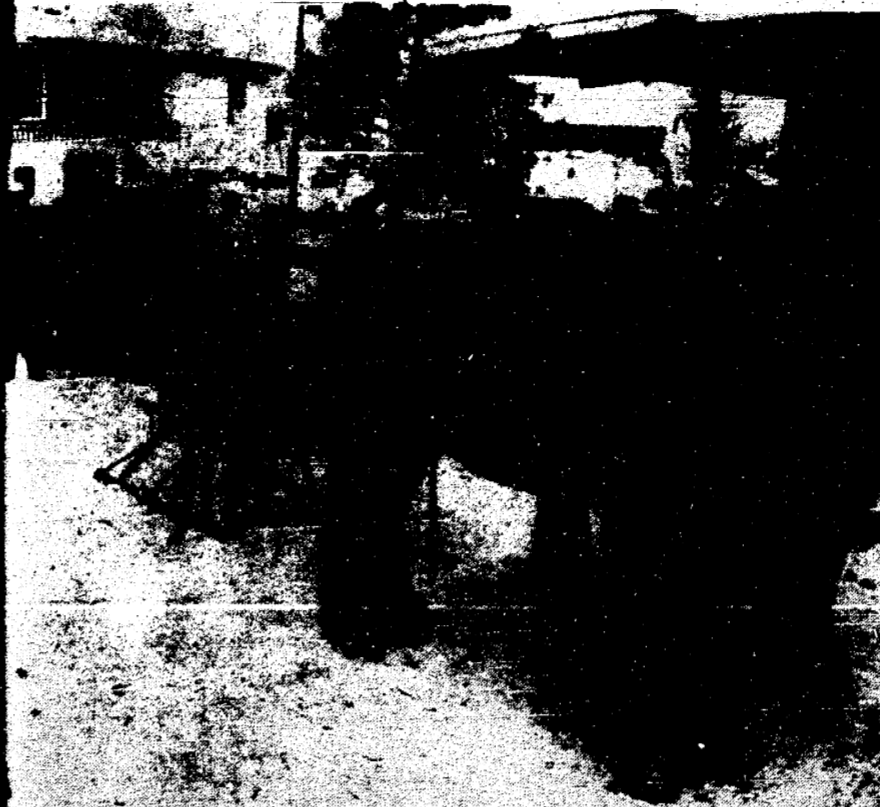
The two will square off in the "Granddaddy of All Bowl Games." Although the two teams have never met in the 64-year history of Rose Bowl competition, they have clashed four times in regular season play, with Michigan's Wolverines winning all four contests.

The 64th Rose Bowl will mark the eighth appearance for both teams. Michigan has won four of seven played to date and Washington is 2-4-1. While Washington has not been to Pasadena since 1964, Michigan lost to USC, 14-6, in the 1977 classic.

Michigan Coach Bo Schembecher has led his team to the Rose Bowl in 1970, 1972 and 1977, but has never won. Don James, in his third year at Washington, will be making his Rose Bowl debut.

The 1978 Rose Parade will be televised beginning at 11:30 a.m. EST (10:30 a.m. CST) over the NBC, CBS and Metromedia Television Networks. The Rose Bowl, follows exclusively on NBC beginning at 5 p.m. EST (4 p.m. CST).

The trouble with a heated economy is that it feels so good. An inflationary climate is an exciting climate with lots of things happening, many of them apparently good, comfortable things that look and seem right.

In a time of inflation, there is more money for each of us to handle and that's a comfortable feeling. Saving money that shrinks in value doesn't make a lot of sense, so there's more buying and selling going on, and that's usually a fun thing.

Look at all the good things coming out of Congress! Higher minimum wages all around; a liberalized food stamp program that doesn't have a purchase requirement; higher loan rates and target prices for farm crops; union, industrial and federally built-in cost-of-living increases and the promise of a big tax cut to come--all make inflation appear less of a threat.

Congress-whose deficit spending causes inflation--busily points fingers elsewhere, at the OPEC cartel, at foreign trading partners, at the weather or at food prices.

Facts are that Congress creates inflation, which either by Congressional action or inaction, then is built into the laws and the attitudes of the country.

For all its mild appearance, inflation is a robber. It is a thief-in-the-night who steals the value out of stocks and bonds and savings accounts.

What to do about it? Hand the problem of inflation back to the Congress that creates it! Do so personally in direct, forceful, and repeated complaints to your Congressman and to your Senator. Tell them you've had enough of a heated economy!

WHAT'S COOKING IN MICHIGAN?

There's something special about a Christmas gift if you make it yourself. It's personal and really shows you care. If what you make looks like Christmas, that's even better, and a good way to do it is with this recipe for Sprigs O' Holly from the file of a friend.

Melt 40 large marshmallows and a quarter pound of fine Michigan Grade A butter in a double boiler. Then add one teaspoon vanilla and two teaspoons of green food coloring. Now add five cups of cornflakes, stir quickly to coat, and drop the mixture by teaspoons on waxed paper. Place red cinnamon candies on top and set aside for 24 hours.

The candy sets up and looks as though it is ceramic. Purchase some glass jars, fill them with Sprigs O' Holly and you have an excellent Christmas present for close friends.

Another idea for you might be what is termed "never fail" divinity. Cook three cups of pure Michigan best sugar,

three-quarter cup of light corn syrup and one-half cup of water in a saucepan until it reads 248 degrees on a candy thermometer. Remove from heat and let it cool to 220 degrees, about 7 minutes. Don't stir it during this time.

Whip two egg whites to the soft peak stage and add the syrup gradually in a fine stream. Add one teaspoon vanilla and continue whipping for 20 to 25 minutes or until the mixture starts to become dry. Add one cup of chopped nuts and stir until blended. Then just drop from a teaspoon onto waxed paper and let cool.

It's a super recipe and with black walnuts, is even better. Or you may wish to top with halves of Michigan maraschino cherries for that festive holiday touch.

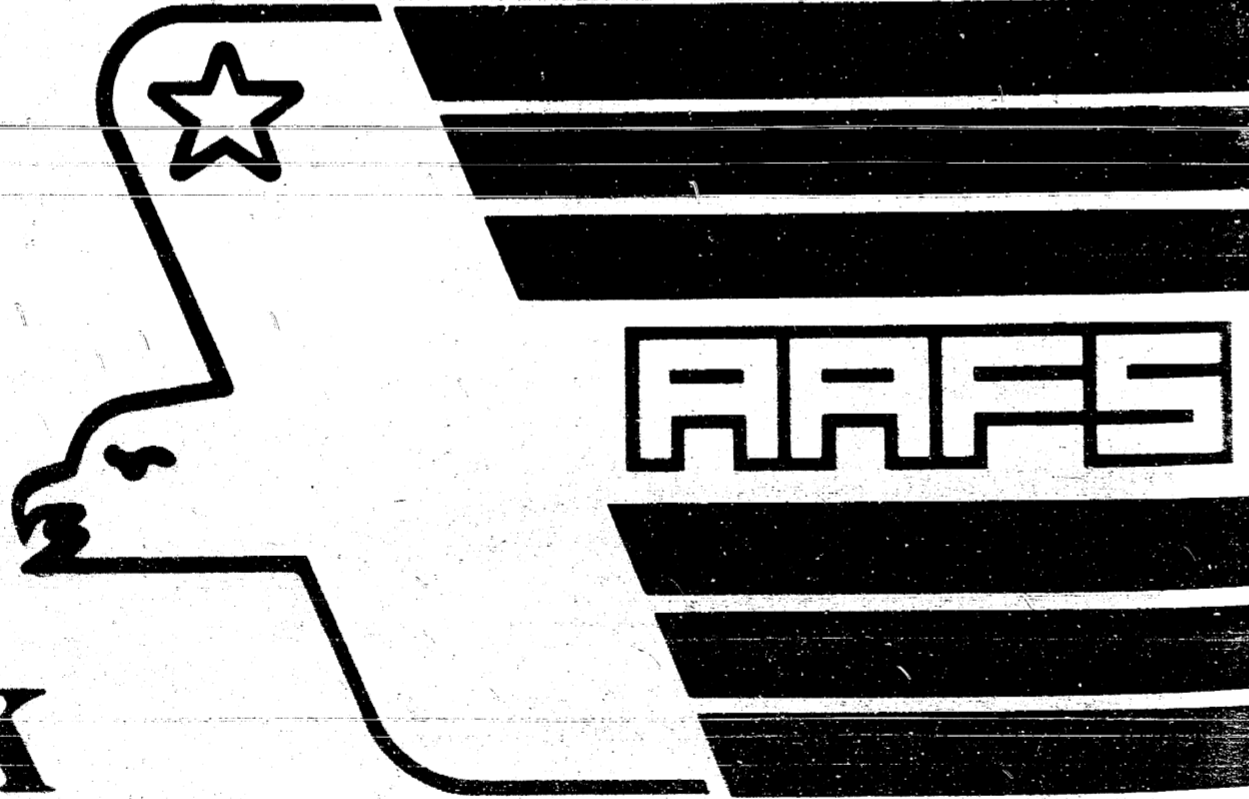

SUSIE'S FLORIDA CORN PUDDING

No other vegetable tops Florida sweet corn in popularity on the American dinner table.

While more sweet corn is eaten "on-the-cob," don't overlook fresh corn as an ingredient. In recipes like this corn pudding, the fresh kernels are incomparable for flavor and snapping crisp texture.

SUSIE'S CORN PUDDING

- 4 ears fresh Florida corn
- 2 eggs
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/16 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2/3 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted

Remove husks and silks from corn; cut kernels from cobs (makes about 2-2/3 cups). In a medium bowl lightly beat eggs. Stir in corn and remaining ingredients. Pour into a greased 1-quart casserole. Stand in a larger pan. Pour hot water up the sides of the casserole. Bake in a preheated slow oven (325°F.) until a knife inserted into center comes out clean, about 1 hour. YIELD: 4 to 6 portions.
