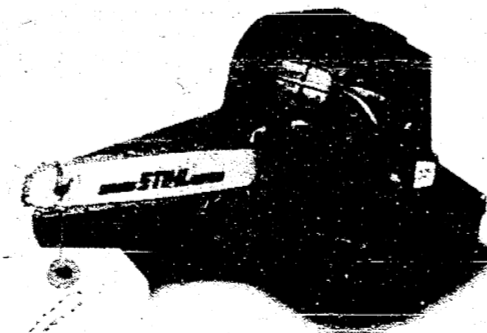

## Council Proceedings

November 21, 1977

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:06 p.m. Present were Daniels, Denhoff, Duncan, Fitzgerald, Scully and Zsenyuk; absent Kennedy and Schaffer. Minutes from the November 7, 1977 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Scully, supported by Duncan. All yeas, motion carried.

Fitzgerald brought up a letter received from Don Limpert requesting a final site plan review for property located north of the old railroad right-of-way known as "Mill Pond Village Apartments, 216 N. Washington. Duncan will take the questions to the Village Planning Commission regarding the continuation of the right-of-way, the closing of three streets (Washington, Clinton and Macomb) and the possible disturbance of the cemetery.

A letter from the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners in discussing a water quality plan under SEMCOG strongly recommended that local governments express our concerns over the water quality management plan to the governor and SEMCOG. Fitzgerald stated that he would contact John Holland of McNamee, Porter and Seelye concerning that item and EPA funds. Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Scully to request McNamee, Porter and Seelye to respond with recommendations to SEMCOG, the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners and the governor. All yeas, carried.

A request was received from Bill Cannon for review before the Planning Commission on December 7, 1977 regarding 5 lots on East Main Street. Daniels will contact him and advise him to submit a revised plan with proposed utility locations in compliance with the present zoning ordinances. This plan should show utility lines, lot depths and approved sewer and water extension plans (which must be signed by McNamee, Porter and Seelye as okay). These things should be done prior to the Planning Commission meeting.

Fitzgerald reported that gravel streets have been graded, sand and chloride have been stockpiled for ice control, litter has been picked up at Carr Park, two water ditches have been patched and bagged leaves have been picked up. The parking restriction signs for snow removal have been erected.

A number of water bills are still being corrected and adjusted. Mr. Boatwright's bill for previous quarters has been adjusted. His meter will be certified and installed.

Questions were raised regarding the supposed closing of Clinton, Washington and Macomb Streets at the old railroad right-of-way. It was suggested that Attorney Roesch be contacted with an answer requested before the December 7, 1977 Village Planning Commission Meeting. Any decision to proceed should rest on Roesch's directions which Council would like in writing.

Denhoff asked about Chi-Bro Park. Little advised Council that no formal notification had been received thus far. Bentschneider has the plot plan etc. If Denhoff would like to review it in regard to park planning.

Duncan reported that according to the sign ordinance those in violation have until December 1978 to correct improper signing of buildings or businesses. Schaffer is measuring the signs to determine those in violation. Action will be taken when Schaffer is present to advise Council of the results.

Moved by Scully, supported by Duncan to adjourn at 9:20 p.m. All yeas, carried. Mary H. Wheeler, Clerk

December 5, 1977  
Meeting opened 7:02 p.m. Members in attendance: David Little, Jack Kennedy, Jeff Schaffer, Jim Duncan, Joe Fitzgerald and Jim Scully.

The proposed sign ordinance survey indicated that there were nine signs in non-conformance.

Bids were reviewed for the purchase of Village truck. Much confusion occurred over local dealers bids and over exactly what was needed. Moved by Fitzgerald, seconded by Scully to throw out existing bids, write a list of specs desired, have it rebid, and open bids at the next council meeting 12-19-77. Motion passed without objection.

The matter of street closings on Limpert property was discussed at length. According to the Village Attorney, the end of the streets of Macomb, Washington and Clinton are still dedicated street right-of-ways because they have never legally been closed north of the railroad. Council would like to see the Macomb Street right-of-way remain a right-of-way. Council would accept a petition from the property owner requesting that the Washington and Clinton street right-of-ways be closed. Motion made by Kennedy and supported by Scully to support the above statements and to have the matter referred to the Planning Commission. Motion passed 4 yeas, 1 abstention.

Motion to adjourn by Schaffer, supported by Kennedy at 8:30. All yeas, carried. Jim Duncan, Acting Clerk

**Village of Manchester Ordinance No. 102**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NUMBER 96 OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER "THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF MANCHESTER VILLAGE".

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCES:  
Section 1. That Ordinance number 96 "THE ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER" is hereby amended by deleting subsection 1 of Section 53.04-A and substituting the following therefor:

Section 53.04-A-1 An identification sign, limited to one sign per building or entrance way to such a building, may be affixed flat against a wall of the building or affixed as to project outward from the exterior wall of the building. If the building is located within a center such as a shopping center or integrated commercial development or office park, each enterprise located therein, may have one such sign affixed flat against a wall of the building or affixed to project outward from the exterior wall of the building. The total sign area if affixed flat against an exterior wall of the building may have a total area of two square feet for each foot in length or height of the wall, whichever is greater and no such sign shall extend above the wall to which it is affixed nor project more than twelve inches from the face of the building.

The sign if affixed to project outward from the exterior wall of the building shall not have a total area in excess of twenty square feet if a single faced sign or a combined total area in excess of forty square feet if a two-faced sign with not more than twenty square feet on each side; shall be located a minimum of three feet from either edge of the building or business facade; shall not exceed a maximum distance of five feet from the face of the building and the bottom of the sign shall be a minimum height of ten feet above the sidewalk.

Section 2. Said ordinance number 96 is further amended by deleting Subsection C of Section 53.07 and substituting the following therefor:  
Section 53.07-C. All signs and billboards shall be inspected on the site prior to erection by the Village Building Inspector for conformance to this ordinance and the Building Code of the Village of Manchester under Ordinance No. 88.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after publication thereof. All signs in violation must conform by 12:00 midnight December 31, 1978, or they will be subject to removal at the owner's expense.

## Hawaiian TREAT

**Hawaiian Hot Bread**  
(Makes 1 loaf)  
2 eggs  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup melted shortening  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
3 teaspoons baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 cup chopped nuts  
1 cup crushed canned pineapple (do not drain)

Beat eggs with sugar together, add shortening. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add dry ingredients to first mixture and blend. Add nuts and pineapple. Stir just enough to combine. Pour batter into a greased 4x8-inch loaf pan. Bake in a moderate (350°F) oven for one hour. Let loaf cool thoroughly before slicing.

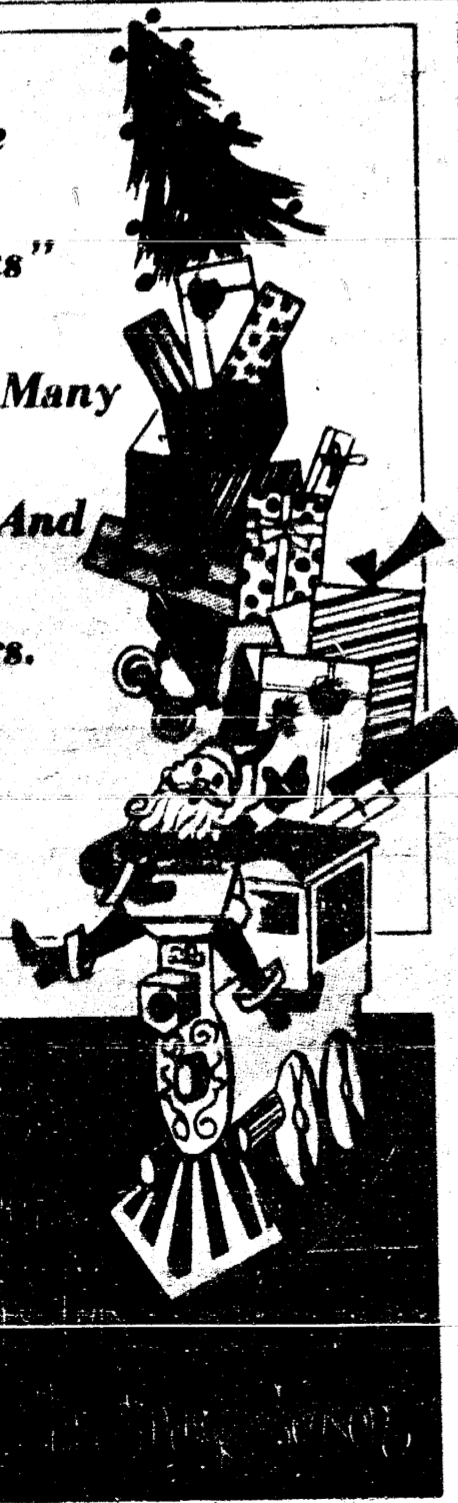

Check often to be sure bulbs do not touch branches, needles or flammable decorations.  
Falling needles indicate the tree is drying out and could become a fire hazard.

**Make Decorations Pretty But Safe**

Decorations are an important part of the Christmas observance. Make them pretty, but keep them safe. Some are potentially dangerous.  
Mistletoe and holly berries are traditional, but must be used carefully if small children are about. Both are poisonous and should not be placed within the reach of small hands.  
Christmas tree ornaments that will break easily or those with small detachable parts a child might swallow should also be avoided. Use non-breakable ornaments and save them year-to-year.

**HOLIDAY DIET**

Most of us tend to eat too much of the wrong kinds of food during the holidays. Candies, cakes and cookies are usually high in calories. Don't stuff on these; and be sure that regular meals include the four basic food groups to assure a healthy, happy after-Christmas.

Do not place the tree near heat. Take the tree down as soon as possible. It is not wise to try to keep a tree for several days after the Christmas holiday, even after a do-it-yourself flameproofing treatment.

**UNORDERED GIFTS**

Every year many of us receive a number of "unordered" items through the mails shortly before Christmas—such things as Christmas cards, pen and pencil sets, holiday envelope stickers, key rings, gift tags, etc. Later a bill or a plea for a "donation" follows with the message the money will be given over to a worthy cause.

Some of these solicitations are for worthy causes. Others are from someone trying to make a fast buck. What can you do about it?

Don't give unless you know where your money is going. If it is a legitimate cause, your Chamber of Commerce or Better Business Bureau will be able to tell you. If it is a worthy cause and you wish to participate, pay by check and keep the cancelled check.

If you doubt the cause is legitimate or just don't wish to participate, mark the item "refused" and return it to the Post Office. Even if you opened it before you realized what was inside, you can rewrap it in the original wrapping as best you can, write "refused" and return it to the Post Office.

Whether you open the package or not, you don't have to pay for it. You are under no obligation to return it as "refused"—but it's a good idea to do so. This will greatly discourage further shipments to you from the same company.



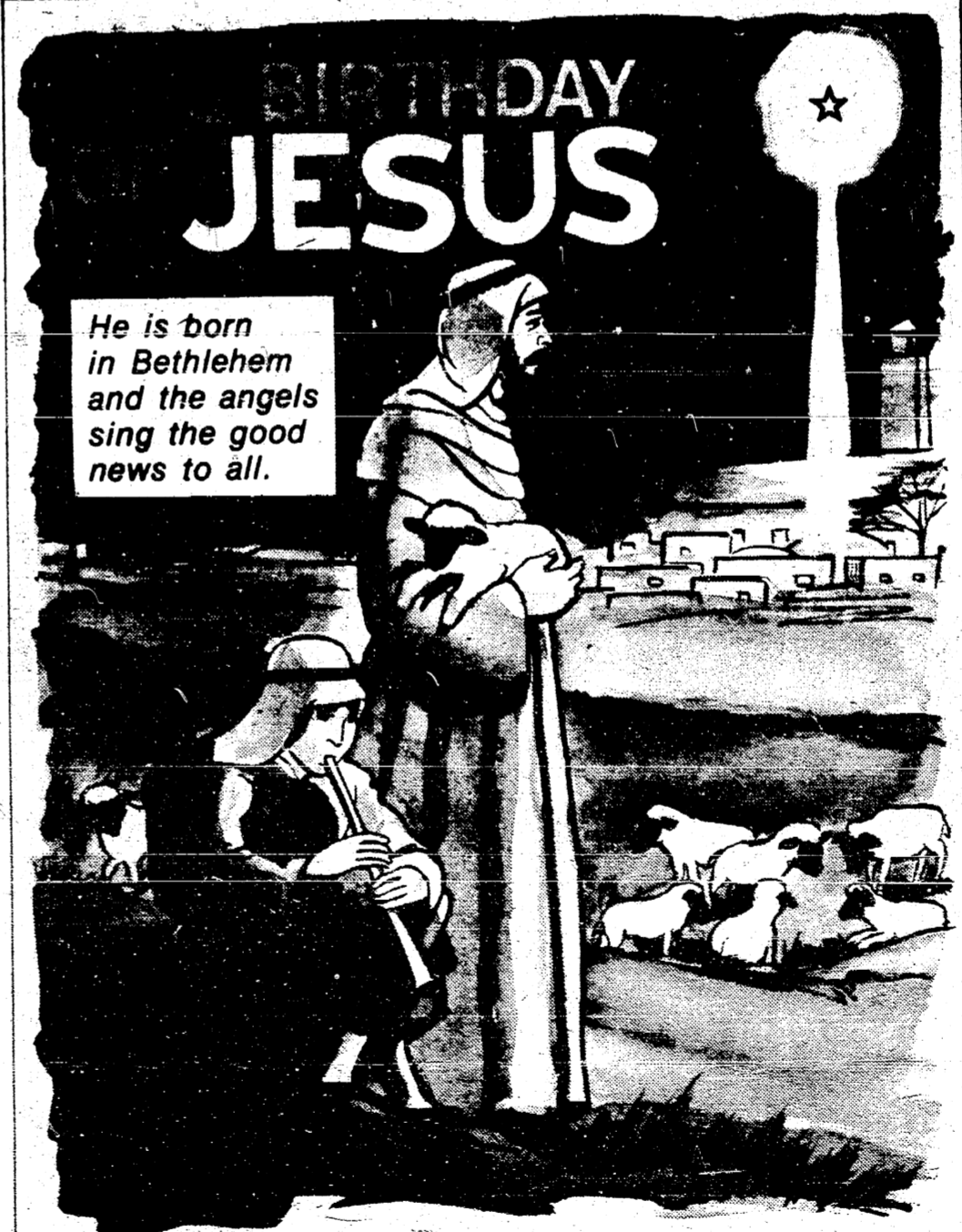

**CHRISTMAS PRAYER**

Christmas is the most spirit-lifting of all the seasons, a time when we are led to think of giving, not getting, of helping, rather than being helped, as in the Christmas prayer of St. Francis of Assisi:

**Live Tree Makes Excellent Gift**

The live Christmas tree is a practical wife-to-husband gift that can be used indoors then out. Possibilities include yew, fir, pine, and spruce which can be purchased at a reliable nursery, wrapped in burlap and boxed.

The tree can be brought indoors immediately before Christmas. It should be given extra care and ample moisture.

Dig the hole where the tree is to be planted outside during Christmas week. Leave the burlap on when you plant and water well. Add a mulch of peatmoss, straw or hay.

Evergreen branches or other decorations may be spread beneath the tree to prevent deep freezing during the remainder of winter.



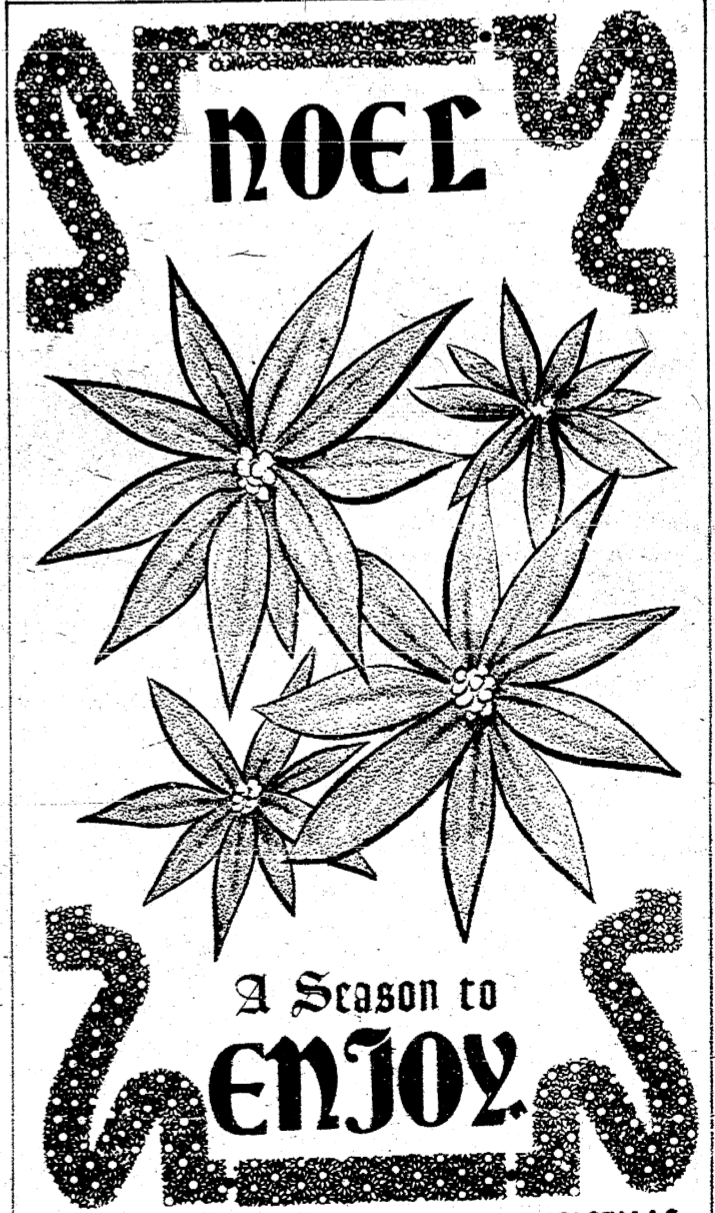
Father Christmas, the bringer of gifts, alias Santa Claus, is derived from St. Nicholas of Patara, Bishop of Myra during the fourth century, whose feast is December 6th. He is one of Christendom's most popular saints, the patron saint of Russia, Aberdeen, parish clerks, scholars, pawnbrokers (because he saved the three daughters of a poor man from prostitution by the present of three gold balls) and of small boys (since he restored three boys who had been cut up and pickled in a salting tub as a substitute for bacon). From this generally benevolent character was developed Santa Claus and the anglicized Father Christmas, the bringer of gifts by sleigh drawn by reindeer (an American notion, for until the nineteenth century the horse was the accepted animal in England). He perhaps owes something to his far more adult northern counterpart, Odin, the Old Gift-Bringer, who rode the sky at midnight in winter with his eight-footed horse Sleipnir, distributing punishments to the wicked and rewards to the worthy. By the nineteenth century all these characters had been crystallized into the modern Father Christmas, visitor by night, frequenter of chimneys, resident of Selfridges, joined to his remote ancestor Odin by their common use of a sleigh by night.

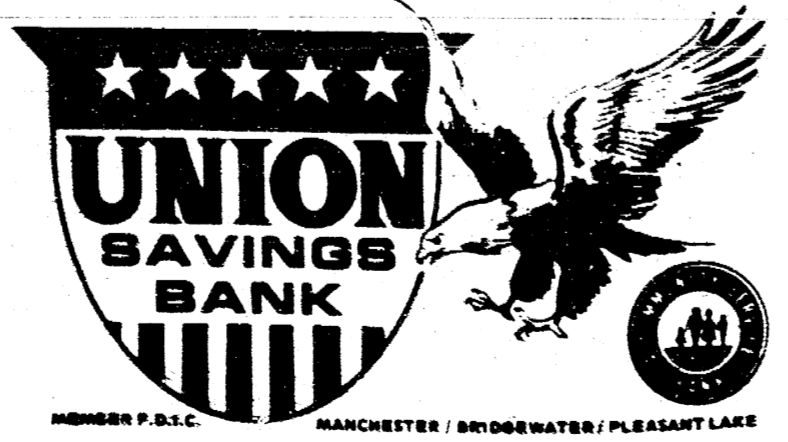

### DRIED FRUIT CONSERVE IS GREAT IDEA FOR LAST-MINUTE GIFT GIVERS

If you've put off buying small presents for friends and acquaintances until the last minute, this recipe from the home economists at the Bull Corporation could be your saving grace. You don't have to worry about coping with the crowds in the stores, just pop over to the supermarket and make your purchase. Never mind that they don't have fresh fruit. The excellent conserve is made from a selection of dried fruits that most markets carry all year round. A few hours in your warm, comfortable kitchen puts a very happy ending to those last-minute gift-giving worries.

- DRIED FRUIT CONSERVE**
- 1-1/2 cups cut-up dried apricots (1 1/2 pound)
  - 1-1/2 cups cut-up dried peaches (1 1/2 pound)
  - 1-1/2 cups cut-up dried pears (1 1/2 pound)
  - 1 medium unpeeled orange, chopped (about 1 cup)
  - 3 cups water
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 1/2 cup seedless raisins
  - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon (optional)

1/8 teaspoon ground cloves (optional)  
1/2 cup chopped walnuts or other nuts



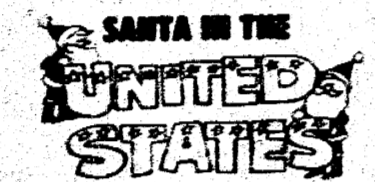
Combine first five ingredients, cover and cook until fruits are tender, about 15 to 20 minutes. Uncover and add remaining ingredients except nuts. Slowly bring to boiling, stirring occasionally until sugar dissolves. Cook rapidly, stirring frequently, until thick, about 15 minutes. Add nuts the last five minutes of cooking. Pour, boiling hot, into hot Ball jars. Adjust caps. Process 15 minutes. Yield: about 5 half-pints.

Note: Use scissors, dipping them into cold water occasionally, to cut up dried fruit.

### The Epiphany Has Special Meaning

Many of who have long heard the phrase "On the twelfth day of Christmas... do not know what it means. Twelfth Night, or Epiphany means "appearance" and the holiday commemorates three "proofs" of Christ's divinity, each occurring on that date—six days after Christmas. These were the visit of the Magi, the baptism of Christ, and the first miracle at Cana where water was changed to wine.

Traditions have grown up around the Epiphany in various parts of the world. For Latin Americans, it is a solemn festival as well as beginning of the pre-Lenten carnival season. Mexicans celebrate with feasting, candlelight processions and fireworks. In the United States, Christmas greenery is burned on Epiphany.



Three men are generally credited with popularizing the image of Santa Clause as we know him in the United States.

In 1869 Washington Irving's "Knickerbocker History of New York" contained 25 references to the great gift giver, picturing him in a "low-brimmed hat" and Flemish trunk home, smoking a pipe as he rode over rooftops dropping gifts down the chimney.

Clement Clark Moore took Santa from the horse-drawn wagon in 1823 and put him in a sleigh, exchanging the horses for eight tiny reindeer and portraying Santa as a jolly old gent, with a "little round belly", "dimples how merry" and a nose "like a cherry."

Thomas Nast, the great political cartoonist, made the final changes about 1863. He kept the pipe, beard and furs—but greatly enlarged Santa's "little round belly", making it the BIG round belly with which he is pictured today.

**Children's Festival in Igloos... In Japan's Snow Country**



During the winter months some parts of Japan are almost completely 'snowed-under.' Large amounts of snow fall on the west (Japan Sea) coast and on the northernmost parts of Japan's main island, Honshu. The northern island, Hokkaido, site of the 1972 Olympics, also receives a lot of snow.

Children in these parts of Japan respond to that much snow just as American children do. To them a snow covered landscape is a delightful playground. Japanese children take special pride and pleasure in their kamakura, the snow igloos that they build. These igloos are very impressive, often as much as six feet tall and six feet wide. The children decorate and furnish the interiors of their kamakura; they often become quite elaborate. Straw mats cover the floor of the igloo and the children usually gather around a small brazier. As at any Japanese home, shoes are left at the entrance. In rural areas of the 'snow country', snow boots are still sometimes made of straw.

Sometime during the winter each area celebrates 'kamakura Festival'. On the night of this festival, village children are allowed to stay overnight in their snow houses. They serve sweet sake and rice cakes to passing neighbors, who in turn give the children a small amount of money or fruit.

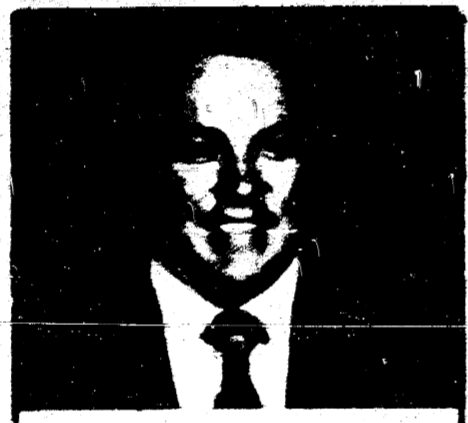

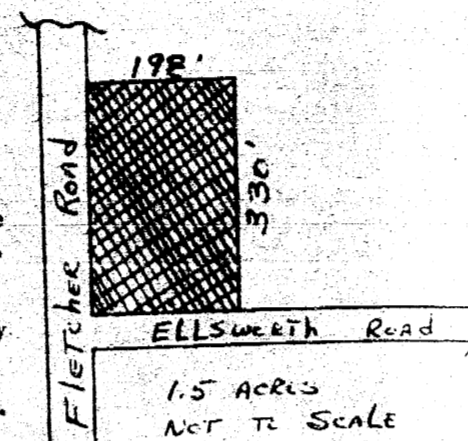

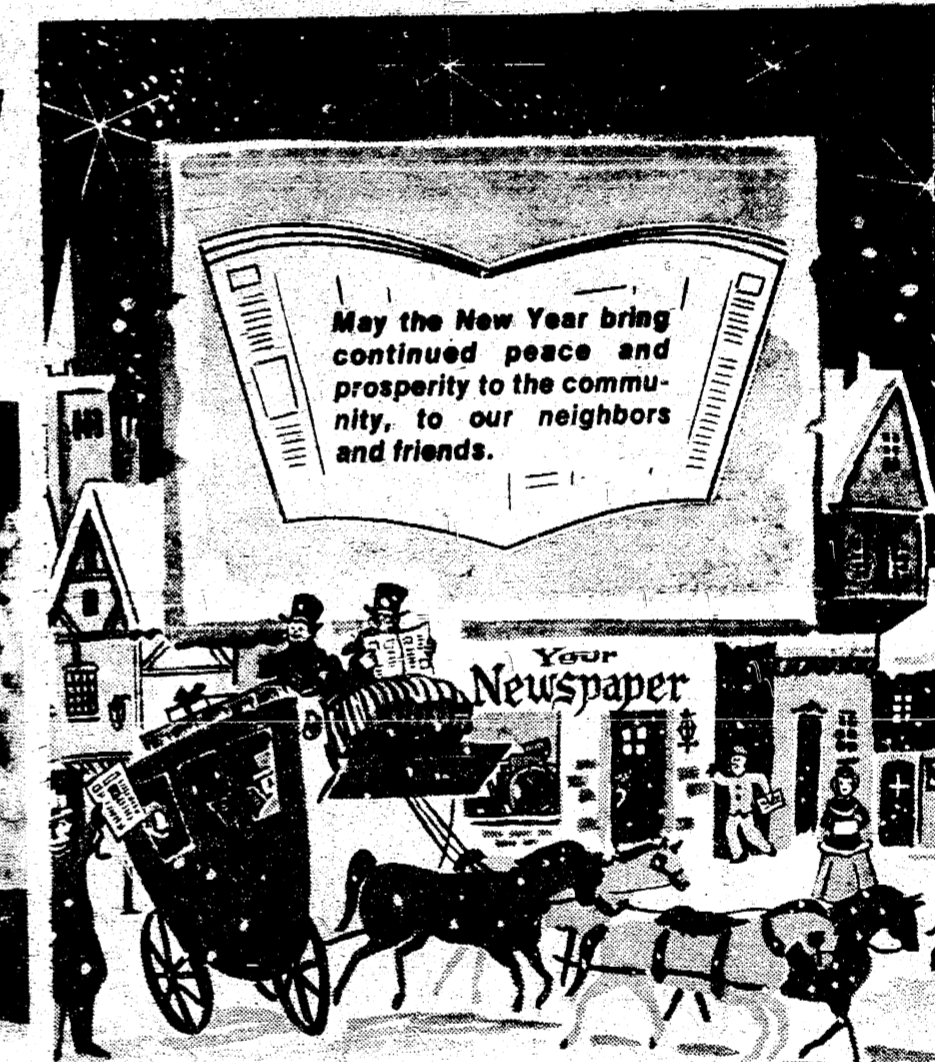
