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
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# Council Proceedings

# Village of Manchester Ordinance No. 102

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND OF DINANCE NUMBER 96 OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER "THE ZONING OR-DINANCE OF MANCHESTER VILLAGE" THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER OR

Section 1. That Ordinance number 9 THE ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER" is hereby amended by deleting subsection 1 of Section 53.04-A and substituting the following

Section 53.04-A-1 An identification sign. limited to one sign per building or er trance way to such a building, may be affixed flat against a wall of the building or affixed as to project outward from the exterior wall of the building. If the building is located within a center such as a shopping center or integrated commercial development or office park, each enterprise located therein, may have one such sign affixed flat against a wall of the building or affixed to project outward from the exterior wall of the building. The total sign area if affixed flat against an exterior wall of the building may have a total area of two square feet for each foot in length or height of the wall, whichever is greater and no such sign shall extend above the wall to which i is affixed nor project more than twelve inches from the face of the building. The sign if affixed to project outward from the exterior wall of the building shall not have a total area in excess twenty square feet if a single faced sign or a combined total area in excess o forty square feet if a two-faced sign with Village Planning Commission Meeting, not more than twenty square feet on each Any decision to proceed should rest on side; shall be located a minimum three feet from either edge of the building or business facade; shall not exceed maximum distance of five feet from in face of the building and the bottom

Section 2. Said ordinance number 9 is further amended by deleting Subsection C of Section 53.07 and sub-

stituting the following therefore: Section 53.07-C. All signs and billboards shall be inspected on the site prior to erection by the Village Building Inspector for conformance to this ordinance and the Building Code of the Village of Manchester under Ordinance No. 93

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after publication thereof. All signs in violation must conform by 12:00 midnight December 31. 1978, or they will be subject to removal



# **Togetherness Is Traditional**

When our elders talk about an "old-time" Christmas among the things they are remembering is the pleasure and anticipation associated with the preparations for the holiday.

There were no "commercial" Christmas trees in the "old days"—everyone went out to the nearest hillside or forest and chose one to their liking-for free. Tinsel, ornaments, electric tree lights, these too, weren't to be had. Decorations for the tree were all homemade—and usually the entire family lent a hand in the

Today we would be foolish, of course, not to take advantage of the many beautiful and ornamental decorations available for decorating home and Christmas tree. Yet, we can still recapture some of the "spirit" of the "oldtime Christmas" by making some of the Christ-

mas tree ornaments and decorations as a family project. A variety of ornaments are possible from such materials as plastic foam. A cookie cutter, for instance, can be used to outline such shapes as snowmen, Santa Clauses, gingerbread men, dolls, clowns and stars on a sheet of 1-inch plastic foam. Cut out the shapes with a sharp knife and then let each member of the family decorate an ornament. Some can glue sequins to the cutouts to form features. Others can tint the foam with food coloring, or glue felt to the ornament to add extra details, such as hats or buttons.

Decorating the tree is usually a family project, enjoyed by both young and old. Preparing the decorations for the tree can be equally enjoyable and memorable.

### Professor Probably Trimmed First Tree

No one is sure when the first Christmas tree appeared in America. Many believe the credit belongs to Charles Follen, a German professor who taught at Harvard. In 1832. he trimmed a tree for his small son. The following year, other Bostonians followed suit.

Later, trees became more popular when Prince Albert, German-born consort of Queen Victoria popularized the Christmas tree in England by setting one up in Windsor Castle. Many Americans, eager to copy their sophisticated British cousins. trimmed a tree of their own.

The big boost came as late as 1845 when the best-selling "Kriss Kringle's Christmas Tree' showed Americans how a Christmas tree should properly be decorated.



# In Japan's Snow Country



During the winter months some parts of Japan are almost completely 'snowed-under.' Large amounts of snow fall on the west (Japan Sea) coast and on the northern-most parts of Japan's main island, Honshu. The northern island, Hokkaido, site of the 1972 Olympics, also receives a lot of snow.

Children in these parts of Japan respond to that much snow just as American children do. To them a snow covered landscape is a delightful playground. Japanese children take special pride and pleasure in their kamakura, the snow igloos that they build. These igloos are very impressive, often as much as six feet tall and six feet wide. The children decorate and furnish the interiors of their kamakura; they often become quite elaborate. Straw mats cover the floor of the igloo and the children usually gather around a small brazier. As at any Japanese home, shoes are left at the entrance. In rural areas of the 'snow country', snow boots are still sometimes made of straw.

Sometime during the winter each area celebrates 'kamakura Festival.' On the night of this festival, village children are allowed to stay overnight in their snow houses.

They serve sweet sake and rice cakes to passing neighbors, who in turn give the children a small amount of money or fruit.

For a long time, crib scenes were seen only in churches. The custom spread to homes, particularly in Italy where families compete to see who can display the best crib scene.




