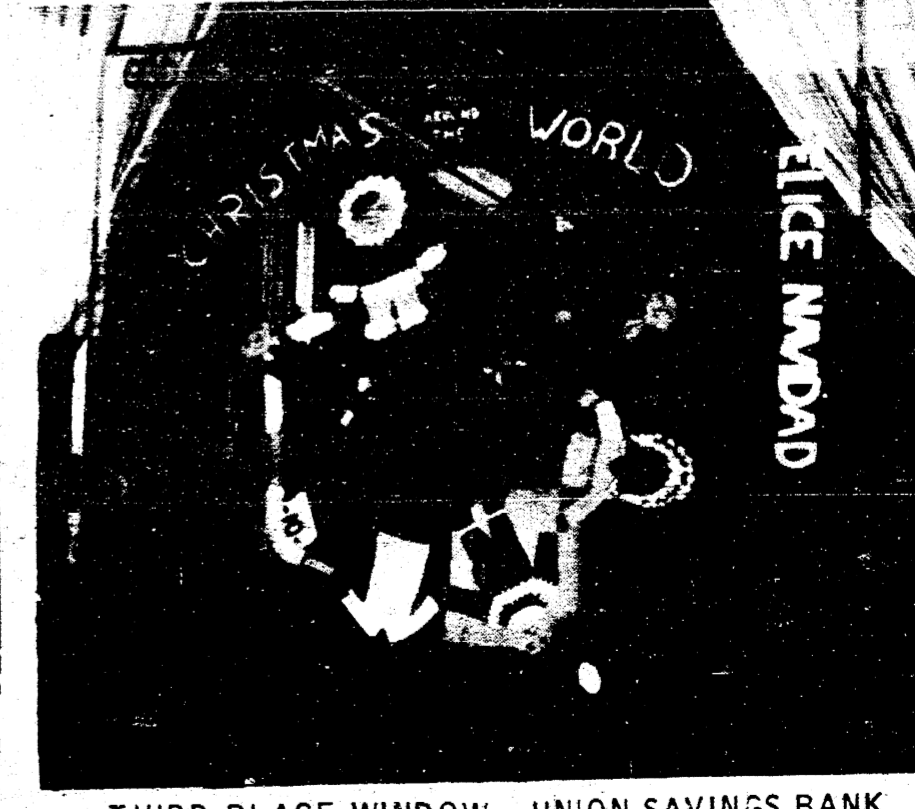

Cross-Country Ski Program

Registration is now open for the Washtenaw County Parks Commission's 5th Annual Cross-Country Ski Program. Beginning January 10 the program will be offered every Tuesday and Wednesday evenings through January and February, snow permitting.

This popular program has provided hundreds of Washtenaw County residents the opportunity to try Cross-Country Skiing for a nominal fee. As in the past, this year's program consists of a 1 1/2 hour instruction session and equipment provided at the site for \$3.00 per skier. Fuller Recreation Area in Ann Arbor, West Middle School and JYRO Park in Ypsilanti are the instruction sites for this year's program. The instruction clinics are offered at 6:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. each evening. Interested skiers register for ONE evening, and designate either the early or late session.

The program is designed for those who are beginning or intermediate skiers. Because the clinic groups are small, each skier receives special attention and instruction. Those skiers with their own equipment can also participate in the program. Advance registration is required. Forms can be picked up at the County Building, City Hall, the Ann Arbor Public Library and at the WCPARC office at 2555 West Stadium in Ann Arbor. Clinics fill quickly, so interested skiers are urged to register as soon as possible. Any questions can be answered by calling the WCPARC office at 994-2575.

Household Hints

DAINTY CURTAINS—For a simple, harmless and effective whitener for dainty curtains and fine linens, a tablespoon of powdered Borax added to the final rinse water helps.

WINDSHIELD WIPERS—Sometimes the windshield wipers on your car aren't doing a very good job. Try rubbing the rubber blades with some fine sandpaper to clean and smooth them.

EASIER MEASURING—Make a measuring job easier, by sticking the other end of the measure down with adhesive tape. That way you don't have to bother anyone to help you measure something.

SPOTTY FURNITURE—You may have white spots on your furniture from someone scratching it. Sponge these spots with turpentine or mineral spirits, and then apply fresh wax.

ELECTRIC CORDS—Rub a thin coat of wax or paraffin at periodic intervals, to protect the cords against premature drying out and cracking.

SANDPAPERING—Put an old nylon stocking over your hand and rub it lightly over the wood. It is a good test to see if your sandpaper job is done well enough.

CLEANING WINDOWS—To help prevent the glass you are cleaning from streaking and looking filmy all over again, pour a little vinegar in the water you are using.

PAINT STIRRER—Stir up your small cans of paint with an old dinner fork. It does just fine.

WINDOW SHADES—You can cover window shades with wallpaper, and give them an interesting pattern or color.

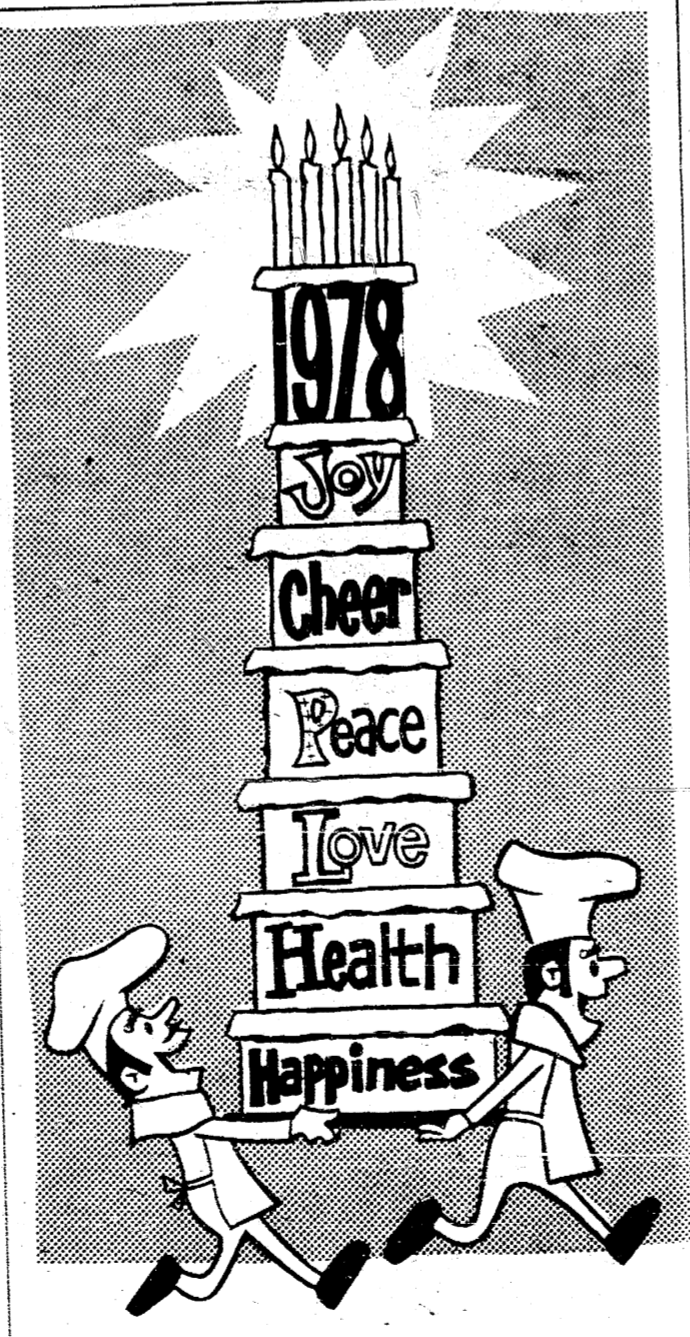

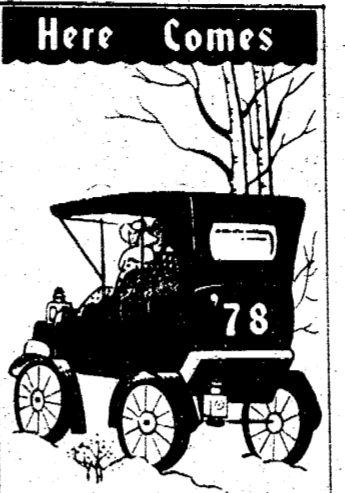

The sixth month of the Roman calendar was Sextilis, which became August.

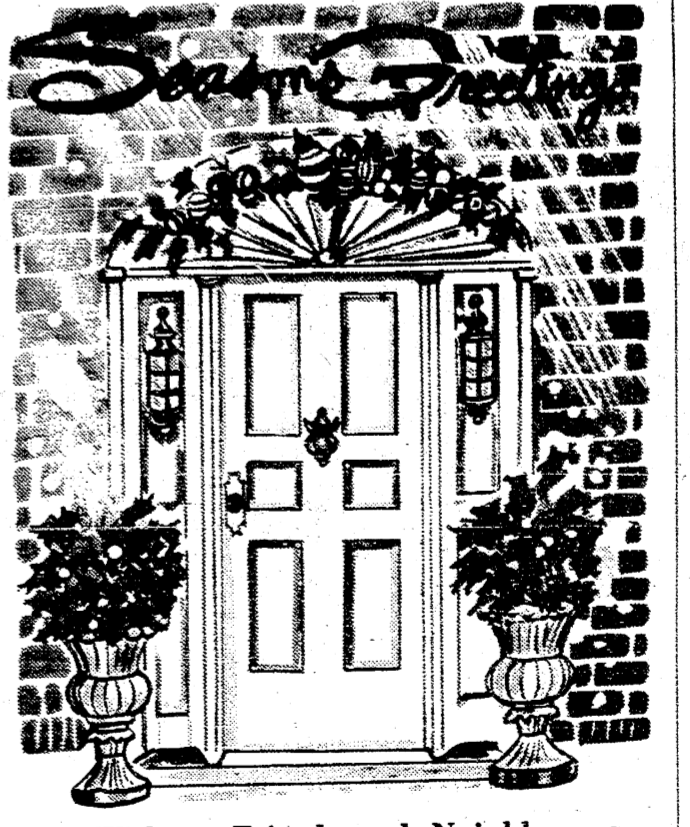

The Apple is Truly All-American

The apple is as much a part of the American way of life that many believe it is a native fruit. It's "All-American", but it isn't native. The apple's ancestry is traced to immigrants. Plant students believe the progenitor of the modern apple appeared first in southwest Asia, between the Caspian and Black Seas. Grows in virtually all states, more apples and more apple pies are produced in the United States than anywhere else in the world. Any time you hang a Christmas stocking you can count on finding an apple there come Christmas morn. As far as Santa knows, no one has ever complained about this eventuality.

Gregorian Calendar Until 2500

The Gregorian calendar since 1582 has withstood several efforts to adopt a new method of marking time. It will probably hold out until at least 2500 A.D., since mathematicians say it will be accurate until that time. The Roman calendar is not perfect. The solar year consists of 365 days, 5 hours, 48 minutes and 46 seconds. Those extra hours, minutes and seconds are compensated for through a well-ordered system of Leap Years, which keep the calendar and the solar equinoxes congruent.

Leap Years are those years divisible by four, exclusive of the years numbering the centuries. Century-marking years are Leap Years only if divisible by four after the centuries have been removed. The year 1978, not divisible by four, thus is not a Leap year, will have 365 days rather than 366.

Longest Year Was 46 B.C. - 455 Days

The longest year in history was 46 B.C., which contained two extra months and a total of 445 days.

The Roman calendar was supposedly devised by Numa Pompilius in the seventh century B.C. and, although revised several times, was some two months behind the sun by the time of Julius Caesar.

Caesar put his experts to work on a new calendar, but there remained the problem of what to do with the two months needed to catch up with the sun.

They solved the situation by inserting the two months between November and December, thus giving 46 B.C. a total of 445 days.

Traditional Foods For New Year Meal

In many sections of the United States, black-eyed peas are a traditional part of the New Year meal.

In Spain, it's sopa, rice cooked with olive oil, tomatoes, vegetables and meat particles. Africans enjoy cous-cous, a mixture of wheat grains, lamb and vegetables.

Armenians traditionally bake cakes for the New Year. Swedes make glogg, a traditional drink which is a mixture of claret wine, sugar, almonds, raisins, cinnamon, cloves and cardamom.

Scotland's Wassail bowl is filled with a mixture of ale, sugar and spices, warm, to which wine is sometimes added.

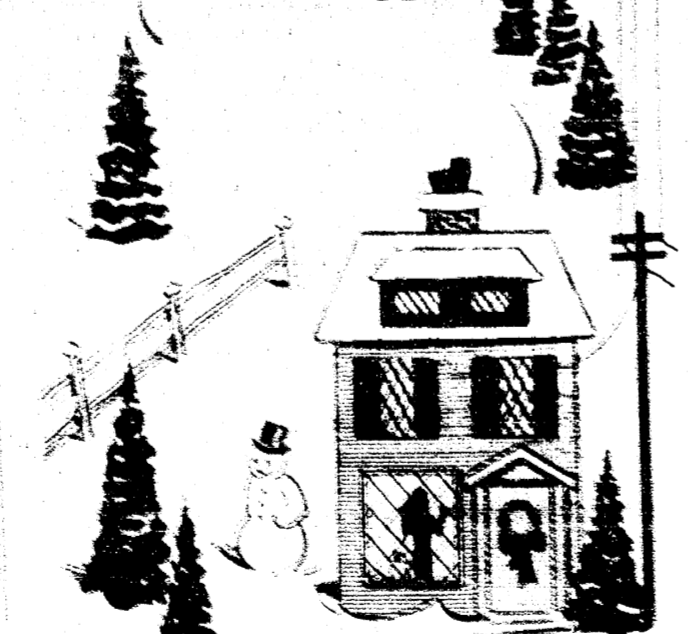

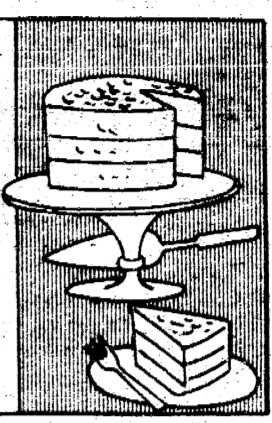

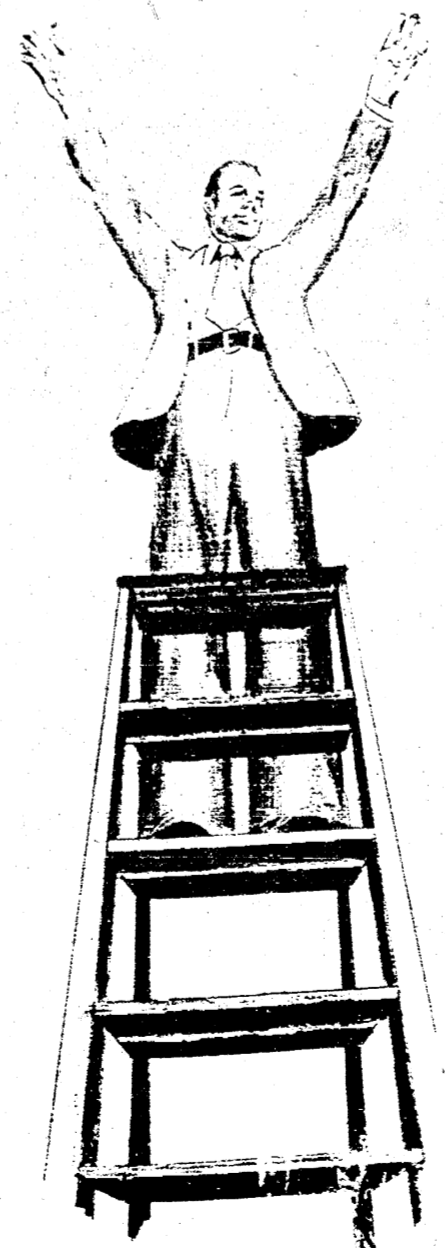


- 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups packaged Graham Cracker Crumbs
- 1/2 cup soft shortening
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2 eggs
- 8 small slices canned pineapple (2-9 oz. cans drained)
- 8 maraschino cherries

Heat oven to 375°F. (moderately hot oven). Put butter and brown sugar into 1 1/2-qt. aluminum ring mold. Set pan in oven while preparing batter. Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Stir in crumbs. Add shortening, milk and vanilla; beat 2 minutes. Add eggs. Beat 1 minute. Remove pan from oven. Spread sugar and butter evenly over bottom of pan. Lay pineapple slices around bottom of pan, on top of sugar mixture. Pour batter over fruit. Bake at 375°F. for 40 minutes, or until cake is done. Cool for 5 minutes on cake rack. Invert on to serving plate and decorate with cherries. Serve warm with whipped cream. Makes 8 servings.

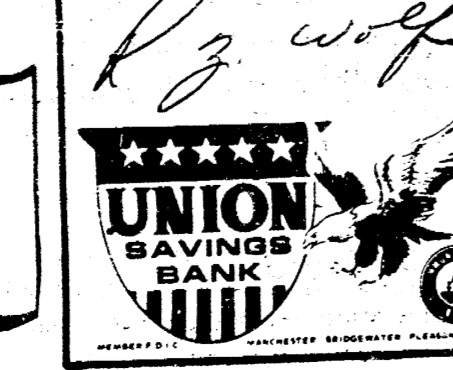

and over, will be given by volunteer tax counselors, who have received special training from the Michigan Department of the Treasury. W. de St. Aubin pointed out that to obtain a speaker to acquaint seniors with the benefits of the Act of 1973, or other information, call 665-3625, the Council on Aging office.

It is necessary to file a claim to obtain a tax credit or refund. We suggest that meetings be scheduled at senior centers, churches, public buildings and that a speaker be requested. If confined to their home, individual visits can usually be arranged.

WHAT'S COOKING IN MICHIGAN?

What did Napoleon, George Washington, John Adams, Dolly Madison, Cleopatra and the first Queen Elizabeth have in common? They all liked pickles.

Thomas Jefferson, another pickle person, once wrote, "On a hot day, in Virginia, I know of nothing more comforting than a fine spiced pickle, brought up trout-like from the sparkling depths of that aromatic jar below stairs in Aunt Sally's cellar."

Jefferson would have loved it in our state because, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, we're first in the nation for producing cucumbers for the pickling industry. In 1976 the crop was valued at \$11.5 million with production at 103 thousand tons.

There are hundreds of ways to use pickles, other than just fresh out of the jar. A sprinkle of chopped pickle or relish adds zip to most soups. Try dicing a pickle and putting some in scrambled eggs. Or dice one for stuffings, meat-loaves or meat dishes. Absolute versatility.

If you're watching your weight, pickles can be transformed into snacks that don't add to your waistline.

For Calorie Counter's Stuffed Celery, combine 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1/2 cup cottage cheese, 1/3 cup chopped sweet gherkins, a pinch of salt and 1 tablespoon chopped celery leaves. Mix well and spread on six celery stalks. It's said these have about 30 calories per serving.

Another munchy for the dieter is stuffed mushrooms. Mix together 1/2 cup chopped mixed sweet pickles and 1/2 cup chopped apples. Stuff 8 large mushroom caps and each serving has only about 25 calories. Really, I'm the right weight. It's just that I'm not 6 foot 2 inches tall, where they have my weight on all those charts.



UNCLE SAM IN THE KITCHEN

The attack against so-called junk food is increasing. In many communities, there is growing pressure to ban candy, potato chips and soda pop from school cafeterias. According to U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPORT, 25 states have restrictions against the sale of what they consider junk food in schools.

Farmers have always been in favor of good nutrition. They've supported increased availability and variety of fruits, meats, vegetables and milk from U.S. production. But they can't help wondering if the government might go too far in dictating rigid nutritional requirements. In the past, parents were responsible for

seeing that their children ate proper meals, but now with school breakfast programs, lunch programs, day care provider programs, the government is taking over the role of telling our kids what to eat.

Take, for instance, a proposed regulation by USDA that would ban formulated grain fruit products from the school breakfast program. If you don't know what they are, think about your coffee break. If you ate a doughnut with your coffee, then you had a formulated grain fruit product.

Carol Foreman, assistant secretary of agriculture for food and consumer services, wants to ban doughnuts and coffee cake and the like from the school premises. She says there is controversy over their fat and sugar content.

If it's doughnuts today—what will it be tomorrow? Farmers are concerned about how the government will go in telling us what to eat and how much of it. It used to be the government was expected to check on the preparation of food we

buy and the purity of food and leave the choice up to the individual appetite.
Now...just how far will Uncle Sam go in our kitchen?

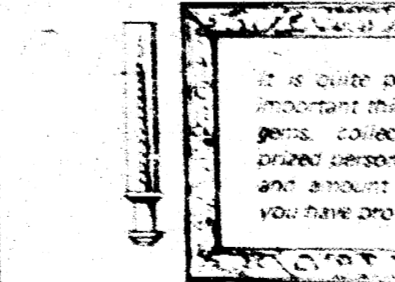

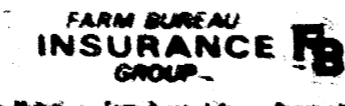
