### Chelsea Hospital Asks for Expansion

Chelsea Community Hospital has asked the State for approval to expand its facilities from 100 beds to 120 beds. The project, if approved, would increase the number of psychiatric beds from six to 16, and would reclassify 19 skilled nursing beds to 12 substance abuse beds and seven medical-surgical beds. In addition, the \$1,300,000 project would include construction of a therapy services area and an administrative facility. Also, the kitchen/dining room would be expanded, and the main corridor remodeled. In keeping with federal regulations requiring approval prior to change in service

and/or construction, Chelsea Community Hospital has submitted an application for a Certificate of Need. The application is under review by the Division of Health Facility Planning and Construction, Michigan Department of Public Health.

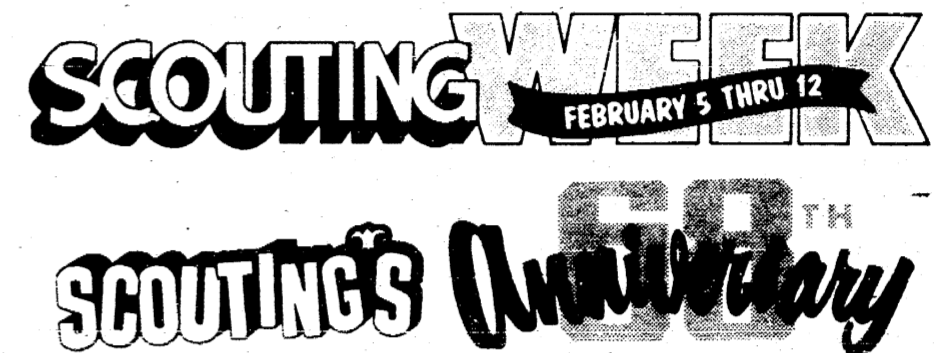

The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

**UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE**

SEC. 495. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he offers to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

**TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME**

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved there, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such requests shall not be made after the 30th day next preceding any election or primary election, unless such 30th day fall on a Saturday, Sunday or a legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day.

**TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY**

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election board in the precinct in which he is registered at the next meeting primary or election. The inspector in charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration request, and if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact by affixing his initials upon said request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 503 of this act filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk, who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

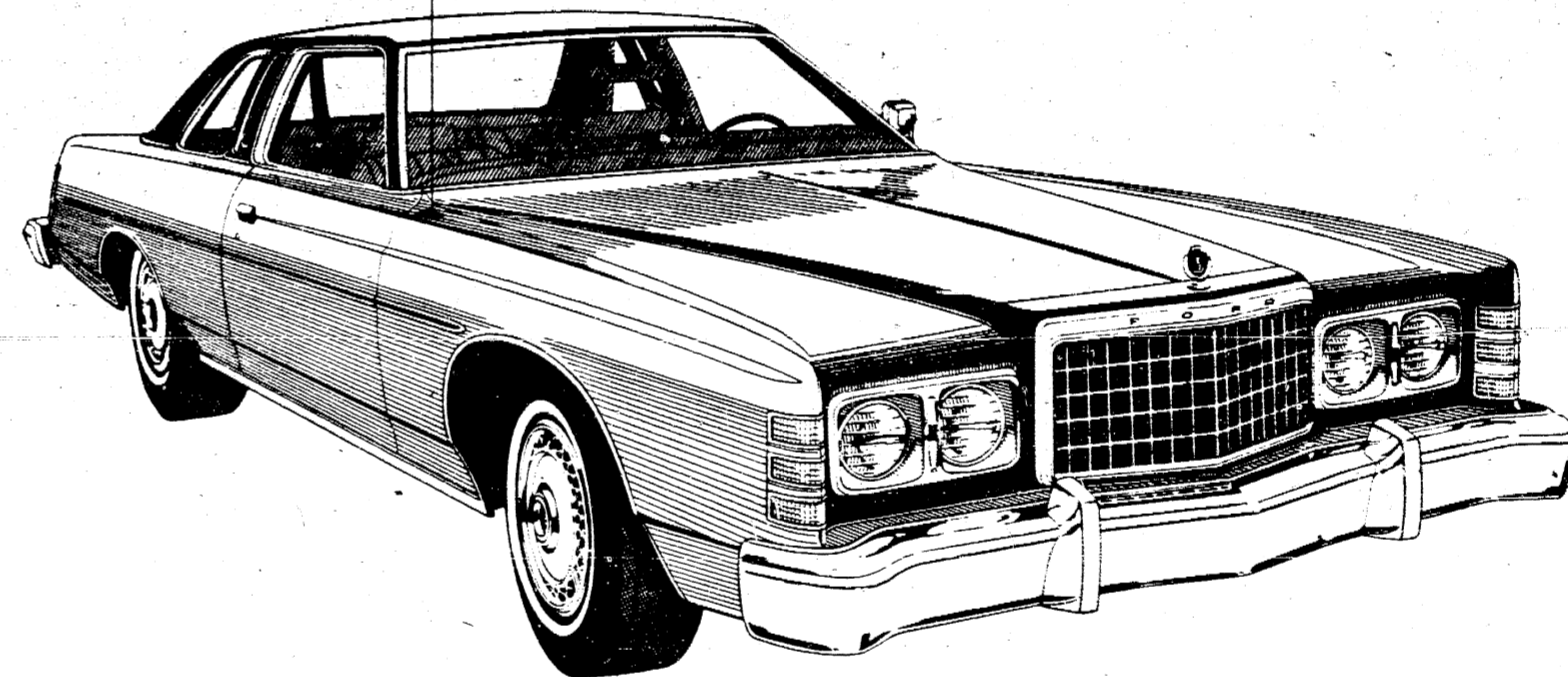

and strong. She is checked for phosphate and calcium levels monthly, along with her normal growth. Finding the right dosage for her is quite tricky, as too much can cause her kidney damage. Quite a load for a 5 year old child.

Negative RH factor seems to be more prevalent than most people think. The RH factor is a protein in the blood. When a mother does not have this protein, she is termed RH negative. If the mother's baby has RH positive blood and some of it slips into the mother's system, she begins to build antibodies to it. Should this condition go undetected the baby can be born deformed, retarded, or even stillborn. Advances have been made in this problem, in the form of a total blood exchange, either in or out of the womb, for the baby; and a serum for the mother, to desensitize her after her first baby only. The long term goal is to be able to totally desensitize the mother, so she does not have trouble with any subsequent baby. Research is working on this

goal. Another problem is low birthweight. There are many causes to consider here, and is a major concern for March of Dimes doctors and researchers. Smoking, drinking, drugs, being a first baby, or a baby of a very young mother, chemical imbalances, vitamin deficiency; these are a few factors that figure in on low birthweight. This is why it is so very important for a mother to place herself in a doctor's care, as soon as she suspects she is pregnant, and to follow his directions carefully. So much can be done through good nutrition, proper rest, and the doctor detecting little telltale signs. Sometimes simply taking the right vitamin can help

a baby grow to a good healthy birthweight. Sometimes it is much more complicated, and needs the attention of trained medical people. March of Dimes researchers at the U of M are constantly searching for the answers to combat all the causes of low birthweight. There are so many more defects. Enzyme and vitamin deficiencies causing retardation, heart deformations, spinal deformations, mongolism; so many, many more. These are the reasons you should volunteer. This is the fight March of Dimes is fighting. Monumental is the word --- but progress is being made, all because you helped.

## March of Dimes Money Works Washtenaw County CELEBRATES 40th ANNIVERSARY

The 1977 March of Dimes campaign netted just over \$116,000. About a third, or \$35,000, was collected in the city's Mother's Marches. All very good, but what exactly does that money do for Washtenaw County? Does Washtenaw County really benefit from all this money?

For research, printing public education materials, special grants, and administration costs. Then it puts the other 40% to work. Of course, there is a certain amount which must go for campaign materials. Pamphlets and reports on our local area must be printed and distributed. Then some of the money is disbursed as follows.

\$25,000 is provided for 5 scholarships to high school seniors entering health related fields in college. \$5,000 is a grant to the Birth Defects Diagnosis Center at the U of M. \$6,600 provides a Health Educator at the Student Parent Center. \$8,000 goes to direct patient aid for birth defects and polio. There is a grant to LaMaze for teaching pre-natal care and nutrition to school-age parents in county high schools, and Scholarships to Family Life Forum in parenting and pre-natal care. A merit award goes to a U of M medical student for a major paper on birth defects. Films and public education materials for presentations to schools, clubs, and organizations, are provided. There is participation in local Health Fairs in co-operation with the Washtenaw County Health Department. "Shots For Tots" are supplied to schools for kindergarten roundups, and other clinics. Also an education module on perinatal nursing care at U of M and St. Joseph's hospitals for nurses. There is work being done with such groups as Spina Bifida, Cleft Palate, and other organizations. Health education materials are distributed to doctors offices, hospitals, and clinics. March of Dimes also sponsors a Youth Conference for 500 area high school students.

The official oratorical contest subject is "Today's Challenge - Tomorrow's Success". Contestants must speak on the local subject for not less than four minutes and not more than five minutes. Judging is based on personal qualities, original organization, delivery and presentation, and overall effectiveness. Further information may be obtained from contest chairman Ted Tapping, 428-
