LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



The late Dr. Charles Callan Farnill, the highly respected historian at Georgetown University, warned a decade ago that "The expulsion of the United States from the Panama Canal Zone has been an objective of the Communists ever since they took over the government of Russia in 1917. The slogan to 'internationalize the Panama Canal' was first coined in Moscow, and has been actively implemented during several decades. The deep Communist interest in the internationalizing of the Canal was brought

to light by Spruille Braden, who was Assistant Secretary of State, 1945-47. Alger Hiss was then in charge of Special Political Affairs in the Department. Braden discovered that Hiss had turned over official Canal Zone papers to the United Nations on the ground that the Zone was "occupied territory" and hence under United Nations purview. Apparently, the attack upon the United States sovereignty over the Zone had been planned by Moscow.

Most reasonable Americans would expect that after a high-ranking official like Alger Hiss is exposed as a Communist agent working for a hostile foreign power our government would immediately review his work, detail the instances and which he influenced U.S. policies to the detriment of our national interests and to the advantage of his Communist bosses, and then reverse those policies. This has not been the case with the Canal Zone.

There is no constitutional, legal, or practical reason for this nation to give away her territory on the Isthmus in obedience to Communist demands. It cannot be to frequently emphasized that the 1903 treaty with Panama specifies 19 times that Panama has ceded this territory to the United States; it states 7 times that the territory has been ceded IN PERPETUITY; and, it then specifically states that Panama retains no sovereignty and powers over the territory which has now been ceded to the United States. As for the legitimacy of the agreement, it is important to note that, following the November 1903 signing of the treaty by the representatives of the U.S. and Panama, every member of the Cabinet of the Panamanian Government then signed the treaty ceding to the United States the Zone where the Canal was to be built.

Promoters of the Panama Canal give-away have made the following claims:
1. If we do not surrender the Canal, sabotage and guerrilla warfare will result. However, such dire predictions conveniently overlook the fact that U.S. military forces stationed in the Canal Zone were able to keep the Canal free from sabotage during four wars.

2. We do not have sovereignty over the Canal Zone and never have. Anyone familiar with the 1903 treaty knows better.

3. There is little Communist influence in Panama today. "The ruler of Panama, General Omar Torrijos, is a Marxist. His government is composed of Marxists. He is allied to Fidel Castro, and he is in sympathy with the Soviet Union's goal of forced Communization of our entire Western Hemisphere. Torrijos has outlawed all political parties in Panama except the Communist Party." "There are at least 2,500 known Communists in Panama, many controlling government offices..." These statements were made by Congressman George Hansen and columnist Henry J. Taylor, a former U.S. ambassador.

4. The Carter Administration claims that because large aircraft carriers and supertankers cannot use the Canal, that it is strategically obsolete. Only 13 aircraft carriers and 26 supertankers fit this description, 98% of U.S. naval ships - including submarines - and 90% of U.S. commercial shipping still can use the Canal.

5. The Canal can be returned to the Panamanians by ratification of the treaty by the U.S. Senate. This is unconstitutional. The Canal is federally owned property. Therefore, Article IV of the Constitution gives the power to dispose of federally owned property to the Congress—that is, to both Houses. It was by Congressional authorization that the U.S. purchased from the Republic of Panama, and from individual landholders, all the real estate in the Canal Zone and then built the Canal there, and only by Congressional authorization—by both

Senate and House—can it be given away. WRITE, WRITE, WRITE your Senators and urge them to vote NO on the Canal treaty.



THE RIGHT TO FARM

As important as food is to life...without it, we die...the last thing you would expect to happen is city people objecting to farmers farming...farmers growing food for you and me. But some city people do. Well, it's not really the growing of food that they object to. It's the noise and the smell that's a part of the food growing business.

Livestock do have certain odors and the manure they drop has even stronger odors. Tractors are loud and when the work calls for getting out in the fields at 6 a.m. or running until 10 or 11 at night and the fields are near towns or cities, people will hear the bellowing of diesel engines when they would much prefer quiet.

So in New Jersey and some of our other more metropolitan states, city people are calling for laws and ordinances and are making complaints and filing suits to stop those activities of farming they object to. The end result though, will be to harass farmers out of the business thus reducing the food supply and raising prices.

In New Jersey, it's led to a drive by farmers to get the state legislature to pass a "right to farm" law. The aim is to assure farmers they can use their own best judgement on how to go about producing food for you and me...and be free from harassment by city people who don't like the smell, or the dust, or the noise of farming. Those farmers are working for those of us who like to eat.

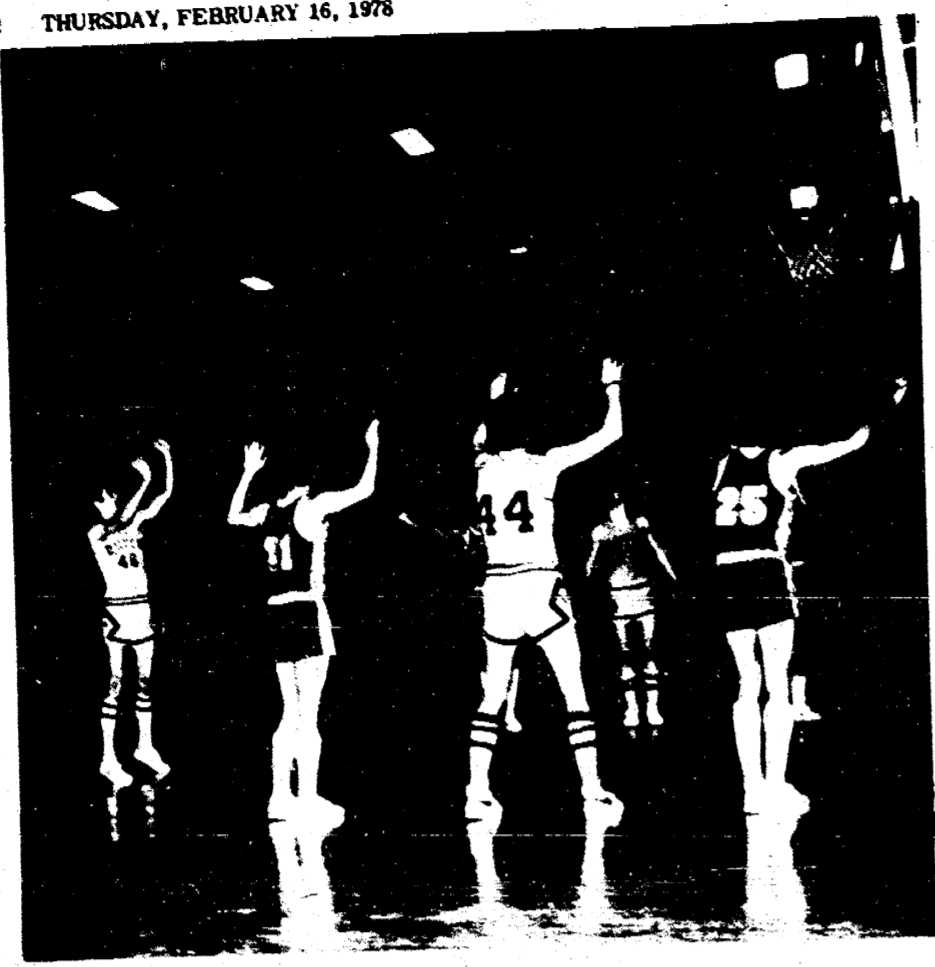
