It was suggested that an article be placed in the Manchester Enterprise regarding sidewalk cleanup.

A letter was received from Washtenaw County regarding cost studies and the availability of information on annual budgets, capital improvement programs, etc. Little indicated that cooperation would be forthcoming to the Washtenaw County Planning Commission.

A SEMCOG proposal for adoption of an areawide water quality plan for Southeast Michigan was read and discussed in brief.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Kennedy to table the issue for further study. All yeas, carried.

Rigg reported on a phone conversation with Mr. Horvath in Lansing regarding the grant approval for Chi-Bro Park. He was advised by Mr. Horvath that approval had been given November 29, 1977. A formal statement will be forthcoming. As Rigg requested, since no clear formal approval had yet been received in writing, Rigg indicated that a master plan will be necessary for the parks in Manchester to obtain any other funding on park improvements.

 AGRICULTURE'S BOOM AND BUST

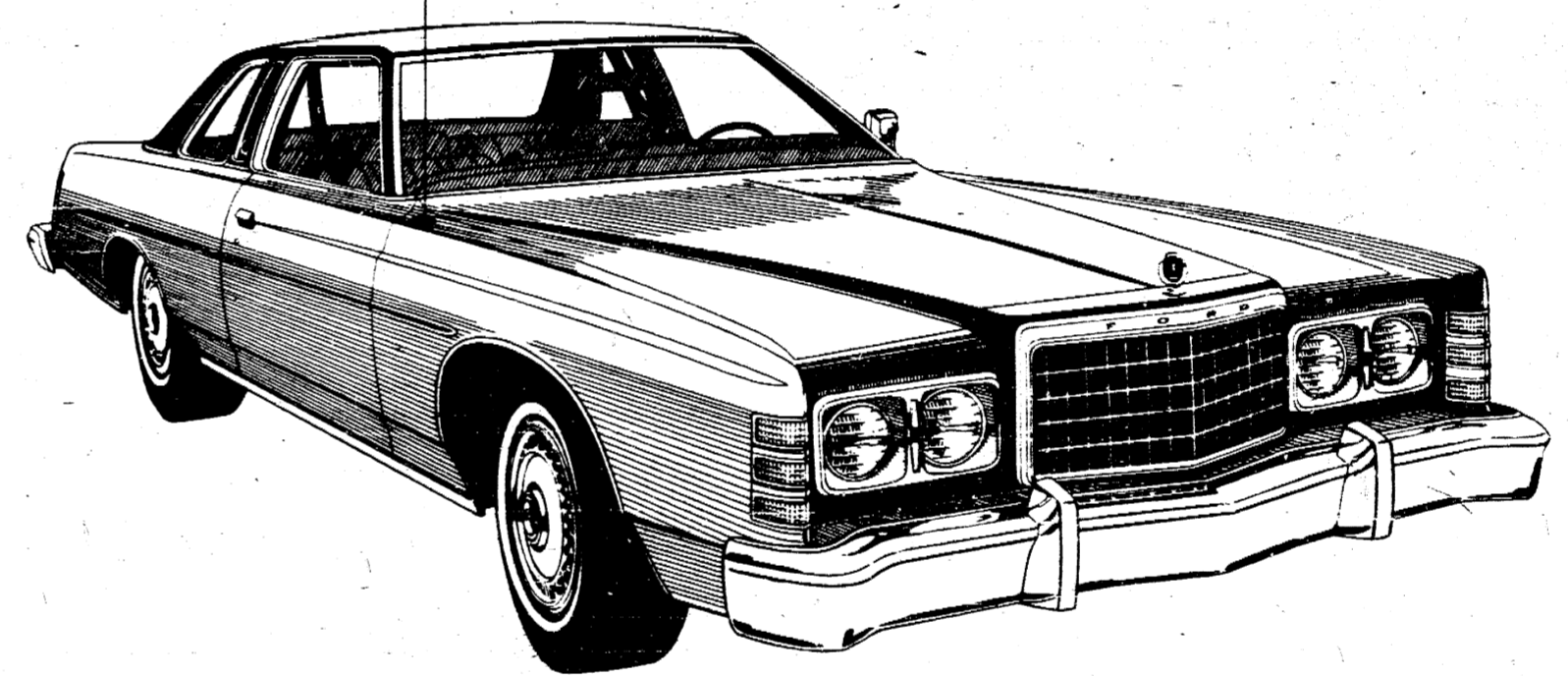
Some of the new farm bills being introduced in Washington are aimed at ironing out the boom and bust cycles of farming. Inally, that is the same goal the Carter

Administration had, but they seem to have ironed out the boom first.
 The question now is how much more government control of agriculture are farmers willing to trade off for better prices? There are some farmers, with their backs to the wall, who are probably willing to agree to anything if it means better prices for what they produce.
 Among the bills to accommodate them is one that would raise prices to 90

percent of parity. In return, farmers would be issued orders on how much they could produce to sell at that price. If a farmer somehow tried to circumvent the controls, he would be suspended from farming for three to five years. That sounds like a bit much government "snoopervision" for most farmers.
 Consumers, of course, also have a stake in ironing out the boom and bust cycles. Presumably they would support more

government money for farming in return for price controls on retail food. In other words, food prices would be limited to a certain increase and that's it.
 Before we go too far in ironing out the boom and bust cycles of agriculture, let's be fully aware that if we agree to complete federal authority over agriculture, we will never see another boom again.
 It just won't be allowed...

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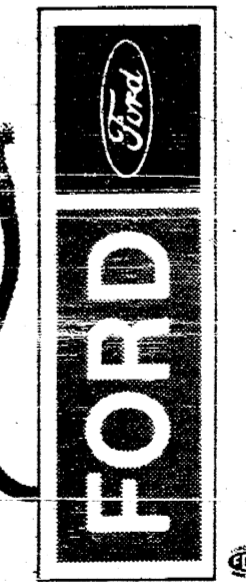

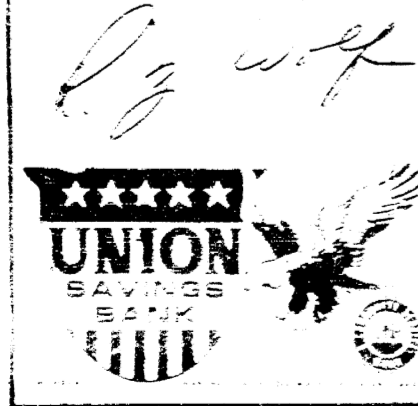
