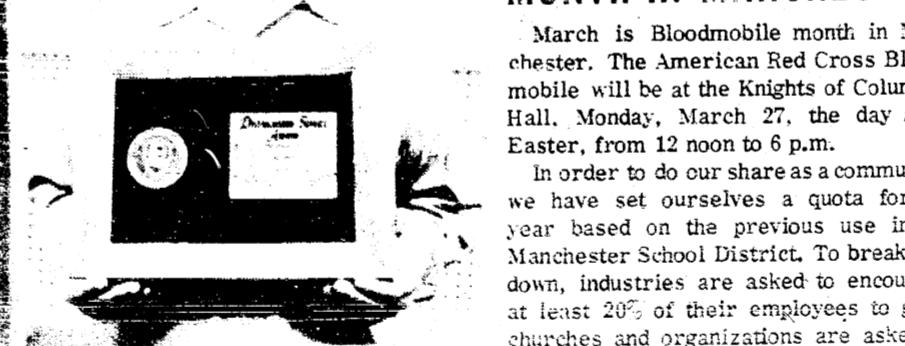

Warmest congratulations are in order for the members of the Manchester Junior Symphony and their conductor, Mrs. Joyce Meade. The Junior Symphony just received a \$500.00 grant from the Michigan Council for the Performing Arts, an organization supported by Michigan taxpayers money. Quite an accomplishment!

For those who may not be aware, going through the steps of qualifying for a grant is made up of hours of legwork and brainstorming. Due to the tireless enthusiasm and efforts of Mrs. Meade and a few parents this was made possible.

As you know the Spring Program was dropped from the Manchester Community School curriculum this year. It was felt that there were not enough students to warrant the cost of continuing the program. The symphony participants, ages 11-14 number 39 at present; the majority of which are spring players. I heard them perform in their combined concert with the Community Orchestra in the fall and was more than pleasantly surprised with their accomplishments. As were a number of others judging from comments overheard in the audience.

Mrs. Meade is to be commended for her vision and caring and enthusiasm. The

### HEARTWORM DISEASE AND YOUR DOG

Mosquito season will soon be upon us. At this time we should start to think about our dogs and Heartworm Disease. This area of Michigan has been known for a high incidence of Heartworm Disease. The following article is for your information on Heartworm Disease and your dog.

**What is it:**  
Heartworm Disease in dogs is caused by long white worms known by the scientific name *Dirofilaria immitis*. The adult worms, when fully grown, may reach a length of 8-14 inches. These worms are usually found in the right side of the heart and adjacent blood vessels and may also migrate to the lungs.

**What are its effects:**  
Severe heartworm infection can result in serious damage to a dog's heart and other organs before any signs or symptoms are noticed. The disease may cause coughing, labored breathing, weakness, tiring and loss of weight. If not detected and controlled with proper treatment, the disease can lead to congestive heart failure and death.

**What is its source:**  
The life cycle of the heartworm is quite different from any other worm in dogs. It is transmitted to the dog only through the bite of a mosquito. Certain areas in the country have more of a problem than others, and the lower eastern part of Michigan is an epidemic area.

When the infected mosquito bites a dog

it passes larvae (microfilariae) into the dog's skin. The larvae then burrows into the skin where it lives for 90 - 100 days and grows to about 3 inches long. It then penetrates into the blood vessels and moves to the right side of the heart and adjoining vessels where it develops into an adult and starts producing microfilariae which are reabsorbed into the dog's blood stream. The microfilariae do not grow but live in the blood stream for three years. When a mosquito bites an infected dog it takes with it the microfilariae which develop into an infective larvae in about 14 to 21 days. This mosquito may, when it bites another dog, infect him with these immature Heartworms.

**How is it detected:**  
Heartworm can be detected in most dogs by your veterinarian through a blood test. They look for the presence of microfilariae in the blood. Some dogs may have adult worms but do not produce microfilariae. In such cases an x-ray examination and other laboratory tests are used to make a diagnosis.

**Can infected dogs be treated:**  
Most dogs can be successfully treated if the disease is not in its advanced stages. Drugs are given through carefully administered injections that cause the adult Heartworm to die. Further treatment is necessary to take care of the microfilariae so your dog will not be a source of further infection to himself or other dogs. If your dog is found to be infected, your veterinarian will discuss the full treatment with you.

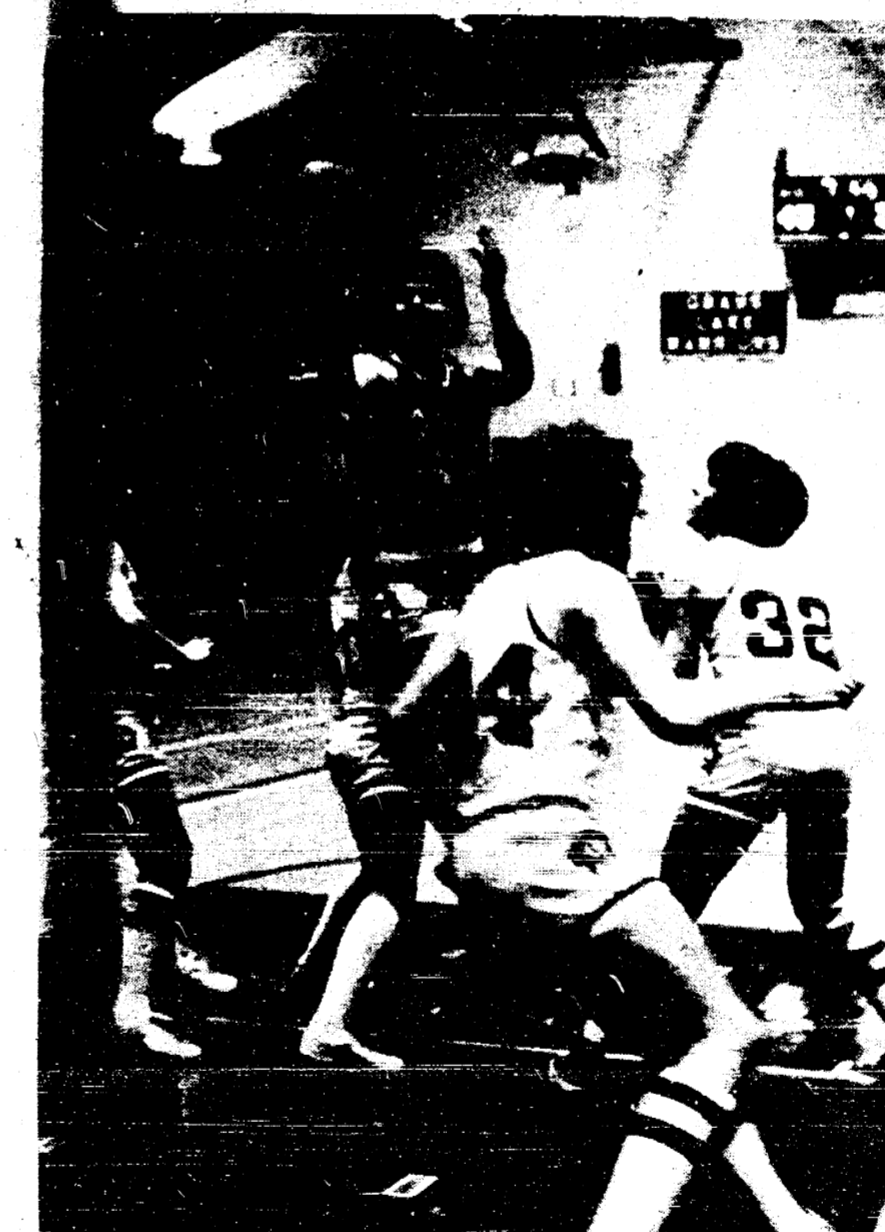
**Can it be prevented:**  
The most effective and practical means of controlling heartworm today is to prevent them from ever reaching the adult stage.

There is a medicine available from your veterinarian that, when given every day during the mosquito season and 30 - 60 days following, can prevent the immature larvae from developing into an adult in your dog's heart.

It is most important that your dog have a yearly blood test before starting on his or her preventative medication.

Committee stated that the job description was not policy, but the Policy Committee had reviewed it and recommended that it be adopted.

After a short discussion, it was moved by Mick, that the job description for Building Principals be approved as submitted. Seconded by Macomber. All yeas. Motion carried.

The next item of business was a proposed policy on Board Operating procedures. Mrs. Mick, Chairman of the Policy Committee reported that the Committee and Mr. Masten had not been able to meet to discuss the proposed policy. Therefore, she moved to table the consideration of policy at this time and place it on the agenda at the next regular meeting. Supported by Macomber, Yeas-Kensler, Westfall, Walkowe, Macomber, Mick and Bunney. Nays-Feldkamp. Motion carried.

The next item was omissions and inaccuracies of the Meeting of November 1, 1977, that had been researched and discovered by Member Macomber.

Moved by Macomber that the following additions and corrections to the November 1, 1977, meeting be so approved and added as a supplement to the November 1 Meeting.

1. The motion to approve the Minutes of the regular meeting of October 17, 1977, were approved with the recorded roll call vote being 6 yeas with member Macomber abstaining.

2. Financing of a new station wagon purchased for \$5,660.78 was discussed and it was approved to finance on a two year note at 5% interest with the Union Savings Bank. The first payment of \$2,830.39 plus interest being due November 1978 and the second payment of \$2,830.39 plus interest being due in November of 1979.

3. Annabell Eversole was employed as Secretary at the High School at a rate of \$5.65 per hour with insurance and sick leave.

Cindy Turnell was employed as Custodian at the High School at an annual salary of \$8,820 (\$4.24 per hour) with insurance, sick leave and vacation days.

Mike Schneider was employed as a part time custodian at a rate of \$2.30 per hour with no benefits.

4. Ed Tubaugh was appointed assistant principal at Pleasant Lake School and \$1200 was authorized in addition to his scheduled teachers pay for his extra duties.

5. Acting Superintendent McGuire reported that the coil to repair the steam convertor at the Nellie Ackerson School would cost \$1,596 which is \$300 more than reported originally.

Seconded by Walkowe. All yeas. Motion carried.

Mr. Masten requested Board approval on 3 new persons who have been employed on a probationary basis. After a short discussion, Mrs. Westfall moved that the employment of Tom Schultz on a probationary basis, as School Maintenance, at a rate of \$4.50 per hour, with insurance, sick leave and vacation benefits, be approved. Supported by Kensler. All yeas. Motion carried.

Moved by Kensler that the employment of Loretta Widmayer on a probationary basis as Bookkeeper of Internal and Service Accounts at a rate of \$4.10 per hour with insurance and sick leave benefits be approved. Supported by Feldkamp. All yeas. Motion carried.

Moved by Westfall that the employment of Carol Kemeter on a probationary basis as High School Custodian at an annual salary of \$8,820 (\$4.24 per hour) with insurance, sick leave and vacation benefits be approved. Supported by Feldkamp, Yeas, Westfall, Feldkamp, Walkowe, Macomber, Mick and Bunney. Abstain-Kensler.

A few questions from the audience were answered at this time.

The Board scheduled an informal Work session at 8:00 P.M. on March 6, 1978 in the High School.

Mr. Macomber said that he had a statement he wanted placed in the Board Minutes.

Fres. Bunney recognized Mr. Macomber.

Mr. Macomber's statement was addressed to Fres. Bunney and the Members of the Board of Education as follows:

"We previously approved to have all our meetings recorded on tape, so there could be no confusion about what transpires at the meetings. I request you as Chairman, to see that this action is carried out without further delay. You are in the position to enforce the board's decision. If you do not choose to exercise this authority, then I will need to decide the further steps to be taken."

Moved by Kensler to move into executive session to discuss negotiations. Supported by Westfall. All yeas. Motion carried. The Board moved to executive session at 10:30 P.M.

The Board reconvened to regular session at 11:10 P.M.

Moved by Feldkamp to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by Walkowe. All yeas. Motion carried.

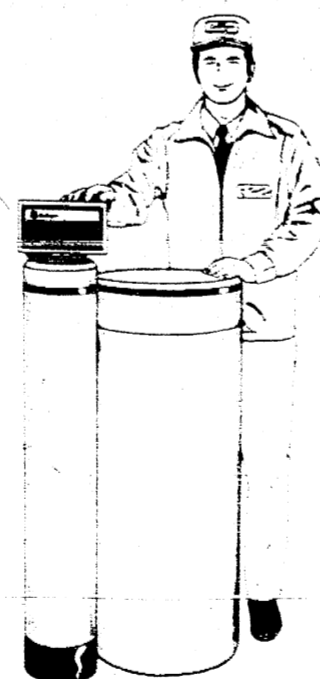
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### MEASLES OUT BREAK IN WASHTENAW COUNTY

It has been brought to our attention by Dr. Hwang that the measles outbreak in Washtenaw County is still prevalent, therefore we are re-running the following article from our December 15 issue. Measles (rubeola) sometimes called "hard," "red," "7-day," or "old fashioned" measles can be a very serious disease. Complications can include ear infections, pneumonia, deafness, blindness and convulsive disorders or other forms of brain disease. Encephalitis occurs in approximately 1 case in 1,000 and may result in permanent brain damage.

Measles is a preventable disease and immunizations against it are required for school entry by all the school districts. The vaccine is safe and better than 95% effective. The Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the U.S. Public Health Service and the American Academy of Pediatrics Committee on Infectious Diseases both strongly recommend that whatever steps are necessary be taken to assure that all children entering school are protected and that all susceptible children be promptly immunized when measles occurs in a community as is now happening in Washtenaw County.

Susceptible to measles are defined as persons who lack: 1) physicians certification or other acceptable evidence of having had measles, or 2) certification of adequate immunization with live measles vaccine

when 12 or more months of age.

The following persons cannot be considered adequately protected and should be re-vaccinated: 1) children previously vaccinated with live measles vaccine before they were 12 months of age 2) persons previously vaccinated with killed measles vaccine 3) persons previously vaccinated with live measles vaccine within 3 months after receiving the killed measles vaccine.

If a person is not sure of his or her immunization status, revaccination is recommended. Infants as young as 6 months may be vaccinated if there is likelihood of exposure to natural measles.

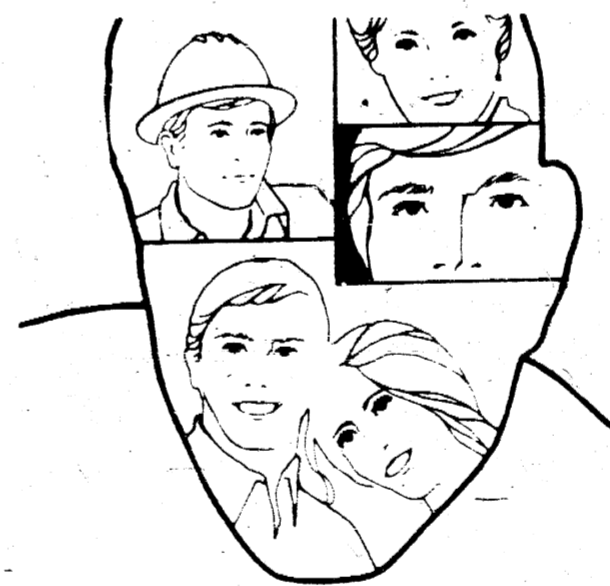
The Washtenaw County Health Department is advising local physicians of the problem and recommending that immunization schedules be altered accordingly. The Department urges that parents who are unsure of their children's measles immunization status check with the child's own physician as to their need for protection. Children who are not under the care of a private physician or clinic may be brought to the Health Department immunization clinics, with their records of past immunizations. Clinics are held in Ann Arbor on the third Saturday morning of each month and in Ypsilanti on the second and fourth Saturdays. Section 2. ACTS PROHIBITED No person shall:

(2) be intoxicated in a public place and be either endangering directly the safety

of another person or of property or be acting in a manner that causes a public disturbance.

- A. golf courses, but not including golf driving ranges;
- B. country clubs, public swimming pools, and recreation clubs, public and private parks and playgrounds;
- C. churches and public buildings;

- E. essential services, as provided in Section 10.03K and L, herein;
- F. home occupations;
- G. professional medical offices.

To bring a bit of that island paradise into your home, here is a recipe your whole



family should enjoy.

**JAMAICAN RICE PUDDING**

- 3 cups cooked rice
- 3-1/2 cups milk
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup flaked coconut
- Meringue

Combine rice, milk, butter, sugar, and salt. Cook over low heat until thick and creamy, about 30 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in vanilla and coconut. Chill. Spoon into dessert dishes; top with meringue. Garnish with additional coconut, plain or toasted, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

Meringue: Combine 1 egg white, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon instant coffee powder, 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar, and 2 teaspoons rum extract in a small deep mixing bowl. Mix well. Pour in 1/4 cup boiling water and beat at high speed until meringue stands in stiff peaks.

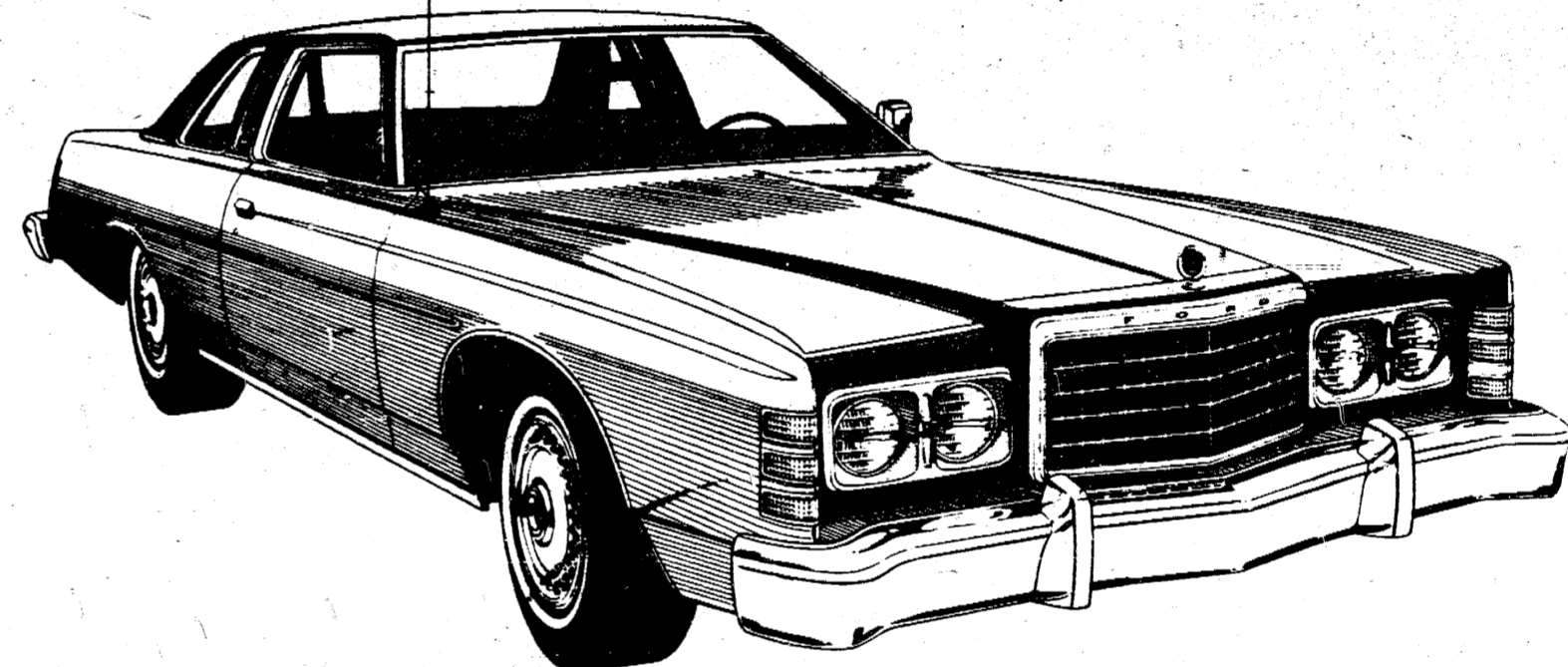


