Manchester Family Service Annual Report

Manchester Family Service, Inc., is a local group supported by the Manchester United Way, area churches, organizations and individuals. It is an incorporated agency managed by nine volunteer board members who represent the various parts of the Manchester School District. It is not what some people think and call "a welfare agency." In fact it has no official connection whatever with the Department of Social Services (DSS) and that agencies financial aid to people in the area.
Manchester Family Service's function is to give assistance to all families and individuals in the School District to locate and, if necessary, to get them to the proper agency or facility to meet their needs. Sixty different locations were among the places contacted last year. It also handles emergency situations for a family or person at the time of a home fire (burn-out) or major tragedy to help coordinate the public's desire to help when there is no closer tie the victim would prefer to have handle the problem.
All of these things were explained at the recent annual meeting of the agency. Statistics for 1977 showed that 76 families were assisted including 227 individuals. There were 122 children in this number and 36 older adults. Approximately 750 calls for assistance and information were received by the chairman and vice-chairman of the organization during the past year. Twelve volunteer drivers covered 8,427 miles in 1977 for residents who had no way of getting to doctors, clinics, hospitals, dentists and other emergency and/or necessary appointments. Drivers are always in demand. Free clothing shops were held three times in 1977--June, September and December. The recipients of this clothing are families from DSS lists of those in need who are willing to accept assistance of this sort, victims of burn-outs or other

emergencies, and families whose needs are brought to the attention of the local agency by any group, industry or concerned neighbor who may know where there is a temporary need not involved with DSS.

The clothing is furnished by people in the area. It must be clean, usable clothing of all sorts, from underwear to coats. It is more satisfactory if the clothing or household items from draperies and bedding to pots and pans, can be delivered to the location of the shop at the time designated rather than to the home of Mrs. Franklin Reck, chairman of Manchester Family Service. A call to Mrs. Reck (428-8852) or Mrs. William Schwab, Vice-chairman, (428-8976) is necessary to make arrangements for such delivery.

Between local shops, clients may have referrals from the agency to the House-by-the-Side-of-the-Road, the Washtenaw County Center for clothing for the needy. Home Aides are often requested by families and this is a need we would like to be able to fill with persons trained for the work. The agency is considering giving a training course in this service. Anyone interested should call Mrs. Reck or Mrs. Schwab.

Manchester Family Service handles the Christmas Bureau in the area for the DSS and Washtenaw County Health Department. A detailed report of this project was given in the Enterprise in January.

Furniture and household appliances are taken care of on an exchange basis. With-out suitable storage space for such items, Mrs. Reck keeps a list of "NEEDS" and "HAVES" by her phone. A call will often find a new home for something within a week or even the same day. The very thing someone wants to dispose of may be the item another person is waiting for. Call before you send things to the dump, if they are usable.

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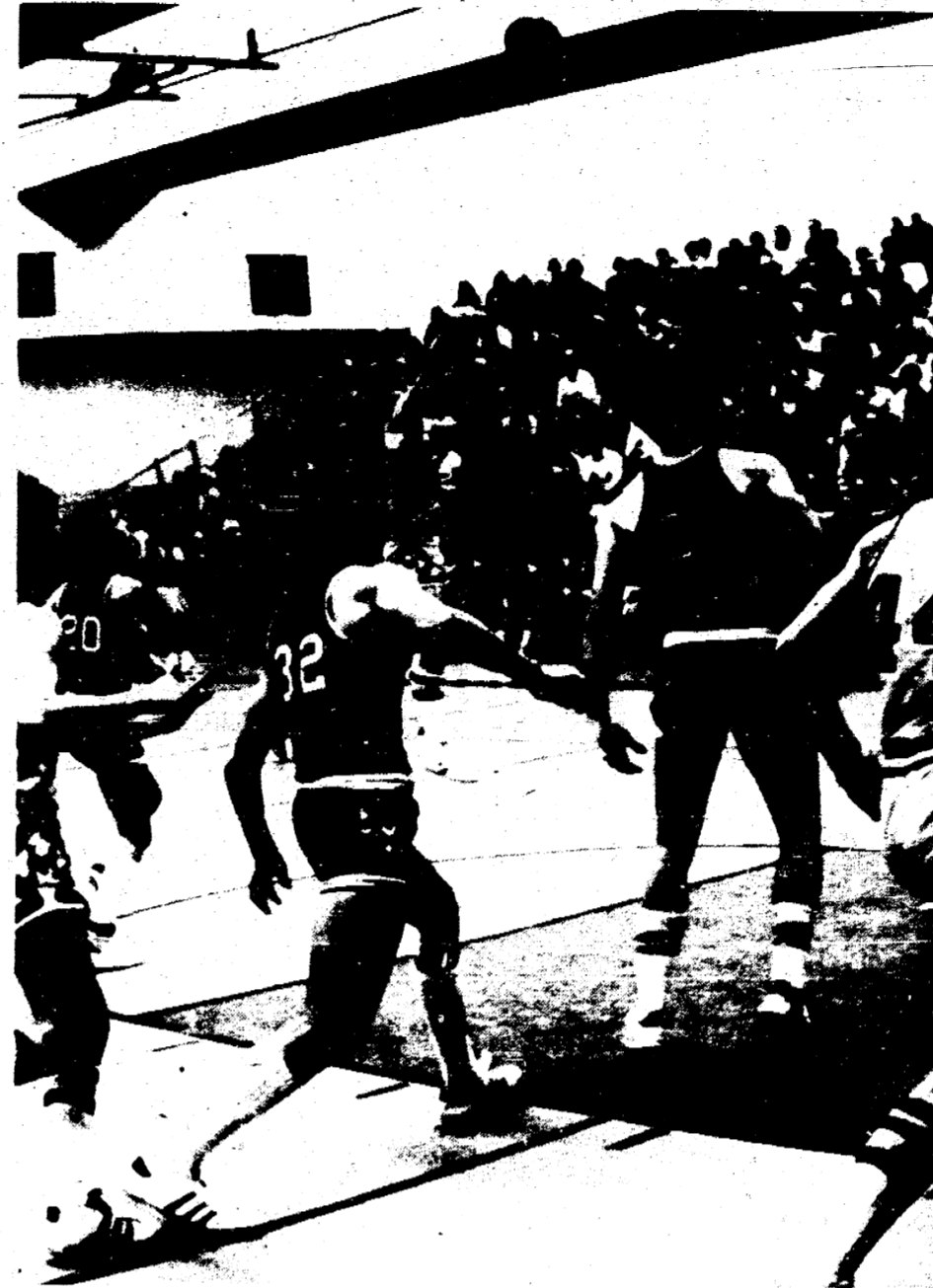

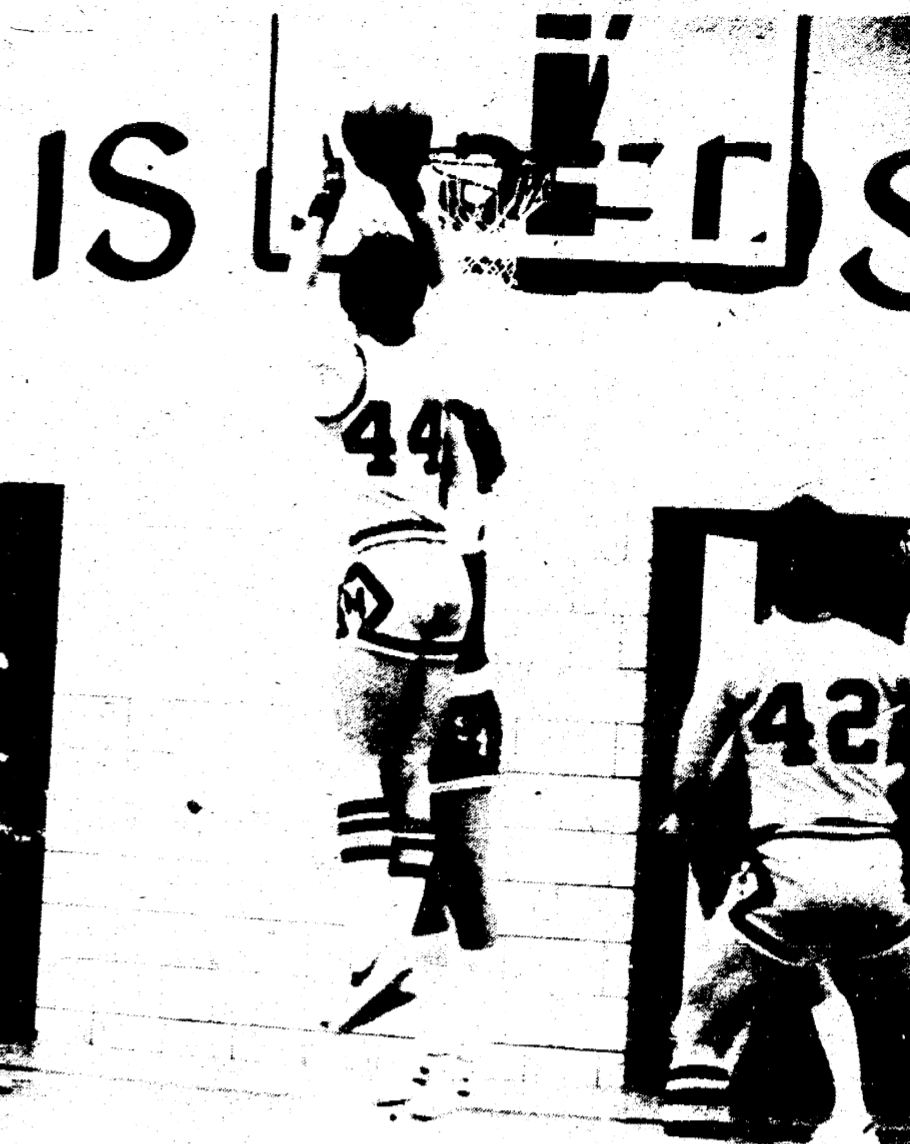

of this Board and by virtue of the applicable sections of the Michigan Vehicle Code being Act 300, Public Acts of 1949 as amended, we impose springtime axle load restrictions effective at 6 a.m., Wed., March 8, 1978.

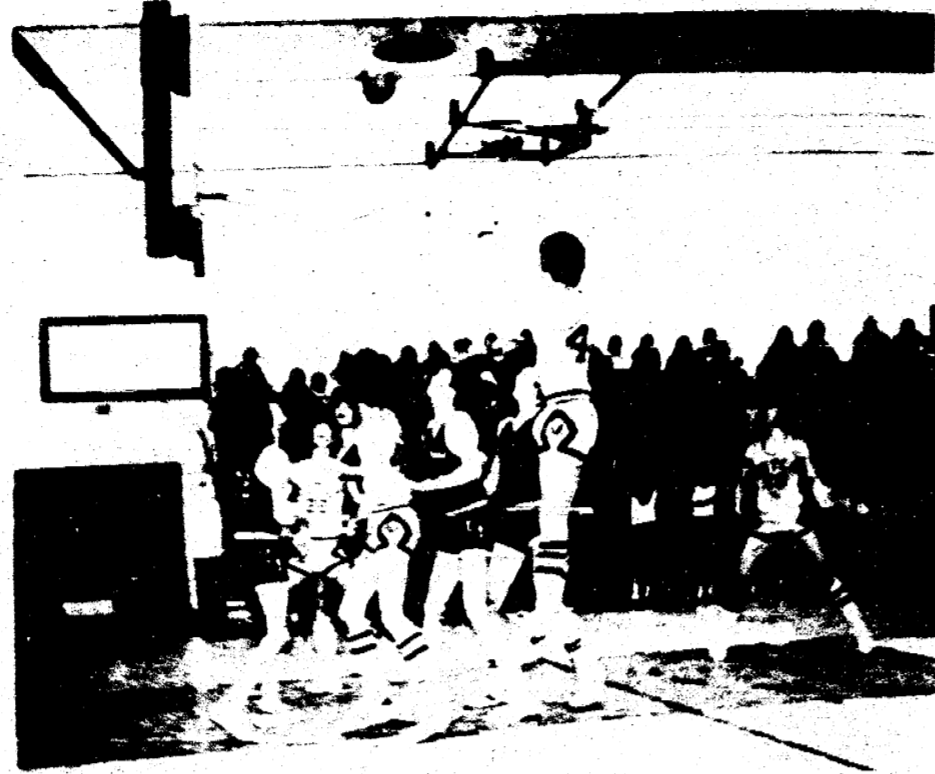

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

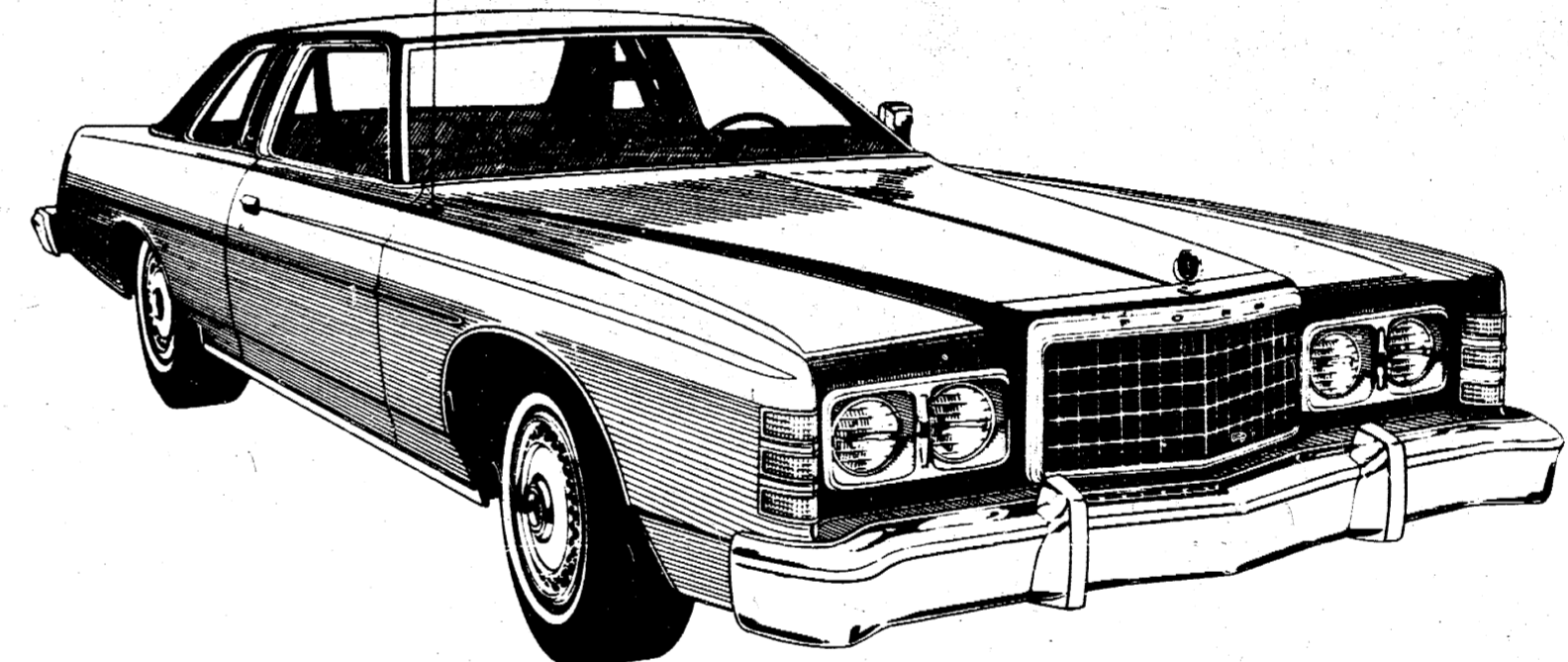

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Village Council Proceedings

February 20, 1978
 Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:00 p.m. Present were Denhoff, Rigg, Daniels, Beasley, and Schaffer; absent Kennedy, Fitzgerald, and Duncan. Minutes from the February 6, 1978 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Schaffer, supported by Rigg. All yeas, carried.

Additions to the agenda were suggested. Moved by Denhoff, supported by Schaffer to approve the additions. All yeas, carried.

Michigan Bell Telephone representatives George White and Bill Friend were present with plans for underground cable work in the Village. Enter Fitzgerald at 7:12 p.m. Discussion continued on Michigan Bell's plans. Fitzgerald indicated that he felt any finished street-one with a curb and gutter, should be bored, rather than open-cut in the work proposed. The Village should receive copies of the performance bonds, as well as be named in them. Council decided to further review the proposed plans and scheduled a work session with Michigan Bell to answer further questions which might be generated by actual site review. The group was scheduled to meet February 27, 1978 at 7:00 p.m.

Recently there was an amendment to the State Statute concerning the handling of persons intoxicated in a public place. Consequently, it is necessary that the disorderly person ordinance of the Village, number 65, be amended to conform with this new legislation. Moved by Schaffer, supported by Fitzgerald to amend Ordinance 65 as follows:

Section 1. That Section 2, subsection (2) of Ordinance 65, Entitled "An Ordinance Relative to Disorderly Persons and Disorderly Conduct" is deleted and the following substituted therefor:

Section 2. ACTS PROHIBITED No person shall:

(2) be intoxicated in a public place and be either endangering directly the safety of another person or of property or be acting in a manner that causes a public disturbance.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and enforced twenty (20) days after passage and after legal publication thereof. All yeas, carried.

An Amendment to the Zoning Ordinance was offered by Schaffer, supported by Denhoff.

Section 1. The Village of Manchester Zoning Ordinance is amended by deleting Section 21.03 conditional uses of Article 21.0 R-1B-Single-Family Urban Residential District and substituting the following therefor:

ARTICLE 21.0
 R-1B-Single-Family Urban Residential District.
 SECTION 21.03-CONDITIONAL USES
 The following buildings and structures, and uses of parcels, lots, buildings and

structures are permitted subject to obtaining a conditional use permit as provided in ARTICLE 50.0:

- A. golf courses, but not including golf driving ranges;
- B. country clubs, public swimming pools, and recreation clubs, public and private parks and playgrounds;
- C. churches and public buildings;
- D. public and private nurseries, primary and secondary school;
- E. essential services, as provided in Section 10.03K and L, herein;
- F. home occupations;
- G. professional medical offices.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced twenty (20) days after passage and after legal publication thereof. All yeas, carried. 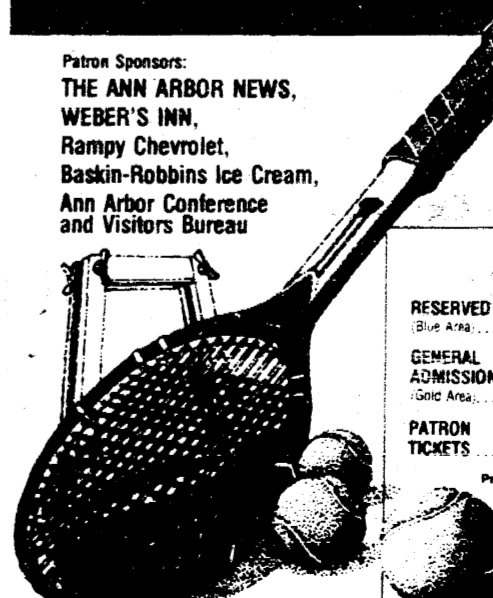
