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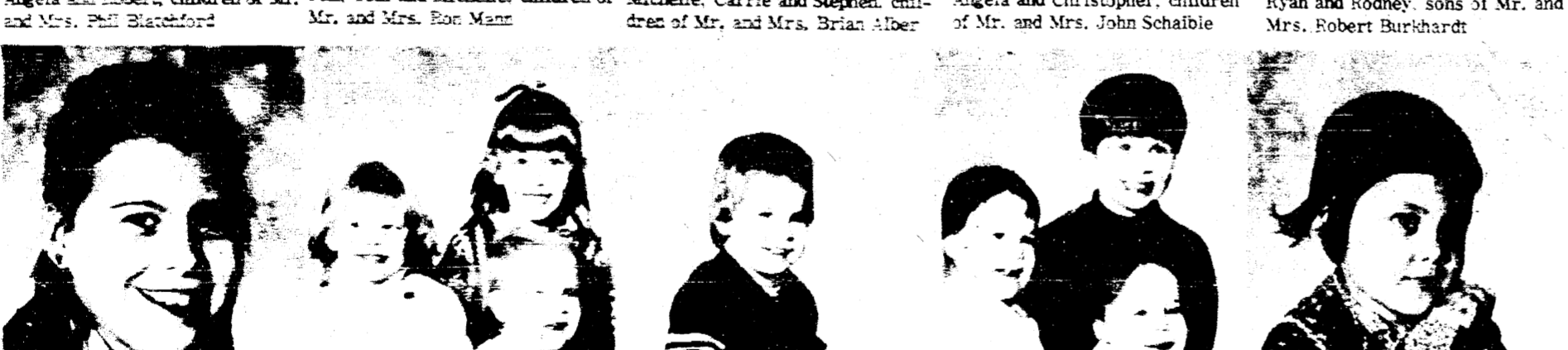

Macomber moved to pay all the bills with the exception of Wash. Co. Rd. Comm. It was supported by Widmayer. Roll call vote: Burch, aye; Fielder, aye; Lentz, aye; Macomber, aye; Widmayer, aye. Carried.
Burch reported there is \$5,462.00 in

the general fund.

Fielder announced that we may have to plan a 15 month budget for the coming year due to a possible change of the Township fiscal year.

The clerk read a letter from Fberle M. Smith Assoc. Inc. thanking the Board for the opportunity to be interviewed for the new fire hall, and also a letter from Robert Chapin stating our rent has been raised \$10.00 per month.

A letter was also read from the Washtenaw Co. Rd. of Commissioners Re: Areawide Water quality plan for south-east Michigan. Letter in file at office.

By a motion by Burch and supported by Widmayer, a Resolution was adopted accepting designation as a management agency in accordance with Public Law 92-500. All ayes, carried. Resolution attached to minutes.

There is a possibility that the township will have to collect 1/2 of the school taxes in the summer. The township would be reimbursed for this charge. However, it will not be this year.

Enter Mike Pogliano 8:48 p.m.

A license application notice was received from the Michigan Dept. of Social Services for James Robert Green application to license a AFG-family home at 18424 Austin Road. The Board must recommend it or not recommend. The absence of a response will be interpreted as approval. If we do not recommend it, we must state the reasons. Mr. Limpert questioned if it met the barrier free requirements? However, it must be licensed under the State. Widmayer moved that we table the application until the next meeting so we can get more information and this was supported by Burch. All ayes, carried. The clerk was instructed to write Mr. Green a letter requesting him to come to our next regular meeting and give us a full explanation on what

he is planning to do.

Michael Pogliano, an architect from Saline was present and told of his accomplishments as an architect. His firm consists of himself and one other. He has done Big Daddys, Saline City Hall, remodeled Saline library, churches and all phases of construction. He left a list of his consultants and references for the Board. He stated the ball park figures for 8000 ft. for the new fire hall and offices to be around \$30-40 sq. ft. If you had air cooling, etc. that would be extra. He also presented pictures of his works. He stated that as a normal architectural contract you would agree on a price usually on % basis. There could be a three area contract and he could make the preliminary for about \$25.00 per hr. for himself and \$12-\$15 per hour for his employee. We would be free to terminate the contract at any time. He works closely with the workers because his business is small. After much discussion the Board thanked him and Mr. Pogliano left at 9:22 p.m.

A discussion was made concerning a plan Tony Schlosser has for the corner of Austin Rd. and Grossman. He is interested in having it rezoned so he can rent bldg. space. He will have to submit his plans to the Manchester Township Planning Comm.


Discussion was held on selection of the

architects for the fire hall. After much discussion, the clerk was instructed to write each architect and ask them to submit a preliminary sketch so that we may better select an architect to meet our needs. We will include a site plan and the criteria we have set up as a Board and Fire Dept. at this point. They are to keep in mind that we demand a "Turn of the Century" theme on the exterior. The deadline for returning their plans is March 5, 1978. We will have a special meeting Tuesday, March 7, 1978 to go over the plans submitted. This meeting will be at 7:30 p.m.
Being no further business, Burch moved to be adjourned at 10:11 p.m. This was supported by Macomber. All ayes, carried.

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Community Education

A new community program will be starting on Tuesday, April 3 & 7. The program is Systematic Training for Effective Parenting (STEP). The STEP Program is widely recognized and accepted for creating an effective, parent-child relationship that can grow and grow in an atmosphere of love, understanding, cooperation, and mutual respect. Parents and grandparents alike often refer to "the good old days" when life seemed more simple and everyone's role was more clearly defined...there was an atmosphere of peace and order in the era of "Father knows best" and "do what your mother says." But times have changed, and people have changed. Relationships have changed between women and men, employees and employers, children and adults. Concerned and sometimes bewildered by the effects which these and other social changes have had on family relationships, today's parents have an increasing interest in finding more effective ways of relating to their children. Parents can admit that they, too, have the right to make mistakes and learn from them; that they, too, have rights as well as responsibilities. Effective parents are kind but firm. They provide opportunities for children to make decisions, within limits, and to be accountable for these decisions. They freely give encouragement. They show confidence in their children's ability to handle difficult tasks without parental "snooping", and they help their children to develop the courage to be imperfect in a society that holds unrealistic expectations of it members. Step participants are helped toward realizing the goal parents want most: to raise responsible children who will grow into responsible men and women, capable of living meaningful, happy adult lives. Learning more effective ways of relating to your children takes courage, practice,

and patience...the courage to be open to, and accept, new ideas and attitudes. In our modern society, we have come to expect "instant" results, "instant" success, "instant" everything! But anything of value takes time...the STEP program usually takes nine weekly sessions to complete. Take the very first step now. Begin...

STEP 1. Understanding your child's behavior and misbehavior.
STEP 2. Understanding more about your child's emotions and yourself as a parent; recognizing the differences between "good" parents and responsible parents.
STEP 3. Learning to use encouragement, instead of praise, to build your child's confidence and feelings of self-worth.
STEP 4. Improving communication by becoming an effective listener.
STEP 5. Communicating your ideas and feeling to children; helping your children explore alternative ways of behaving.
STEP 6. Replacing reward-and-punishment with learning-from-consequences.
STEP 7. Applying natural and logical consequences to the challenges of child-training; acting positively, rather than reacting negatively.
STEP 8. Establishing family meetings that encourage democratic family relationships.
STEP 9. Developing confidence and growing as a person, as well as becoming a more effective parent.

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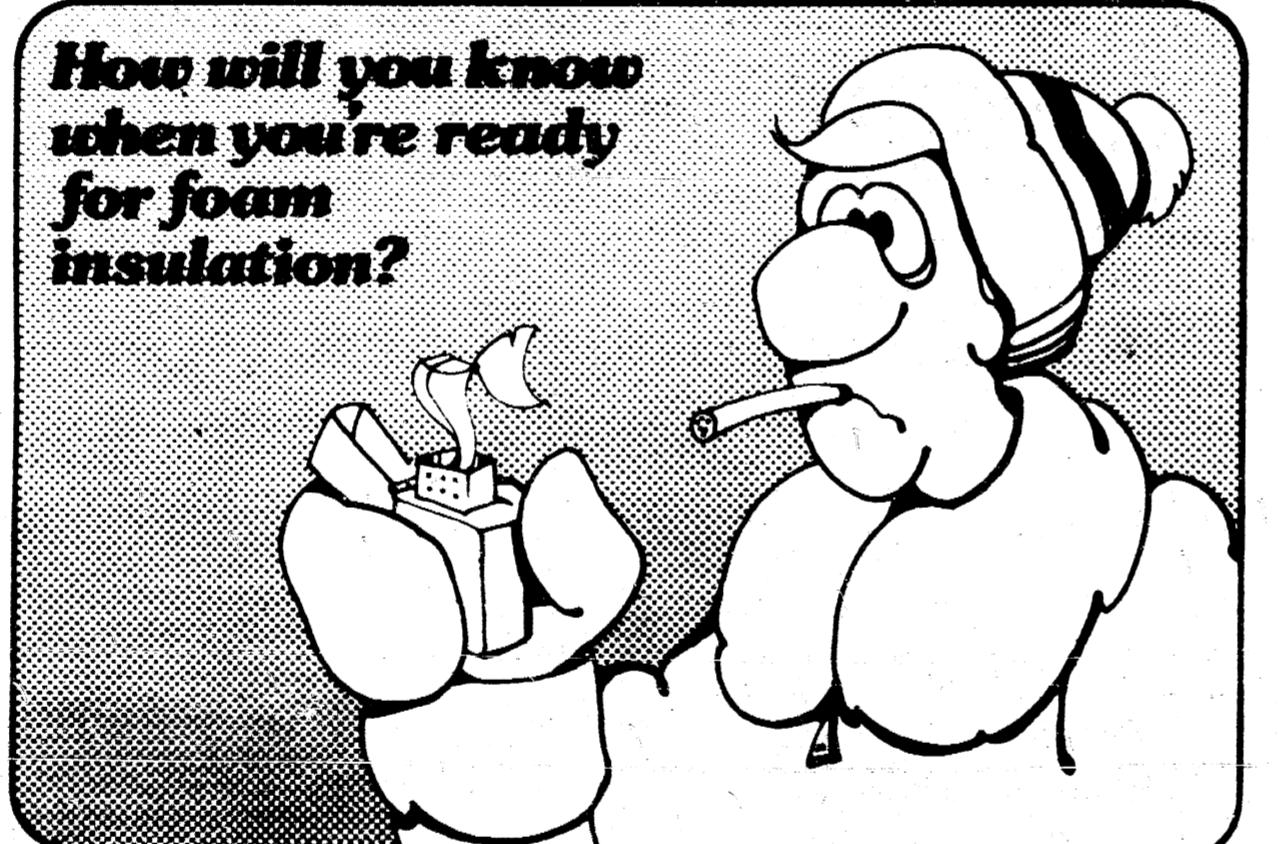


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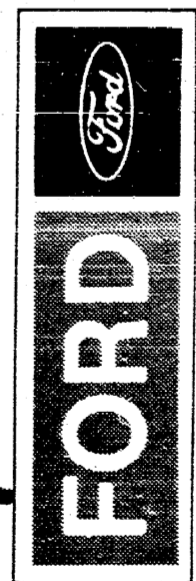
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Sharon Valley 4-H Club

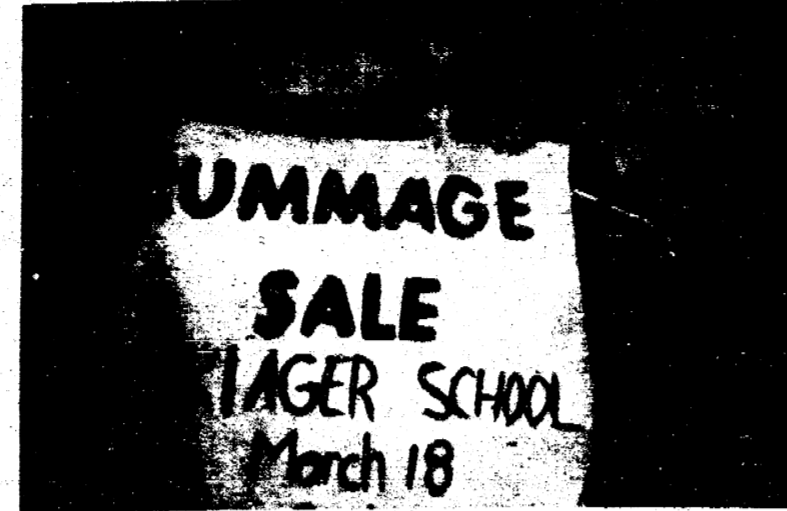
