Exit Kennedy at 7:20 P.M.

The hearing will be held in the Manchester Enterprise and will be set for 8:00 p.m. March 20, 1978. Fitzgerald reported that roofing needs for Village buildings had been researched as requested at the last meeting. Service

Roofing estimated \$2302 plus time and materials for work at the well house. Joseph C. Hayes, Builder estimated \$7652. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Schaffer to accept Service Roofing's bid and request that they submit a firm bid on the well house. On the fire hall Council wished to have the new roof done. Inspections would be done by Building Inspector Knauss. All yeas, carried.

A letter of authorization was requested by John Adams of McNamee. Porter and Seeley regarding further testing for sewer needs. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Schaffer that the clerk find out proposed means of payment, cost, funding and how Village 20% would be affected. All yeas, carried.

Information was presented on a V-plow. After some discussion, it was moved by Duncan, supported by Fitzgerald that Daniels be authorized to purchase V-plow #531V for \$2,979.00 and chains for the vehicle on which it will be mounted. All yeas, carried.

Dean Shepherd was contacted regarding the second half of the tree program. He indicated that they would begin work approximately April 10.

Zsenyuk discussed the changes in the Floator policy portion of the Village Insurance. The clerk was asked to request bids for the program with each policy listed individually. The bids will be due April 17, 1978 at 8:00 p.m.

Zsenyuk reported on his trip to Pontiac regarding the Snow Disaster Funding. John McGuire of the Manchester Community Schools also requested funding. At this

point the Village will be reimbursed \$810.00 of the \$1060.00 paid in contracted services during the storm.

Rigg reported on possible funding programs available for parks. After some research had been done, he indicated that the Village would definitely need a completed park plan to apply for any funding. Moved by Fitzgerald supported by Schaffer to authorize Rigg to hire Linda Byce to complete the park plan program at an approximate cost of \$800-1200. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Rigg, supported by Duncan to approve signing of the Washtenaw County Tax Systems Agreement, which allows for the printing of Village tax bills by the County. All yeas, carried.

A request was received from the Manchester Co-op Nursery to hold their "Second Annual Junque Sale" in Wurster Park May 12, and May 13. Moved by Duncan supported by Fitzgerald to approve the above request. All yeas, carried.

A new community program will be starting on Tuesday, April 3 & 7. The program is Systematic Training for Effective Parenting (STEP). The STEP Program is widely recognized and accepted for creating an effective, parent-child relationship that can grow and grow in an atmosphere of love, understanding, cooperation, and mutual respect. Forest Clark of Manchester has been admitted to the degree-granting program of Michigan State University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

He is one of 120 students who will begin the professional curriculum this spring, to earn a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree. For most, the entire program -- from pre-veterinary study through the professional curriculum -- takes at least seven years.

Clark is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Clark, 97 Mammoth Road.

"Admissions competition is keen, with as many as 600 applicants for each class," says Jo Ann Gardner, who coordinates the admissions process.

"Because of the pre-veterinary course requirements, most of the newly-admitted students have about three years of college work under their belts," she says. "Pre-

veterinary requirements include such subjects as organic chemistry, physics, biochemistry, dairy production and animal husbandry."
