Farmers have been working for years to gain a public understanding of their unique industry. As they became more and more of a minority, they realized this understanding and support was vital. Its farmer-members would rather get their income from the marketplace than from taxpayer dollars in the Federal Treasury. Traditionally, they've supported legislation that has been in the interest of consumers as well as farmers. not only because they are one of the largest consumer groups themselves, but because they know that all citizens benefit from a healthy, viable agriculture.





MARCH OF DIMES 2nd ANNUAL WALKATHON

"Manchester's second annual March of Dimes Walkathon is set for April 29", say the Superwalk's Co-chairpeople, Carol Williams and Matt Donnellon, "We expect it will be bigger and better than our first walk, and we are ordering better weather. However, in case the weather does not co-operate, we have set a rain date for May 6. Whatever the weather, all walkers should dress comfortably, as 15 miles can get to be a long walk." The same route will be used as last

year, with the checkpoints being the John Litteral home on Kothe Rd., the Athletic Field. the Thurman Green home on Tracy Rd., the Ed Walz home on Schleweiss Rd., and back to the High School, All walkers will check in at the High School starting at 9 a.m., where they will receive a walker's identification vest to wear, which is donated by the Vernors Ginger Ale Company, who will also furnish pop at the end of the walk. On the vest is a mileage chart, which the walkers will have stamped at each checkpoint, to show how many miles have been completed. The vests take the place of last year's walkcard and serve the same purpose. They are to be shown to your sponsors

when collecting your pledges, to show them how many miles with which you were credited.

Of course, safety is most important. The vests are bright yellow, so the walkers can easily be seen by motorists. They also identify walkers to the "Poopout Pickup" vehicles, and to the checkpoint people. As with last year's walk, there will be CB communications at each checkpoint and in the pick up vehicles. All of these vehicles will be clearly marked as March of Dimes authorized vehicles, and walkers are reminded strongly, DO NOT get into any vehicle that is not so identified. These units will be under the very capable direction of Rita Burkhardt, who with her committee people did fantastic job last year. The walkers were never out of contact with help all along route, and the follow up car trailed the very last walker right up to the High School door, so we were sure no one




