### CHILD AND FAMILY SERVICE

Child and Family Service of Washtenaw County will sponsor a workshop on Family Transitions, to be held on Saturday, April 25, 1978, at St. Pauls Church, Chelsea. The workshops are open to the public and are being set up especially for residents of Manchester, Dexter, and Chelsea. This is an attempt on the part of Child and Family Service, which is a member of the United Ways and Chests in Chelsea, Dexter, and Manchester, to provide more

direct service to these three communities. If the workshops meet with any success, other so-called Family Life Education programs will be provided in the area.

In describing the aim and purpose of the "Family Transitions" workshop, Natalie Fitzgerald, Casework Supervisor, explained, "The workshops are for people of all ages - individuals, couples and families - who want to learn how to deal more effectively with the growing tensions, concerns and problems of daily life. The workshops are offered as an educational experience through which people can learn or strengthen skills in communication, relationship building, problem solving, decision making and life planning as a means of personal growth and enrichment."

"Experienced, professional social workers will lead workshops on the following subjects: The Blended Family - His, Hers, Ours; Marital Separation - With or Without Children; Coleship - Communication in Close Relationships; Enjoying Your Young Child; Living With an Adolescent; Substance Abuse in the Family. We have tried to provide something of interest for most every family."

In addition to the workshops, a relaxation session with Yoga will be held during the lunch break. The program will begin at 9 a.m. with three morning workshops. After lunch the afternoon workshops will begin at 1:30 and end at 3:30. People will be able to attend two workshops. Some may want to attend for only half a day, which is possible. Beverages will be provided, but people will be required to bring their own lunch. Free

child care will be available for youngsters between the ages of one and six. Anyone interested in attending is urged to register as soon as possible. Pre-registration is required, however if vacancies exist people will be allowed to register at the door. The fee for the entire day is \$5.00 per person and \$3.00 for additional member.

March 20, 1978  
 Council met in annual session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:12 p.m. The clerk read the results of the Annual Election held March 13, 1978 which had been certified by the Washtenaw Board of Canvassers. Jeffrey Schaffer received 66 votes and was elected President. Mary H. Wheeler received 63 votes and was elected Clerk. Mary M. Smith received 63 votes and was elected Treasurer. Russell Widmayer received 61 votes and was elected Assessor. Howard DuRussel received 62 votes and was elected Trustee for a two year term. Gale Koebe received 63 votes and was elected Trustee for a two year term. Ronald Walter received 62 votes and was elected Trustee for a two year term. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Kennedy to accept the results of the Annual Election held March 13, 1978. President Little administered the oath of office to the clerk, who in turn administered the oath of office to Schaffer, Smith, Widmayer and Walter (the latter being done at his home.) Moved by Kennedy, supported by Rigg to adjourn at 7:30 p.m. All yeas, carried.

March 20, 1978  
 Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:30 p.m. Present were Kennedy, Rigg, Fitzgerald, Duncan, Daniels and Zsenyuk; absent new trustees Koebe, Walter and DuRussel.  
 Minutes from the March 6, 1978 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Duncan, supported by Rigg. All yeas, carried.  
 The resignation of Ronald J. Walter was read to Council. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Kennedy to accept Walter's resignation. All yeas, carried.  
 The name of John Althouse was offered in appointment to fill one year of Walter's

two year term. Moved by Rigg, supported by Kennedy to approve the appointment of Althouse to Walter's position. All yeas, carried. Althouse was then sworn in by the clerk. Exit Kennedy at 7:40, having been relieved of his responsibilities which were to be taken over by Walter and then in turn Althouse.

Public Works Committee reported that Service Roofing had submitted a firm bid for \$2416.00 for the Well House roof. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Althouse to award the total contract to Service Roofing. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Duncan to recess as Council and convene as Zoning Board of Appeals at 8:00 p.m. All yeas, carried. Additional members Broucek and Leeson were in attendance. A Public Hearing had been scheduled to hear any comments on the proposed change in the R-1B Single Family Urban Residential District Sec. 21.03 Conditional Uses so that item C professional medical offices could be added. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Leeson to suggest approval of Ordinance 104, AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 96 OF THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ENTITLED "THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ZONING ORDINANCE." Fitzgerald, Leeson, Daniels, Duncan, Althouse, Rigg and Broucek... All yeas, motion carried. Council reconvened at 7:45 p.m. Moved by Duncan, supported by Fitzgerald to approve Ordinance 104 as listed above. All yeas, carried. (copy attached)

Rigg proposed that Council reconsider the decision to purchase a V snow plow. The motion died for lack of support. The clerk was requested to address a letter to the Manchester Township Board advising them of the main sewer crossing the property for which the fire building is proposed.

McNamee, Porter and Seeley advised Council that additional testing would cost an extra \$2100, a portion of which would

be covered by the federal funding. Council approved having the work done, which McNamee, Porter and Seeley will subcontract portions of.

The clerk was asked to have a current Accounts Receivable list at the next meeting.

Public Works activities of the past two weeks included repairing the broken hydrant lead on the intersection of East Main and Adrian Street, patching asphalt and opening drains prior to the run off. Reynolds Sewer Service cleaned the sewer in the main alley behind the Black Sheep. The blockage was caused by grease and sludge.

Zsenyuk reported on a meeting of the newly formed Manchester Villages Association. One of the main concerns is parking on Main Street. Members have agreed to park off Main Street. Parking for the handicapped was brought up. Before Public Works does any line painting, the group was asked to select four (4) spots for the handicapped, since the merchants in particular are more aware of possible appropriate locations for handicapped parking. **AGRICULTURE IN ACTION**  
MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU EDITORIAL

DO YOU NEED A GOAT TO BE HEARD?

Farmers have been working for years to gain a public understanding of their unique industry. As they became more and more of a minority, they realized this understanding and support was vital. But, most times, news of their activities and their viewpoints were relegated to the farm page where they ended up talking to themselves rather than to the non-farm public.

All that has changed now. Farmers are in the public eye, the topic of front-page stories, radio broadcasts and network television. But there are farmers who are not comfortable with the image that has resulted from the activities which made them headlines. There are many who are concerned that the public will lump them all into the category of farmers the New York Times editorially criticized as working for "a free shot at the public purse" and for "bullying Congress into providing what the marketplace will not."

The majority of farmers who belong to a farm organization belong to Farm Bureau. And this organization has steadfastly stood against taking a free shot at the public purse and bullying Congress into providing what the marketplace will not. Its farmer-members would rather get their income from the marketplace than from taxpayer dollars in the Federal Treasury. Traditionally, they've supported legislation that has been in the interest of consumers as well as farmers, not only because they are one of the largest consumer groups themselves, but because they know that all citizens benefit from a healthy, viable agriculture.

It's common knowledge that "parity" has been the key word in the difference of opinion between farmers in the current financial plight of agriculture, and because Farm Bureau has stood firmly against high government price supports, it has been unjustly accused by some of not working for a fair income for farmers. Nothing could be further from the truth. As American Farm Bureau president Allan Grant recently explained: "I'd like to see a whole lot more than parity for farm prices. I'd like to see 125 or 150 percent of parity....Farmers are entitled to a profit. But the market has to supply the price or else we have nothing...we only have government regulation, and government regulation brings a consistent lower price."

That sensible viewpoint from a man who represents millions of farmers didn't get national coverage...maybe because he didn't dump a goat on the capital steps as he said it....

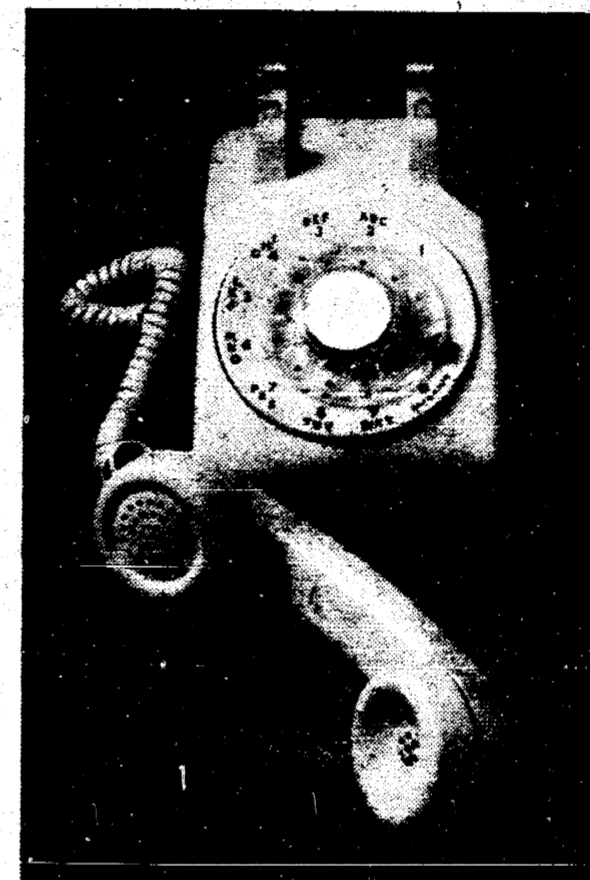

## MARCH OF DIMES 2nd ANNUAL WALKATHON

"Manchester's second annual March of Dimes Walkathon is set for March 29", say the Superwalk's Co-chairpeople, Carol Williams and Matt Donnellon. "We expect it will be bigger and better than our first walk, and we are ordering better weather. However, in case the weather does not co-operate, we have set a rain date for May 6. Whatever the weather, all walkers should dress comfortably, as 15 miles can get to be a long walk."

The same route will be used as last year, with the checkpoints being the John Litteral home on Kotte Rd., the Athletic Field, the Thurman Green home on Tracy Rd., the Ed Walz home on Schleweiss Rd., and back to the High School. All walkers will check in at the High School starting at 9 a.m., where they will receive a walker's identification vest to wear, which is donated by the Vernors Ginger Ale Company, who will also furnish pop at the end of the walk. On the vest is a mileage chart, which the walkers will have stamped at each checkpoint, to show how many miles have been completed. The vests take the place of last year's walkcard and serve the same purpose. They are to be shown to your sponsors

when collecting your pledges, to show them how many miles with which you were credited.

Of course, safety is most important. The vests are bright yellow, so the walkers can easily be seen by motorists. They also identify walkers to the "Poopout Pickup" vehicles, and to the checkpoint people. As with last year's walk, there will be CB communications at each checkpoint and in the pick up vehicles. All of these vehicles will be clearly marked as March of Dimes authorized vehicles, and walkers are reminded strongly, DO NOT get into any vehicle that is not so identified. These units will be under the very capable direction of Rita Burkhardt, who with her committee people did a fantastic job last year. The walkers were never out of contact with help all along the route, and the follow up car trailed the very last walker right up to the High School door, so we were sure no one was lost or stranded.

Also at each checkpoint, will be stationed a registered nurse. Walkers will never be more than 2 miles from medical help, should the need arise.

Sgt. Ken Beasley and our police department will be available to direct traffic when walkers have to cross main roads. The police department has been very co-operative, and even helped plan the route last year for maximum safety.

And of course, each checkpoint will have goodies, to keep the body able, as well as the spirit willing.

Speaking of goodies, everyone who finishes the walk will be awarded a ticket on one of Detroit's famous Bob-to Boats. Everyone who turns in their pledges by May 13, 1978, will be eligible for a prize drawing and a merit patch. The Battered Boat Trophy will be awarded to the group that raises the most money, and there will be prizes for the boy and girl who have the most sponsors and collect the most money.

So register and get your sponsor sheets, either at school, or at Matt Donnellon's State Farm Insurance Office. Start getting friends, neighbors, and relatives to sponsor you. Break in your walking shoes, start training, and we will see you on the 29th, at 9 a.m., at the High School, ready to go. Remember, your whole family can walk, from baby Jane to Grandma and Grandpa Jones. Fantastic way to spend a family day together! Fresh air, exercise, and that really great feeling, knowing that you have helped someone in need.

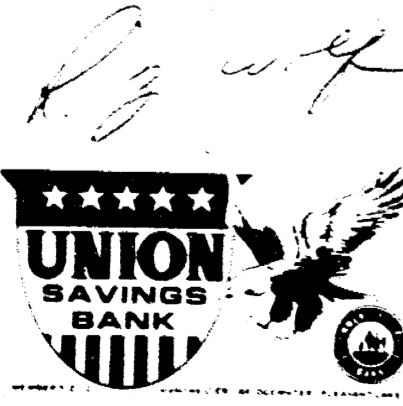

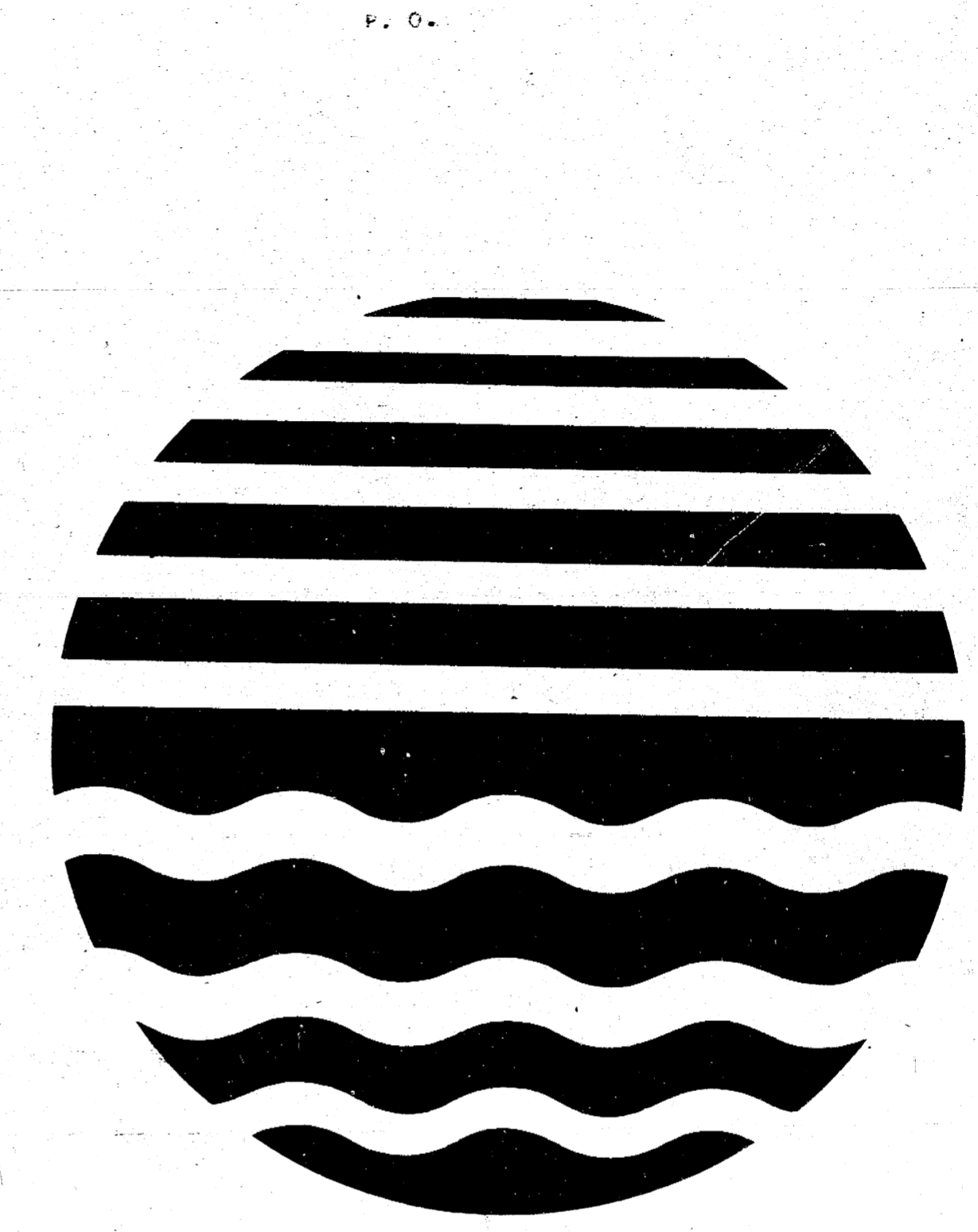

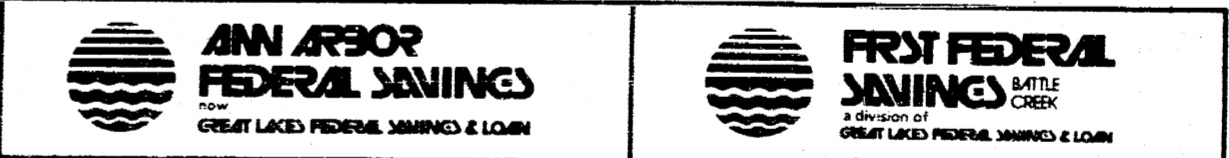
