graduates.

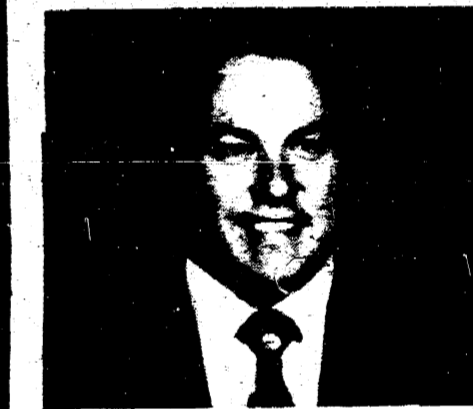
Also, 315 members of the freshman class

The next item considered was the con-

tract status of two teachers who were employed in the spring of 1977.

Moved by Kensler that Loretta Vogel be given a probationary contract to March 31, 1979. Seconded by Macomber. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Kensler that Ronald Janssen be granted a probationary contract to February 28, 1979. Seconded by Walkow. All Years. Motion Carried.

Next for consideration were the teachers who had been hired on a limited contract to replace persons who had been granted extended leaves this past year.

Moved by Kensler that the following teachers will not be extended after this school year: Sandra Catshurst - High School - Physical Education, Andrea Lebowski - High School - English, Robin Smeak - High School - German, Laura Young - Middle School - English and Gay Williams - Middle School - Physical Education. Supported by Feldkamp. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Masten explained that two time-out counselors have been employed this year and their salary has been financed by the Office of Criminal Justice. He stated at this time the funding has not been approved for next year.

Moved by Feldkamp to notify Michael Mouradian and Helen Feinberg that their employment will be terminated at the end of this school year. Supported by Kensler. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Masten informed the Board that if funding becomes available the Board will be requested to consider continuing the program.

Mr. McGuire informed the Board that C.E.T.A. Funding for our reading coordinator's salary is not available for next year.

Moved by Kensler that Karen Ellsworth be notified that her employment will be terminated at the end of this school year. Supported by Feldkamp. All years. Motion carried.

Moved by Mick that the Board ratify the Master Agreement for years 1977-78 and 1978-79 with the Manchester Edu-

cation Association. Supported by Kensler. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. Masten reported to the Board the bids that had been submitted for the replacement of the Middle School Boiler as follows, for an oil burning Steam boiler:

Schneider Climate Control - \$26,568. Boone & Darr, Inc. - \$20,660. Young & Ost - \$19,126. Paul E. Bengel - \$15,261.

Moved by Feldkamp to grant the bid on the Middle School Boiler to Paul E. Bengel, Plumbing & Heating of Jackson on an oil fired steam boiler in the amount of \$15,261. Supported by Walkow. All years. Motion carried.

Mr. McGuire reported that a cooperative Career Education and Job Placement program was being considered by Saline, Milan and Manchester. For Career Education, each school would have a Cathode Ray Tube installed and students would be able to get complete, immediate information on all aspects of any career from the Intermediate School District computer.

There would also be a Career Counselor for Milan and Manchester and job placement for several Manchester students. The program would be completely funded by C.E.T.A. Mr. David Mieras would be in charge of the program for the three schools with Mr. McGuire being the local coordinator.

The Cathode Ray Tube would be purchased by Manchester and then leased back

to the Government for a two year period. Moved by Feldkamp that the Board approve the program and name the Superintendent of Schools to be our agent to sign the agreement with C.E.T.A. with the understanding that we purchase a CRT Terminal and lease it to the Federal Government on a 2 year program for repayment. Supported by Kensler. All years. Motion carried.

President Bunney asked for Board discussion concerning the extra voted millage needed for the next school year.

Mr. Masten said he would like some direction in order to have resolutions prepared for the April 17th Board Meeting.

After a discussion, it was the Board's consensus opinion to renew the 17.78 mills. The number of years request was left for determination later.

Mr. Masten suggested that .8 of a mill from Debt Retirement could be dropped and used for maintenance for the next 2 years. The Debt Retirement would then use up excess reserves and special maintenance projects could be done without increasing the total millage. This plan would have to be approved by the voters.

Mr. Masten reported that there was a meeting on April 4th at 6:30 p.m. with Mr. Mitchell to negotiate the Custodial and Maintenance Contract. He asked the Board who they wanted to negotiate?

Farmers and news people alike had a heyday with the "Dick and Jane" style approach OSHA took in their booklets about farm safety--almost as much fun as they had with OSHA's ruling for a toilet in every field.

Of all the editorial observations news media have made regarding OSHA and the farmers' reactions to some of the "help" it has offered to make the farm a safer place in which to work, one of the most astute has to be from the Omaha World Telegram:

See the farmer.
See the farmer go to the mailbox.
See the farmer get the little book.
The farmer can read.
The farmer can read big words.
The farmer can read big sentences.
The farmer knows about cows.
The farmer knows about fences.
The farmer knows about manure pits.

See the farmer read the little book.
Now the farmer knows about OSHA.
See the farmer kick the mailbox.
Hear the farmer say bad words.
See the farmer throw the little book.
See the farmer throw the little book into the manure pit.

See OSHA.
See OSHA print.
See OSHA write.
See OSHA throw money into the manure pit.
Say bad words about OSHA.
And a lot of farmers, in unison, shout "AMEN!"

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Heartworm and Your Dog

Mosquito season will soon be upon us. At this time we should start to think about our dogs and Heartworm Disease. This area of Michigan has been known for a high incidence of Heartworm Disease. The following article is for your information on Heartworm Disease and your dog.

What is it:
Heartworm Disease in dogs is caused by long white worms known by the scientific name *Dirofilaria immitis*. The adult worms, when fully grown, may reach a length of 6-14 inches. These worms are usually found in the right side of the heart and adjacent blood vessels and may also migrate to the lungs.

What are its Effects:
Severe heartworm infection can result in serious damage to a dog's heart and other organs before any signs or symptoms are noticed. The disease may cause coughing, labored breathing, weakness, tiring and loss of weight. If not detected and controlled with proper treatment, the disease can lead to congestive heart failure and death.

What is its Source:
The life cycle of the heartworm is quite different from any other worm in dogs. It is transmitted to the dog only through the bite of a mosquito. Certain areas in the country have more of a problem than others, and the lower eastern part of Michigan is an epidemic area. When the infected mosquito bites a dog

but live in the blood stream for three years. When a mosquito bites an infected dog it takes with it the microfilariae which develop into an infective larvae in about 14 to 21 days. This mosquito may, when it bites another dog, infect him with these immature Heartworms.

How is it Detected:
Heartworm can be detected in most dogs by your veterinarian through a blood test. They look for the presence of microfilariae in the blood. Some dogs may have adult worms but do not produce microfilariae. In such cases an x-ray examination and other laboratory tests are used to make a diagnosis.

Can Infected Dogs Be Treated:
Most dogs can be successfully treated if the disease is not in its advanced stages. Drugs are given through carefully administered injections that cause the adult Heartworm to die. Further treatment is necessary to take care of the microfilariae so your dog will not be a source of further infection to himself or other dogs. If your dog is found to be infected, your veterinarian will discuss the full treatment with you.

Can it Be Prevented:
The most effective and practical means of controlling heartworm today is to prevent them from ever reaching the adult stage.

There is a medicine available from your veterinarian that, when given every day during the mosquito season and 30-60 days following, can prevent the immature larvae from developing into an

adult in your dog's heart. It is most important that your dog have a yearly blood test before starting on his or her preventative medication.



Heat 2 tablespoons butter in same skillet; add chopped mushrooms; saute until golden. Sprinkle fish with salt, pepper and chopped mushrooms; roll up, jelly-roll fashion; arrange in a greased casserole. Pour wine and lemon juice over fish; dot with 2 tablespoons butter. Cover with foil. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) 45 minutes. Pour off fish stock from casserole; set aside. In small saucepan blend flour with 1 tablespoon fish stock. Gradually stir in remaining stock; cook and stir until thickened. Remove from heat; stir in cream and reserved sliced mushrooms; heat, but do not boil. Pour sauce over fish. Sprinkle with parsley if desired. Yields 6 portions.

MUSTARD CHEESE CUPS

- 3/4 teaspoon powdered mustard
- 3/4 teaspoon water
- 8 slices white bread
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 5 thin slices boiled ham
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1-1/4 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/16 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 cup (4 oz.) grated sharp Cheddar cheese

Blend mustard with water; let stand 10 minutes for flavor to develop. Trim crusts from bread; discard crusts. Cut bread in half. Arrange 3 halves around the inside of a 6-ounce custard cup. Press bread firmly to make a "cup." Repeat with 4 other custard cups. Brush bread with butter. Place a slice of ham in each cup, pressing into bread (folding if necessary). In a small bowl mix eggs, milk, paprika, salt, black pepper and mustard. Stir in cheese. Pour into custard cups. Place on foil-lined baking pan. Bake in a preheated hot oven (400°F.) until knife inserted into center comes out clean, 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 5 portions.

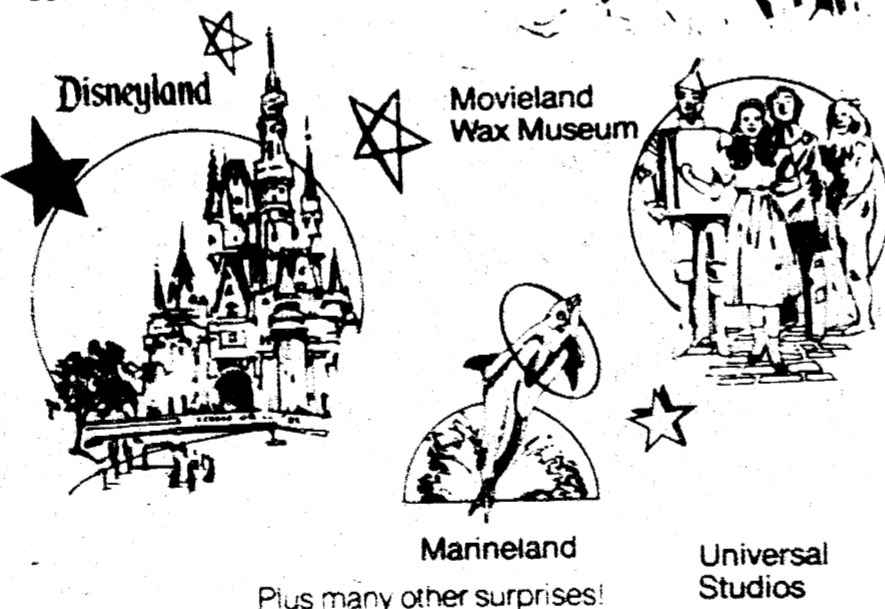

Hardwood seedlings available are the fast growing Tulip Poplar and the Black Walnut. Black Walnut seeds may also be obtained. Wildlife fruit-bearing shrubs include Multiflora Rose, Autumn Olive, and Silky Dogwood. Two types of Wildlife Packets are available. These include a variety of shrubs and evergreens. District Directors related that the Annual Tree and Shrub Program is part of the District's effort to further conservation plantings. The seedlings are intended primarily for natural beauty, hedgerows, windbreaks, erosion control, wildlife habitat improvement and reforestation. 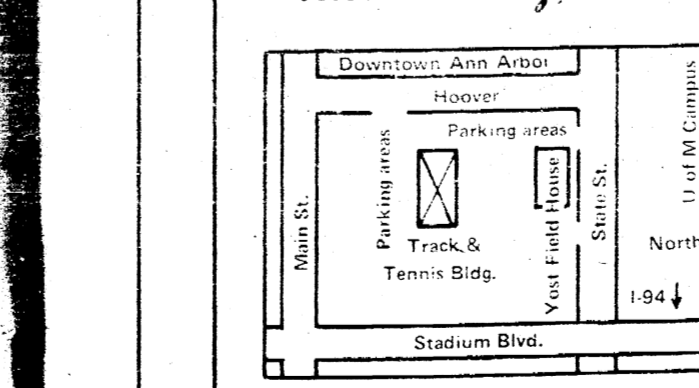
