

### MANCHESTER LOSES 2nd. IN A ROW

On Thursday, April 20, Manchester hosted the 10th annual very cold, very wet day. Times were hampered by the weather and some performances were very poor. Here are the results of the meet which lasted from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Shot put—Bob Weirich 40'7"—1st, high jump—Weirich 5'4"—2nd, long jump—Rowe 19'1 1/2"—1st, Daniels 18' 1/2"—2nd, pole vault—Brown and Eversole tie for 4th, 3000 meters—Keith Moore 9:27.5—1st, K. Norgaard 10:38.5—4th, 500 M. LH—Tassie 42:35—1st, 500 M. relay—145.7—2nd—Manchester, 500 meters—Eversole—2:04.5—1st, 100 meters—G. Daniels—12.9—3rd, 110 high hurdles—Rowe—17.0—3rd, 400 meters—Eversole 53.9—1st, 1500 meters—Moore—4:17—1st, and 200 mile dash—Daniels—25.1—3rd.

### SPRINGPORT INVITATIONAL

Last Saturday, the Dutch Track team traveled to Springport for their first outdoor invitational. For the most part the meet was disappointing as Manchester had had at least three meets a week for the last 2 weeks and are beginning to feel the strain. Anyway, here are the results. The highlight of the meet for Manchester was the first and third finish in the long jump by Terry Rowe and Mark Daniels. These two will continue to improve and have a very good chance for first and second in our league. Terry jumped 20'7" for 1st and Mark jumped 19'9 1/4" for 3rd. Keith Moore picked up two medals as he placed 2nd in the 2 mile with a time of 9:57. Later in the meet he came back and placed 3rd in the mile with a 4:40 clocking. The final medal winners was the freshman relay team of Sprule, Kempf, Fran and Brooker who tied for 2nd with Stockbridge with a total 550 relay time of 1:45.2. On Tuesday, April 18th, the Dutch Track team faced a very tough Napoleon team. This was Manchester's first home meet on their new track but it wasn't enough to have the home advantage as Napoleon won it 91 1/2 to 66 1/2. Winners for Manchester were: Terry Rowe—long jump—19' 10 1/4", Terry Brown—pole vault—11'0", Keith Moore—3000 meters—9:14, Keith Moore—1500 meters—4:23.5, Steve Eversole—500 and 400 meters—2:06 and 54.3 respectively, 400 meter relay of Dresch, Mooneyham, Daniels and Rowe—50.15.

Last Thursday, our Dutch Track Team opened their outdoor season with their first league dual meet at Hudson. "The meet was a thriller to the end" exclaimed Manchester's Coach Jim Brink. The two teams battled back and forth and when the dust had settled they were dead locked 79 to 79. The whole team put out as there was many individual winners. This meet was a confidence winner for the Dutch since they are in a rebuilding stage. Here are the results. Keith Moore started out as one of three double winners for Manchester. Keith clocked a 10:08.7 2 mile for 1st and later won the mile unopposed in a time of 4:43.5. Another distance runner for Manchester also doubled as Steve Eversole picked up where he left off last year by winning the 1/2 mile by forty yards in 2:05 and then running a 34.6 1/4 mile for 1st. The third double winner was Mark Daniels. Mark is the one to watch in the

long jump as he won it with a jump of 19' 11 1/4". He then won the 220 yd. dash with a super time of 25.3. Other winners were: Tom Tassie—330 yd. low hurdles—43.3, 440 relay team of Mooneyham, Kempf, Daniels and Dresch 50.2 and pole vault—Terry Brown 11'9".

### "End of An Era"

Friday, April 28, marked the end of an era when Alfred "Stubby" Strang punched his time card for the last time. Stubby was the last employee of Double A Products Co. to have worked for the company when its business was still located in Ann Arbor.

As a 23 year old youth he joined the company in February of 1937 at the vast sum of 35 cents an hour. At that time Double A employed about 50 people.

In 1940 the company, headed by Mr. Herbert Upton, moved the plant to Manchester. Strang was one of the 22 men who decided to make the move with the company. Now instead of making jig saws and power hand tools he was helping to build the new plant, even trying to lay the footing during a blinding snow storm on May 1, 1940.

Stubby was honored at a retirement party Friday night, ending 41 years as a conscientious worker.

Retirement plans include fishing and water skiing at his cottage at Wampplers Lake and tending his garden and working in his workshop at home.

After serving a year as Assistant Prosecuting Attorney under William F. Dalbey, I was appointed by Judge O'Brien in January, 1972, as Referee and Staff Attorney in the Juvenile Division of the Probate Court, a post I have held ever since. In this assignment, I have conducted hundreds of hearings and worked closely with protective services workers, hospital teams, police and public defenders in handling child abuse and neglect cases in addition to those involving delinquent youth.

My earlier experience included nine years with the U.S. Civil Service in Detroit, and 12 years as attorney for the Bendix Corporation in Ann Arbor.

I completed both undergraduate and law school studies at the University of Michigan following wartime service as a Navy patrol plane commander. I was admitted to practice before the State and Federal Courts in 1949. I am 57, married, with all 4 children in college (3 sons at the University of Michigan). In our home, we have provided short and long term foster care to some of the youth of the community.

Looking ahead to the challenges facing the Probate Court, I see the continuing need to preserve constitutional rights of individuals while at the same time safeguarding the community. Neither goal can be sacrificed for the other. In rehabilitation of delinquent youth, I believe we should continue Judge O'Brien's emphasis on remedial education, study skills and vocational training. I favor the expansion of the records of minor and status offenses. I think battered wives with minor children deserve prompt and effective support and protection from the community, and I think the Probate Court can help provide it.

I believe my background and experience qualifies me well for any assignment in the Probate Court, and if elected I will strive toward the goals I have mentioned.

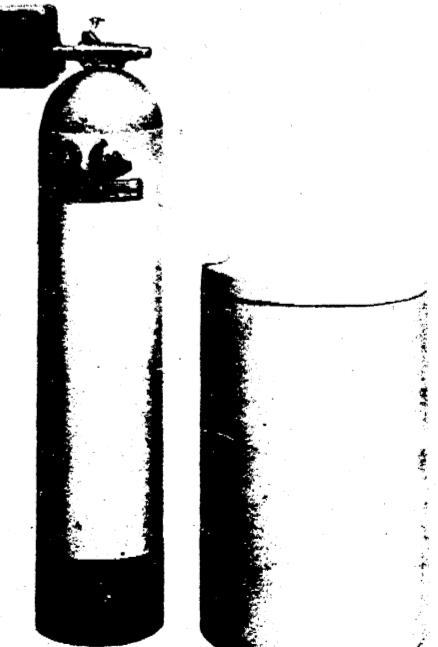



### BWARE OF THE CARROT!

More and more individuals and organizations are publicly revealing the ridiculous methodology in research and statistics used by food faddists to support their suggested bans. The Northern California Section of the Institute of Food Technologists came up with its own tongue-in-cheek analysis of that methodology: "Carrots will kill you! Every carrot you eat brings you nearer to death. Although leading horticulturists have long known that *Daucus Carota* is a delicious vegetable, the thinking man has failed to phrase: "Sure it helps your night vision, but what does it do to your liver?" "Carrots are associated with all the major diseases of the body. Eating them breeds wars and Communism. They can be related to most airline tragedies. Auto accidents are caused by carrots. There exists a positive relationship between crime waves and consumption of this vegetable. For example: "—Nearly all sick people have eaten carrots. The effects are obviously cumulative. "—99.9% of all people who die from

cancer have eaten carrots. "—99.9% of all American soldiers have eaten carrots. "—96.8% of all Red sympathizers have eaten carrots. 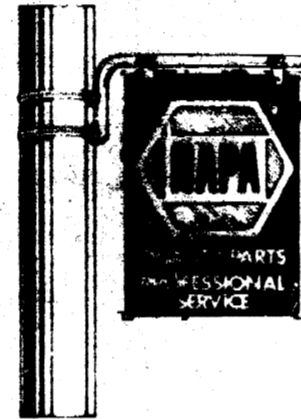
