LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

To The Editor

During the spring of the year we in Michigan are treated to a spectacular display of nature's unique and beautiful colors. Most in Michigan—those living in urban settings, especially—must venture out into the rural areas of Michigan to behold this natural wonder, which remains one of Michigan's most cherished natural resources. Fortunately, those of us lucky enough to be able to call Manchester home can enjoy this beauty from our windows or by simply strolling down the street. Manchester, abounds with a natural beauty (which we all realize) not seen in any other town in quite as unique a manner in southern Michigan. A ride through

Ypsilanti, or even our neighbor community, Saline, gives one a very profound appreciation for our small, peaceful town.

There are those among us though, which brings me to the point of this letter, that would take away this beauty in favor of the cold, ugly process called industrialization. We need not look far fellow Manchesterites, to witness the damage that is wrought by business and industry. Even on comparatively small levels, such as taken place in Chelsea or Saline, the damage is obvious. Instead of the quiet solitude of small town life, the inhabitants of these towns are constantly barraged with noise from semi-trailers and other industrially related machinery. We also know, that Manchester has not entirely escaped the disruption caused by small industry. The eastern portion of our town is already heavily laden with small industry, which has substantially contributed to the undoing of peace and quiet in this end of town. Yet, there are attempts being made, by those who lack appreciation for the wealth of natural beauty, to rezone more land in eastern Manchester for the purpose of constructing yet more small industry. Perhaps the first glance at such an idea is appealing to many. More industry may mean a few more jobs locally, and it may contribute to a slightly richer tax base, which I would imagine is very attractive to those in city government. A more thoughtful look, though, at this proposed rezoning reveals a less than appealing situation for most of us here in Manchester. Not only will more industry cause further deterioration of the peace in that area of Manchester, industrialization inevitably leads to substantial reduction in residential property values, and hence, makes even more industrial expansion possible as the area becomes less attractive to prospective home buyers.

Life in Manchester continues to be good. Lets insure it remains that way for years and generations to come. To do that, we must stop those whose only concern is for increased profit margins at any price. Let your views be none to the city

fathers who will be considering this proposed rezoning in the near future.

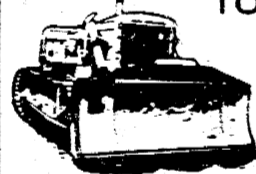

Did you know that some are authorized by USDA to deliver meals to food stamp recipients aged 60 or over, who are physically handicapped, feeble, or who cannot

prepare all their meals.

Also communal dining facilities such as seniors citizens' centers, and certain other public or non-profit private establishments which prepare and serve meals to the elderly may be authorized by USDA to accept food coupons from recipients aged 60 or older.

After checking with the service to be sure that they have been authorized to

accept food stamps then you may use all or a portion of their stamps to pay for delivered meal service or communal dining facilities.

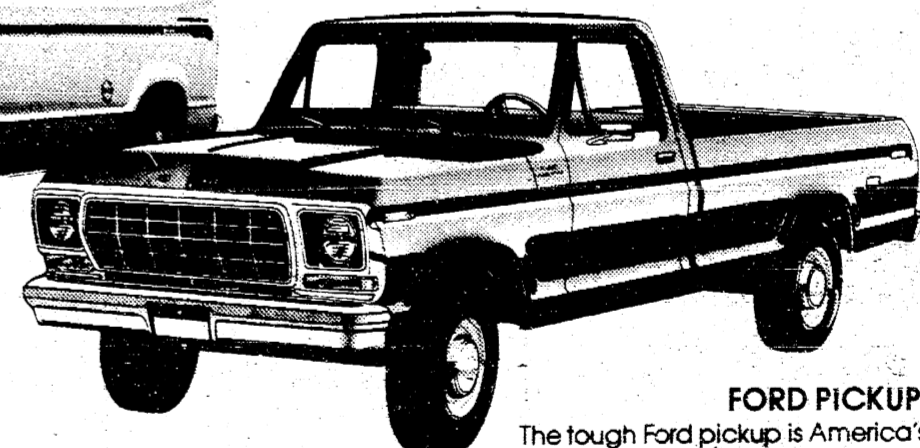

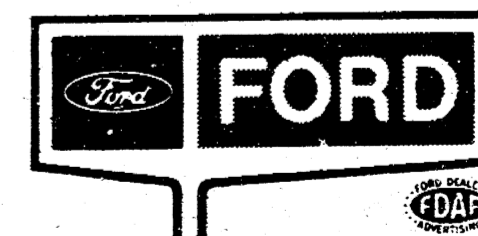

Council Proceedings

May 1, 1978
Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:05 p.m. Present were DeRusse, Rigg, Koebbe, Daniels, Zsenyik, Althouse, Fitzgerald, and Duncan.

Minutes from the April 17, 1978 regular meeting were read and approved. Moved by Rigg, supported by DeRusse to approve the minutes as read. All yeas, carried.

Koebbe reported on Public Works activities. Two bids were received for a pickup. Pres. Schaffer opened and presented the two: Tird Chevrolet \$4,283.00, Widmayer Ford \$4,278.00. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by DeRusse that Council should accept bids as presented and leave the decision to the discretion of the Public Works committee regarding purchase. All yeas, carried. Koebbe presented information concerning the fire burn site and the sewer. The township has a valid document allowing them to build the fire burn over the sewer. Engineers have recommended that the sewer be inspected with a TV hookup and if inspection is okay to go ahead and build over the sewer. An easement could be obtained from the township to build sewer around the building if necessary, at the Village's expense. If

necessary, perhaps a plastic liner could be used. The engineers would get the cost to see the TV routing of the slope of the sewer. Clarence Fiedler was present and asked if there would be any problem concerning easement. Fiedler could see no problem of easement and stated that the township would like to see any problem resolved so that building can take place. Mr. Roesch was also present and stated that the township could grant an easement and the building could be put up. Easement means to occupy and maintain. Koebbe would work with the township on the easement. Althouse moved, DeRusse supported that Council obtain price quotes for TV-ing the sewer. All yeas, carried. Daniels presented the rest of the Public Works activities. Daniels reported that he had met with Allen Schaffer and McKames, Porter and Seeley, represented by John Adams, in the Riverbend Subdivision. Mr. Schaffer has retained the firm to do some water and sewer plans for him. At this time a river crossing from Macomb was option of with a ballpark cost figure of \$25,000 to \$30,000.00. Daniels suggested to Mr. Schaffer that he come to Council with his plans. Street sweeping has begun.

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presented information concerning a grant program for blighted areas. Through the grant, funding would be available for substituting houses which could also include streets, sewers, etc. Two public hearings would be needed to determine Village desire to obtain funding for rehabilitation purposes. Fitzgerald proposed the question, "Can property be purchased through HUD?" Daniels and Zsenyik are to pursue the matter further.

A Public Hearing was held at 8:30 a.m. for a conditional use requested by Ed Street, who was present. The conditional use was for an apartment over the Kozy Kitchen Restaurant, which also involved a lease for 1 1/2 car parking spaces from Mr. Stein at the corner of East Main Street and M-52. Duncan reported the Planning Commission's recommendation. Duncan moved, Daniels supported that the conditional use be granted. All yeas, carried.

Brocock made the suggestion that perhaps zoning be changed so each person requesting apartments over stores need not go through Planning Commission, Council, Public Hearings. He also suggested fees for site review, variances, conditional uses, etc. DeRusse will check into fee charges and report back to Council. Duncan stated that D.E. Limpert Company hasn't met with full site plan approval yet and must go back to the Planning Commission concerning Mill Pond Village.

Rigg reviewed plans for parks. Tennis courts were under discussion. A site location given was Carr Park. Kirk Park doesn't have a suitable base for construction of courts. At Carr Park, the first driveway would need closing. It was suggested that one court would cost \$15,000 and three courts would cost \$33,000. Rigg stated that possibly the townships should be asked. Specifications would be necessary for advertising for sealed bids. Site would need to be determined. The Master Park Plan will be completed in two weeks. The Jaycees would like to do any park painting that is needed. Pres-

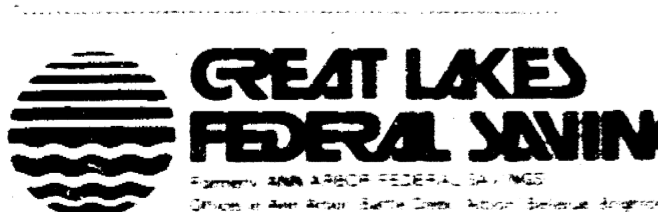

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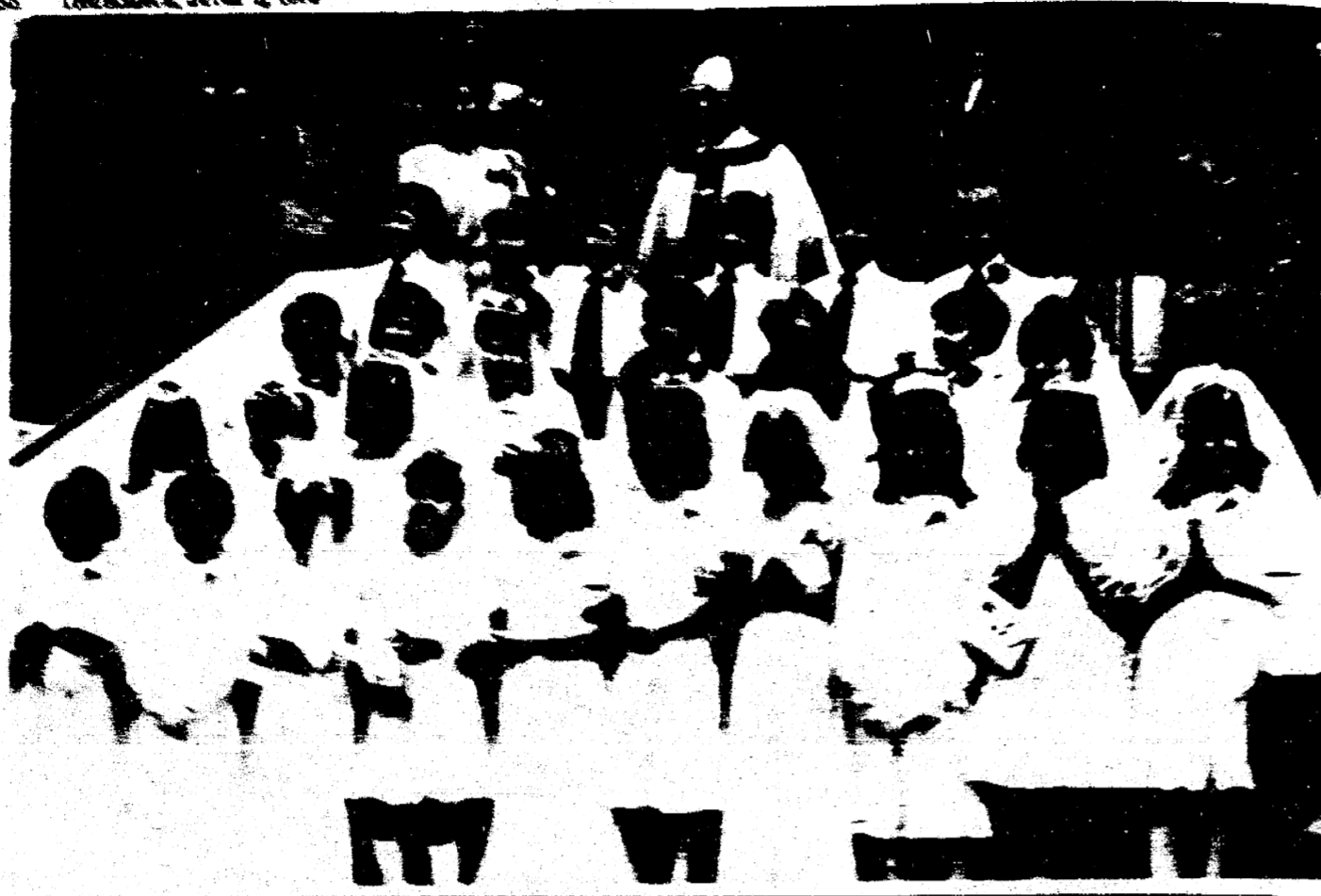

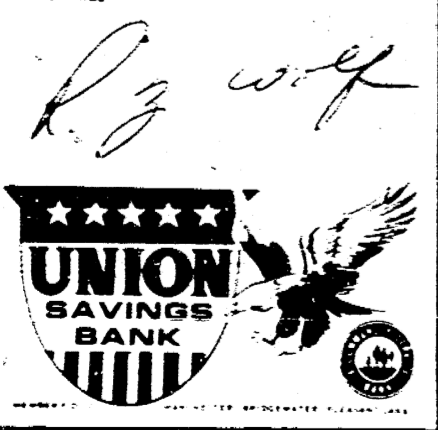
