Or so some consumer research group would like to have us think. This word comes from preliminary findings by Dr. Barry Commoner, a well-known consumer advocate, who presented a paper at the annual meeting of the American Society of Microbiologists in Las Vegas. Dr. Dommoner's paper reported that certain ways of cooking hamburger could produce a possible cancer-causing muta-

"A 'cheap shot' at the beef industry" is what the report was called by Allan Grant, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation. "This is nothing more than a hamburger scare news release designed to raise research money. In fact, there does not appear to be evidence that consumption of hamburger--regardless of the method it is cooked-has caused an increase in cancer in humans," Grant said in a letter to Dr. Commoner requesting documentation of the research that led to the news release.

Science doesn't know at this point what actually causes cancer and research continues. There is nothing wrong with warning consumers about evidence of cancerproducing agents when it is all beyond a reasonable doubt. But it is becoming increasingly popular to point the finger at the producers of food by consumer activists who are getting an increasing amount of the Carter administration's ear for their programs these days. And as long as the administration continues to provide funds for these consumerists

research ideas, the finger-pointing will

First, it was the cranberries, then it was the Strohtiom 90 scare hi milk, then it was the cholesterol warning about eggs and dairy products, then it was the 'dangers'' of eating bacon and processed cold meat products, and now it's the warnings of cancer dangers in the good old American hamburger.

It keeps up, it won't be too long until we will all have to send health hazard warnings to our neighbors when we invite them over for hamburgers or breakfasts of bacon and eggs, or warn them about getting too close to our gardens when they stop over to visit. Even those famous hamburgers we all enjoy at the local drive-in may have to be stamped: "Warning-This food may be injurious



14th District Judge Candidate

SPEEDY TRIALS are necessary to insure that a defendant will be prosecuted within 90 days of his arrest. The criminal knows that if his trial is delayed the odds are in his favor: people' memories fade, they relocate in different regional areas, evidence may be lost of destroyed, or witnesses may expire through natural causes.

CERTAINTY OF PUNISHMENT necessary to prevent the criminal shopping for the lenient judges. If the criminal is aware that all judges will give the same term of years for the same type of crime, he will no longer be assured a sanctuary of probation but instead the prospect of jail.

SEVERITY OF PUNISHMENT signal be met on the basis that PUNISHMENT SHOULD FIT THE CRIME AND NO THE PERSON. Thus, if the crimina commits the crime of armed robbery, he should receive a term of years commensurate with the crime and not on the basis that he is a victim of drags, economics, or social deprevation, When the criminal becomes aware that upon the conviction of an armed robbery he will receive 25 years in the greatest walled prison in the world-Jackson, then his moral sussion may convince him to seek fund from honest employment.

Last, but not least important, is PLB-LIC AWARENESS by the criminal that erime will not be tolerated. News medias can disseminate the trials, results of trials, and punishment for the crime committed. With this foundation, the trend will reverse itself from the vast majority' fear of being a victim of a crime to placing the fear within the criminal, so that he will reflect prior to committing a crime that JUSTICE is SWIFT, CER TAIN, SEVERE, AND PUBLIC.

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
