**LIC.**  
 SPEEDY TRIALS are necessary to insure that a defendant will be prosecuted within 90 days of his arrest. The criminal knows that if his trial is delayed, the odds are in his favor: people's memories fade, they relocate in different regional areas, evidence may be lost or destroyed, or witnesses may expire through natural causes.

**CERTAINTY OF PUNISHMENT** is necessary to prevent the criminal from shopping for the lenient judges. If the criminal is aware that all judges will give the same term of years for the same type of crime, he will no longer be assured a sanctuary of probation but instead the prospect of jail.

**SEVERITY OF PUNISHMENT** should be met on the basis that PUNISHMENT SHOULD FIT THE CRIME AND NOT THE PERSON. Thus, if the criminal commits the crime of armed robbery, he should receive a term of years commensurate with the crime and not on the basis that he is a victim of drugs, economics, or social deprivation. When the criminal becomes aware that upon the conviction of an armed robbery he will receive 25 years in the greatest walled prison in the world—Jackson, then his moral evasion may convince him to seek fund from honest employment.

Last, but not least important, is **PUBLIC AWARENESS** by the criminal that crime will not be tolerated. News medias can disseminate the trials, results of trials, and punishment for the crime committed. With this foundation, the trend will reverse itself from the vast majority's fear of being a victim of a crime to placing the fear within the criminal, so that he will reflect prior to committing a crime that JUSTICE IS SWIFT, CERTAIN, SEVERE, AND PUBLIC.

All citizens of Michigan who are concerned about unreasonable property tax assessment increases each year may help to lower their property taxes.

The statewide Tisch Petition drive to put an amendment on the election ballot in November to CUT property taxes is endorsed by the "Coalition for Property Tax Reform in Michigan," a statewide, non-profit, non-partisan group, and is picking up steam across Michigan. Howard Jarvis, the successful leader of the California Property Tax Revolt, says that the Tisch Petition is the only proposition he supports for Michigan.

The Tisch petition will: (1) CUT PROPERTY TAX assessments IN HALF next year, (2) LIMIT tax value INCREASES to 2 1/2% a YEAR, (3) State INCOME

TAX INCREASES STOPPED AT 5.6%, (4) Local VOTER CONTROL and full state funding of state ordered programs.

All voters who would like to CUT their property taxes NEXT YEAR should send a 15¢ stamped, self-addressed envelope to: Robert E. Tisch, Box 381, Laingsburg, 48848, for copies of the petition.

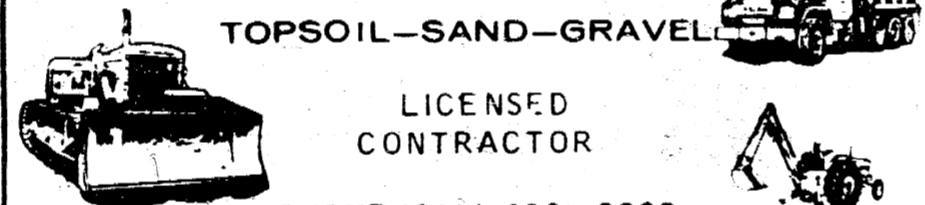

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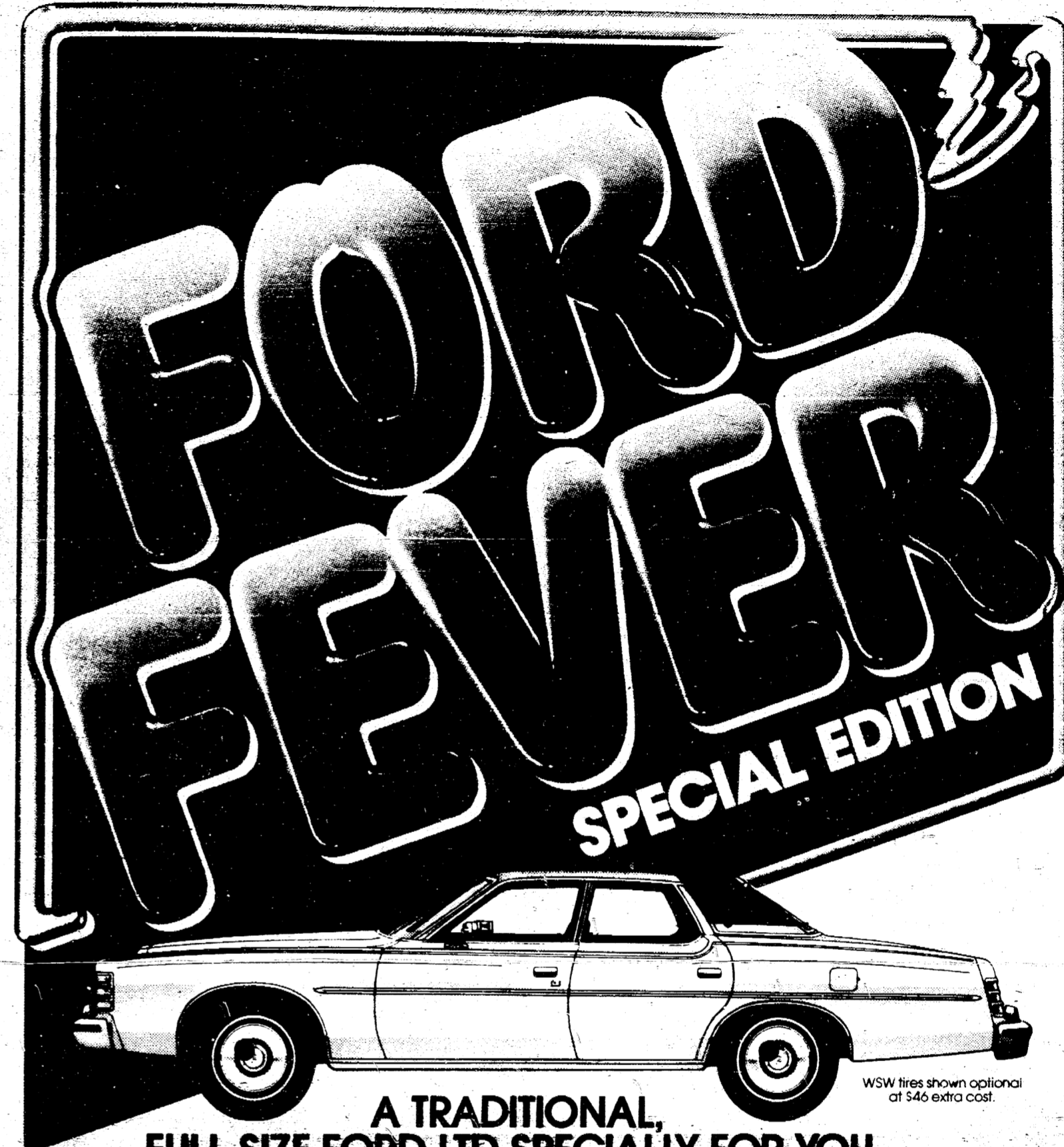

### DAIRY MONTH

June has special meaning for dairy farmers throughout the nation: It's Dairy Month, a time when dairy industry groups traditionally increase efforts to promote better understanding of their industry and their products.

That's particularly significant in Michigan where dairying holds the Number One spot in the state's second-ranking industry, agriculture.

Thousands of people here have jobs producing, transporting, processing, distributing or selling milk and other dairy products.

The equivalent of some 500 million gallons of milk was produced last year on the 7,000 dairy-farms in Michigan. About 265 million gallons of that were processed and sold as fluid milk; the remainder was used to manufacture various dairy byproducts.

Observance of Dairy Month will include efforts by leaders of dairy farmer groups to remind consumers of the importance of milk and other dairy products, and of the importance of dairying to the state's economy.

While many aspects of dairy farming in Michigan have changed over the years in the wake of technological advances in agriculture, it remains an industry pri-

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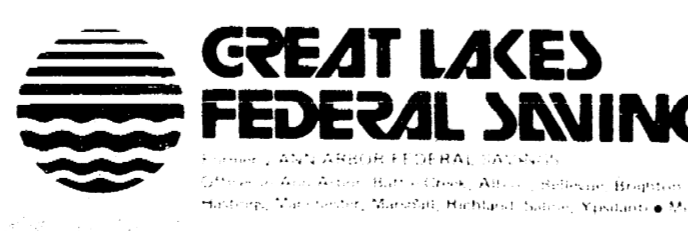

# Council Proceedings

May 15, 1978

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Schaffer at 7:00 p.m. Present were Daniels, DuRussel, Fitzgerald, Duncan, Koebbe, Rigg and Zsenyuk; absent Althouse. Minutes from the May 1, 1978 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Duncan, supported by DuRussel. All yeas, carried. Enter Althouse at 7:03 p.m.

Gary Wiedmayer was present to inquire about water being extended to the two undeveloped lots on Schaffer Court. The Village policy is that the owner extends water mains. After an explanation of the possible alternatives, Mr. Wiedmayer left.

Keith Reed inquired about what is to be done with the building next to his barber shop which has been condemned. He was advised that the owner is in litigation with the insurance company. Any demolition would have to be done at the owner's expense; however, just because the building has been condemned does not mean that it has to be torn down. It must be properly secured though. The primary concern is the securing of the building, which the Police Dept. will direct Alexander to do.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dorr were present with a request to build a garage on their property located at 500 E. Main within the required eight (8) foot sideyard setback. The variance hearing was scheduled for June 5 at 5:15 p.m.

The clerk advised Council of a conditional use permit request which had been received from Alma Arnett, and which had been reviewed by the Planning Commission. The hearing has been scheduled for 8:00 p.m. June 5, 1978.

Mike Bruff asked about Village assistance in River Cleanup Day scheduled for May 26, 1978. Council indicated that some of our people could be available using Village equipment. Mike was to contact Bruce Daniels later in the week regarding arrangements.

Don Limpert indicated that he had just recently discovered that his property on the East side of the Village on Duncan Street is being used as a dump. It was suggested that he post the area, which he assured the Council he was going to do. He wanted the Village to be aware that he had not been using the property in that manner.

Limpert questioned Council on Roesch's opinion regarding Washington, Clinton and Macomb Streets. He had not been present at the last meeting when Roesch was, but said he understood that Roesch has reserved his opinion on the streets affecting the Mill Pond Village property. Limpert said he cannot proceed with the project until the matter is settled; there are too many implications. Schaffer said that Council also cannot proceed with a decision until the matter is settled by our attorney. Fitzgerald stated that the previous council had brought up the matter of the street closings when a subject of a possible river crossing was raised by Limpert. At that time Limpert's tax description also came up. Duncan indicated that since Roesch has estimated that he will have an answer within a month, this is the time frame that we must work within. Limpert answered that he would like it resolved as quickly and equitably as possible. Schaffer indicated that he was to meet with Roesch on May 17, and would contact Limpert regarding any revised time frame.

Laurin Leeson questioned a portion of the Council minutes of April 3 regarding compensation of Planning Commission members. The resolution was fashioned after the Village Ordinance governing payment of Council president and trustees and contains a clause about reimbursement which could be in conflict with the manner in which members are appointed. The clerk agreed to check into that with Roesch. The term president is incorrect in referring to the Planning Commission

Chairman and should be changed to chairman. This can be done at the same time any amendment to change section 4 is voted upon. Leeson also questioned the legality of the official zoning map since changes have not been kept current. The original map is located with the Wash-tona Planning Commission. Leeson agreed to work with DuRussel and the clerk, as well as Sang Nam on an update of the Zoning Map.

Duncan reviewed Planning Commission actions. Dorr's request for a variance was approved to allow construction of a garage with allowances of four feet of rear yard setback and four feet of side yard setback. Cox's request for a variance to allow construction of a carport with allowance for only five feet to side yard setback with the structure ten feet from the nearest building on adjacent property was approved. Arnett's request for a conditional use permit to establish a "one chair" beauty shop in the basement of her home was approved if provision is made for adequate off-street parking for all vehicles as per Zoning Ordinance. The above applicants were referred to Village Council for proper hearing and formal action. Limpert was present at Planning Commission to apply for a change in zoning on that property described as "Thomas Morgan Addition-Lots 8,9, 10, 11, 12" on the southwest corner of Duncan and Morgan Streets, from the present zoned use of R-1B (Single-Family Urban Residential District) to I-3 (Urban Industrial District). He also is requesting the vacating of the platted alley on the west side of these properties; the alley is between and parallel to Division and Morgan Streets.

According to the unapproved minutes of the Planning Commission meeting of May 8, 1978 the following recommendation was to be forward to Council: that favorable consideration be given to Mr. Limpert's application for rezoning of the properties described as "Thomas Morgan Addition-Lots 8,9,10,11,12", from R-1B to I-3, provided that Mr. Limpert simultaneously apply for rezoning of the

properties facing on Duncan Street, and extending to the Village Limit, currently zoned I-2 (General Industrial District), such that the parcel generally north of Duncan Street be rezoned R-1B, and the parcel generally south of Duncan Street be rezoned R-3 (Medium Density Multiple-Family Residential District). Further that Mr. Limpert's request to vacate the alley between Division and Morgan Streets shall be denied. The motion was approved with Chapin and Bruce voting no. The request for simultaneous requests of zoning changes was at suggestion of Planning Commission and not an inducement by Limpert, according to Limpert and Duncan. After some discussion it was decided that Mr. Limpert should apply to have his property rezoned. The Public Hearing will be set when Limpert has the legal description and request turned into the clerk.



Zsenyuk reported that the amount of malicious destruction of property at Carr Park has increased. Enforcement of ordinances has increased and a warrant has been secured on the malicious destruction. Zsenyuk attended the Manchester Association meeting and suggested that Council review the proposed plans submitted on the parking situation, both the north and south sides of Main Street. Fitzgerald agreed to attend a meeting about the parking on May 16, 1978. Limpert has estimated that the total cost for the proposed parking lot renovation would be less than \$20,000. In checking into the availability of HUD

Specifications for the new police cars were sent out. These specs are the same as those for the State Police. There is a 8-10 week delivery on the police package. Bids were received from Tirb Chevrolet \$5,870.00, Widmayer Ford \$4,333.00 and Driscoll Bros. \$5,697.00. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by DuRussel to accept the bids leaving the decision to the Health and Safety Committee. All yeas, carried.

## Employment Opportunities For Manchester Youth

The Manchester Community Schools is now offering an in-school youth program in cooperation with the Washtenaw County Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) office. The program is the Youth Employment and Training Program (YETP). may participate in the YETP program being offered through the schools. The youth who may take part in the program must be:  
 1. 14-19 years of age.

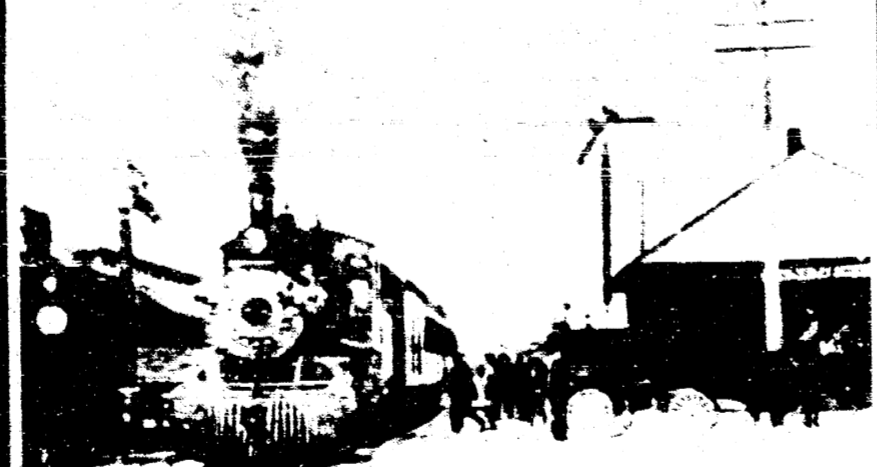

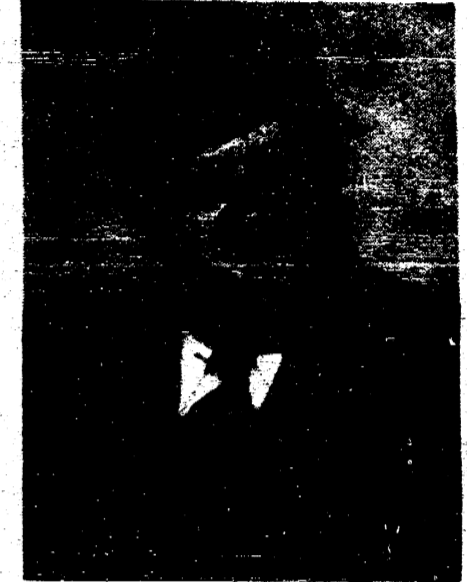

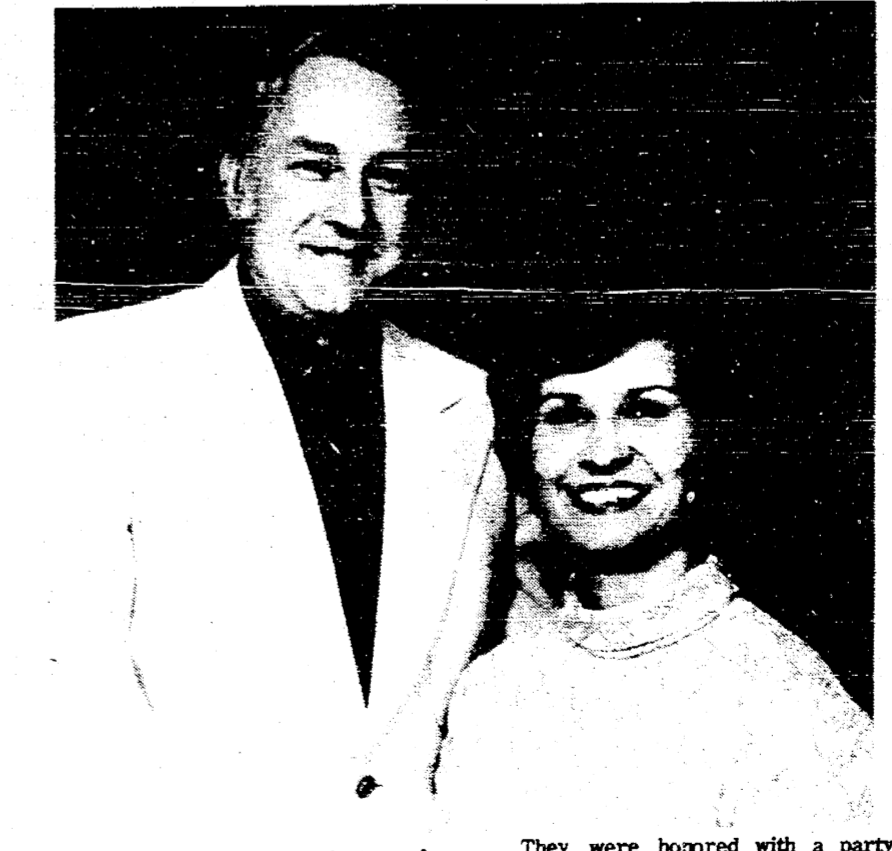
